

## RANGER TAKES STEPS TO GET POST OFFICE

### FINAL STATE CROP REPORT FOR SEASON

General Conditions on Farms Greatly Improved Says Commissioner.

AUSTIN, Nov. 17.—General conditions on the farm have greatly improved, said State Agricultural Commissioner George B. Terrell today in his final crop report for the season. Terrell reports the Texas cotton crop at 4,250,000 bales. His estimate on other crops is: Corn, 114,000,000 bushels, (1927) 106,000,000. Oats, 45,000,000 bushels, (1927) 83,000,000. Wheat, 28,000,000 bushels, (1928) 32,000,000. The 1926 cotton crop was 5,609,000 bales. Terrell said that cotton is practically all gathered except in the north-west and that it will average one-fourth bale to the acre.

"The price of cotton and cotton seed has been better than it was last year," his report said. "The price of cotton is still too low as the total crop is estimated at 5,000,000 below last year's production and 5,300,000 below last year's consumption. The short crop and increased consumption justify 25 cent cotton, and cotton reached that price early in the season when the short crop was announced by the government, but for some unaccountable reason cotton has declined since that time with no apparent cause.

"Supply and demand are not now controlling the price, but the price is controlled by the exchange gamblers, and it may not advance until nearly all the cotton leaves the farmers' hands.

"The statements given out by the secretary of agriculture sometime ago, forecasting lower prices for cotton, and indicating a large carry over, were seized upon by the cotton gamblers to lower the price, and as a result the cotton farmers have lost millions of dollars. These conditions should be thoroughly investigated by congress, and the gambling features of the exchanges abolished, and this conspiracy against the farmers should be exposed, and the guilty parties punished."

On other farm conditions, Terrell said: "With the exception of oats other feed crops are very good, such as grain, sorghum, hay and other forage crops. In 70 per cent of the counties enough feed has been made to do them. Fall planting of oats and wheat has increased about 15 per cent with the main wheat acreage in the northwest district and the largest oats acreage in the central and northern districts.

"Production of pork, dairy products and poultry has increased and the price of cattle, wool and mohair is fairly good."

### SLAYER SOUGHT BY OFFICERS IN LOUISIANA

#### Father of Fourteen Children Killed Following Quarrel on Highway Bus.

MONROE, La., Nov. 17.—The slayer of Walter Barrett, father of 14 children was sought by officers of two parishes today.

Barrett was slain last night on the highway near Calhoun, in an altercation with Chas. Pilcher. Pilcher made his escape after the shooting. The two men quarreled while riding a bus from Shreveport to Monroe. Near Calhoun they were ejected from the bus. The murder followed.

### Condition of Man Injured in Train Wreck Critical

The condition of Robert Lewis, who was injured in a rear end collision of two freight trains in the Texas-Pacific main line, Ranger, is still critical. Lewis, who lost his left foot in the wreck, had to suffer the amputation of his left leg just below the knee and yesterday hemorrhaged considerably during the day. He is still reported as being a pretty sick man, but is resting a little better today.

R. H. McFarland, the other victim of the wreck, was buried in Fort Worth this afternoon.

Other sick people at the City-County hospital are Mrs. Jimmie Nottingham, who this morning underwent an operation for the removal of her appendix; Bernice Stevens, who has been ill for several weeks, following an automobile accident and whose condition remains unchanged; Mrs. Alice Maidwell, who underwent a major operation Tuesday and is some better.

Mrs. Katherine Williams, another automobile accident victim returned to her home this morning.

### Jury Finds Locke Guilty, Gives 10 Year Sentence

ANTLERS, Okla., Nov. 17.—Major Victor M. Locke Jr., 51, prominent state politician and former chief of the Choctaw Indians, was found guilty of manslaughter by a district court jury today which recommended a 10 year prison sentence for the killing of Abner Baptist, 27, also a Choctaw.

Locke, who had pleaded he shot and killed the young Indian last September, during a spell of temporary insanity induced by Baptiste's alleged attack on two young Indian girls, heard the verdict at 10:35 a. m. without a show of emotion.

### Tulsa Oil Men Are Skeptical About Big Oil Producer

TULSA, Nov. 17.—Oil men here today agreed with the Fort Worth producers who skeptical of the claims made by officials of the Trans-Continental-Mid-Kansas Oil company that their gusher in the Yates pool would flow around 60,000 barrels per day.

Experts pointed to the fact that the test was made for only 45 minutes and after the well had been shut down two days. They declared that great quantities of oil would be stored at the "head" and for a short time would show a phenomenal flow but if tested for a longer period they believed the well would "slow down" to a much smaller production.

### Prohibition Head Denies Extensive Killing By Squads

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Lowell, prohibition chief, today said only 175 persons, 46 dry agents and the rest citizens had been killed in dry enforcement in the last 18 months.

### PORTFOLIO IS PREPARED AS FIRST MOVE

#### Senator Mayfield Has Given Promise To Aid Movement

Work of compiling a portfolio of pictures of Ranger's business houses, street scenes, industrial plants and residences has been completed and is ready to be sent to United States Senator Earle B. Mayfield at an early date. This book comes as a sequence to a suggestion by Senator Mayfield that all this data be furnished and forwarded to him at Washington so that he could in this way go about ascertaining a federal building for Ranger. With the portfolio will go a petition signed by citizens of the town and letters from individuals.

At the same time these documents are sent to the senator a similar set of data will be sent to the postmaster general.

At a meeting of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce directors this week, this portfolio was exhibited and approved. At the same time the directors voted to send a telegram to Rev. George W. Shearer, who is attending the Central Texas Methodist conference in Fort Worth, and extend through him an invitation to the conference to meet in Ranger next year. This is being done in conjunction with the same action of the Lions and Rotary clubs.

W. W. Houswright made a report on the pictures that will be sent to Mayfield, read a letter from him and talked on the necessary procedure of action.

V. V. Cooper, road commissioner; M. K. Collie and Mr. Moss of the Moss Gin company were visitors. Mr. Collie talked of the coming tree-planting campaign which the Chamber of Commerce has approved. Commissioner Cooper talked on the condition of the road that leads to Thurber, that section of it which begins where the highway turns toward Strawn and ends at the mining city. He reported that the commissioners court had spent \$1,000 for a bridge on that road, but even with that the road needed more improvement. After a good deal of discussion as to what might be done toward remedying this condition, Commissioner Cooper promised to take up the matter with the commissioners court relative to getting it chatted and other bridges repaired.

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**Eastland County Court-At-Law Makes Rulings**

Because so many attorneys and their clients are negligent in getting into the trial of cases Tom J. Cunningham of the Eastland county court-at-law has set down a number of rules which he expects to enforce and which he hopes will greatly assist in clearing up his docket, which is badly congested just at this time. Following is Judge Cunningham's statement:

"Cases will be assigned at the beginning of each term, or the week prior thereto. A copy of these settings will be posted on the court's desk, as heretofore, and a copy furnished to the newspapers available at the time. On the day a case is set, it is set for trial, and if the plaintiff or plaintiffs, appear and are ready for trial, a hearing will be given. If the defendant or defendants, appear, and the plaintiffs do not, a hearing will be given. This rule will work both ways.

"No pleadings will be permitted in any case to be heard unless filed and opposite party given three days notice thereof, prior to the date the case is set for hearing.

"On each Monday, two weeks from the opening of the succeeding term, all cases that have been on the docket 18 months must be dismissed or other arrangements made to get them off the docket. The congestion of the docket must be relieved.

"After a case is tried in the court no ex-parte hearings will be entertained by the court, and only hearings in the court room, in open court, with the parties at interest present, will be listened to by the court. In the court room is where the trials will be had, and cases can not be heard by the court in ex-parte hearing in his office before the day of trial."

**Seats for Women Employees Must Be Provided**

Complaints that some employers of female help in Eastland, Cisco and Ranger, are, in some instances, failing to provide seats for such employees for use by them when they are not actually engaged in their work, have come to the county attorney's department, according to County Attorney J. Frank Sparks. These complaints, Mr. Sparks states, have not come from employees themselves but from others interested in the welfare of such employees.

Texas statutes provide that employers of female help shall require them to work not more than nine hours in any one calendar day nor more than 54 hours in any one calendar week; that seats shall be provided for use by such employees when they are not actually engaged in the performance of their duties; and that notices shall be posted in conspicuous places about the building in which such employees work, calling attention to the fact that seats are for their use. The penalty for failure to comply with this statute calls for a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200, each day the statute is violated constitutes a separate offense.

County Attorney Sparks stated that his department would certainly prosecute violations of this law and that some member of the office would doubtless be detailed to investigate the reports already received by his department.

**Kathleen Norris, as Soul Doctor, Calls American Home Life Safe**

"The Home is not really losing ground," declared Kathleen Norris in a recent interview. She adds, "The average life still centers there and just as the home is the scene of life's greatest satisfactions, so too is it the field of our greatest problems."

Besides fame as a novelist whose every book is a "best seller," Mrs. Norris enjoys a unique title. She is, in her own words, "A Doctor of Domesticity." Through widely syndicated articles she deals with the problems of women in the home. And these problems embrace every domestic subject from economical home management, to serious marital difficulties and the yearnings of the modern flapper.

What quality essential to a happy marriage is most often lacking? Mrs. Norris was asked.

"Humor," she said promptly. "There is almost no situation which humor will not save. Humor, understanding and sympathy are closely allied.

"Take any average case. Suppose that a man is pettish; that his children annoy him; that home life makes him irascible. Remember that he may have, besides the small home worries, a multitude of troubles connected with the family welfare, on his mind. Condemnation will never cure him. Nine times out of ten he condemns himself more severely than can anyone else. Intolerance is always futile. But if you laugh at him; if you assure him that he is making himself just a little ridiculous, it is quite possible that you will reach either his sense of humor or his self-respect.

"Remember too, that there is a perverse pleasure in being condemned. People who are overstrained, nervous and tired, rather like to think of themselves as great, lonely, misunderstood souls. But no one likes to be laughed at.

"So much for the curative quality of humor. But sympathy and understanding are needed as well. Remember that every departure from normal, healthy behavior has a deep seated mental or spiritual cause.

"Women so often get in a rut. They cease to grow. They make life a dull, dreary routine for their men, and then they are outraged if their husbands take to grumpiness,

or something worse. They look everywhere for the cause, except within themselves. They have nothing to give to their husbands—not even thought.

In her latest book, "The Sea Gull," Mrs. Norris deals in startling fashion with modern love and its problems.

"An interesting, growing and happy home is, after all, the chief influence for good," added Mrs. Norris. "But the living heart of such a home is the family and the life and spirit of the family may be maintained even if its members are widely scattered. How may this be done? By frequent and loving letters, or, if the time be lacking for these, by the considerate use of greeting cards on birthdays, anniversaries and the great holidays.

"Mother's Day, Father's Day, Christmas, New Year, Easter, the spirit of each can be expressed through a card of greeting, calling to remembrance and renewed vigor the sweetest loves and loyalties of life.

"Being a 'doctor of domesticity' has its compensations," concluded Mrs. Norris. "I know of no better way to feel the pulse of the world. And this still beats strong and true, no matter what the cynics may say."

The merest glance at the federal government's expenditures reveals that war is far and away our most costly luxury. Obviously, the greatest loss of the World War was to be compiled from the casualty lists,

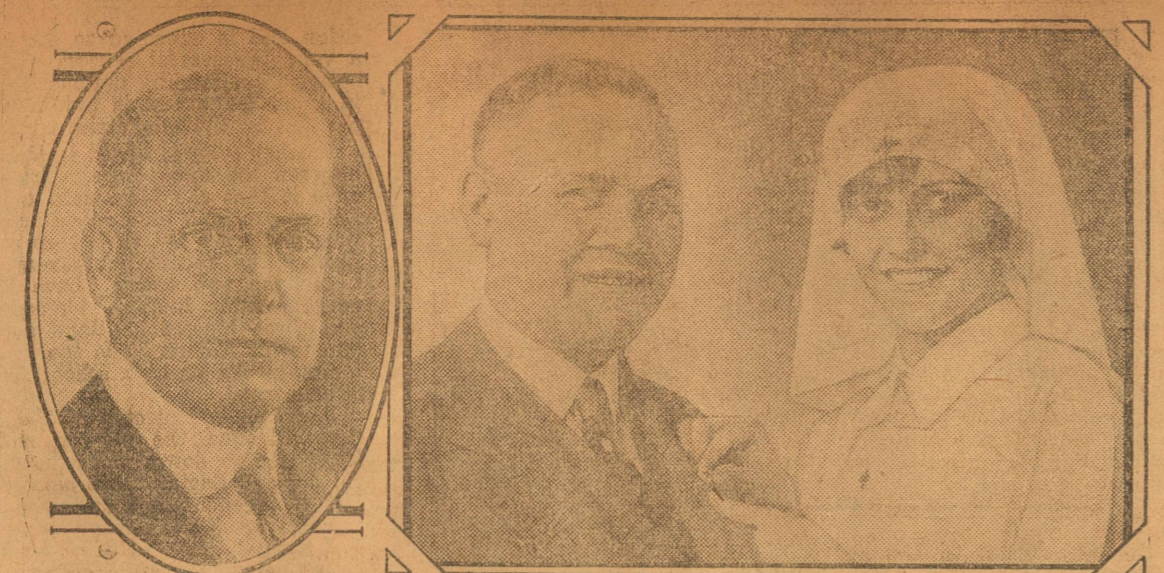

## Business and Labor Join to Aid Red Cross

**Heads of U. S. Chamber of Commerce and American Federation of Labor Urge Member Organizations and Individual Business Men and Workers to Support Red Cross Membership Enrollment**

**T**HE nation's business and industry, as represented by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America, and the American Federation of Labor, has expressed anew its confidence in the American Red Cross, and heartily commends the record of service of the Red Cross in the past year.

The leaders of both the National Chamber and the Federation of Labor have called upon the member organizations of the two bodies, and the individual business leaders and workers to respond to the Red Cross appeal for membership of 5,000,000.

President Lewis E. Pierson of the Chamber of Commerce, in a letter to organization members throughout the country, points out that the demands upon the Red Cross have increased year by year, and are still increasing. To meet these demands, he states, requires the sup-

port of the large, popular membership, an effective organization and large resources.

"The Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America is heartily in sympathy with the national and international work of this great organization and speaks the generous cooperation of the business men of the Nation," continues President Pierson. "You will, I am confident, rally to this call and lend every possible support to the Red Cross in its annual membership campaign which is to be conducted throughout the country in the period between November 11 and 24."

President William Green of the Federation of Labor, in a communication addressed to officers and members of International and National Unions, State Federations of Labor and City Central bodies affiliated with the A. F. of L., tells of the desire of the Red Cross to

enroll 5,000,000 members this year. He says:

"We know that in the past year the Red Cross has met its greatest test in peace time relief work in the Mississippi valley. For months we were thrilled by the speed, precision and competency with which it performed the tasks of rescue and relief. We were gratified that the workers of the Nation aided so generously in providing the Red Cross with the relief funds it required."

"The American Federation of Labor has confidence in the American National Red Cross. It is in sympathy with the national and international service of this great democratic organization. It has supported it gladly in the past. It will continue to express its faith as need requires. I urge every worker who can possibly do so to join the Red Cross during the annual roll call."

but it has been over nine years and the American people are still paying out more than 75 per cent of all the money that comes in and goes out of the treasury to defray the direct cost of that war and of preparedness for the next.

The treasury collected more than four billion dollars in the fiscal year of 1927 and paid out more than three billions for war bills and the national defense. The figures for 1928 will show no great divergence.

Receipts were \$4,129,394,000. The surplus was \$635,000,000 and that was applied to debt reduction, making a total direct war and defense outlay of \$3,165,000,000.

The money was split up as follows: Debt retirement . . . \$1,156,000,000 Interest on debt . . . 787,000,000 Army and navy . . . 680,000,000 Veterans' bureau . . . 391,000,000 Pensions . . . 221,000,000

Seventy million dollars should be deducted from the army appropriation in figuring the total war burden, to approximate the amount spent on rivers and harbors.

For various reasons, the burden will not soon be lightened appreciably. These reasons include the likelihood that European nations will eventually pay no more than a fraction of their debts to us and the fact that disarmament conferences have failed and that even now large appropriations for new cruisers are being demanded in Congress. There may never be any more huge surpluses like those of 1927 and 1928, which means that while a few hundred

millions less in future years will be taken from the taxpayers and applied to the war debt, neither the war debt itself or the enormous interest charge can be radically reduced.

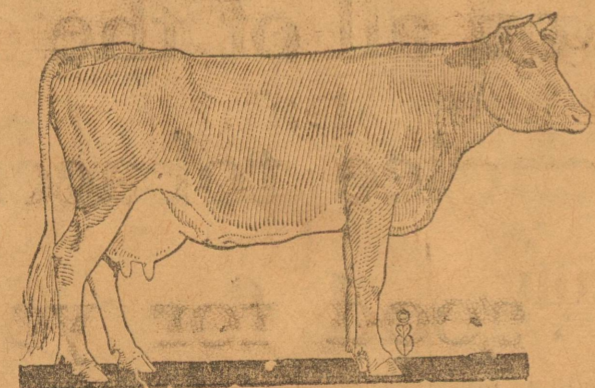
Another big war in the next few years probably would force us to pay large sums on debts and other marital obligations until well after the year 2000.

In his report for 1925, Mellon went out of his way to point out the enormous cost of war.

"While it is not possible to segregate entirely expenditures which might fall in this category," he said, "if we add to the disbursements for public debt retirements interest on the debt, War, Navy, Veterans' Bureau, and pensions, other extraordinary expenditures, such as adjusted compensation and the increased outlays by the treasury, the expenditures which are directly or indirectly attributed to war and the national defense compose over 80 per cent of total federal expenditures."

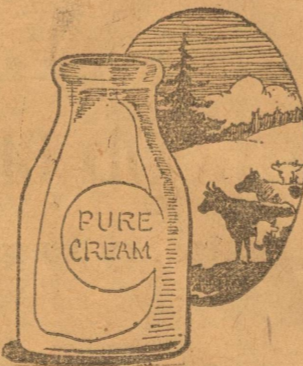

## Longhorns Have Edge Over Aggies On Former Score

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 17.—When the Texas Aggies and Longhorns clash in their annual Thanksgiving game on Kyle Field this year, the Longhorns will have the edge on their old rivals in the thirty-three games in which these two teams have met since 1894. The Longhorns have come out at the long end of the score in twenty-one games while the Aggies have won only nine. The other three games resulted in scoreless ties.

In the ten games played since 1917, the year in which Coach D. X. Bible became head coach at A. & M., the results do not favor the Longhorns so decidedly, for they have won five of the games to the Aggies four, the one remaining having resulted in a tie. The Longhorn's aggregate score for the thirty-three games is 416 to Aggies 176. Since 1917 the Aggies have piled up a total score of 64 to the Longhorns' 48.

Since Coach Bible has had the Aggies under this care they have won four conference championships, in 1917, 1919, 1921 and 1925. If the Aggies win from the Steers on Thanksgiving Day they will win another championship and give Bible an average of five out of a possible ten championships, a record seldom exceeded. Although Bible became head coach at A. & M. in 1917 he is in his tenth year as head coach this year. He was not at A. & M. in 1918, being at that time in the Air Corps of the Army during the World War.

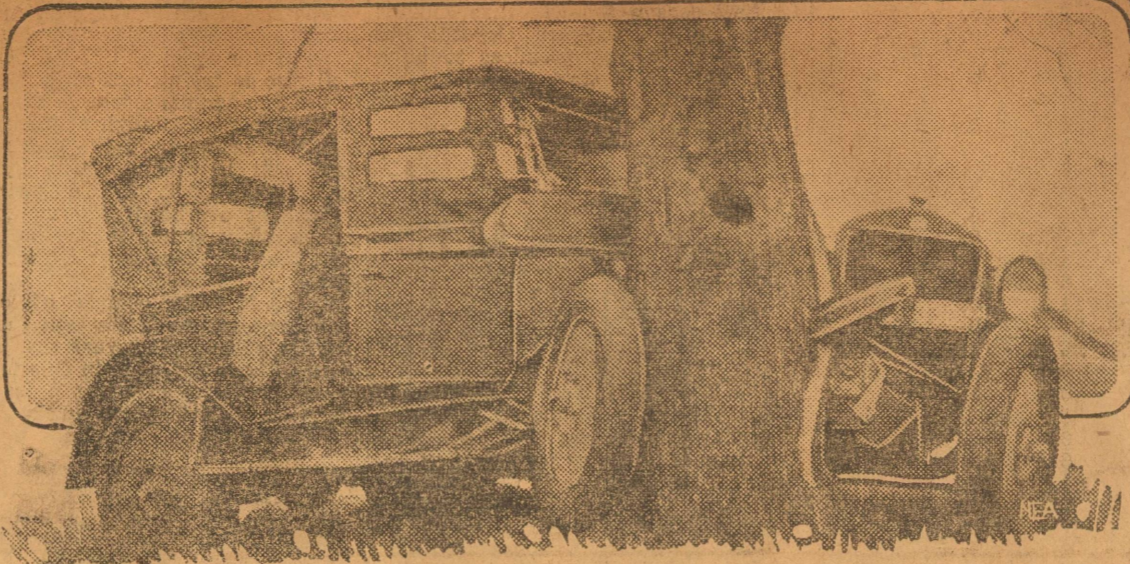
