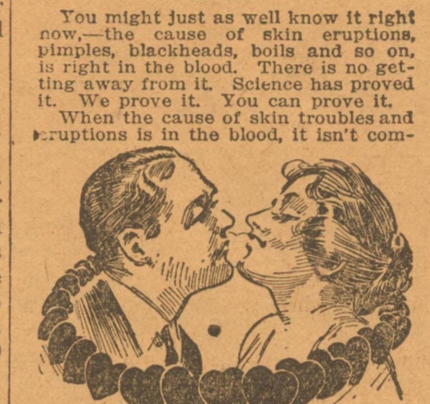

ANOTHER LARGEST STILL.

WICHITA FALLS, Jan. 27.—Officers, led by State Ranger McCormack, captured near South Bend, Young county, one of the largest stills ever seen in this section. It was twenty-five feet long with an estimated capacity of 350 gallons finished product per week.

The still was located in a dugout 25x100 feet under an old tool shed and was equipped with modern machinery for pumping mash from the vats into the still. Seventy-five gallons of corn whisky were taken in the raid and two men were arrested.

The pope is in reality the bishop of Rome, and his headship of the Catholic church comes as a perquisite of that office, and not through selection to a supreme office, says an interesting explanation of the position and the election thereto, contributed to the Times by Rev. O. E. Mollari. The account follows:

"The title of pope is at present employed solely to denote the bishop of Rome, who in virtue of his position as successor of St. Peter, is the chief pastor of the whole church.

Is Local Bishop.

"The supreme headship of the church is, we see, annexed to the office of the Roman bishop. The pope becomes chief pastor because he is bishop of Rome. Thus an election to the papacy, is, properly speaking, primarily an election to the local bishopric. The right to elect their bishop has ever belonged to the members of the Roman church. This is not to say that the election should be by popular vote of the Romans. The choice of a bishop belongs to the clergy. It may be confined to the leading members of the clergy. It is so in the Roman church at present. The electoral college of cardinals exercises their office because they are the chiefs of the Roman clergy. Should the college of cardinals ever become extinct, the duty of choosing a supreme pastor would fall, not on the bishops as assembled in council, but on the remaining Roman clergy.

"To prevent the evils of a disputed election, Alexander III. established the law in 1179 that no one should be held duly elected until two-thirds of the cardinals should have given their votes for him. To the electoral session was given the name of "conclave" (Latin, cum, with, and clavis key; a place that may be securely closed.)

History of the Conclave.

"In 1271, the election that ended with the choice of Gregory X at Viterbo, had lasted over two years and nine months, when the local authorities, weary of the delay, shut up the cardinals within narrow limits and thus hastened the desired election. The new pope endeavored to obviate for the future such a delay by the law of the conclave, which almost in spite of the cardinals, he promulgated at the fifth session of the second council of Lyons, France, in 1274. It is the first occasion on which we meet with the word conclave in connection with papal elections."

SURGERY ALTERS MAN'S IDENTITY IN NEW THRILLER

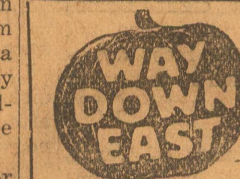
