ROUMANIAN SITUATION BECOMING MORE SERIOUS REPORTS SAY

CONVENTION OF PEASANT PARTY IS FEARED

All Revolutionary Persons Ordered Arrested By Premier

VIENNA, Oct. 29.—Reports alleged to have gone from Bucharest during the night indicate that the Roumanian situation is becoming more serious hourly. These reports have received wide distribution in Vienna.

Premier Bratianu has ordered troops in readiness to arrest all revolutionary persons arriving to attend the convention of the peasant party which has been summoned at Alba on Nov. 1, the reports declared.

Compulsory School Attendance Period Begins November 7

The period of compulsory education for the Eastland city schools will go into effect on Monday, Nov. 7, and will continue for 100 days, according to a statement given out this morning by W. Z. Bates, superintendent of Eastland schools.

The law states that all children who were eight years of age on Sept. 1st and not over fourteen years of age will be required to attend school for the time noted above.

The compulsory education law is a state provision and the officials of all public schools are urged by the state department to enforce the law to the limit.

Failure upon the part of the student to attend school will subject a \$500 fine to be imposed upon the parents unless a legal excuse is given for his absence.

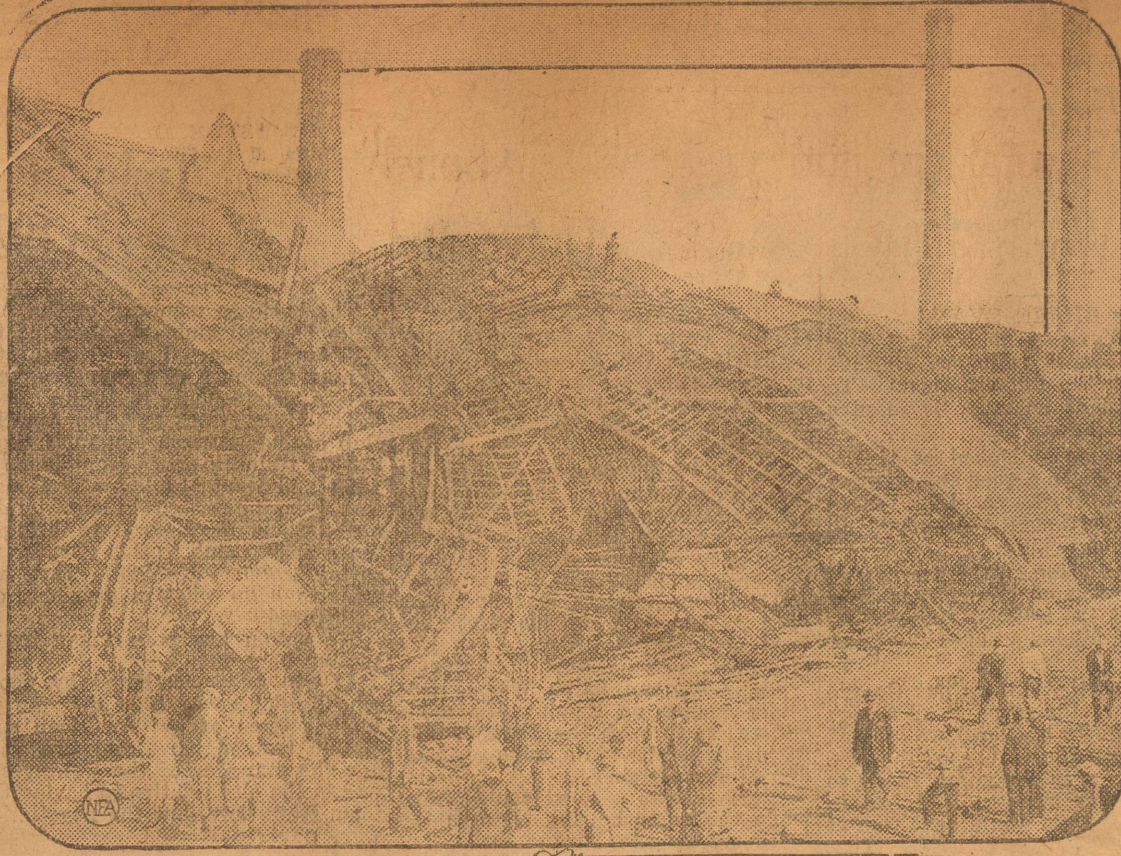





Work Will Start On Court House About Jan. 1

While the preliminary work necessary to be done before actual construction on Eastland county's new \$300,000 courthouse can be started, is being disposed of as rapidly as possible, it is not probable that work on the new building will be started before the first of the new year. In the business district, a second story is being added to one business building and a 40 by 40 garage is being erected. BULLDOGS PUT UP SPUNKY FIGHT AGAINST STRONG EAGLE SQUAD

RANGER TEAM IS BADLY BEATEN BY ABILENE

Individual Ranger Players Win Admiration of Crowd By Fighting Spirit.

"Badly beaten, but not humiliated."

That, in five words tells the most of the story of the Bulldogs' engagement with the Abilene Eagles Friday at Abilene when the Eagles won by a score of 33 to 0.

With Captain Garland Hinman on the side lines except

for a very few minutes of the game and then he was in there on one leg and a mere shadow of his normal self, and with Cotton Reeves out with a wrenched knee for nearly the whole last half, the rest of the Bulldogs stayed in there and fought in true Bulldog style until the last whistle blew.

It was a rare exhibition of nerve and fight on the part of the young and inexperienced players who were outweighed and whose opponents showed they had had football experience before this year.

There was nothing but praise for those little fellows, from the crowd that watched the game and saw them dive in there and put out everything they had with a grim determination to have it said that, although they were defeated, they didn't quit until the last play of the game.

To pick out an individual star will be left to someone who claims to know football. Charlie Hamilton didn't show up so good in the first quarter, but was started in the second half and during the third quarter he put out the best football he has yet shown. Hamilton has the physical ability to be one of the foremost high school football players in the state, but this is his first year which, in a measure, accounts for his difficulty in getting going.

Cotton Reeves showed more drive than he has had in any game this year until he went out in the third quarter, and Ernest Whitehall, Seth Hubbard and Hammett carried the battle to the big boys as well as did Ray Trammell.

Mitchell and Tackett put the best they had into their guard positions, and Bumpers, who played guard part of the time surprised the fans with his good work for such a little man.

Turkey Hinman and Blackmon showed up well for their experience, and their progress will be watched by the sport writers of the district when the 1928 season gets underway. David Whitehall turned in a good

game and fought with a determination to do his part toward making up what the team lost in not having Garland Hinman in there. Arkansas McLaughlin and Gene Nourse each turned in good games. Nourse was particularly thrilled because it was the longest he had ever been allowed to stay in a conference game.

Toward the end of the game Little Claire Seay went in. His sweater is hardly broad enough across the back to permit room for his number, 22. But he hit the big fellows just as hard as his weight would let him. Then there was Bohannan, center. He had the toughest job on the team, but did not make a single bad pass all through the game and did mighty nice work on defense.

It wasn't such a slaughter as the score would indicate. A couple of nice breaks in Abilene's favor did not hurt them any, but they had the Bulldogs clearly outclassed in weight and experience and deserved to win. But don't let anybody tell you that the Bulldogs didn't show plenty of fight, because better than 400 Ranger people who saw the game were unanimous in their decision that the Bulldogs gave a good account of themselves and there was no regrets at the loss of the game after such a valiant fight.

Abilene Shows Courtesies To Bulldog Crowd

The town of Abilene certainly showed their guests from Ranger every courtesy Friday when a special train bearing the Bulldogs and their supporters spent the day there.

Every citizen of Ranger, particularly the patrons of the schools, should be proud of the showing made in Abilene by the pep squad and the band. Four Victories For Yankees Was Worth \$100,000

George Moriarty, in his first year as a big league manager, finished fourth with the Detroit Tigers. To me that means he must be rated a successful leader.

At one time it looked as if Detroit might finish a good second after a very bad start. A late season slump, unfortunately, spoiled all chances of so doing.

"In commenting on the showing of the club, none of the experts have pointed out the weakest spot on our club, relief pitching," says the Tiger pilot.

"The fact that illness put George Daus out of the running all season was the biggest handicap we labored under. With Daus, one of the best relief pitchers in the game, ready to hold a one or two-run lead late in the game, Detroit would have won at least 10 or 15 more contests. That would have meant second place."

When one considers what an asset Wiley Moore was to the New York Yankees, it is easy to figure what a loss Detroit suffered in the absence of George Daus.

Was Aid to Baseball

The four straight victories of the New York Yankees in the world series was a great thing for baseball.

"For the Yankees to win four straight games to decide the championship was worth far more than the \$200,000 I returned, because of the prestige that it gives my team and the good that it does the game," was the remark Colonel Ruppert made at the close of the series.

Some idea of what a difficult job it is for one team to win four straight games from a strong opponent is proved by a glance at the record of the New York Yankees during the past season. No club in the American League from April to October was able to take four straight from the Yanks.

When two teams enter into a world series, it is about a 15-1 shot that neither will win four straight. As a matter of fact it has happened only twice in the 24 that have been staged.

Johnson Was Pleased

Recently I received a letter from B. B. Johnson, retired president of the American League, in which he said:

"The four straight victories of the New York club pleased me immensely. It was a splendid performance and it will have a good effect on professional baseball. Nine out of 10 persons seemed to think that the series would extend over Sunday, for the monetary benefit. It was good to disabuse their minds in that particular."

Since the former head of the American League has, from the time he organized it, stressed the honesty of the game, the clean cut victory of the Yanks just prior to his resignation, was the source of great gratification.

Really the drastic stand that B. B. Johnson took on some of the unpleasant situations in baseball, dealing with crookedness, made much of his trouble in later years.

Ralph Welch Is Hero At Perdue University

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—Bo McMillen took his Center college football team up to Cambridge, beat Harvard and became a national figure several years ago.

Harold "Red" Grange slashed his way through some of the best football teams in the middle west for two years and then went down to the University of Pennsylvania to show the Philadelphians how it was done.

The latest western star had the good fortune to make his first big start against Harvard, and he, like McMillen, won national prominence.

He is William Ralph Welch, generally known as Ralph. His darts decidedly helped win a game for Purdue early in October.

Welch insists a co-ed could have made the gains he did, through the holes cut by the Purdue line, and with the interference formed by his mates in the backfield.

While football seems to have created Welch's reputation, Ralph considers baseball his best sport and he hopes to earn a position in one of the major leagues as a catcher when he has completed four years at Purdue. He aspires to catch for the better maker nine next spring. Being a sophomore this year, he was not eligible for competition last season—his freshman year.

If his baseball aspirations go awry, Ralph will take up the football business, he says, either as a professional player or as a coach.

The Purdue star is working his way through the university by waiting on table and washing dishes in his fraternity house. The assignment in the butler's pantry is a much harder one than the one given him by Jimmie Phelan, Purdue coach, who sent him against Harvard to replace the injured Purdue ball-carrying star "Cotton" Wilcox. Welch's explosive showing made Crimson players think they had tackled some "guncooter," they said after the game.

Beular went within three yards of a touchdown in the second period but an incomplete pass on the last play gave S. M. U. the ball.

BIG PARADE OUTSTANDING EVENT OF THE CONVENTION

Returning Legionnaire Tells of Trip to France, Says Much of Battle Ground Reclaimed

The Big Parade of the approximately 26,000 legionnaires who went to Paris for the American Legion convention in September, was, according to Al Tune of Ranger, delegate from Carl Barnes Post No. 69, the outstanding event of the second American expedition.

The parade was formed by state delegations, and Texas had ninth place, as it had the ninth largest delegation. It started its line of march at 2:30 in the afternoon and marched until 4:30.

There were 48 delegations in the great parade and quite a few delegations were led by companies of French soldiers, and every delegation was led by two French officers. The solid six and one-half miles of the ground covered by the march was lined with French soldiers standing shoulder to shoulder, with bayonets fixed, so as to protect the Americans in case of trouble, but there was none.

The American troops were allowed to march under the Arch de Triomphe, the third time any foreign army has ever been allowed to do so. The grave of the Unknown soldier is at this point and each delegation passing by placed flowers on the grave. Mr. Tune said that when the Texas delegation arrived, and though ninth in line of march, the grave was already banked with wonderful flowers. The French were carried away with this tribute by the Americans.

Shown Courtesy.
Mr. Tune stated that from the time they left Galveston via the Chicago until they reached New Orleans via the De LaSalle, both French liners, with French crews and French officers, every courtesy was extended them. In France it seemed that the French were never happier in their lives. The French people seemed anxious to please the Americans, in treatment, prices and entertainment. While Mr. Tune unloaded at Brest in his former American expedition to France, he did not visit that point this time. He stated that the business meetings of the convention were held at the Trocadero, which is near the Eiffel tower and the opening speeches were made by Generals Pershing, Foch, Savage and the president of France.

The president of France in his address of welcome, stressed the way the French people felt toward the Americans, was warm in his welcome and hoped that the friendship between the United States and France would always be of the warmest kind. General John J. Pershing, who, Mr. Tune said looked a little older, but seemed very delighted to be with the

"boys" again, responded to the address of welcome by telling the president of France and others how delighted the Americans were to be in France again.

Paris Prosperous.
Mr. Tune said that Paris seemed more prosperous and that 80 per cent of the battle fields had been reclaimed and turned back to farm lands. He said that there were still parts that showed the scars of war, especially Belleau Woods and Rheims.

Belleau Woods, consisting of 350 acres, was purchased by the United States after the war and it is just as it was when the Armistice was declared except the undergrowth that has grown up in nine years' time.

Down the slope there is a cemetery where sleep 2300 American soldiers, and this cemetery, Mr. Tune said, is kept in perfect order and each day the flag is raised and lowered again in the evening.

German artillery is still lying around, trenches and shell holes still bespeak the warfare that went on there in the latter part of the war.

Mr. Tune said that he was told by a caretaker that it was thought that 53 American dead are still among the

ruins and will eventually be found. Six were found last year and these were all identified.

Chateau Thierry, which was the turning point of the war and was the nearest the Germans ever got to Paris and were not turned back until the Americans turned them back, has been practically rebuilt, Mr. Tune said. The bridge across the River Marne has been replaced and only a few bullet-spattered walls tell the story of that bloody field.

Visited London.
Mr. Tune did not go to Germany but talked to some friends who did and they reported that the Germans were tickled to death to see them and did everything they could for them while there.

Prices were reasonable in most cases, he said. A meal that would cost a couple of dollars over here could be gotten for 10 or 12 francs over there, or about 50 or 60 cents.

Mr. Tune visited in London for three days, going over by boat and train, which takes about seven hours, while an airplane takes only two and one-half hours for the trip. He visited Westminster Abbey and saw tombs with dates on them that went back 200 years before Columbus sailed for America. He visited Downing street and saw the statue of Lord Kitchener and others, and had the pleasure of seeing the royal palace guard change, as it does every day at 12 o'clock. Of course he saw the Tower of London and many other historical spots, but when it came time to come back to the old U. S. A. Mr. Tune came via New Orleans, thus beating the Galveston route he went, by several days, and arrived in Ranger several days earlier than he would otherwise.

Mrs. Lee will also have charge of extension work.

The initial meeting of the delegates representing forty-five counties in the sixth federated district, was held Saturday morning. Attending both this and the afternoon meeting were such well-known Texas club women as Mrs. John F. Lyons, Fort

Worth, past state and national president of the federated music clubs; Mrs. J. O. Matrief, Fort Worth, vice-president and chairman of extension work state federated music clubs; Mrs. Monroe G. Cheney, past president of the first district and present state chairman; Mrs. M. H. Hagan, Ranger, second vice president state federated women's clubs and candidate for president of the Texas federated women's club; Mrs. R. Q. Lee, Cisco; Mrs. Chas. G. Norton, Eastland; Mrs. Fred L. Drago, Eastland; and Mrs. S. O. Hittson. Mrs. John Lyons delivered an address at a luncheon given by the Eastland Music club at noon Saturday at the community club house.

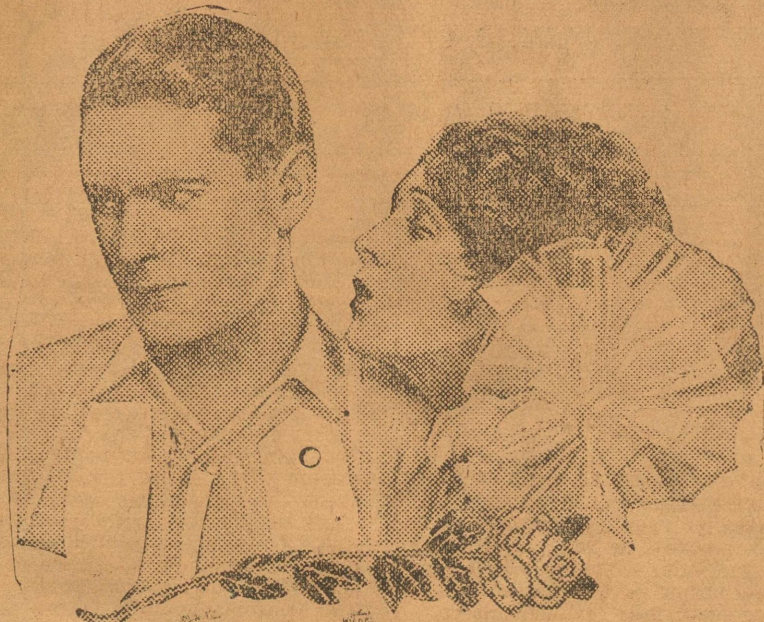

The only difference being, a person can cense an ill-feeling and go to a doctor, while the automobile carries on until cold weather comes and forces a visible protest—then a repair job is needed. This is the observation of R. A. Armstrong, director of service of the Oakland Motor Car company, who urges owners to have their cars given a pre-winter inspection and adjustments necessary to insure maximum cold weather performance. "This pre-winter automobile check-up is similar in its purpose to the growing practice of visiting a physician every autumn just for inspection," said Mr. Armstrong. The physician checks over the visitor's physical condition, alters his diet, possibly gives him a hypodermic of anti-cold serum, directs him to change to heavier clothing and in general "services" him for the winter. It is a wise precautionary measure that undoubtedly prevents much winter illness. "The few essential attentions which are necessary before any automobile can maintain its best service under lower temperature conditions, require very little more time than the physician consumes in preparing the human machine for the rigors of winter. But that hour or two will pay large dividends later in uninterrupted driving satisfaction. Many of the Oakland-Pontiac service stations have grouped these cold weather precautions under a flat rate which compares favorably with the fee which a competent physician charges for physical examination. "Highly important among these details is a change to lighter lubricants in crank case, transmission and rear end. A lighter grade is necessary to give the moving parts the same protection that they have received during the warm weather with heavier lubricants. "Gasoline tank, gasoline lines and carburetor should be cleaned. The carburetor should be adjusted to give a slightly richer mixture, which is nothing more than placing the car on a cold weather diet. Spark plugs should be cleaned or if they have been in service for more than 10,000 miles, they should be replaced. Distributor points should be cleaned and adjusted. Radiator hose connection should be tightened. If compression has been reduced by long service, it should be brought back to normal. Hard starting in winter often may be traced to low compression. "While many motorists now understand cars so thoroughly that they are able to do practically all of these operations in their home garages, we advise our owners to place the car in an Oakland-Pontiac garage where trained service specialists are available. "The flat rate plan is spreading steadily through the Oakland service organization. It is meeting with universal approval from motorists. They like the idea of buying their service 'over the counter' at a known price just as they would any other commodity."

"A large force of traffic experts are kept busy the year around to guard against any delay either in incoming or outgoing freight, which would mean a shut-down of the works within a few days."

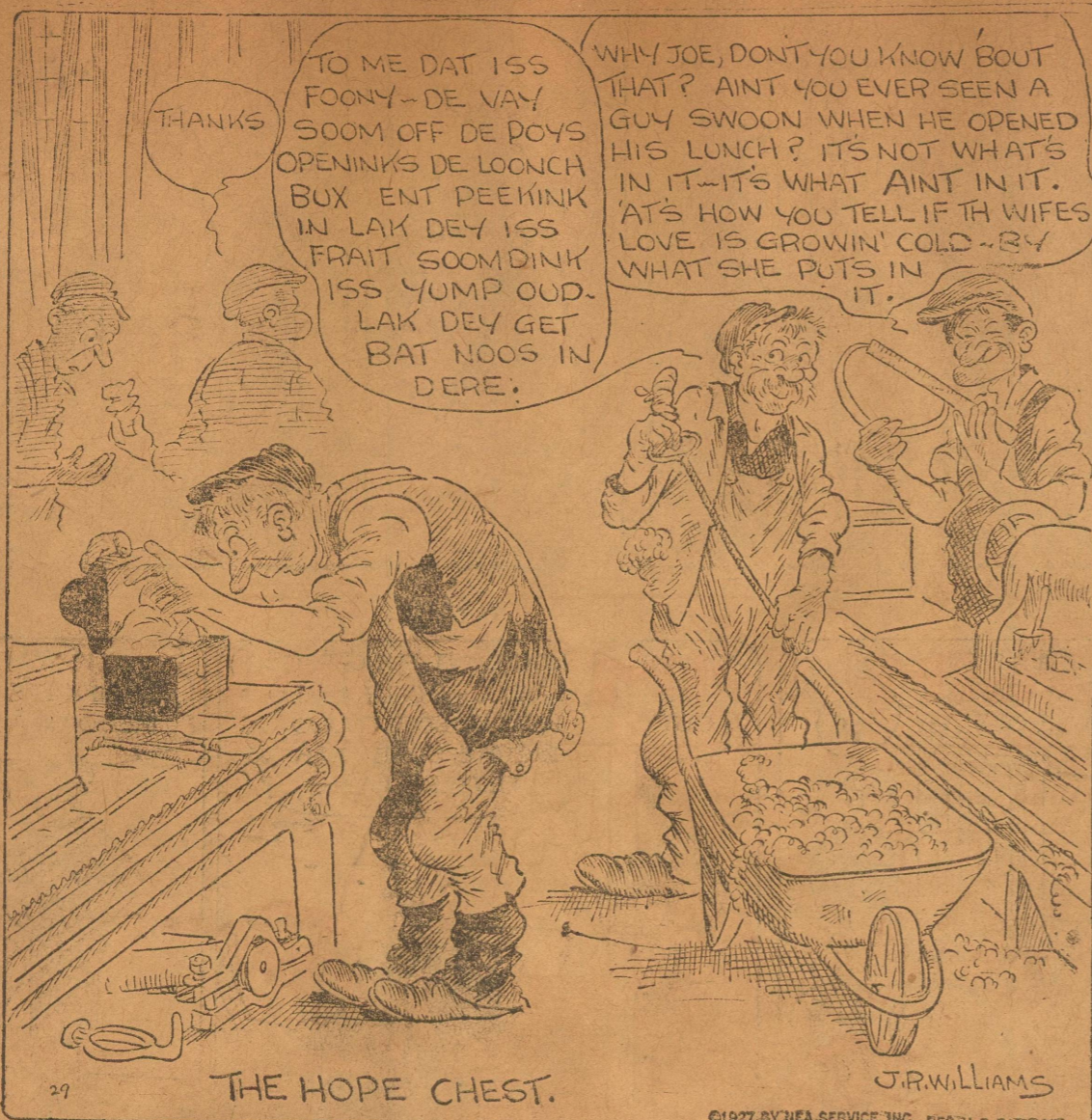

Washington Is Interested In Tunney's Talk

WASHINGTON.—The news that Gene Tunney, the gentle prizefight champion, had conceived certain notions about becoming an ambassador after he retires undefeated from the ring at the age of 35, aroused considerable interest at the Department of State.

Secretary Kellogg and Under Secretary Olds being absent, other officials would not allow their names to be used in commenting upon this unexpected compliment which Mr. Tunney had paid the diplomatic profession.

It almost appeared as if some of these gentlemen didn't take the idea very seriously. This was rather puzzling, for, as everyone knows, the very best people have patronized the intellectual Mr. Tunney, and many of our best people are right

here in the state department.

One official was unkind enough to point out that the lowest grade of the foreign service has about 20 vacancies a year for which there are some 200 applicants. The applicants must take written, oral and physical examinations and it was admitted that Mr. Tunney ought easily to pass the physical examination. If he were lucky enough to obtain an appointment he would go on the payroll at \$2400 a year and spend six or eight months in the foreign service school before being shipped off as a vice consul at Belize or Kafachi.

Mr. Tunney, however, undoubtedly would depend upon a presidential appointment, for the way up through the ranks is long and arduous.

With the launching of the S. S. California, reputed to be the world's largest electrically-operated mercantile ship, it was brought to light by Lloyd's register that there is a general trend toward electric motor ships. Late figures show that 197 motor ships, including conversions, totaling 1,860,000 gross tons are now under construction. The program of the U. S. Shipping Board in the expenditure of \$25,000,000 to convert steam-propelled freighters to electric drive craft is in line with this trend.

Legion Post Has Plans For Parade On Armistice Day

Carl Barnes Post, No. 69 of Ranger is planning to stage an Armistice day parade on Nov. 11, at which time the 77 rifle type German siege gun and the two 100-pound shells secured this week from Austin, will be paraded down Main street and the gun unveiled with suitable ceremonies in front of the Gholson hotel.

The gun was shipped out of Austin Friday and after it is unveiled in Ranger it will be placed on display possibly at the Willows or the park at the Texas & Pacific station until Ranger gets a municipal park or federal building.

In speaking of the red tape that he and Post Commander Felton Brasher had to go through before getting the gun, W. C. Hickey said that they started with the sergeant at Camp Mabey, were sent to a lieutenant colonel, then back to the adjutant general's office, where they were told that they had to get per-

mission from Governor Moody.

An audience was obtained with the governor who stated that he believed that active legion posts should have preference and for them to go see the adjutant general, get the necessary papers and then make their selection out of what was left of the war relics.

While in Austin Mr. Hickey stated that they saw Clarence Gilmore, who expressed his regrets that he was unable to attend the Ranger Home-Coming Oil Jubilee.

AUSTIN.—Contracts will be let by the state highway commission Nov. 14 for Tom Green, Cass and Kerr counties.

The largest contract will be in Tom Green county where more than 15 miles of concrete paving is planned from eight and one-half miles northeast of San Angelo to the county line on the road to Sterling City and Big Spring.

Work in Kerr county is to be grading and building of drainage structures on 11 miles of the road

between Rock Springs and Mountain Home.

Cass county will have three stretches of road built utilizing the East Texas iron ore soil as a base. The work will be near Linden and Douglassville.

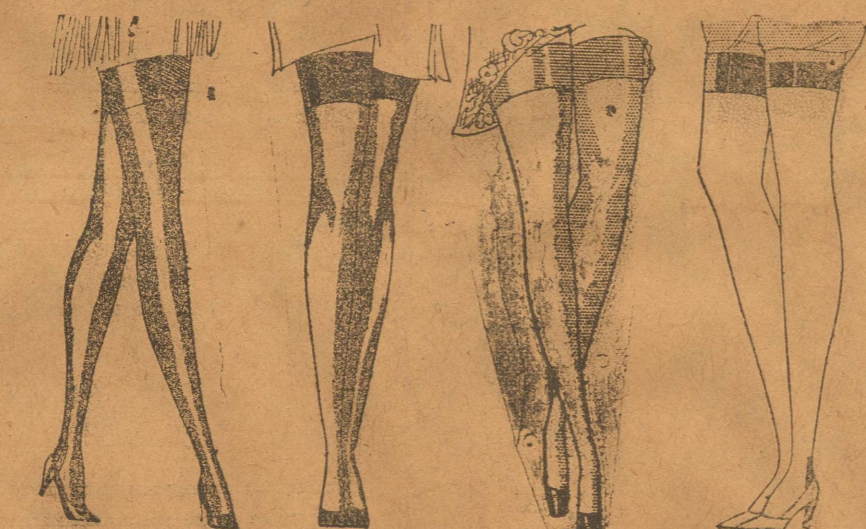
