First Real Rumble Heard Over Teapot Dome Coolidge May Override Senate To Appoint Warren

CALL BANKERS TO TESTIFY ON LIBERTY BONDS

Eleven Financiers Will Be Quizzed by Counsel.

FALL'S RANCH INVOLVED

Government Hopes to Prove Sinclair Bonds.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 12.—The first real rumble in the Teapot Dome oil suit in which the government is trying to break the lease of the Mammoth Oil company of naval oil reserves, was heard today when the government began calling 11 bankers from various cities, including El Paso, Texas, and Pueblo, Colo., to give evidence.

The bankers are to testify relative to numbers on bonds with which Albert B. Fall is alleged to have paid off a debt on his Three Rivers ranch in New Mexico. The numbers on the bonds negotiated by Fall are said to correspond with numbers known to have been held by the Continental Trading company, in which Harry F. Sinclair is a dominant figure.

FLASHES

\$100,000 DALLAS FIRE.

DALLAS, March 12.—Fire of undetermined origin swept the three-story building of the Nash-McLarty Motor company in the downtown section this morning. The loss is estimated at \$100,000. For a time an entire block was menaced. A double alarm brought all fire apparatus within a radius of three miles to the scene. No one was injured.

SHOOT NIGHT FROWLERS.

DALLAS, March 12.—Two men were shot, one perhaps fatally, by Night Watchman A. C. Butler at the city waterworks plant last night. Butler told the police the men drove up in a wagon and were collecting brass fittings in the yard when he fired. Dallas Cummings was shot in the stomach and may die. John Sherron was shot in the leg.

RUSH ACT EXPECTED.

AUSTIN, March 12.—Quick action was anticipated today upon a bill introduced in the senate by Senator Parr outlining an appropriation of \$600,000 was laid before the body and reported out of committee favorably a few minutes later.

GRAND JURY RESUMES

The 89th district court grand jury, which adjourned last Saturday after having been in session about a week, resumed its work this morning. Some ten or fifteen bills of indictment were returned during the week the grand jury was in session.

COLDS KILL CHICAGOANS.

CHICAGO, March 12.—Chicago is in the grip of a disease which has taken a toll of 201 lives in nine days. The health commissioner and a corps of physicians are working today to determine the exact nature of the disease. Twenty-seven persons died from influenza and pneumonia during the last 24 hours, it was announced. The disease is prevalent also in other cities, according to reports to the local health officers.

WHEAT CROP ENDANGERED

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 12.—The 1925 wheat crop of the southwest is endangered by cutworms and an invasion of grasshoppers, John A. Whitehurst, president of the state board of agriculture, warned today. Millions of eggs of grasshoppers have been found in every county in the wheat belt of Oklahoma by the state entomologists, Whitehurst said.

SENATE TABLES HOUSE'S ADJOURNMENT RESOLUTION

AUSTIN, March 12.—The senate late Wednesday laid on the table subject to call the sine die adjournment resolution adopted by the house yesterday ending the regular session at 6 o'clock, March 19. Having adopted the resolution, the house must now await the pleasure of the senate which may, if it sees fit, delay adjournment or amend the resolution in favor of an earlier date and send it back to the house for approval.

MITCHELL WILL CONTINUE FIGHT

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 12.—Brig. Gen. William Mitchell is not discouraged by his demotion to the rank of colonel and will stay in the service at least three years more, continuing his efforts to show the people the needs of the government air service, he said today in an interview with the United Press.

"Rank makes no difference to me," he said. "I am going to remain in the service at least three more years and perhaps longer; at least, until I can bring before the people of the United States the truth about the government air service."

In speaking of his demotion, General Mitchell declared his rank of brigadier general was only temporary and his permanent rank was that of colonel, to which he reverts April 26.

President's Act Refutes Intimates' Claim That He Would Bow to Senate

WASHINGTON, March 12.—In direct refutation of statements of his close advisers yesterday, to the effect that the president had decided to drop his insistence upon the appointment of Mr. Warren, President Coolidge today re-submitted to the senate the nomination of Charles Beecher Warren to be attorney general. The rejection had been made by the senate by a vote of 39 to 41, but after a conference today between the president, Senator Butler and Warren, it was decided to re-submit the nomination for a second consideration by the senate.

At the white house all comment on the announcement was refused by Butler. White house officials said there would be no statement today. Later Butler received a call from the white house that the nomination must be sent up immediately. He informed the chief executive that he saw no objection to such a course and believed the sooner such action was taken the better would be the result.

Banking Commissioner Urges Claim Filings

Depositors and creditors of the Peoples State bank of Ranger have been notified by Banking commissioner C. O. Austin to present their claims and make legal proof of them on or before June 12. Claims of guaranteed depositors must be presented and legal proof made of them not later than June 12, for none made after that date will be entitled to payment of all or any portion out of the depositors' guaranty fund, the notice states. All claims and proof of claims must be presented to the special agent in charge of the bank at Ranger, who is on duty during regular week-day business hours. The approximate amount of the guaranteed deposits is \$420,000.

When informed of the decision of the white house to re-submit the nomination of Warren, Senator Walsh, leader of the opposition, said such a procedure was "unprecedented."

WASHINGTON, March 12.—President Coolidge will give Charles Beecher Warren, whose nomination as attorney general was rejected by the senate, a recess appointment to the office, "if Warren is willing to" (Continued on Page 2)

SENATE RAZZES SMILING DAWES

WASHINGTON, March 12.—While Vice President Dawes sat laughing in his chair, the senate proceeded to haze him again today. Senator Norris, republican, of Nebraska, started the firework by reading a burlesque poem about Dawes, charging, with terrible oaths, on the senate. Senator Neeley, West Virginia, democrat, followed with an editorial charging that Dawes, by his absence from his chair in the senate at a critical time when the vote was taken on the nomination of Charles E. Warren as a member of the president's cabinet, had brought defeat to the republicans and embarrassment to the president.

Senator Copeland, New York, democrat, said: "I always understood it was the duty of the vice president to be in the chair at all times, but a lot of unfavorable things have happened on the floor of the senate as well as in the chair."

AERIAL TESTS PLANNED.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Intensive aerial tests will be carried out under widely differing conditions during the next twelve months in an effort to get facts in the dispute precipitated by Brigadier General Mitchell and the house aircraft committee, it was said by leaders of the committee today.

Senate Will Consider Relocation on Friday

AUSTIN, March 12.—Plans for the relocation of the Texas prison system will be taken up in the senate Friday, it was decided after the senate had spent most of the morning session arguing on the merits of the proposed legislation. Senators Davis and Fairchild were outspoken in their opposition to the Wood measure, which is similar to the Teer-Chitwood bill engrossed by the house earlier in the week.

Fear Keeps Indians From Naming Those Who Killed Redmen

PAWHUSKA, Okla., March 12.—That a prominent and wealthy white man in Northern Oklahoma keeps silent in the tongues of the Indians in an Indian village just outside here regarding the murders of 20 Indians and several white men in the last three years, was the opinion voiced by investigators today. The investigations are being conducted behind closed doors.

MAYOR FACES MURDER CHARGE

Brownsville Executive Held For Woman's Death. BROWNSVILLE, March 12.—Charged with murder and driving an automobile while intoxicated, A. B. Cole, mayor of Brownsville, was at liberty on \$5,000 bond today. The date for his preliminary hearing has not been set.

Ethel Barrymore In Critical Condition

KANSAS CITY, Mar. 12.—Ethel Barrymore, noted actress, ill here, was in "a critical condition" today, according to the statement of her physician. Miss Barrymore was forced to cancel her engagements for the week and no new bookings are being made.

Dr. Terrell Agrees, With Present Regime, To Seek Re-election

Dr. C. O. Terrell will be a candidate for re-election as police commissioner of the city of Ranger, according to a statement made by him today, although he has not yet made formal announcement. Dr. Terrell is a native of Ranger, his father having been in the drug business in Ranger when it was but a village. During the oil boom period he took a leading part in the readjustment work necessary when thousands of people changed a quiet little town into a bustling oil camp overnight. It was largely through his efforts that the health of Ranger was maintained in spite of demoralized conditions.

China's Welfare Is Sun Yat Sen's Last Thought as He Dies

PEKIN, March 12.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, former president of China, who suffered for weeks with cancer of the stomach, died in Canton today. The Chinese leader has been on the point of death for nearly six weeks. Just before he died, Sun signed and gave several documents to leaders of the Kuo Ming Tang party. They are reported to have been his last wishes concerning political affairs in China. He requested that his body be embalmed and buried in Minkin. The body was sent to the Rockefeller foundation for embalming.

OFFICER WILL START WAR ON RANGER DOGS

Dogs without homes or tags or owners will have to seek the tall timbers in a few days, for the dog catcher will be started on an intensive hunt over Ranger for strays and captured dogs are to be executed, according to Sanitary Officer Wade Swift.

Owners of dogs which it is desired to keep from the clutches of the dog catcher will have the opportunity for a day or two of obtaining license tags from City Secretary Love at the Ranger city hall. The license for a male dog will cost \$1 and for a female dog \$2, for in the eyes of the law the female of this species is more valuable than the male.

If an untagged dog is taken by the dog catcher to the pound an additional dollar will be required after the license has been purchased before the dog will be released, and if a captured dog is not reclaimed within a brief period it will never hear its master's voice again, the sanitary officer warns.

Divorce Is Granted Winfield Scott Jr. In Yucatan, Mexico

KANSAS CITY, March 12.—Winfield Scott Jr., son of a former Texas cattle baron, has been granted a divorce at Merida, Yucatan, Mexico, it was learned today. The divorce was granted from the former Miss Gertrude Josephine Lane, who at the time of her marriage lived in Kansas City. Following a hasty courtship, the pair were married here in January, 1923, and, after a cruise of the Mediterranean, took up their residence in the home of his mother in Fort Worth. In June, 1924, Mrs. Scott came to Kansas City and while she was here Scott filed suit for divorce, charging his wife had embarrassed and humiliated him in public places. Mrs. Scott filed a counter suit in which she asked \$200,000 and \$1,200 monthly alimony.

Young Woman, Child Bitten by Olden Dog

Miss Pauline Matthews, 18, and "Major" (J. B.) Vaughan, the 4-year-old son of Dr. J. L. Vaughan, both of Olden, were bitten late Tuesday afternoon by a dog believed to have been mad, which was killed soon afterwards by County Motor Traffic Officer Hammett on the Bankhead highway in the center of Olden. The dog was frothing at the mouth, had glassy eyes, and was running in circles snapping at everything that got in its way when the officer's bullet stopped its career. The head was taken off by Dr. Vaughan and sent to the Jensen-Salisbury laboratories in Kansas City for examination. A report is expected by wire not later than Friday noon, and if it be found the dog had rabies the Pasteur serum treatment will be given to Miss Matthews and the Vaughan child. Both Miss Matthews and the child were bitten on the hand. The dog tore off a part of the shoe of a man who kicked at it, but the man was not bitten. The dog is said to have bitten several other dogs in Olden and was reported also to have bitten a cow, but the latter could not be verified. Fearing a spread of rabies because of the dogs bitten, Traffic Officer Hammett has declared war against all untagged stray dogs wandering along or about the Bankhead highway. These are said to be so numerous that Hammett is expected to be kept busy for some time executing his death sentences.

COOLIDGE MAY APOINT WARREN OVER SENATE

 serve under such circumstances. Warren was summoned to the white house from Michigan to confer with the president upon the question. Republican senate leaders have urged, in conference with Mr. Coolidge, the impossibility of confirming Warren's appointment, so unless the president consents to abandon him entirely the recess appointment is the only way left. Warren arrived in Washington this morning. He was met at the station by the white house automobile and taken immediately to the white house to have breakfast with the president. Warren declined to discuss any phase of the situation until he had conferred with the president.

Warren's rejection by the senate was resented by the president as an unwarranted interference with an executive function. Mr. Coolidge is convinced of the fitness of Warren for the post. Warren's friends say he has suffered keenly on account of senatorial attacks on his career. Several times during the last two months, before the senate voted on his nomination, Warren intimated to the president he would prefer to withdraw rather than be subjected to a continued senatorial quarrel.

FREE ADVERTISING.

The only goods a bank has to sell it is capital and deposits—money. Ever hear of a bank giving any of it away?

The only goods a newspaper has to sell is its advertising space.

Yet in every community there are people who entertain the idea that the newspaper man is in business either for fun or for glory, and is just dying to give away his merchandise.

The newspaper boosts every business man's game, 52 weeks of the year, and often 365 days of the year, yet when he asks to have his game boosted by patronizing a special community edition, he is too often looked upon as beggar and the contract is signed as a matter of charity.

Nevertheless and notwithstanding, the local newspaper publisher is the most all-round loyal member of the community, the back-bone of every effort that tends to promote civic, religious, educational and industrial advancement.

It is, indeed, refreshing to note that a president of one of the state editorial associations is outspoken in the opinion that newspapers are "easy marks" for stock and bond brokers and bucket shop sharks who get columns and pages of free advertising every day on the theory that the reading public is interested.

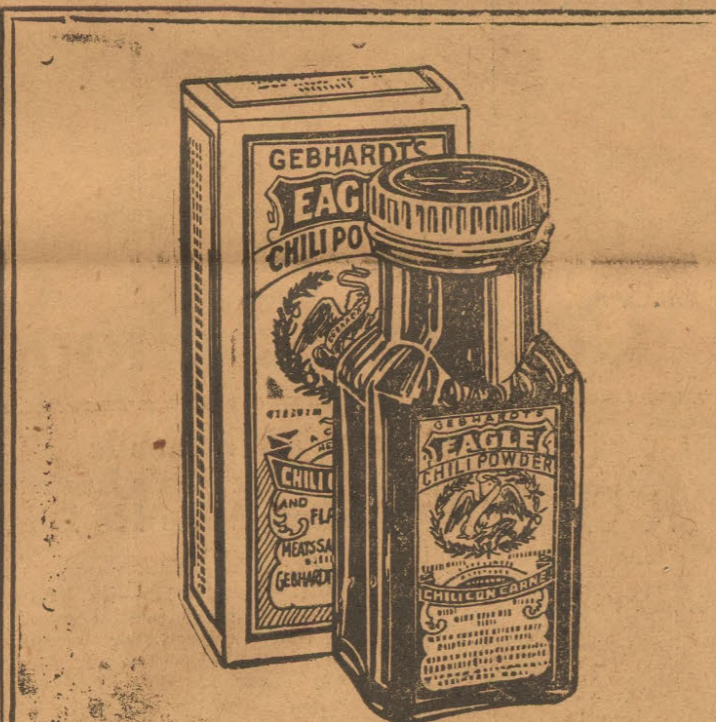
A nationally known advertising manager declares that where one reader is interested in stock statistics, a thousand readers are absorbed in local store quotations—yet the merchant pays the price, while the stock brokers, who make more profit than the combined automobile business or the steel trust, get free publicity.

The discussion of this question has developed the argument that stock reports cannot be classed as "news," for the reason that every man interested has his information at least 12 hours before the paper is printed, and now gets it by radio. As a matter of justice to local merchants, brokers should be compelled to pay for their space, or do without. In the latter event the business would be classed with the merchant who does not advertise, and die a natural death.

WOMEN CROWD MEN IN BUSINESS.

The changes in the business world which have raised woman's position from that of an inferior to that of an executive has brought about a peculiar economical situation. It has brought to women great financial responsibilities which were formerly regarded as peculiar to men and if this condition is to continue, women must not expect to enjoy all privileges which have been theirs hitherto.

Comrade Heister reported a sufficient number of legionnaires signed up for a "Forty and Eight" lodge in Ranger and said the papers applying for a charter would be sent off at once.

Comrades Diehl, Dockery and Daffer were named as the entertainment committee for the next two weeks.

1-2 teaspoon salt.
 Cream Crisco with flour, add sugar to the two well-beaten eggs. Scald milk and add to creamed Crisco and sugar. Mix the whole and place in double boiler and boil until thick, stirring constantly. When thick enough to hold its shape, when cut with a knife, take off fire and allow to cool before pouring into baked pie shell.

PIMOLA SALAD.
 Place a slice of cold boiled ox tongue on a crisp lettuce leaf, a slice of fresh tomato the same size and thickness on top of tongue, cover with a good salad dressing and place five slices of pimola (ripe olives) over dressing. Sprinkle top with Gebhardt's chili powder.

FRENCH POTATO SALAD.
 Take large potatoes, peel, wash and cut in halves crossways the long way. With a sharp pointed paring knife cut out centers, being careful to cut through the outside of the potato anywhere, leaving a shell about 1-4 inch thick.

Drop shells and centers in boiling water to which a little salt has been added and boil until tender but not broken. Carefully drain off the water, chop the centers with equal parts of Gebhardt's deviled chili meat, hard-boiled eggs and a shaving of onion, a pinch of chopped parsley and pickle; mix with boiled salad dressing and fill potato cup by heaping the filling in it as long as it will stay on the potato nicely. Cover top with boiled salad dressing, letting it run down the sides of the potato, and dot the top with Gebhardt's chili powder. Cut off bottom of potato so it will stand evenly and serve on lettuce leaf. "This salad," says Mrs. Chitwood, "will make your husband come home one hour before meal time."

Dr. C. C. Sealeman, president of Southern Methodist university, will speak in the Methodist church in Ranger at 7:45 Sunday evening, March 15, on the subject of the unification of the two Methodist churches.

This is the outstanding question before American Methodists today. The Methodists of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and Ireland have already united, so that in each of the above countries there is only one Methodist church. The question of the unification of the three branches of Methodism in England is being voted on, and is now nearly completed. The indication is that it has carried by more than a three-fourths majority. All eyes are now turned to America to witness the final stages of the unification of American Methodists.

The plan that is now before us is the result of years of labor, and prayer, and study of a joint commission of our two Methodist churches. The plan was drafted by two of our greatest southern lawyers, Judge Candler (brother of our Bishop Candler), and Judge White of Louisiana. It already has the endorsement of the joint commission, the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, and the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

In this district practically nothing has been said or done except on one side of this question. We believe it to be for the best interest of our church that our people should be thoroughly informed on this matter before final action is taken. It is in harmony with the above idea that I am inviting Dr. Sealeman, who chances to be in the bounds of this district next Sunday, to speak to our people on this subject. We have no

one in our church better informed or better prepared to speak helpfully on this subject than Dr. Sealeman. So, all people interested are cordially invited to attend.



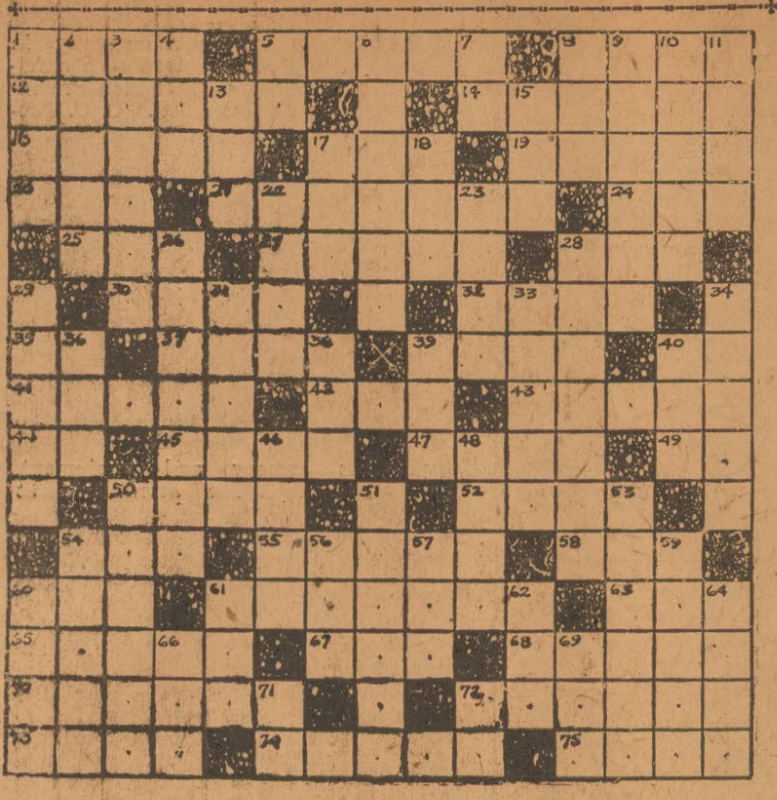

PLAN RANGER NATIONAL GUARD COMPANY SOON

Ranger will have a company in the Texas national guard if a sufficient number of eligible men are interested in its formation. C. C. Patterson, secretary of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, recently wrote to Adjutant General Mark McGee asking if there was room for a letter company in the guard and received a reply from Major General Hulen, commanding the Thirty-sixth division, advising him he could go ahead with the organization.

"A national guard company will be a good asset for Ranger," said Mr. Patterson. "About 60 men are needed to form it. Officers, who are local men, will be appointed by the district commander and provides arms and equipment, pays the men for attendance at weekly drill and also pays for attendance at the two-week encampment each year. Young men, 18 years old and upward, are needed. It is healthful and delightful recreation, makes for better citizenship and a better town and should be encouraged."

Mr. Patterson asked that any young man in Ranger interested in joining the national guard communicate with him at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, and as soon as enough are ready to enroll the application for place as a unit will be sent in.
