EASTLAND COUNTY FARMERS COMPLAIN THAT COTTON CROP FORECASTS ARE DECEPTIVE

W. M. Sneed, owner of two cotton farms in Eastland county says the farmers of this vicinity are practically of one mind that the forecasts sent out by the department of agriculture from Washington every fifteen days are entirely too large. In Mr. Sneed's opinion, the ultimate crop this year will fall far below that forecast and he gives it as his observation that this has been true in nearly all instances. Furthermore, he believes (and interviews with some twenty-five farmers throughout the county seem to bear him out in this) the farmers have long since lost faith in these reports entirely.

Asked what they thought of the forecast sent out Monday of this week, estimating the crop at 15,225, 000 bales, several farmers were of one accord in calling it ridiculous, in all instances. Word to express it in all instances. One farmer said:

"It may not be the department's fault. They take what figures are given to them. And these are nearly always padded. Our crops in Eastland county are just like other crops. There have been rains and everybody knows the crop is cut short on account of the boll weevil which die off in hot, dry weather and interviews with some twenty-five farmers have long since lost faith in these reports entirely.






