Writes to Relatives, Downs Poison Without Replying to Accusation.

CISCO, Jan. 2.-Following the alleged discovery of letters indicating ap revious marriage, Alvin Swann, 45, tool dresser and blacksmith of this place, yesterday afternoon died a few minutes after he is said to have swallowed two ounces of carbolic acid. "I guess I am going to hell,"

Swann is said to have replied to a question from one of his stepdaughters, as he raised the poison to his lips. The daughter screamed and sought to wrest the poison from his hands but failed. Swann gulped down the poison and lay down on his bed, dying about 4:30. Four letters addressed to his brothers and half brothers in Oklahoma are thought to explain his act.

Swann was married to Mrs. Addie Horn on Nov. 15. Yesterday morning his wife is said to have been looking through an old suit case belonging to her husband, when she discovered a letter from one of Swann's brothers in Oklahoma, addressed to Swann and his wife and dated in October -several weeks prior to his marriage to Mrs. Horn. Swann is said to have refused to either deny or admit that he had a wife before his last marriage in reply to his wife's accusations, but to have started writing letters to a brother and a half brother in Tulsa and to two half brothers in Oolagah, Okla.

On completing the letters Swann is said to have calmly poured the poison in a glass. Mrs. B. Montgomery, one of his two step-daughters, was in the room at the time and asked what he was going to do. According to her statement Swann replied, "I guess I am going to hell." She stated that she attempted to take the poison from him, but failed.



WANT SUBS FOR OIL FIELD HUNT

Vast Underwater Deposits of Petroleum Can Be Located, Is Bellef.

By HENRY WOODHOUSE.

UASHINGTON, Jan. 2.- The puzzling insistence on the part of the British delegation to their demands for the abolition of the submarine and their equal insistence to their proposals to forbid construction of submarines of great size is increased by the fact that the British are planning extensive underwater mining, exploring for underwater petroleum fields, locating sunken vessels, and other underwater work in which submarines are to be used.

The British admiralty war staff, in their report of the survey of the oil fields of Persia, and on the map showing the locations of the oil fields, show six oil fields on the Persian gulf, four of them being capable of tapping only by using submarines and divers.

My investigation of the British oil monopoly plans has shown that the that city. British petroleum department is locating submarine oil fields and that, in fact, the officials of the petroleum department are aware of the fact, and they recognize the fact that these submarine oil fields are the only possible obstacle to the British government achieving complete world-wide monopoly of oil resources. It is known that approximately 50,000,000 square miles of ocean floor is at depths of only from 50 to 200 feet, and many extensive petroleum deposits have been dis-

Enormous Field.

As the land surface of the earth covers only 56,255,000 square miles, it will be seen that the ocean floor is comparatively shallow water where oil field may be found is approximately as large as the total land surface of the earth.

When found that the British admiralty listed submarine fields as available, over two years ago, I began an extensive study of the subject to ascertain to what extent submarines could be used to open up to mankind the vast stores of petroleum,

Having known the Lake family for a number of years on account of the pioneer work of Christopher J. Lake and Simon Lake in aviation, as well as in submarines, I took the matter up with the Lakes, and they told me that they had made experiments with their own submarines and had ascertained that submarine mining was feasible with present day submarines to depths of from 50 to 200 feet.

A trip which I made across the continent and along the Pacific coast from Vancouver to San Diego, then BODY OF BABY GIRL back to San Francisco, enabled me to survey the work already being done in drilling and operating oil wells in shallow water on the Pacific seaboard, and convinced me that presentday submarines would make it possible to tap oil fields existing at depths of from twenty to fifty feet.


