Starkey Blames Mahaney for His Run-in With Sheriff.

Stecial to the Times EASTLAND, March 28.—With the completion of the testimony of fifteen witnesses on the assault made on L. J. Starkey, Cisco legionnaire, by Newt Mahaney, former deputy sheriff, the state rested shortly before noon today in the trial of Mahaney, charged with assault with intent to murder. The majority of the witnesses introduced by the prosecution testified to seeing Nolley strike Starkey down and Mahaney slash him with a knife. Others testified to threats and foul language that had been directed toward Starkey by Mahaney, previous to the encounter on Feb. 3.

Starkey told the jury of an encounter with Mahaney eighteen months ago at the station in Cisco, and it was later brought out in the testimeny that Mahaney had "stuck a gun in Starkey's stomach." Starkey declared that after Nolley had struck him to the ground with his pistol he had heard the sheriff say "I will shoot the \_\_\_\_," and this testimony was corroborated by Ross Marchman, who followed him on the stand. Both men also testified that Nolley had demanded of Mahaney "what he was doing with that knife," after Starkey had been struck down and cut, and that Mahaney had re-plied, "You know, Sam." Another witness told of hearing Nolley advise Mahaney to go and pay a fine immediately.

Special Prosecutor.

Beside the county attorney, the case s being prosecuted by Judge B. W. Peterson, as special counsel. J. Lee Clearley is acting as chief counsel for the defense. The court during the progress of the trial found it necessary on two occasions to caution the spectators against any demonstration, the first occasion being when Starkey

The state opened in the case yesterday afternoon about 3:30 when the selection of the jury was completed. M. F. Watts, truck driver, of Cisco, told of seeing the fight between Starkey and Sheriff Nolley, and to seeing Mahaney start to cut Starkey. Starkey then turned and hit Mahaney and then Nolley hit Starkey on the head LAST OF WEEK twice with a pistol, the witness said.
After Starkey fell, the witness said, he saw Mahaney "reaching with a knife twice." He said that Starkey did not hit Mahaney until after the former had cut him in the stomach.

Dr. D. Ball of Cisco testified to the location and condition of the wounds on Starkey's body. On cross-examination the witness said that the wounds were regarded as critical and that if unattended Starkey would have died. It was brought out that before the encounter, Starkey was above the average in physical fitness, the inference being that if he had been only average in fitness he would have died from his wounds.

Other witnesses told practically the same story as did Watts. Had Previous Trouble.

Starkey took the stand when court opened this morning. He told of an encounter with Mahaney eighteen months ago, but was not allowed to say whether or not Mahaney was armed. He said that he had approached Nolley to have him contradict a rumor started by Mahaney




