Old Well 'Comes In' for 1,500

BOY, 3, STRICK Crosbie & Sweet Drill Out Gas Well Cave-in and Get Big Production, Mile North of Olden. ROTHBLUM

Cleedth Bourdeau, Shaken Off Running Board, Has Right Side Crushed.

Cleedth Bourdeau, 3-year-old son of Gleason Bourdeau, proprietor of Bourdeau Bros. planing mill on South Rusk street, was run over and painfully injured about 10:30 this morning by a truck driven by his father. The rear wheel of the truck passed over the right arm and side of the child, breaking the arm. One rib is also thought to be broken. The child was carried to the Clinical hospital. where it was reported he would recover from his injuries. The father was almost prostrated by the accident and was given medical attention after he had assisted in setting the child's

The accident occurred while the little boy jumped on the running board of the truck while the men were not looking and was thrown off when the truck, coupled to the plow, was



Olden is all excited this week about an oil well that may be a "freak," but if it will just keep going, it is a profitable one. It's making 1,000 to 1,500 barrels. The well, belonging to Crosbie and Sweet, casinghead refiners, is located on the Scott & Hill tract, about a mile this side of Olden. It is an old gas well, drilled more

than two years ago to a depth of 3,280 feet and made 15,000,000 feet of gas despite a cave-in of the last 200 to 300 feet at the bottom.


Recently, the gas flow declined to such an extent that the owners decided to drill out the cave-in, in an effort to increase the flow. This was done and when the casing was lowered, the well began making salt water, which on the second day began showing oil. The oil flow gradually increased until yesterday the well was said to have filled a 500-barrel flow tank with oil in twelve hours, or

at the rate of 1,200 barrels a day, and the salt water had almost vanished.

This well, which is on the south and east edge & production at that point, is near the Harris wells of the Magnolia company, one of which came in for 4,200 barrels. Manager Robinson of Crosbie & Sweet said deep tests had been drilled on every side of this well, failing to show production on the south and east, and he did not anticipate drilling any

more. However, should the well continue to make oil at anything like its present rate, someone is sure to get curious as to what is under the surrounding country.

Other wells are due to spring up in that section soon, George Ford, prominent land owner at Olden, said yesterday afternoon, including two to be drilled on the townsite.

COAL STRIKE TACTICS. Suppose, during the closing days of the war, the allied powers had refused to accept the capitulation of Austria because Germany was still fighting? That would have been a blunder which would have retired the person responsible to the far edges of the back woods. For it is a recognized fact that if one can take a portion of his opponents out of action, his chances with the remainder are bettered.

And yet that reasoning does not seem to appeal to the coal miners' executives. They are going to smash the whole front at once and refuse to do any nibbling or infiltration into the operators' position. Perhaps they know what they are doing, but the chances are they do not. Otherwise, they would wage an industrial war on a saner basis. It seems that there are sections where a wage scale could be agreed to. By signing in those districts, they would at once lessen the number of their opponents, put those opponents under the flank fire of seeing other coal operators taking their markets away from them, and increase their own way chest. But by forcing the friendly employes to line up with those unfriendly, they strengthen the opposition, without helping their own cause in the districts where the fight is hardest. They absolutely deprive themselves of money. The families of half a million men must be fed while they are idle, and with no one working. Where is the money to come from? But suppose half that number were at work at the rate of pay the union demands, then those miners would have money to assist their workless fellows, while the holdout operators would see the nation getting along without their coal,
