(By The Associated Press.)

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—Hundreds of passenger trains were withdrawn from service on the railroads of the country today, most of the withdrawals being made in the middle west, the south and the southwest, in accordance with instructions issued last week by the railroad administration, and hundreds of other trains have been ordered cancelled next week, chiefly in the east, as a result of the coal miners' strike.

In New England alone orders were out today cancelling nearly 300 trains. Wednesday dozens of trains are to be discontinued in Pennsylvania and even Canadian railroads have felt the coal shortage to such an extent that thirty-five additional passenger trains were taken off today, including the Transcontinental Limited of the Canadian Pacific.

PUBLIC STILL IN DARK.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The public, those who are most concerned, are still in the dark today as to the government's latest move to settle the strike of the bituminous coal miners.

Nothing as to the nature of the proposals has been made public either by the miners or the officials but comfort was taken in the statement last night by Attorney General Palmer that the end of the strike was in sight.

Hope for a settlement tomorrow afternoon of the controversy between the miners, operators and government was expressed in a formal statement issued at the White House today.

The statement follows:

"It is hoped that there will be a settlement Tuesday afternoon of the controversy between the miners, operators and the government through the acceptance by the miners of a plan for a definite conclusion of the strike. The plan as proposed by President Wilson was submitted to Acting President Lewis of the miners by Attorney General Palmer Saturday night."

The utmost secrecy still surrounds the president's proposal and Secretary Tumulty and other officials refused to supplement the White House statement today. It was learned, however, that the proposal made to the miners was from the president himself and in the form of a memorandum written by him.






