



It takes know - how, skill and nerve to reveal the magnificent grandeur of sky diving as did two men, at Muleshoe Airport late Thursday afternoon.

Putting on this pagentry in the sky were John Nelson, Fort Walton Beach, Fla. and Richard Cooper, Camon Air Force Base,

Just before sundown, Nelson left the runway with Morgan Lecter piloting a Super Cub for the climb to 8,000 feet, where he was to leave the craft on his 155th jump as a sport skydiver. At an altitutde of 2,500 feet, the huge, colorful chute opened after 30 seconds delay on free fall. Nelson landed within a few feet of his intended spot with a 12-15 mile per hour wind.

The second jump run Richard Cooper was aboard to make his dive. A continual trail of brilliant smoke gave onlookers a distinct pattern of the divers maneuvers and he shot eastward against the wind, this feat accomplished until he was in the position for his descent.

Cooper left the plane at 8,200 feet and fell 6,500 on free fall. 




