FIVE TOWNS TO ENTER FLOATS IN BIG PARADE

Abilene Sends Word Will Enter Float, Band and Seeks Special Train.

Five out of town floats and bands are assured for the Big Parade, the opening gun in the Ranger Home Coming Oil Jubilee and a number of towns are yet expected to accept invitations to join in that big event.

Tommy Carswell, secretary of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce telephoned Wayne C. Hickey this morning that the directors of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, at a meeting last night, voted to send a big float, a band and two young ladies from the colleges there as envoys from Abilene to ride in the decorated float.

They also authorized the secretary to try to make up a special train from Abilene for the event and if this was not possible, to make arrangements for a motorcade. Their float will cost around \$250.

Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce has voted to send a float and band and a large delegation to Ranger for the Jubilee.

Cisco and Eastland and Fort Worth have already announced that they would participate in the parade and send bands and a number of other towns still unheard of are expected to notify Jubilee headquarters of their intentions to come in.

The city council has called an election for that date to decide whether the city council shall be reduced from 10 to five members and a city manager placed in charge of city affairs.

Former Bulldog Star Is Making Fight For Life

A battle not for a championship, but a battle with grim disease is being daily fought by Glenn Seay, former Bulldog guard.

The valiant Bulldog, whose fighting spirit last year was one of the big factors in winning for Ranger the 1926 West Texas championship, has been fighting for two months, trying to conquer leakage of the heart.

The members of the 1926 and 1927 Bulldog and the junior college team, met today and sent their sick comrade a lot of flowers to cheer him in his fight for health.

At the chapel services at the Ranger high school the devotional service was dedicated to the sick youth, who last year graduated at Ranger high, and prayers were breathed to the Great Empire who rules the destinies of football stars, that the guardsman be spared and that his fighting spirit once more shall win.

Announcement of his illness was made by Prof. R. F. Holloway, and all football troubles and worries, was swallowed up in this major fight with death.

Many Smallpox Cases Reported Official Says

Smallpox rings up a new high record this year in Texas, according to Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer, who calls attention to the fact that for the period from Jan. 1 to June 30, there were 2,059 cases of this disease reported to the state department of health, this being 161 cases more than the number reported for the entire year of 1926.

"As outbreaks of smallpox occur only in unvaccinated communities," Dr. Anderson stated, "the responsibility for such outbreaks should rest squarely upon the shoulders of these communities. It is a known fact that the only cases of smallpox reported in communities having a consistent vaccination program, are isolated cases of unvaccinated individuals. Everyone knows that vaccination is a prevention of smallpox, and this fact is not even a debatable question at the present time, owing to the preponderance of evidence showing its truth."

"Only people who are opposing vaccination against smallpox at the present time, are those who are ignorant and uninformed on the subject, and those who are doing it through viciousness. While it is true that during the civil war and early in the use of this immunization some fatalities resulted from insubstantial measures, present day methods of manufacturing vaccine and its administration, eliminates the former danger of infection.

"Vaccination against smallpox is compulsory in Germany, beginning at birth, and seven year periods thereafter. The records show that Germany has had only 40 cases of smallpox during the last 10 years. During the last 15 years there have been more than 700,000 cases of this disease reported in the United States. Any person with common reasoning power should be able to see that vaccination prevents."

EXPECT TO RESUME HOP TO SOUTH AMERICA TODAY

ST. LOUIS, Senegal, West Africa, Oct. 13.—With no wind, a clear sky and increasing heat, Lieutenant Castes and Joseph LeBrix were expected to take off momentarily today on their attempted flight to cross the south Atlantic to Port Natal, Brazil.

MOTOR SHOW OPENS TODAY IN LONDON

Many American-Made Cars on Display at Olympia Hall, Very Popular.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Evidence of the ever-growing popularity of American six-cylinder and straight-eight automobiles was one of the outstanding features of the motor show which opened at the Olympia hall here this morning. The show will continue until Oct. 22.

General price reduction in all makes of British cars, especially in the light-weight class, also was noted. With the sole exception of France, the space allotted to European models is almost negligible, and is only worthy of note for the fact that two German models are on view for the first time since 1914, namely the Mercedes and Horch.

There are 516 stands, 100 of which are occupied by car manufacturers or concessionaires. Of the remainder 335 are devoted to accessories and components, 62 to coachwork and 19 to tires and wheels. France has 19 representatives, America 17, Italy 8, Belgium 3, Austria 2, and Spain and Canada one each, the remaining 47 being English.

The new models announced by several British firms some time ago and on view today, although not considerably reduced in price, are improved in detail and equipment with a view to increased comfort and safety.

Four-wheel brakes are fitted on practically every new model, and fenders or bumpers are standard equipment on many.

In an effort to combat the invasion of the American straight-eights, W. R. Morris, maker of England's most popular car, has introduced a British eight-cylinder model, of which great things are expected.

Clean Up of Millions Made By Revolution

MATAMOROS, Oct. 13.—Now that Mexico's revolution is seemingly ended, a check up in scout-official quarters here today showed that the Mexican government profited about 5,000,000 pesos from the uprising. The cost of quelling the revolution was estimated at 10,000,000 pesos and the value of property confiscated from alleged rebels was placed at 15,000,000 pesos.

German Seaplane Resumes Flight Toward America

BRUNSBUTTEL, Germany, Oct. 13.—The Heinkel seaplane D-1220 today resumed its flight to Amsterdam enroute to New York. The plane took off yesterday but was forced down here by engine trouble.

Beyond Amsterdam the flyers will choose their route to the United States at their discretion.

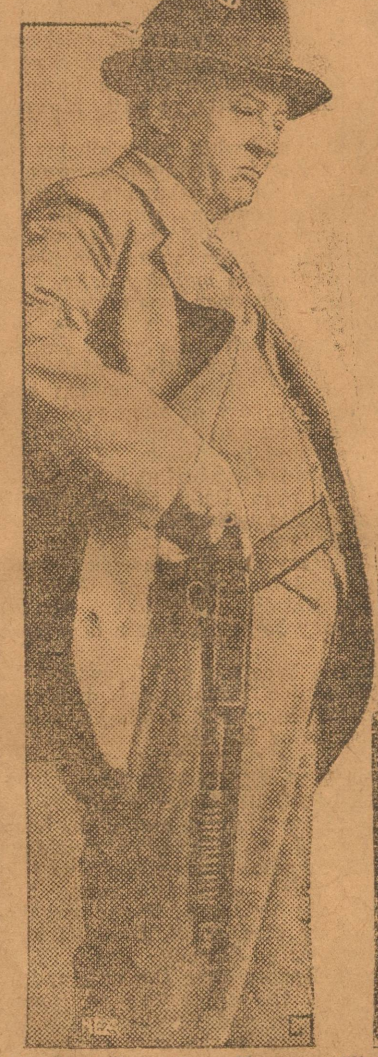
PROMOTIONS MADE IN WAR DEPARTMENT

Take \$3,000 From Richland Bank, Officers Believe They Went To Dallas.

MEXIA, Oct. 13.—No trace has been found of the three bandits who held up and robbed the First State bank of Richland, 20 miles north of here, of \$3,000. The robbery occurred shortly before 3 p. m. yesterday, when H. C. Davis, cashier, and Grady Calame, assistant cashier, were alone in the bank.

Two bandits staged the holdup while a third waited in an auto. It is believed the bandits went to Dallas by way of Corsicana.

Presidential Party Goes Sight Seeing At Fort Pitt, Pa.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 13.—President Coolidge went sightseeing in Pittsburgh today, taking a five mile auto trip through the city to the Old Block House at Fort Pitt, an historical point of revolutionary days.

After breakfast at the home of R. D. Mellon, brother of Secretary of the Treasury A. W. Mellon, the president, Mrs. Coolidge and party left for their trip through the city.

Mexican Senate Considers Six Year Term

BROWNSVILLE, Oct. 13.—Unofficial reports received here today from Mexico said the Mexican senate was in session today to consider extending the president's term to six years to apply to the next president elected.

Dispatches also said that the Mexican diplomatic corps was enroute from Mexico City to the border to meet Ambassador Morrow, from the United States, who was reported to have left New York today.

CAME DOWN BECAUSE OF BAD BREAK GAS LINE

Ship Reports Picking Up Two Aviators About 350 Miles From Shore

Miss Ruth Elder and George Haldeman, her pilot, are safe on board the Dutch oil tanker Barendrecht.

The 23-year-old southern girl, who sailed away from Roosevelt Field, New York, on Tuesday with Haldeman in the airplane American Girl and was not heard from for more than 36 hours, reported herself and her pilot safe at a moment when on both sides of the Atlantic hope for her was fast fading.

At noon today, 43 hours since Miss Elder left Roosevelt Field, word came to New York of her safety.

United Press cables from Paris announced receipt by Commandant Renvois of LeBourget flying field, Paris, a brief message from Miss Elder. It said: "Landed by steamship Barendrecht with broken oil lines; Haldeman and I. o. k."

More than an hour later no further details had become available but computations taking into consideration both the flying speed and the route of the American Girl and the probable positions of the steamers would indicate Miss Elder landed beside the obscure Dutch tanker about 350 miles from Land End, England, and probably southwest of that point.

LE BOURGET COMMANDER RECEIVES MESSAGE

LEBOURGET, France, Oct. 13.—Commander Renvois of LeBourget airbase today announced receipt of a telegram indicating that Ruth Elder was safe with George Haldeman, her pilot.

The telegram which Renvois received had been sent by the Dutch government at 3 p. m. and was signed "Ruth Elder." It said that the airplane American Girl had been forced down by a broken oil line and picked up "by Barendrecht."

There were two separate corrected versions of the telegram. The second saying that the message had originated at sea, having been wireless apparently from the Dutch oil tanker Barendrecht at sea 140 miles southwest of Landend, England.

SHIP DUE AT BAY TOWN TEXAS NOVEMBER 3

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—The Radio corporation of America was advised this afternoon that the Dutch tanker Barendrecht which had picked up Ruth Elder and George Haldeman at sea, is due at Bay Town, Texas, November 3.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Dr. Dorothy Logan was handed a check for \$5000 today for a prize for lowering Gertrude Ederle's channel swim time.

After Drifting Six Days On Raft Three Men Safe

MANILA, Oct. 13.—After drifting for six days on a raft, three Filipinos from the steamer Taculin, wrecked by a typhoon, landed on the northern coast of the island of Masbate.

The fate of 20 others on board the Taculin is unknown.

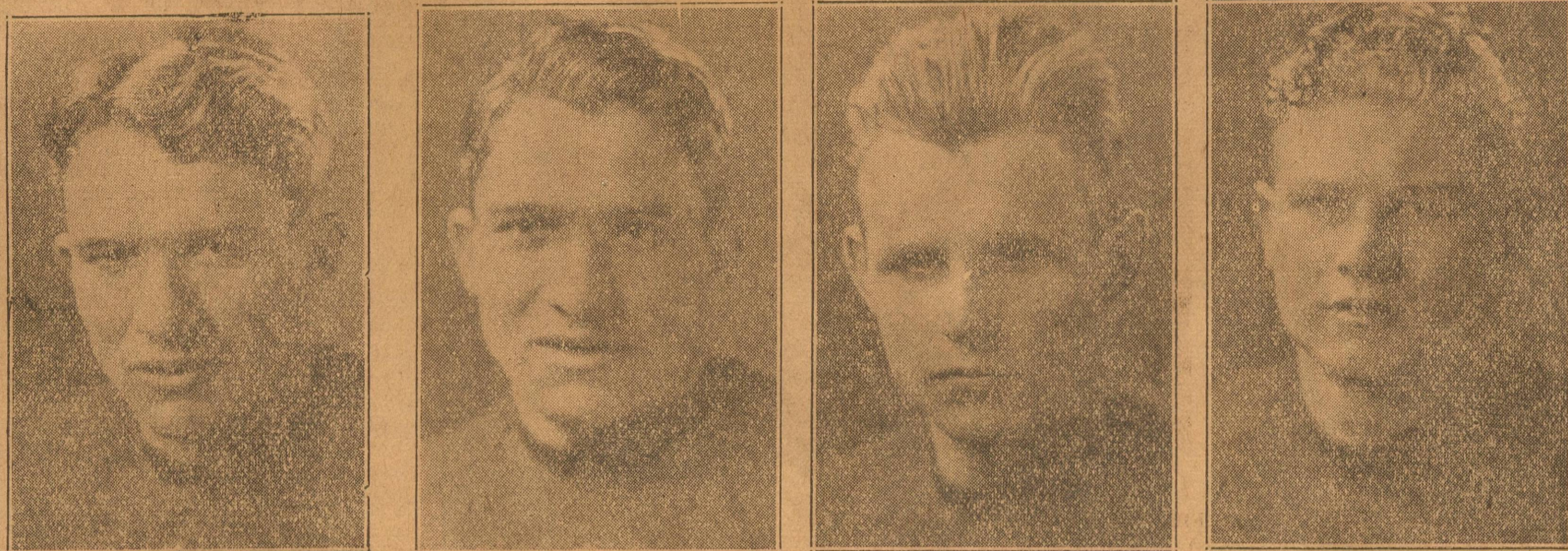

Hunky Phillips was the next to go into the discard for not having taken his examination at the proper time and then Clyde Peppers was taken out because it was impossible to get his transfer from a former school in such shape that would be satisfactory.

With each of these losses, Coaches Cherry and Davis have had to re-vamp their team and change the line-up and change players from one position to another and, though they lost enough star material, to make three high school teams, the Ranger Bulldogs were still looked upon as the terrors of the district. This in the face of the fact that they were lacking in experience and exceedingly young as a whole.

This last takes out the team captain, Victor Short; the stellar end upon whom rested the job of both receiving and breaking up forward passes, David White; a scintillating halfback whose broken field running was always a sensation, Homer Short; and, a fighting quarterback who was in the middle of every play, Seth Hubbard.

Then, to cap the climax, it looks like Ray Trammel is going to have to leave school and go to work to earn his living. Ray is a young fellow but quite versatile. He is a fighter while he's in there and runs good interference and totes the mail when his plays are called. That's just another

one of the dark and gloomy features of the outlook for Ranger High football.

What do we have left? We have 17 men who are eligible to play, unless it is soon fit to take some 120-pound freshmen who graduated from grammar school prematurely and put them out there in a uniform as marks for the other teams to vent their spleen.

We have Garland Hinman, Garland is all "het up" to a crying pitch today and is in plenty good humor to play any team in the conference single-handed.

You know the rest of them without them being named. If Ranger were playing for the state championship today with these kids in their present frame of mind it would take a real championship team to stay on the same field with them. That's the old fighting spirit, men.

NEW PENITENTIARY IN ILLINOIS IS TOO SMALL

Some of the new rules, it is said, have been framed with an intent to slow up Rockne's system. The change made in the shift rule is more or less directly aimed at him, since few eleven work with greater speed or precision in their shift plays than the athletes coached by Rockne.

It has always been Rockne's aim to get speed, develop a bewildering offense and let the rest of the game take care of itself. A great offense has always been Notre Dame's best defense.

It will be interesting to see how the officials in the big games rule on Rockne's shift play this fall. He insists he will be able to keep within the rules without slowing up his attack. Other coaches express doubt on that point.

Rockne again appears to have another well balanced eleven and the results of the more important games on his schedule will definitely determine just how much the new shift rule has handicapped his style of play.

The next time you go out to see the Ranger Bulldogs play a football game, suppose you try watching the line as closely as you have formerly watched the backfield. And when your eyes shift to the backfield, instead of watching the man with the ball, watch those fellows running interference ahead of him. Try that for a half of a game sometime and you can see why newspapers make football stars of men who are frequently mediocre and would be tied hand and foot were it not for the stellar work of their team mates.

But it's human to keep the eye on the ball and note who carries it and how far he carries it, and consequently the ball toter often gets credit for a brilliant play when some one who is not even mentioned in the play made it possible.

Then here comes a safety man who makes a shoe-string tackle and saves the game. If you'll just watch closely you'll see that the runner's interference has been taken out somewhere down the line.

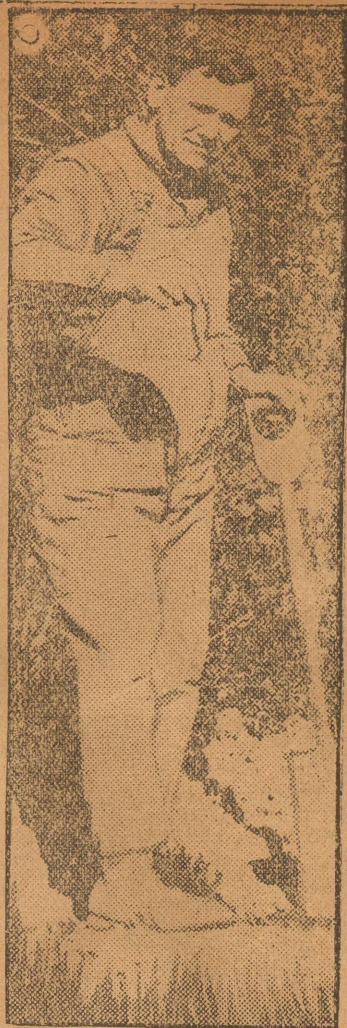
The above is written apropos of the fact that many times a local boy becomes discouraged because he does not get personal mention in the news story on a game where he knows good and well in his own mind that he has made it possible for some individual player to bring the stands on their feet through a sensational run.

Take for instance "Arkansas" McLaughlin. In the game with T. C. U. freshmen he did nothing to bring the plaudits of the multitudes and bring the crowd to its feet. That opportunity was denied him. Still if you happened to be watching him you could see him make a vicious dive into every play and set one of the big boys down and keep him out of the play. There's no telling just exactly what effect that had on the ultimate score, but it's safe to say that it helped Ranger make more first downs.

The center has a tough job, especially on offense, when he has to use his hands to pass the ball back and then be at a disadvantage in keeping his opponent from rooting his nose in the sod. The poor boy seldom, if ever, has a chance to do anything that is of such a nature as to gain him much notice. Still, on the other hand, he certainly gets a big panning if his passes are not as true as a rifle bullet.

When you, away in the stands, look at the line in playing formation you look at it as a unit and are always ready with your criticism if it fails to hold at the right time, but the chances are you are so busy watching the ball that when Short or Tackett or Mitchell snake through and break up the other fellow's play and often make tackles, you never think of giving them credit for it.

You seldom notice the tackles breaking through and smearing plays, but you always notice it plainly when the opposition runs a smelling line back through tackle and yell bloody

Wilcy Moore Has Big Year, Earns Close to \$16,000

This has been a big year for Pitcher Wilcy Moore, of the New York Yankees, who just a year ago at this time was finishing a very successful year in the South Atlantic League. He had won 30 games and lost only four.

Despite his remarkable record, none of the major league scouts fancied he had a chance to make the grade in the American or National Leagues.

It seemed as if his great year in the minors would be wasted until the New York Yankees decided that a pitcher with so remarkable a record must have something. He was bought for a very nominal sum.

"He had a great year in the minors but not a single scout turned in a favorable report," was the comment of Manager Miller Huggins during spring training.

Yet Wilcy Moore, 30 years old, won 19 games in the American League last season and saved probably 15 others to make the most remarkable record ever made by a first year man.

Constantly in Reserve
Now for the very pleasing part of the big season that Moore has enjoyed as a member of the Yankees' pitching staff.

In the Sally League, Moore was paid, so I understand, \$2400 a year, a rather healthy figure for that league. His rights in baseball called for the Yanks to pay him \$3000. Moore was delighted to sign such a contract.

There is no denying that Moore played a major role in the winning of the pennant by the Yankees. The greatest weapon a manager can have is a relief pitcher capable of meeting most any emergency. Moore early proved that he could.

With Moore in constant reserve, a gulfion for punishment, Miller Huggins was able to shift his pitchers that it was the exception for one of the veteran pitchers to act in a relief role. That helped.

Now for the part that has made a big hit with Moore.

Unless I have been badly misinformed, Owner Jake Ruppert tore up Moore's \$3000 contract and made him out a new one calling for \$10,000. He well deserved it.

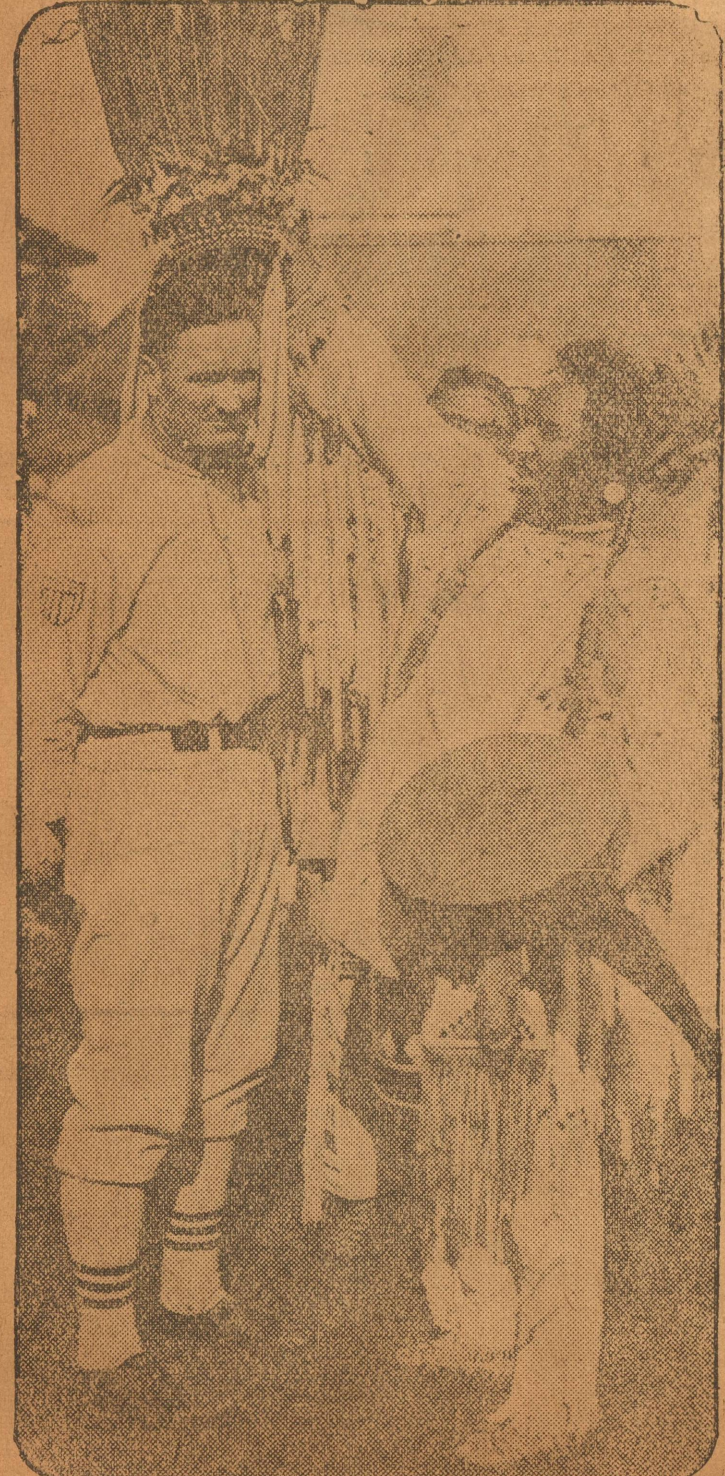

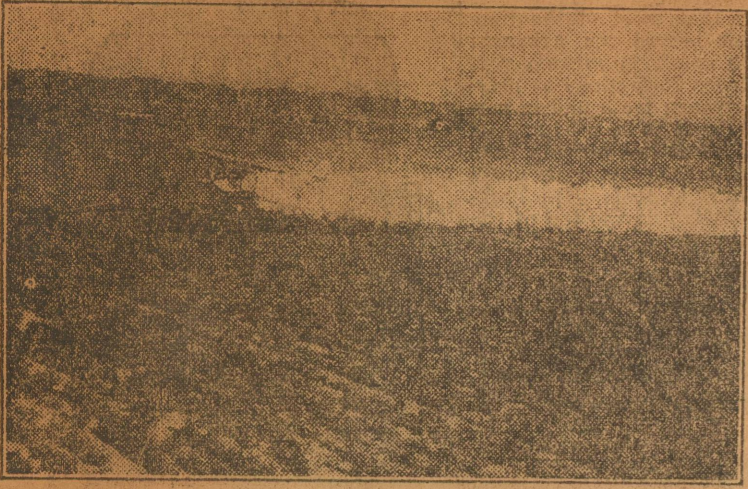

More Business Houses Planned For Eastland

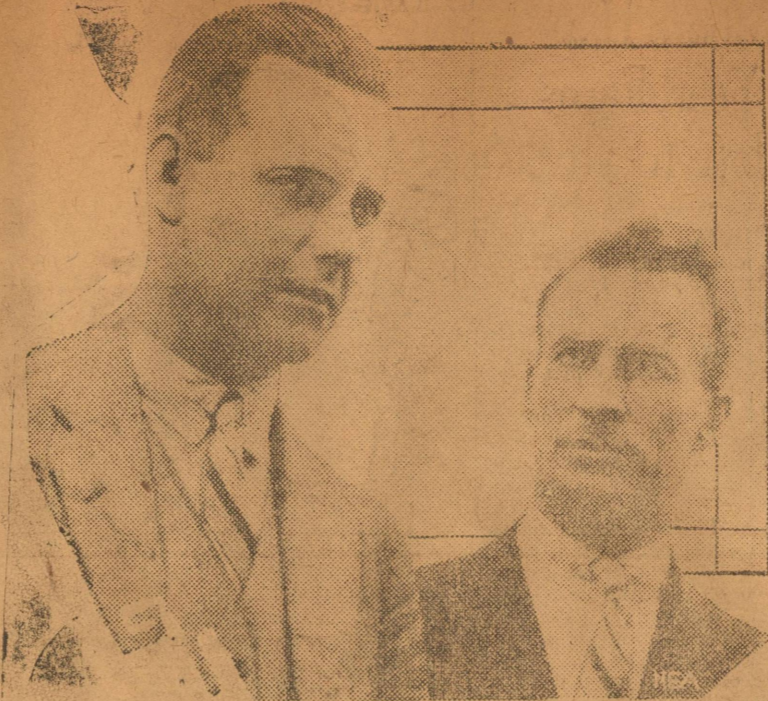

BAN ON CERTAIN PLAYS IS MYTH DECLARES HAYS

So Called Czar of Movies Looks Only To General Conduct of Business.

By United Press.
NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—A more or less prevalent idea that Will H. Hays spends most of his days and all of his nights reading movie manuscripts to decide what shall be seen by the public and what shall not be seen, was shattered today by Hays himself in an interview with the United Press.

As president of the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America, Inc., Hays is advisor to 37 important producing and distributing companies and as such, he has a great deal to say about the general conduct of the business. Much has been written and said about the "Hays ban" on certain plays and stories and the "Hays ban" on production.

A United Press reporter, who sought to find the "Hays ban" found that it doesn't exist.

"The misrepresentation by those whose plays or books are not being filmed that I 'ban' certain books and plays from the motion picture is entirely in error," Hays said. "It arises from a fundamental misunderstanding of the industry's purpose and a gross misconception of its procedure in this regard."

"This office does not ban anything—any more than an editor bans news from his newspaper. Every editor who is about his business, however, retains the right of final judgment. Treasonable utterances, libelous statements, gross exaggerations, of course, are refused space. They go into the waste basket, where they belong, or are penciled out of existence without any thought by the editor, or by anybody else, that the sacred right of free speech is being trampled under foot. The material, as far as the editor and his public are concerned, is just not suitable for publication."

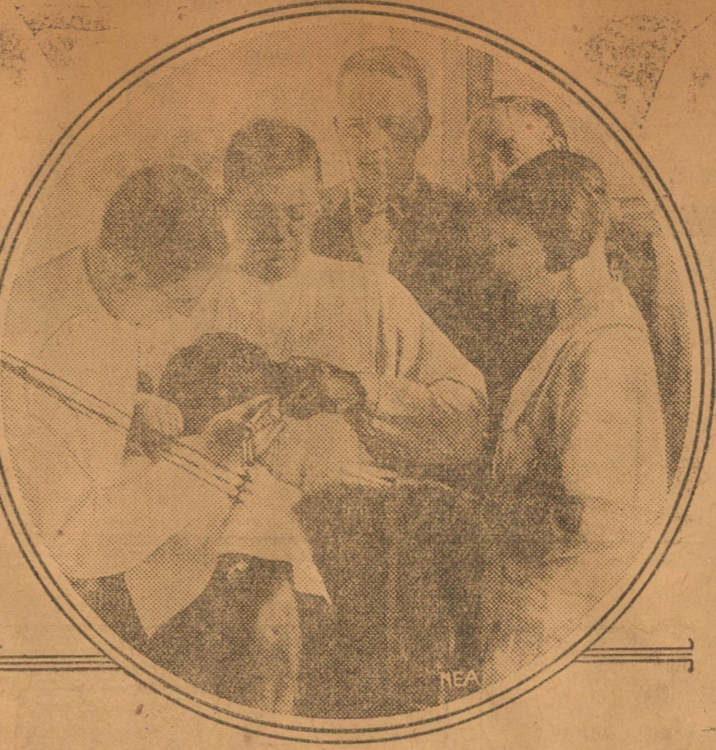
Pictures Not Banned.

"What happens in the motion picture industry is analogous. The scenario department of a member company is offered the screen rights to a book or play which the scenario editor believes has objectionable or questionable subject matter. He believes that for the good of the industry as well as for the good of his own company, the book or play should not be converted into a moving picture whose audience differs largely from the audience of the book or the play in that its appeal is wider. Acting on the scenario editor's advice, the member company rejects the story and sends of such rejection to our association, such a notice is a recommendation that all the associated companies reject it.

"We, in turn, read the book or see the play with open minds and then if our opinion coincides with that of the company bringing the story to our attention, we forward that company's rejection to the other members so that they, having their attention called to the particular matter, may also avoid a mistake."

"The companies are not told that they cannot make the picture. They are not told anything, to be exact, except that a member company has been offered the screen rights to a certain book or play and that such company rejects it because it would

be bad business to make such a picture. Our forwarding of the rejection shows the association's concurrence in the member's conclusion.

The motion picture, Hays pointed out, is an international entertainer. Its patrons are citizens of every country under the sun. When a motion picture is shown in this country with titles in English, it must be remembered that it will be shown also in 70 other countries with those same titles translated into 37 languages. Men of every race, of every degree of education, and position will see that picture, and to a certain extent, Hays declares, be influenced by it.

Obligations Defined.
"Further, there is possibly a distinct psychology in the situation," he said. "The motion picture seems to reach very deep into consciousness. The quickest way to the deepest mind may be the eye."

"Since the screen is international in character and since it does have a psychological effect upon its patrons, added duties and responsibilities are imposed upon the men who are its custodians."

"These obligations are clearly defined. One of them is to see that the nationals of one country are truthfully presented to the nationals of all other countries. Another is to see that the conventions of society and the laws of God and man are not held in scorn."

"Moreover—and from a selfish standpoint—there is a chance that some might be barred by the nation if misrepresented and it would become a liability on the industry. If the degradation were flagrant, every picture produced by the offending company might be barred from the offended country or it might lead even to the barring of all American pictures. Such was actually the conditions in one country when this association was organized."

"The method we have chosen is thoroughly legal and it has proved efficient. And, of course, it is not censorship in any sense of the word. Nor does it, by any possible interpretation limit the production of vital or artistic pictures."

Some authors, have felt that their work has a prior right and that the motion picture industry is violating some definite ethical standard when it does not buy their books or plays. Some of this material takes the form of violent attacks upon foreign governments whose nationals are among the best customs or against accepted conventions of society he added.

"Our own government, of course," Hays concluded, "is co-operating in this work. Whenever the opportunity presents itself, we go directly to the government of the country around which the story revolves and ask for expert advice. We work in advance of production and the results are such as to assure us that motion pictures are having a salutary effect upon the friendship of nations."

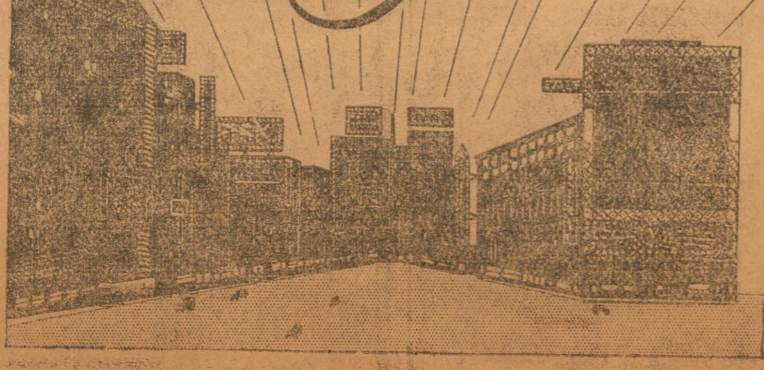

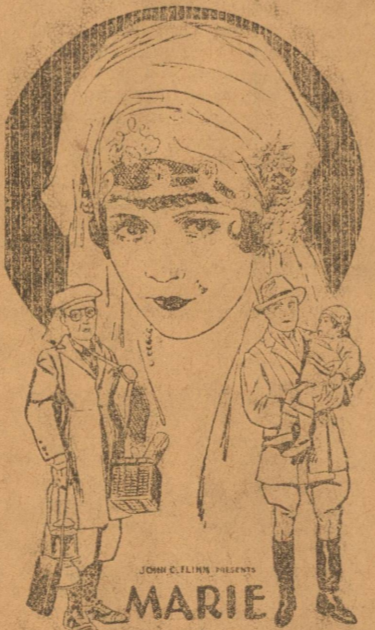
