Senate Committee Recommends U. S. Board to Rule on Issues.

By Associated Press WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.-A government tribunal for regulation of the coal industry, whose rulings shall be enforced only by the power of public opinion, is recommended in the report of Chairman Kenyon of the senate labor committee, which recently investigated the disorders in the West Virginia and Kentucky coal

The report held that both the coal operators and the miners were responsible for the recent fatal conflict and property destruction in West Virginia, and said mutual concessions would have to be made by the coal operators and the United Mine Workers would have to be made to end the conflict.

The senate committee conducted an extensive investigation of the Logan county war last year, both as to actual occurrences and conditions leading up to it. The report has been awaited with interest for the last several months, as it was known the committee would advance definite conclusions based upon the voluminous testimony taken by it.




