## **NO OPPOSITION EXPECTED FOR** NAVAL TREAT

### Vote at 3 P. M. Today; 18 Articles Approved at Yesterday's Session.

WASHINGTON, March 29 .--- Prediction that the senate would ratify the naval limitation treaty today by a unanimous vote is being made by administration leaders, in view of the complete lack of opposition to the four-power supplementary treaties. The favorable sentiment revealed during the five-hour discussion yesterday resulted in an agreement for a final vote on ratification at 3 p. m. today. Administration lead-ers also are hopeful that the sub-



a committee of the whole, adopted the first eighteen articles of the naval limitation treaty. Each article was adopted by a viva

Action came at the conclusion of a speech by Senator Lodge, explaining the treaty.

Only a bare dozen senators were present and further action on the treaty was blocked temporarily when Senator King, Democrat, of Utah, suggested the absence of a quorum.

Mahaney Claims Self-Defense HABEAS CORPUS IS REFIISE **APPEALS COUR** 

> Decision Held Vital to Probe of Klan's Alleged Illegal Activities.

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, March 29 .--- J. D. Copeland, police commissioner, and F. G. Reynolds, clerk of the Austin camp, Woodmen of the World, today were ordered remanded to the custody of the sheriff of Travis county by the court of criminal appeals this morning. This order affirms the verdict of the criminal district court, citing the two witnesses in contempt of court for refusing to answer questions of the grand jury investigating the Ku Klux Klan.

Copeland and Reynolds appeared before the Travis county grand jury on March 14, and refused to answer when asked if they were members of the Ku Klux Klan, who its officers and members were, and similar questions. They were fined \$100 and remanded to jail indefinitely for contempt of court at a hearing on March

The grand jury had recessed until
