BABY PRINCESS ELIZABETH BESET WITH INVITATIONS

LONDON.—The baby Princess Elizabeth, now 18 months old, has become the most popular member of the British royal family, if numbers of invitations can be taken as a criterion of popularity.

Princess Elizabeth is the only daughter of the Duke and Duchess of York and is preceded only by her uncle, the Prince of Wales, and her father in the line of succession to the throne. Since her father and mother returned to England from their Australian tour they have been inundated with invitations from all parts of the British Isles asking that the princess be present at various public functions.

These functions vary from the opening of children's hospitals to the closing of dog shows. So numerous have the invitations become that the duke and duchess have had special forms of refusals printed. They have, however, allowed the princess' name to be connected with several charitable functions and her mother has represented her on several occasions.

HOUSTON.—Southwest Texas' program for the expansion of its food roads into a comprehensive system of interlocking highways which will penetrate all sections of the region will be outlined at the first annual convention of the South Texas chamber of commerce in Brownsville, November 14 and 15.

Judge W. O. Huggins of this city, one of the prominent lawyers of the state and president of the Gulf States good road association, has accepted a place on the program, according to announcement by Ray Leeman, general manager of the chamber.

In 1926-26 the state of Texas owned 11,697 school buildings valued at \$103,327,862.

TAXI MEN CHARGE TOO LITTLE.

Because the drivers wanted to charge too low a rate, 100 Berlin taxis were put out of action by the police recently. Hitherto Berlin taxi fares have been in three classes, graded on the size of the vehicles. The system proved unsatisfactory, and the owners and drivers agreed to adopt the minimum charge as uniform for all taxis. As it would take several weeks to manufacture the new meters, the driver of the two higher classes introduced printed tables, showing the passengers the lower charge due, as distinct from the amount registered. At once the chief of police declared the move illegal, it being a regulation that drivers are forbidden from making a bargain with their passengers, and he held that for a passenger to pay less than the sum registered on the meter was a bargain.

LORAIN.—Officers and directors of Loraine's new banking institution have been elected. Work on the proposition has been going on for a number of weeks and stock was oversubscribed last week. Loraine trade territory has been developing rapidly during the past three or four years and the need of a bank has been acute. Application will be made for a National Bank charter.

Early in December representatives of all branches of aviation—commercial, engineering and experimental—will gather in Washington to review past progress and to formulate a program for future development.

Plans are under way in Germany for the building of 80 more moving picture theatres to seat 100,000 people, and in Great Britain 20 theatres are to be built with an average seating capacity of 2500.

TO PREPARE FOR CORONATION.

Elaborate plans for the preparation for the coronation of the emperor of Japan in November, 1928, are being made. Early next year an announcement of the date of the event will be made to the spirits, according to the recent decision of the preparatory committee for coronation. In Kiobe, early in February, will be held the ritual of the selection of the sacred field where rice to be used in the coronation will be grown. This will consist of the burning of a tortoise shell, the fissures opened in the shell by the heat indicating the location of the sacred fields. Then will follow an elaborate ceremonial by specially selected maidens in planting the sacred rice to the accompaniment of music by court musicians. The rice seedlings will be selected in advance by the local prefectural governors.

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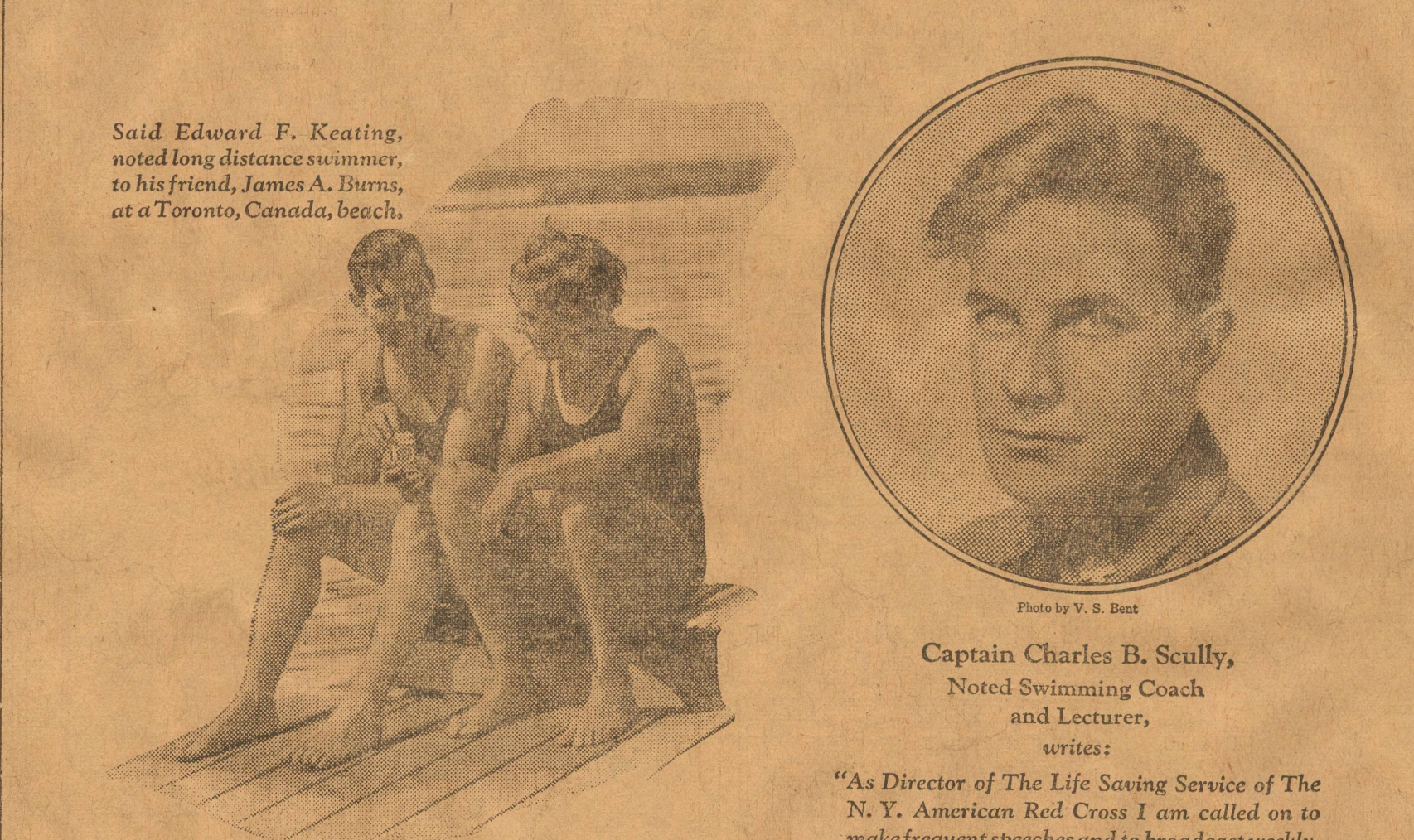
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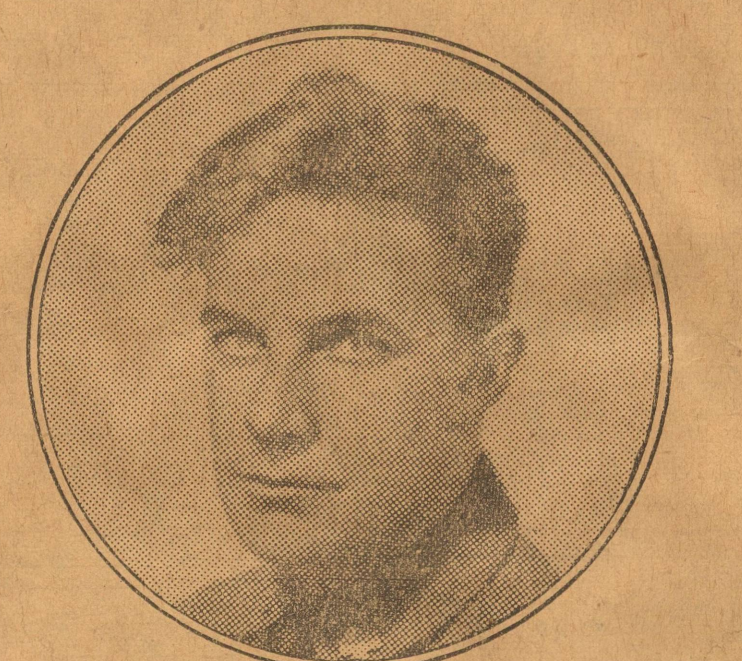

Moslah Temple Preparing For Big Ceremonial

FORT WORTH, Oct. 24.—Fort Worth will be the mecca, Nov. 18, for one of the largest Shrine gatherings ever held in Texas, when Moslah temple stages its annual fall ceremonial.

The fall ceremonial will be the most spectacular ever attempted any where and will be the most elaborate Shrine ceremonial ever staged by Moslah temple.

"Desert Follies" is the name which has been given the ceremonial and the prologue preceding the ceremonial proper will long be remembered by the nobility. Special lighting effects with multi-colored screens of various colors of the rainbow, will be used in making the lighting effects the most pretentious ever staged.

The class of novices is expected to be the largest in several years and has been named the "Al Shuman class" in honor of Potomato A. L. Shuman, it being the aim of the novice committee to have 250 or more novices when the initiation starts.

Several innovations will be staged in connection with the holding of the ceremonial, among them being an afternoon dance at the Texas hotel from 2:30 until 5:30 o'clock, when music will be furnished for the dance by Ligon Smith's nationally known Columbia recording orchestra. In addition there will be a dance at the mosque, Saturday evening, Nov. 19, at which time Fred Cahoon's orchestra will furnish the music. Both dances will be informal and open to all novices, Shriners and their ladies.

A formal Thanksgiving dance will be held at the mosque, Nov. 25, which will be open to all Shriners and their ladies. Nineteen twenty-seven card and fez will admit to any or all of the entertainments planned for the fall and winter social season of Moslah temple.

Shriners are especially invited to make their arrangements to attend "stag" night to be held at the mosque, Dec. 10, when one of the most elaborate vaudeville and boxing exhibits ever staged will be given for the nobility.

The annual street parade will be held the day of the ceremonial and all out of town Shriners are requested to register at the Texas hotel immediately upon their arrival in Fort Worth the morning of Nov. 18 as they are to be guests of Moslah temple at lunch that day. Appropriate badges will be issued when they register.

Man Faces Murder Trial Third Time Convicted Twice

BASTROP, La., Oct. 24.—After spending three years in jail and having been twice convicted of murder, Luther Hays went on trial here today for the third time on a charge of murder growing out of the slaying of Adolph Epstein, a grocer near here, in 1924.

Epstein who operated a small store at Swartz, a gas field town, was slain in March, 1924. Hays and his brother-in-law, Howard Robertson, were charged with the murder. Robertson was later convicted and subsequently hanged. Hays and Robertson were tried jointly and convicted but Hays won a new trial in which he was held guilty. His attorneys obtained a new trial.

With Hays in jail since August, 1924, is Willie Stone, who will be the state's star witness against Hays. Stone is alleged to have been stationed outside the store in an automobile while Robertson and Hays went inside. Robertson maintained his innocence to the end.

Their health must be carefully looked after, their condition being checked up every morning, requiring the attention of their keeper at all times of the day.

The performers themselves must be in a state of physical perfection in order to do the many things required of them, as the circus demands of them nothing less than 100 per cent efficiency in their various acts. To give less is to be disloyal to the show, and there is not a class of people more loyal to their calling than circus people.

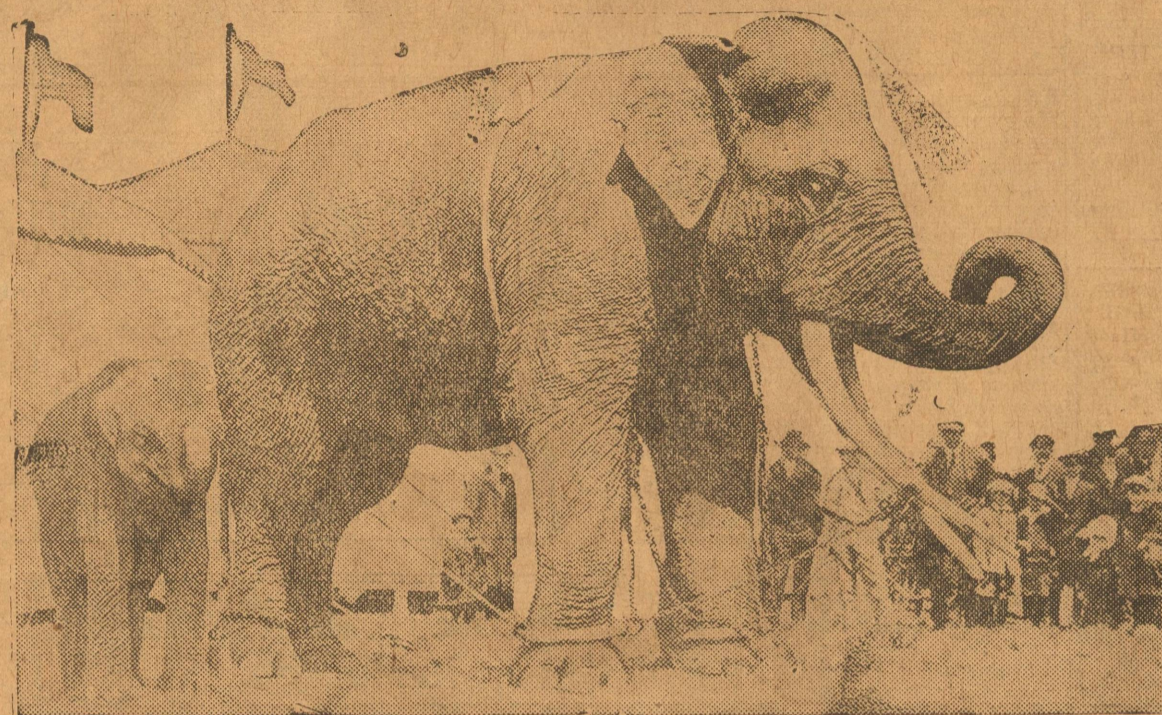

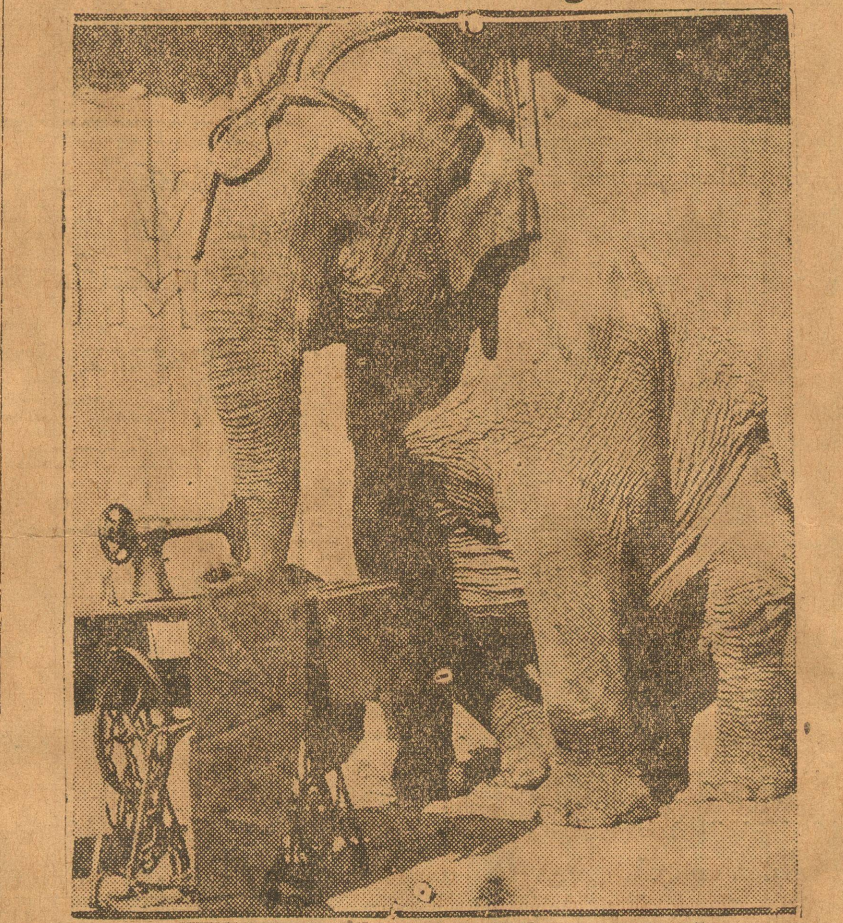
