Holland Merchant Loses Life, Fire

Texas and Oklahoma Banks Reported Robbed By Bandits

Wynnewood Oklahoma Bank Big Loser

Lone Bandit Secures \$1,000 From Small Bank In Texas

WYNNEWOOD, Okla., Nov. 3.—Four bandits robbed the First National bank of Wynnewood, escaping with cash and bonds estimated at between \$10,000 and \$12,000 after locking officers and customers in the bank vault.
They were believed to have escaped northeastward in the direction of the Seminole oil fields, traveling in a Buick sedan with an Oklahoma license.

TEMPLE, Nov. 3.—The Planters National bank at Grover, Coryell county, near here, was held up and robbed of \$1,000 by a lone bandit today.
The bandit fled in a touring car, after forcing employes of the bank into the vault.

Crippled Man Is Hit By Automobile On Ranger Main Street

Gas Anderson, aged 47, while attempting to cross Main street, Ranger, this morning was knocked down by a car and was taken to the City-County hospital with a cut in the back of his head. Anderson has many physical disabilities, including one leg entirely gone and both hands missing. He is said to have come in here from Breckenridge. He told hospital authorities that he was 47 years old, had no people and no home.
The driver of the car stated that he was coming down Main street and was in the act of turning on to South Rusk but did not see the crippled man who stepped out from behind another car, in time to miss hitting him. Anderson fell to the ground when struck by his car. The driver stopped his car within two feet of where the accident happened and did what he could in the way of rendering assistance.
Anderson's injuries are not considered serious.

KANSAS CITY POLICE LAY BANDIT TRAP

City Detective Kidnaped for Jewelry Saleman, Gun Battle Follows

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 3.—Two bandits were shot and two detectives wounded shortly before noon today following the kidnaping of a man the bandits believed was a salesman but who proved to be Herbert Hix, a city detective.
Hix was the bait in a police frame-up to stop mandrill and had been going from one jewelry store to another carrying a sample case. He was followed by three city detectives.
When the bandits overtook Hix and forced him to enter their car at the point of guns, the three detectives opened fire.
A hail of bullets followed and as a result two detectives and two bandits were wounded, none believed seriously.
The bandits fled through the downtown section and released Hix in the residential district.

YOUNG M'ADOO FILES BANKRUPTCY PETITION

Report One Marine Wounded In Fight In Nicaragua

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—One American marine was wounded, two national guardsmen killed and 60 Nicaraguan rebels killed or wounded in an engagement near Jacaro, Nicaragua, Tuesday morning, according to advices received from Managua today.
A national guardsman and a United States marine patrol fought against 250 rebels in the main engagement.

EASTLAND METHODISTS AWARD CONTRACTS

Contracts have been awarded by the building committee for the First Methodist church of Eastland, for a combination cooling and heating system and for art glass windows for the new building the congregation now has under construction.
For the past several months the basement of the new building has been used for a place of worship by the congregation, but after next Sunday other quarters will have to be obtained since the contractors will be doing the work on the building. The place where services are to be held has not been announced.

Following the open air meeting the Army will march to the Christian church, where beginning at 8 o'clock an old-fashioned Salvation meeting will be held, conducted by Colonel White and his staff.
A real heart-felt welcome is given to everyone in Ranger tonight to attend these meetings.

Eastland Church Of Christ Owns Fine Property

The congregation of the Church of Christ at Eastland, which is not large in numbers when compared with the congregations of other religious denominations in the city, is the owner of one of the best and most up-to-date church buildings in this section of Texas, having just recently paid off their last obligation on the property.
In addition to the church house the congregation also owns a handsome residence adjoining the church which is used as a parsonage for the pastor.
The Church of Christ building, erected about six or seven years ago, at a cost of some \$70,000, is one of the show places of the city. While the entire congregation has worked faithfully for several years to lift the mortgage from this building, Judge Allen D. Dabney, among the individual members, is perhaps due more credit for the work than anyone else. He has always taken the lead and assumed more of the burden than any other and it was through his tireless efforts that the indebtedness against the church has been paid.

HAROLD DURHAM AND FAMILY BACK FROM DALLAS

The baby did not have to undergo an operation and is reported as doing nicely. His case was observed with much interest by Dallas medical men, Mr. Durham said.

SUPERINTENDENT CISCO FISH HATCHERY MOVED

Joe Dixon, superintendent of the state fish hatchery at Cisco, has been transferred to Wichita Falls. The transfer is effective today. Dixon, it is stated, will be succeeded at Cisco by Superintendent Wright of the Kerrville hatchery.

ONE ARREST HAS BEEN MADE IN BANK ROBBERY

Man Held at Galveston Partially Identified as One of Bank Bandits

GALVESTON, Nov. 3.—A second arrest in connection with the \$8,500 Texas City bank robbery was expected today.
Sheriff R. E. Kirk, shortly after midnight arrested W. S. Schrivener of Houston.
Schrivener was being held in Galveston county jail today.
Though questioned at length after his arrest he maintained silence.
Cashier Chester Grissen of the First National bank of Texas City partially identified a picture of Schrivener, Sheriff Kirk declared.
Elizabeth Lege, bookkeeper, has not seen a picture of the arrested man, the sheriff said.

German Aviator Missing, Forced Landing Feared

ALLAHABAD, India, Nov. 3.—Nothing had been heard today from Otto Koennecke, German round-the-world aviator, since he left Karachi yesterday announcing Allahabad was his destination. It was feared he had made a forced landing, particularly as he had been held up for weeks by persistent engine trouble which it was hoped finally had been removed.

Millikin Back In Prison, Prepares For Execution

HUNTSVILLE, Nov. 3.—A. V. Millikin, who tried to prove to a Lockhart jury that he was insane because of superstitions and conversations with spirits, today found an ill omen following him to the electric chair. Just 13 hours before he is scheduled to be electrocuted, he walked back into the penitentiary accompanied by Sheriff E. W. Ellison of Lockhart.

Many Robberies Reported, Call For Assistance

Eastland county officers have been called upon to assist in catching the thieves and robbers, who during the past few days have committed numerous crimes in this immediate section of the state. A few days ago the owner of a filling station on the Bankhead highway just west of Cisco was held up at the point of a gun and robbed. The City pharmacy at Baird was also burglarized only a few nights ago. Similar crimes have also been committed at other places in adjoining counties recently.
There is a rumor abroad that an Eastland county bank has been picked by the crooks of this section to be robbed some time in the near future. Whether there is any foundation for this rumor or whether it is purely the result of someone's imagination is problematical.

PENITENTIARY WARDEN AND WIFE ARE SUED

HUNTSVILLE, Nov. 3.—Warden L. Speer of the Texas penitentiary here and his wife, were named defendants in a \$100,000 damage suit for alleged slander, filed today by George W. Dixon, Houston attorney.

AUSTIN.—Test of the state "hot check" law is to come before the court of criminal appeals on Nov. 2. The test case is from El Paso where J. T. Holland was given a six months jail sentence for an alleged "hot check" passed to the Savoy hotel for \$10.

"The point upon which the conviction is attacked is that the court permitted a "no account" notation on the return check to be evidence of the check being bad. The defense contends it is necessary to summon bank officials to prove lack of funds.

Pep Squad Needs Cars For Trip To Breckenridge

Cars are needed to take Ranger's pep squad to Breckenridge tonight. The West Texas coaches, always to the fore in city service, has donated one coach but that will not carry more than 30 and there will be at least 100 people going over to pep for Ranger.

PEOPLE OF U. S. ARE READY FOR COURT REFORM

Chief Justice Taft Says Country Ripe For Speedier Prosecution of Criminals

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—Chief Justice William Howard Taft of the United States supreme court, told the national crime commission conference here today that the whole country is becoming aroused to the necessity for better legal machinery for the prosecution of crime.
"The Baumes law," he said, "seems to indicate that the forgotten man—the victim of murder or robbery—is being remembered.
"We must not allow our interest in criminals to cause us to make the prosecution of crime subordinate to reform."
"The country at large is ripe for measures which will insure speedier prosecution," Taft said.
He told the commission that judges ought to have more power in the conduct of criminal cases.

Man Found With Bullet In Heart As Hotel Burns

LAREDO, Nov. 3.—The bullet-riddled body of a man identified as Jack Dalton, McAllen, Texas, was found in a room of the Penna hotel here at noon today, while firemen were extinguishing a fire that caused considerable damage to the hotel.
The body was stretched across the bed in the room with a bullet through the heart.
Police believe the man set fire to the hotel and then committed suicide.
A short time prior to the fire Dalton had asked for writing paper. He registered at the hotel last night.

Catholics Gather For Funeral Late Jeremiah J. Harty

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 3.—Several hundred Catholic laymen and priests were at union station today when the body of the late Archbishop Jeremiah J. Harty arrived here from Los Angeles where he died last Saturday.
Funeral services are to be held at the cathedral Friday morning. Several hundred priests and 10 bishops and archbishops are here for the services.

MARILYN MILLER GIVEN DIVORCE IN PARIS

PARIS, Nov. 3.—A divorce to become effective at the expiration of a 60-day period during which an appeal could be made, has been granted to Marilyn Miller, actress, from Jack Pickford, by the Versailles tribunal, lawyers in the case announced today.

BEDOUINS FIGHTING ON PALESTINE FRONTIER

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Daily Express Jerusalem correspondent reports that dispatches from Damascus state 200 have been killed or wounded in clashes between two sections of the Rualla Trizat, most powerful of the Bedouins.
The fighting occurred in the neighborhood of Deraa, close to the Palestine frontier, according to the report.

MINEOLA.—Ten thousand people are expected to gather here for an Armistice day celebration which promises to be the largest affair ever held here. A rodeo, parade and football game will feature the entertainment program.

Explosion Is Heard Before Fire

Foul Play Is Feared, Mysterious Auto Seen To Leave Store

HOLLAND, Texas, Nov. 3.—Sam Barton, 41, owner of the Barton Drug store here, was burned to death this morning when his store was destroyed by fire following a mysterious explosion.
Barton had gone to the store early, to work on his books, his wife said, after returning from a trip to Dallas.
Officers are attempting to identify the driver of an automobile that drove away from the store immediately after the explosion.
The theory was advanced that Barton had been murdered and the store burned.
Loss by fire was estimated at \$16,000.
The death of Barton was the second murder mystery to come to light in Holland within 12 hours.
Last night, boys playing along the banks of the Little river here, found the badly decomposed body of J. H. Wilson, a carpenter. Hands and legs of the body had been bound with cord giving rise to the belief that Wilson was slain and thrown into the river.

Ferry Rammed By Steamer In Sidney Harbor, 9 Dead

SIDNEY, Australia, Nov. 3.—Nine persons are dead, 40 are injured and several are missing following a collision in Sidney harbor today when the steamer Thaiti rammed a crowded ferryboat.
The ferry, whose passengers were mostly women and children bound for a picnic, sank within 30 seconds in the shark infested waters. Some passengers were terribly injured in the collision itself. Others were imprisoned in saloons and the engine room crew was unable to escape.

F. J. Von Zuben of Fort Worth, consulting engineer, in charge of the engineering work, is in Ranger as are a large number of representatives from paving contracting firms.

J. C. Penny Buys Out Golden Rule Line Of Stores
Announcement was made today by Roy W. Gilbreath manager of the local J. C. Penny Company store of the purchase of the twenty stores operated by the Golden Rule Mercantile company by the J. C. Penny company. The latter organization owns and operates 885 stores throughout the country. The deal involving the consolidation of the Golden Rule Mercantile company with the J. C. Penny company is the largest of its kind ever put through in this section and involves a consideration of more than \$2,000,000, according to a statement made by E. M. Tower, vice president of the Golden Rule Mercantile company and one of the largest stockholders in that organization.

Negotiations were completed in New York City on October 4, with the J. C. Penny company represented by Earl C. Sams, president after two years' consideration of the policies governing the change.

The stores involved will start operation under the J. C. Penny company name on January 1, 1928, following the annual inventory of both companies and the J. C. Penny company will take over the furniture, fixtures, leases and stock of the Golden Rule Mercantile company at this time.

This consolidation will bring together two well known store organizations which started from a common origin a little over a quarter of a century ago.

At that time, J. C. Penny went to work as a salesman in a store operated at Evanston, Wyoming, by Mr. Guy Johnson. Also working for Mr. Johnson at the same time was a man by the name of R. W. Stevens.

As these two men grew in experience with the store, they were taken into partnership and allowed to purchase interests in other stores opened by Mr. Johnson's company, which later became the Golden Rule Mercantile company.

In 1920, Mr. Penny went to Kennermer, Wyoming, and Mr. Johnson's partners consented to sell him their interests in the small store which became the "mother store" of the present J. C. Penny company system.



EASTLAND AND ABILENE GAME IS EXPECTED TO DRAW 5,000 FANS

Athletic Field At Eastland Put In Good Shape, Additional Seats Have Been Placed

It is being estimated that between 4,000 and 5,000 people will attend the Eastland-Abilene game to be played in Eastland Saturday afternoon at Maverick athletic field.

The game is the only one on that date in this section. Ranger goes to San Angelo but the majority of Ranger fans will attend the important game at Eastland. The Breckenridge Buckaroos and the Cisco Lobos are both idle on that day and it is expected that both fans and teams from those two cities will attend the game as they play Abilene Nov. 11 and 25 respectively. Cisco plays the Mavericks on Nov. 18. It is reported that Abilene fans will run a special train to Eastland for the game and a large delegation from that city is being expected.

Both the Eastland and the Abilene bands will be at the game and pep squads from both places will be in action.

Work is being conducted daily providing a larger seating capacity and putting the finishing touches on the field in general. Press boxes will be constructed before the game and room will be provided for at least 20 press representatives. Fences are being made higher where necessary and there is to be a fence built at the south end of the field.

From the standpoint of football the game should be one of the best of the year. It will virtually settle the chances that the Mavericks have for the title, although if they should lose it will not put them out of the running altogether.

Both teams go upon the field with their goal lines sacred, uncrossed by the feet of men. Neither of the teams have been scored upon this year and the Mavericks have had but five first downs made against them. The Breckenridge Buckaroos managed to put over two first downs in the first class A game of the season compared to seven for the Mavericks. The Mavericks smothered the Ranger Bulldogs with 17 first downs compared with three made by the Ranger eleven. The Gorman Panthers did not register a first down against the Eastland eleven.

The Mavericks display one of the best defensive machines in this district. The veterans, Jimmy King, Daniels and Thompson are deadly on the defensive. They get through and smear and their favorite pastime is throwing the opposing backs for a loss. The backfield comes in too for its share of the defensive work. Bull Simons is a dangerous offensive on the defense as he is on the offense and Osbourn and G. C. Smith allowed few men to get by their respective places.

Offensively, the Mavericks are surprisingly dangerous. They displayed a marvelous offensive crusade to Ranger. They have a passing machine that functions and a man in the person of Johnson that circles the ends and hits the line with a punch that counts.

However, it is generally thought that the Abilene Eagles have one of the best offensive teams in this district. They have piled up something over 200 points in the games they

Neither Team Can Win Title But Neither Wants to End Season in Cellar

And San Angelo, said the mayor, wants its football publicity to be as favorable as that derived from other resources and advantages too numerous to mention in a mere few lines of type.

In the hardest scrimmage they will be given this week, the Bobcats Tuesday afternoon showed some improvement, particularly in tackling. Bill Bissett, head coach, summing it up thus: "They looked fairly good, nothing extra, and had quite a bit of fight."

The fight that makes the Bobcat, when cornered, feared by other animals is what is expected of the blue and orange jerseyed players Saturday. They will be cornered in that if they lose to Ranger the last faint chance of finishing season high in the Oil Belt district will have a glimmering. San Angelo, hailed as a dark horse after its first two victories and before encountering Class A opposition, is considered lightly now but its football representatives are determined that if they can't win the 1927 title they at least will have a say in who does lead the race.

AUSTIN, Nov. 3.—Texas will likely rule the decided favorite in their clash with Baylor University in Austin Saturday. The Texas team, despite their defeat at the hands of the Mustangs Saturday, have one of the best teams in the conference. Baylor on the other hand, is one of the weaker members of the loop, their weakness being largely attributable to the Baylor tragedy at Round Rock last season that snuffed out the lives of some of the Bear's greatest athletes.

But at that Baylor is hustling along with lots of fire and enthusiasm, and is apparently making the best of a bad deal. They have yet to register a win in the conference, but they will be scrapping for all they are worth Saturday when they meet the Texas team. They always play Texas harder than anyone on their schedule, largely because Baylor students and supporters would rather whip Texas than any other team on the Baylor schedule.

The Baylor team is easily the largest team in the conference. They are big and bulky, but they are noticeably lacking in experience and skill. Morley Jennings, Bear coach, is rapidly remedying the situation and is turning out a good team.

Texas has a better record than Baylor. The Loghorns have beaten Trinity, Oklahoma Teachers, Rice, Vanderbilt and have tied T. C. U. S. M. U. beat the Loghorns. On the other hand Baylor has been beaten by Centenary, Southwestern, T. C. U. and Arkansas. The Bears have beaten Trinity and St. Edwards University.

But despite that fact, there will be a great deal of interest in the game. The match between the two teams is always highly colorful. This year will be no exception.

Mustang-Aggie Game Saturday Will Be Important Battle

CHAMPIONSHIP OF CONFERENCE MAY BE DECIDED

Expect Crowd 15,000 to 18,000 People at Kyle Field For Tilt Between Strong Teams

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 3.—The 1928 champions of the Southwest conference gridiron will meet the 1927 challengers when the Mustangs play the Aggies on Kyle Field Saturday afternoon in what is expected to be the football classic of the year. A crowd of between 15,000 and 18,000 is expected to attend. The battle will start at 2:30 o'clock.

Saturday's game not only will see in action two of the strongest teams the Southwest conference has known in years, but will also probably decide this season's championship. The Mustangs are leading the conference with a perfect average, while the Aggies are trailing only half a game behind. The Mustangs, who have not lost a conference game in two years, showed a dazzling offense and an impregnable defense in defeating Missouri of the Missouri Valley conference, victor over Nebraska and Northwestern, and Texas and Rice of the Southwest conference. The Aggies have shown a brilliant attack in defeating Sewanee, Arkansas, and Texas Tech, and in these victories their line appeared to be one of the best of the conference has had in recent years. The Aggies and T. C. U. Frogs played a 0 to 0 tie in Fort Worth, but

three of A. & M.'s backfield stars were out of the lineup with injuries.

Be Hard Fight.

If the Mustangs defeat the Aggies Saturday, football critics believe that the S. M. U. eleven will march undefeated to its second consecutive championship. If the Aggies defeat the Mustangs, critics expect the Aggies to win the championship, provided they can handle the Longhorns on Kyle field Thanksgiving.

Football fans are marking time until Saturday's game. In years gone by, the football championship was decided on Thanksgiving day when the two state schools played in their annual contest. Saturday's game will have something of the same significance as concerns this year's championship that the Turkey Day battles had in the past.

Through the Mustangs and Aggies of this year, the Southwest conference has arrested the attention of football fans of the nation as never before in the history of the southwestern teams. It used to be considered that all the great football teams were to be found in the north and east, with an occasional good team on the Pacific coast. But the games this year in which the Aggies and Mustangs have figured have caused the fans of the country to see that these two Texas teams are on a par with the teams of national reputation.

The Mustangs' 32 to 9 victory over Missouri is rated one of the biggest upsets of the year. Missouri had previously defeated Nebraska 7 to 6, and after having been trounced by the Texas team, last week Missouri beat Northwestern 3 to 19 in one of the most spectacular battles of the season. Missouri won the Missouri Valley championship in 1925 and 1925. Even New York newspapers took cognizance of the Mustangs' phenomenal victory over Missouri. A. & M. won its intersectional game with Sewanee this year by the score of 18 to 0. The Aggies beat Arkansas 40 to 6 recently on Kyle field, while Arkansas defeated Louisiana State last week 28 to 0. Previously Louisiana had Alabama 0 to 0. Last year Alabama was selected to face the Pacific coast champions in the Golden Gate state.

The Longhorns had reflected credit on the southwest conference by defeating Vanderbilt, but last week the Mustangs scored 14 points on the brilliant Longhorn eleven in the first quarter of play, and they were content to rest on their 14-point margin. The day before this game the Aggies exhibited their best attack of the year in defeating Texas Tech at Lubbock 47 to 6.

These records bespeak the offensive power of the Aggies and Mustangs and fans are counting upon seeing a spectacular offensive game.

Aggies Hopeful.

Playing on Kyle field, where the Aggies defeated the Mustangs 7 to 0 in 1925 and in the same year won over the Longhorns 28 to 0. The Aggies will enter Saturday's fray hopeful of doing what no other conference team has been able to do in two years—defeat S. M. U. Kyle field is a hallowed place for the Aggies, and the record book fails to reveal where any team ever won over the Aggies on this turf except by the closest sort of score. Playin' again on this field is an advantage to A. & M. The Mustangs will be forced to take the road for this game and any coach knows that a train ride always saps the strength of the team to some extent.

D. X. Bible, veteran coach of the Aggies, realizes the tremendous task that confronts his team. He is cheerful over the outcome of the game but not over-confident. Asked of his team's chances, he made the reply: "Our supporters will not be disappointed in us."

Saturday's drama will include a cast of players, some of whom rank with the best of all time in the history of the conference. The Mustangs have a fine backfield, a strong line, and a relieving passing machine. In Gerald Mann the Mustangs have a great passer, a man who is the spark plug of the Mustang machine. To his passing the S. M. U. elevens owe much of the credit for their success in the past two years. In Redman Hume the Mustangs have a man who is better at carrying the ball than Mann, and a player who has star qualifications in other respects.

The fastest man on the Mustang squad is W. C. Lynch, who was kept under wraps in the Longhorn game in order that he will be in the best condition for the Aggies. Ross Love, fullback, is particularly adept at receiving and breaking up forward passes. It will be recalled that he broke up eight passes consecutively against the Longhorns last year after the Mustangs came from behind and forged ahead in their 21 to 17 victory.

In the line the Mustangs have a spectacular end in "Dog" Dawson, who compares with George (Hook) McCallough of the Longhorns of 1924 and 1921, and whose ability to receive passes is uncanny. Dawson has been playing for S. M. U. several years, and is a finished product. The S. M. U. team has a great tackle in

Roach, and a fine guard in Captain Tatum. The Mustangs do not have a weak man at any position and in games thus far it has been a battle to see who would win regular berths.

Both Strong Teams.

Against this galaxy of stars, the Aggies also have their scintillating lights. In Captain Joel Hunt, A. & M. presents the best all-round player in the conference and many Aggie supporters aver he is the best player A. & M. has ever had. Hunt is a whiz on the offense, especially at carrying the ball. In this respect and at throwing passes he is expected to give Mume and Mann a race. Hunt also can punt, and will have the able assistance of Z. W. Bartlett, center. The Aggies have other backfield stars who furnish a good combination

for their brilliant captain, Joel Hunt, in H. R. Burgess, who has been handicapped much of the time this year with injuries, the Aggies have an excellent line plunger who is also good at backing up the line. R. Varnell, who weighs only 174 pounds, is also a good fullback. At halves the Aggies will present new faces in Brooks Conover, or R. R. Dorsey, at left half, and Pinky Alsabrook, former all-state end from Cisco, at right half. Conover, Dorsey, Varnell and Alsabrook were freshmen last year but they have been playing football for a number of years and have had much experience. Conover is a good, all-round player, while Alsabrook has as a specialty the receiving of forward passes. In the Texas Tech game last Friday, the passing combi-

nation of Hunt to Alsabrook flashed as brilliantly as the Mann to Dawson combination. Alsabrook's fine showing last week has assured him of starting in the momentous Mustang game.

In the line the Aggies have a defensive team that has held like a wall. Siki Sikes and Red Petty are dependable ends and are both good at snatching passes. The Aggies have two of the best tackles in the conference in A. C. Sprott and W. S. Lister, both of Livingston. Sprott weighs 195 pounds and Lister tips the scales at 194 pounds. The Aggies will present two comparatively new faces at guards in J. G. Holmes, a 185-pounder of Troup, and E. E. Figari, a 185-pound product of the

Island City. These two men, squad men last year, have shown much improvement this year, and have held their own against all opponents. In Z. W. Bartlett at center the Aggies have a pivot man who is considered a strong contender for all-conference honors.

Depends on Drive.

The analysis of the two teams shows that there is not much difference in the individual players. Critical followers of the game have suggested that the Mustangs have perhaps shown more finish than the Aggies, and that the S. M. U. playing has been a little more alert. But it must be remembered that D. X. Bible and Charles Bassett of the Aggies had virtually to rebuild their team, while Ray Morrison had much of his 1926 championship team intact. The experience of the other games this year should give the Aggies the confidence and polish necessary to battle the Mustangs on even terms on this score.

Coach Bible believes the team that shows the most drive Saturday will be the team to win. If the Aggies can muster the proper drive, local fans expect the Aggies to be victorious.

The Aggies are going to give the Mustangs everything they have in this game. No more determined squad can be found than the Aggies. And the coaches are hopeful that the A. & M. team Saturday will display the brilliance that has characterized many of the games on Kyle field against the Longhorns.

To win Saturday's game the Aggies expect to have to play offensive football. The Aggies realize that it would be unwise to play only a safe, defensive game against the Mustangs, a type of game that other schools have attempted against the Mustangs to no avail. By unleashing a passing, slashing, smashing attack with confidence and determination the Aggies believe they have a good chance for victory. It is likely they will not permit the Mustangs to keep the ball longer than possible unless the wind is such that an exchange of punts would be profitable to the Aggies.

The Aggies have carefully scouted the Mustang plays, and their players have been practicing against these formations for some time. On the other hand it is expected the Mustangs will be confronted with an offense seldom presented by a Southwest conference football team.

FROG TEAM HAS FULL STRENGTH FOR SATURDAY

Most of Those on Hospital List Ready to Take Field Against Porkers.

FORT WORTH, Nov. 3.—With Captain "Blackie" Williams, Frog quarterback, almost entirely recovered from his sprained ankle; Fullback Orrin Thompson's lame leg apparently back in shape, and with Albert Acker capably taking care of the position left vacant by the injury of Oran Slim Steadman, star right end, the T. ---to Save on Your Gas Bill

5. Ovens and broilers with automatic control will save you approximately 50 per cent. on your gas bills, when properly used.
6. When you have finished cooking turn the fire out both in the grate and under the oven.
7. Use a small stove built for heating purposes to heat your kitchen. Cook stoves are built to keep the heat within the stove and not to heat the room.
8. Since they are not scientifically constructed wood or oil stoves with so-called patented gas burners waste twice as much gas as they actually burn.
9. Don't try to heat a big room with a small stove. Don't put a big stove in your bathroom. A small bath-room heater made to heat just that amount of space will be much more economical. There is a heater especially designed for every different size of room you have. We shall be very glad to assist you in making the proper selections.
10. Have your plumbing inspected regularly. This is very important as small leaks easily run up large bills.
