FANS WONDER WHETHER PIRATE STARS ARE TO GET GATE THIS YEAR

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—Considerable curiosity has been expressed in professional baseball circles over the report that emanated recently from the office of Barney Dreyfuss, owner of the Pittsburgh club, to the effect several of the 1921 Pirates would go on the auction block this year.

The world wants to know what Barney was trying to tell it about the players with whom he is willing to part either for coin or in trade. Was the Pirate owner simply disgusted with the failure of his hired men to win the pennant, or does he suspect something?

Time was when the guy who emitted even a mild "boo" against the honesty of baseball was roasted so hard he could not sleep nights. Times have changed since 1919.

Against Sales During Season.

Folks are wondering if Dreyfuss meant anything by his alleged proposal to revamp his team and omit from the 1922 lineup several star players. Taken in conjunction with the Pirate chief's avowed intention to curtail the sale of ball players during the playing season, it looks as if he was on the warpath to eradicate some of the things which have hurt baseball in the past.

For years envious pennant chasers in the National league have raised the cry that McGraw "got what he wanted if he wanted it"—always. That was not true in the altogether. The New York Giants frequently in past years have been able to purchase needed playing material from other teams, in the same circuit in mid-season or later, and these purchases undoubtedly have helped the Giants win several pennants.

McGraw always has had a bank roll and a generously minded club owner back of him, and when a tail-end team began to be pinched for money, with no chance to get it at the gate, the New York club has been able to buy needed material in exchange for the coin which the weak club owner needed. But in spite of the leverage of ready money, McGraw was denied the ambition of winning a world's pennant for many seasons, and not until this year was he able to get everything he wanted when he wanted it, making 1921 a year long to be remembered by the veteran leader of the Giants.

No suspicion attaches to the result of the last world's series. McGraw outgeneraled Huggins, just as a lot of managers have been doing in previous years, and there was no doubt of the outcome of the 1921 series, if the Giants proved anywhere near the class of the Yankees—which they did.

Dreyfuss either is sore on his athletes for their slump at the end of the season, or suspects something. He probably will spill it later, if he does. As for the weakening of the Pirates in the last month, it was expected by a lot of folks, and those who were rooting for Pittsburgh hoped the slump would come earlier in the season. If you ever competed in a mile or two race you know perfectly well the tough job a contestant has to set the pace all the way and still finish in front—or even one, two, three.

And the pacemaker always is worried and has to look back to see what the rest are doing, while the men close behind him know exactly what they have to do to close up the distance before they reach the wire. That is an explanation sufficiently logical to account for the failure of the Pirates at the finish.

If Dreyfuss has any other thought he ought to tell the world about it.

MORAN WILL BAR STUNT TRAINING FOR CINCY REDS

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—"Freak" training stunts for the Cincinnati Reds will be barred and from the time the players don their uniforms at Mineral Wells, until the team leaves for the north, the athletes will be kept busy working into a perfect baseball machine, according to Manager Pat Moran.

"Let the Cubs go ahead with their mountain climbing and let Tris Speaker put his Indians through their cowboy stunts, but in the meantime watch out for the Reds, as their time will be devoted into building up a smooth working infield," Moran said.

The greater part of the training work has already been mapped out by Moran for the 1922 season. It will include more baseball and less aimless mechanical work than has been the case in previous years and according to indications will be the case with other clubs in the circuit again.

Although the players were given good salaries last year, the club is doing even better this year, according to President August Herrmann. Recent increases, especially for the younger players who have made good with the club, it is predicted, will add to the eagerness of the players to do their best during the training season.

GUARANTEE FOR DEMPSEY-WILLS BOUT IS POSTED

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—William A. Brady, theatrical producer and sports promoter, today placed \$50,000 in a bank here as a forfeit to guarantee his good faith in seeking to arrange a match between Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills, negro heavyweight. Brady said that if he could bring Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, to believe in the success of such a bout, he would immediately post an additional \$150,000. Dempsey's share of the purse would be \$150,000 and Wills' \$50,000.

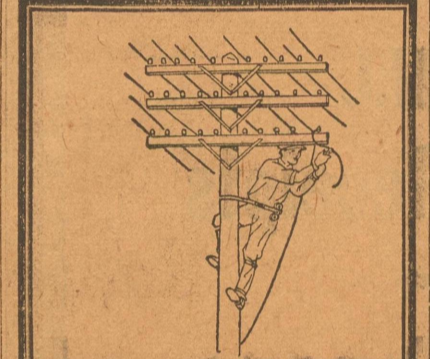
Conditions of the bout would be the same as those under which the Carpenter-Dempsey affair of last summer was held. Kearns said he was considering the offer.

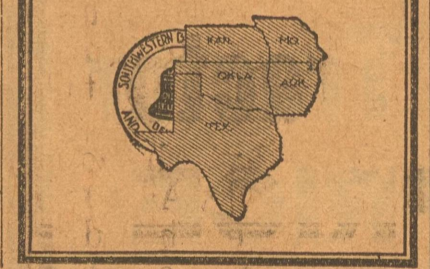

AUTOIST GIVES LIFE SAVINGS TO WIDOW OF MAN HE KILLED

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—His life's savings of \$3,000 are to be the first payment as civil damages to the widow of the man Paul Eckert of Brooklyn, ran down in his automobile and killed. He will turn over to Mrs. John G. Sheridan in installments \$5,000 more as he earns it. Justice Dike was told yesterday in Brooklyn supreme court.

After hearing the story of the settlement, the justice adjourned for a week the sentencing of Eckert, who pleaded guilty to assault in the first degree.

JUDGE ORDERS SPANKING IF GIRL MARRIES AGAIN

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Jan. 28.—"Spank her well if she gets married again without your consent."

This is the instruction given to the father of Mrs. Marie Stevens, who was granted an annulment of her marriage to William C. Stevens of Port Chester, by Supreme Court Judge Seegar.

The court also told the young husband that if he again married a girl under 18 he would find himself in serious trouble. Mrs. Stevens testified she was 15 years old when she was married to her husband, but admitted she had told the minister who performed the ceremony she was 19.

BURGLAR KILLED AS HE VISITED PLATONIC LOVE

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—The platonic love of a burglar for a married woman was discovered as the cause of a slaying at the trial of William Grubb for first-degree murder.

Taking the stand in behalf of her husband, Mrs. Mary Agnes Grubb testified that George Corcoran—whom Grubb is charged with having killed—used to visit her frequently, bringing her presents of silk stockings, gloves and other finery taken in his night prowling.

Then, she testified, Grubb surprised the burglar in their home one night and shot him to death. She admitted Corcoran had sought a warmer affection from her, but declared their relationship had never been more than platonic.

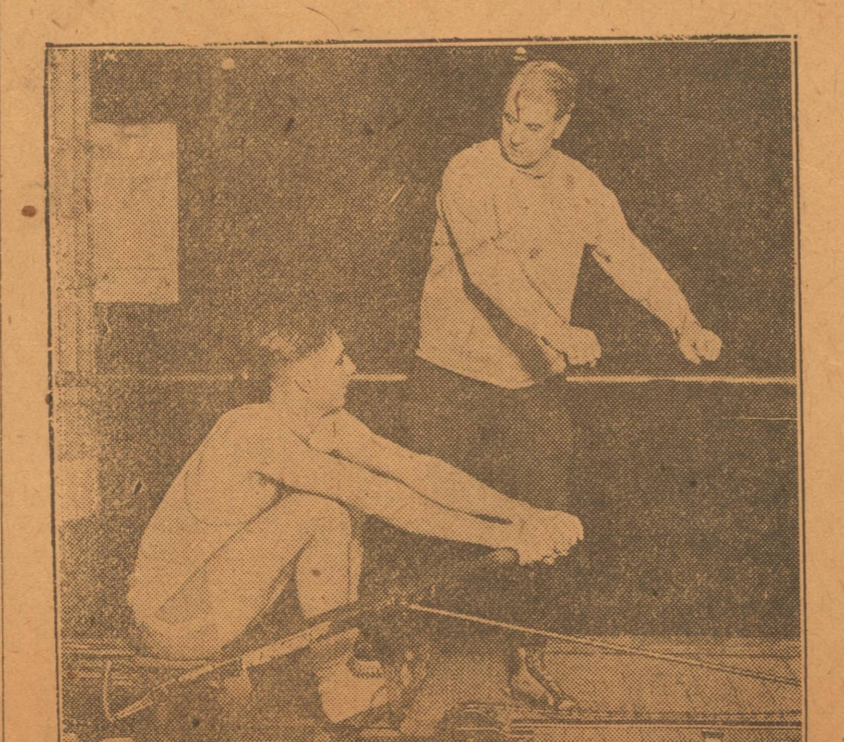

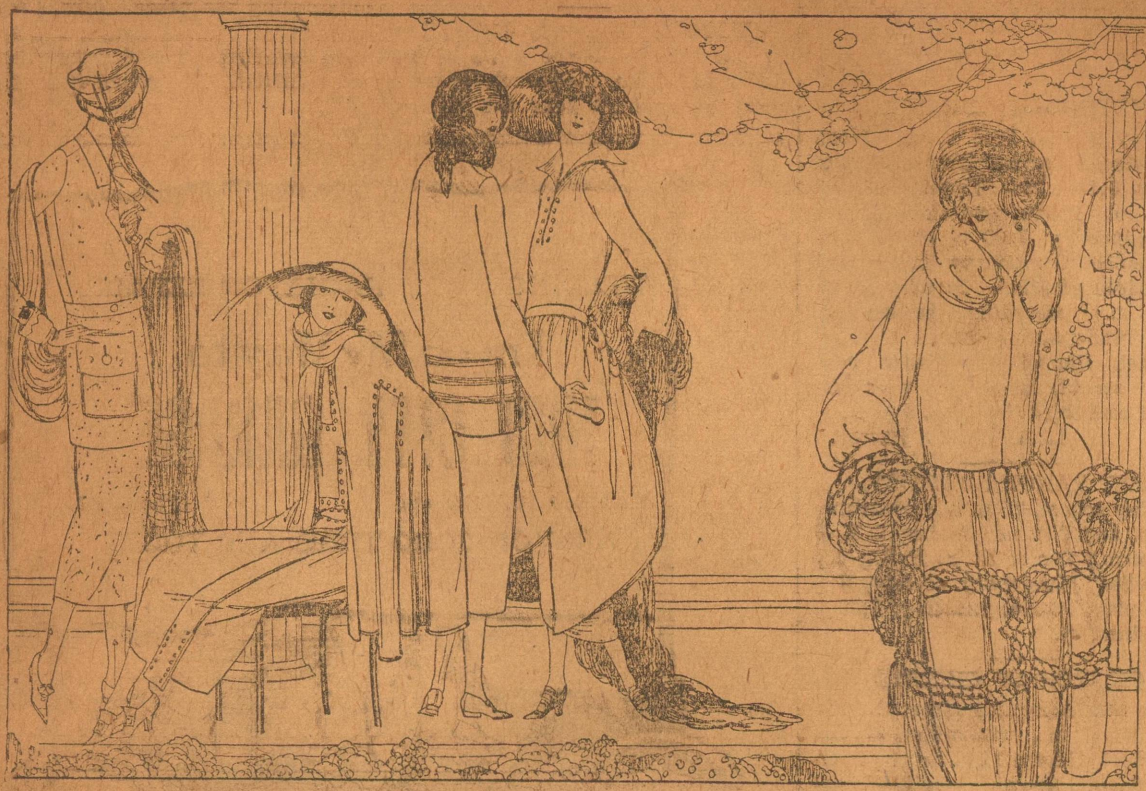
HOW TO HANDLE EUROPE TOLD BY CONGRESSMAN By Associated Press. AKRON, Ohio, Jan. 28.—The only way for Europe to rehabilitate is to organize and capitalize the productive forces of their countries, Representative F. D. Fess of Ohio said here tonight in an address before the Ohio State Bar association. Production must be stimulated and waste in useless standing armies must be cut off, he said. He advised that the United States make this clear if it participates in the Genoa conference. The United States had made an enviable record in its diplomatic negotiations, he said, but added that economically the United States had not been so successful in its foreign relations, principally because of unsettled conditions in Europe. He advised against further extensions of government credit to Europe or cancellation of loans to European countries. He said establishment of an international bank is not practicable, and the suggestion that American capital be invested in European industrial stocks is a matter of individual business. The proposal that American money invested in European securities be exempted from taxation has been rejected because such a plan is inimical to American labor, he said, but added that the finance corporation had been authorized to loan money to business houses of Europe to be invested in agricultural products. According to Dr. Leroy Coffman, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Davenport, Iowa, the Sunday school was established as a result of the influence of a little girl who had attended vacation Bible school at his church. Dr. Coffman states: "The mayor was opposed to its existence but the written permission of all other members of the school board of this city of Walcott in response to general sentiment in its favor, obtained the school building for the Sunday school and it is now an established fact."

Dr. A. Frank Houser, pastor of the Calvary Baptist church of Davenport, recently made an inspection of this village and reports that: "Some weeks ago a Sunday school was started in Walcott, perhaps the

first in all the history of the town now in its sixty-fifth year. There was no decided objection to the Sunday school being started by the young people and children of the village but in case a church was started the mayor threatened to close it.

"We looked into the educational conditions and found that the regular school only this year was advancing to an intermediate grade preparatory to a high school course, which some of the students take in Davenport, twelve miles away. The town is sixty-five years old and has never sent a person to college from its immediate village precincts. Several have taken to academic and normal courses at Cedar and Iowa Falls, but no one entered college. There have been three from the country or farm houses who entered Ames Agricultural college, but I could only learn of one that took the full course."

Dr. Houser also reported that almost the entire community that located here are known to have immigrated to this country from Holstein and the Danish Rhenish borders, about 1848. This village, during the world war was known as "Little Berlin."

HYPNOTIC EYE GETS DOCTOR'S BEAUTY MARRED

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—Harvey Willis was held today on charges of attempting to kill Dr. M. H. Fash, after Mrs. Willis had "confessed" she had broken her marriage vows, naming the physician. She claimed she had been "hypnotized" by Fash. The physician was only slightly wounded by the knife stab wounds inflicted by Willis.

Mrs. Willis, the mother of an 11-month-old baby, told police that Dr. Fash had attended her for more than a year. Gradually, Mrs. Willis declared, she fell under the influence of the physician.

After worrying a great deal, and going through a long mental strain, Mrs. Willis finally confessed to her husband. Willis went to the doctor's office and stabbed him. "I only wanted to disfigure his face, so he would always remember," Willis said. Dr. Fash denied the accusations.
