DEPORTATION AWAITS MAJORITY OF THOSE WHO ARE CAUGHT IN RAIDS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Radical leaders planned to develop the recent steel and coal strike into a general strike and ultimately institute a revolution to overthrow the government, according to information gathered by federal agents in Friday night's wholesale roundup of members of the communist and communist labor parties.

Late figures showed that a total of 2,635 aliens were held with evidence which federal agents believed was sufficient to warrant deportation. The total number of arrests was estimated at close to 4,500, although this estimate was changed almost hourly.

Officials indicated that both groups of radicals were only awaiting an opportune moment to carry on among other classes the same sort of agitation among field workers and miners. Among the foreign element of the communists and communist labor parties information described as conclusive revealed that payrolls had been "loaded" with agitators to be sent suddenly to every fertile field in support of a general strike campaign.

During the last few weeks of the coal strike communist agitators were discovered to have penetrated practically every mine center east of the Mississippi river. Evidence showed that in several instances where miners had voted to re-join the union, the communists had spread their propaganda of distrust of the government to such an extent that few, if any, miners actually got back to their jobs.

Attempting to incite the mine workers to violence were the most bold in West Virginia. Officials said serious trouble was being narrowly averted there, but all soft coal regions were affected and much of the data leading up to Friday's nation-wide raids was gathered by secret agents circulating among the mine workers and coming into contact with the agitators themselves, it was said.

The raids also disclosed that a "hash" fund has been created by the two radical parties. Much of this money had been set aside for use in bailing out adherents of the doctrine in case of arrest for sedition and the teaching of violence.

Plans for organization of the workers in support of the communists were pictured as more complete than ever a political campaign. It was evidenced, officials declared, that the movement was "tips" and that settlement of the coal strike was a keen disappointment to the radical leaders.

Assistant General Attorney Garvin made public tonight the department's memorandum submitted to the bureau of investigation upon which was based the government's classification of the communist and communist labor parties as coming under the espionage act. This disclosed that both groups were pledged to fight any suggestion of military action by America against the soviet Russia.

Deportation hearings in the cases of the radicals arrested in last night's raids will begin as soon as possible. Anthony Caminetti, commissioner general of immigration stated tonight.

#### \$100 BILLS COME OUT OF BOX LIKE MAGIC

NEW YORK.—A wooden box, a foot high and several feet long, with revolving metal plates on the top and bottom, which by electric manipulation seemingly changed pieces of paper into brand new \$100 bills with speed and skill, was the cause of the arrest of Henry Klein on the charge of having a fake money-making machine in his possession. The police believe, they said, that men have been operating among foreigners out of town and selling the machine to any buyer who had \$300 and was ignorant of the law. At the police station the machine, when set in motion, with great noise and buzzing, exchanged three pieces of paper, marked with red and blue ink marks to represent the threads of federal bank notes for three new \$100 bills. About a year ago, according to the police, a man named Loper, from Pittsburg, together with a band of swindlers, operated in this city and other places selling a similar machine.

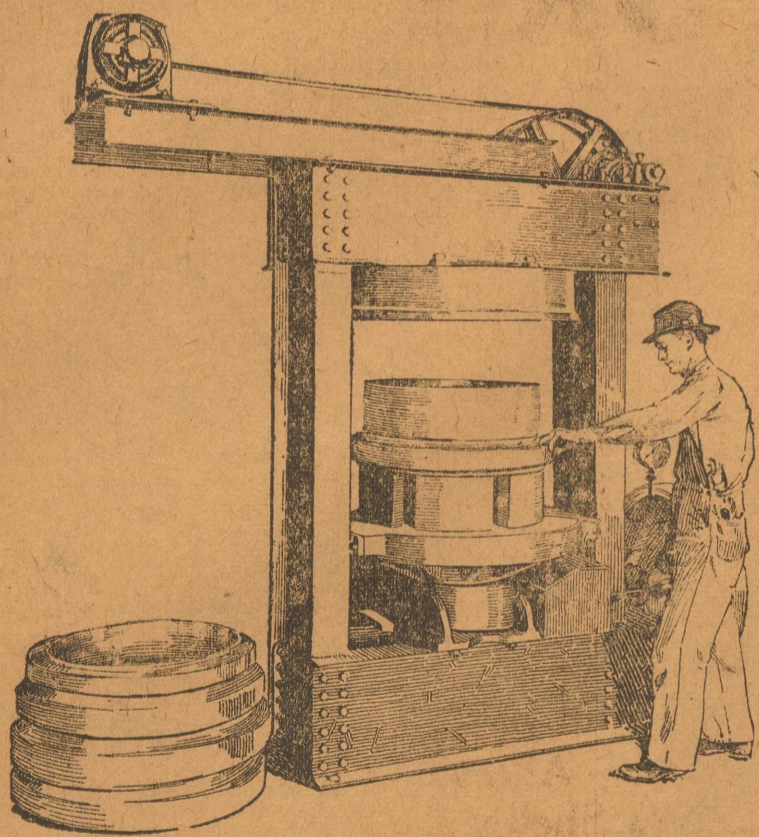

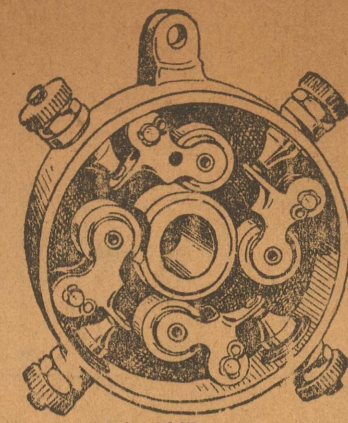

## ROMANCE ENDS BECAUSE TOWN LACKING IN MATTER OF JAZZ

LINCOLN, Neb.—The romance of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Phelps of Peru was shattered because there was not enough "jazz" in the community life of the college town to satisfy the girl, according to testimony submitted in court when the young husband got a divorce on the ground of desertion. He was a member of the American expeditionary forces and was wounded in France.

Although the girl was born in Peru and lived there the greater part of her life, the lack of the bright lights and the gaiety of the "white way" of the big cities appealed to her far more than the monotony of the normal school town. It was shown that she longed for the life with a "kick" in it and her heart ached for an opportunity to indulge in sophisticated pleasures.

**Ardent Movie Fan.**  
Evelyn May Phelps was married seven years ago to Donald Phelps and she was satisfied with life with him until the coming of the movie show. When the silent drama invaded the town she became a devoted fan. She reveled in the pictures that depicted life as it existed in the Bohemian resorts of the "wicked" cities, and especially those dramas which had the jazz in them.

Two years ago she disappeared from her home in Peru with the intention of going on the stage. She joined a carnival company and scandalized her relatives and friends by appearing in a town near her old home in an attraction in which she enacted the part of a spider woman and submitted her pretty face, with a spider's body attached, to the public at 10 cents a view.

**Husband Sent to France.**  
Meantime her young husband had been summoned to the colors. He was sent overseas and was wounded. He wrote to his wife from a hospital in France telling her that he loved her and asking her to take up the tangled threads of their domestic life and piece them together so they could establish a home again when he got his discharge.

What she wrote to him filled him with despair. She told him that she could never bear the humdrum life of a small town any more. She had tasted the sweets of Bohemian life in the big cities and it was dearer to her than life at home and she would never be content to return to the old life again. The last heard of her she had joined a Cincinnati theatrical company. The young soldier-husband has not ceased to mourn for his lost companion.

Phelps, speaking tenderly of her on the witness stand. "She was a good cook, and a fine, neat housekeeper. She was alright until her head was turned by the movies and then life in Peru proved stale for her. I loved her and I love her yet."

### Eastland News

EASTLAND, Jan. 3.—Deputy Sheriff G. L. Russell recently appointed deputy at Olden by Sheriff H. E. Lawrence, celebrated New Year's day by raiding a still and capturing the alleged maker and about four gallons of evidence.

The still was found in a house about a mile from the town of Olden, and consisted of a large tin can surmounted by a copper coil made from parts of an automobile.

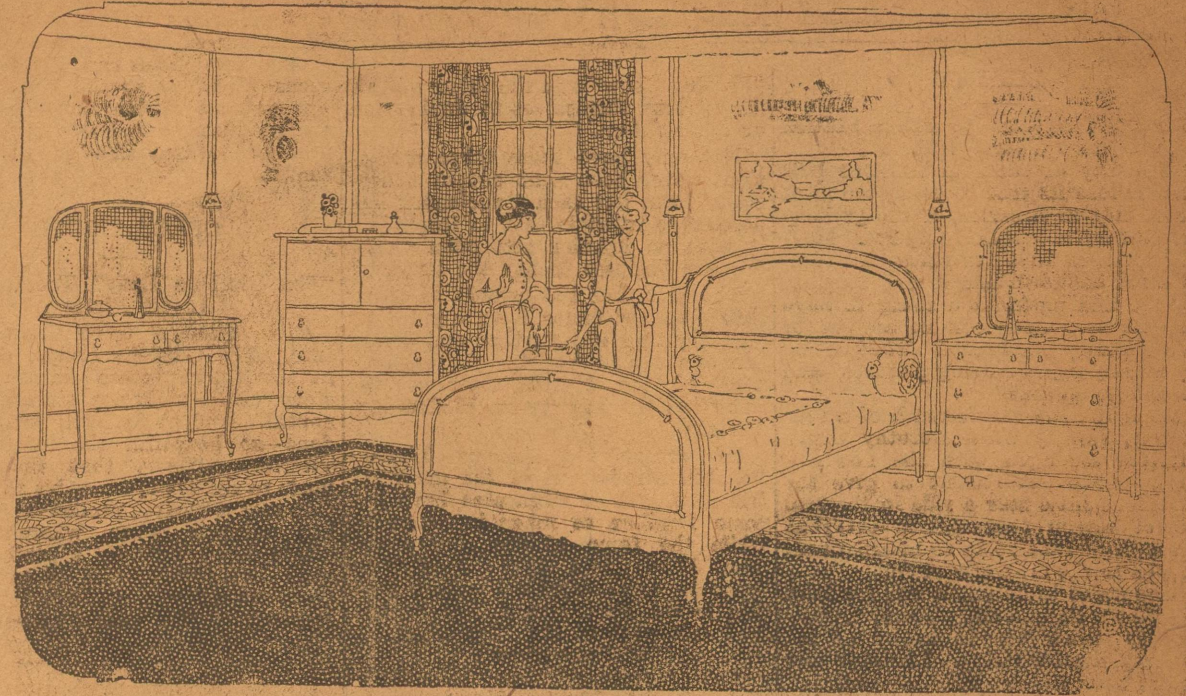

# DECLARES THAT DENIKINE IS TRUE PATRIOT

By Associated Press  
LA CROSSE, Wis.—Capt. Reinhold Schultz, who recently returned to his home here after an interesting experience in the American expeditionary force, was in charge of the first relief ship sent to Russia by Herbert Hoover, and said to have been the first vessel that sailed the Black Sea for five years. Captain Schultz has been "loaned" to Mr. Hoover by the army.

It was on this trip that he came in personal touch with General Denikine, whom he met at Rostov, Russia, then the headquarters of the leader of the anti-bolsheviki forces. The visit was in the nature of a mission from the United States army for the purpose of impressing the nature of the relief mission on the Russians.

"Denikine," said Captain Schultz, "is the most patriotic Russian I met. He is a man of great personal magnetism, and the officers and men I saw appeared to adore him. His army, which is well equipped and disciplined, is entirely a volunteer force and the men are good fighters. 'The Russians admire the Americans. Their ideal, so far as I could learn from General Denikine and his officers, is to set up a United States of Russia,' Captain Schultz said.

The captain saw only one incident of bolshevik tactics, although he was informed they were common, he said. "While I was at Denikine's headquarters a patrol brought in the body of a peasant who had been killed by the bolsheviki a few kilometers from the army's front," he said. "The man evidently had died in horrible agony. The skin about his wrists had been circled with a sharp knife and pulled down over the fingers like a glove. Then the finger tips had been fastened together with wooden pegs. That isn't hearsay. I saw the body three hours after the man had died."

The captain for a time was the assistant chief of the legal department of the army, with headquarters at Treves in the American section of occupied Germany. He has had a fluent and colloquial knowledge of German, and has had fifteen years of service in the Wisconsin national guard.

# ESKIMOS GO CRAZY ON JAZZ MUSIC; GIVE FORTUNES FOR PHONOGRAPHS

Denver Post: The Eskimos have gone crazy over jazz music.

From the day that the "white man" from the "great heaven" came in his big boats with a load of phonographs things haven't been the same with the yellow man.

Unusually shrewd in driving a bargain, he lost his business acumen at the first shrill note of the canned music boxes, and from that time on was willing to heap silver fox furs, and valuable sable upon the white fur trader until he comes through with a music box.

Give an Eskimo a music box and a half dozen records and he will sit down and play the "infernal machine" until the records are threadbare and the springs of the machine are stretched beyond any degree of resiliency.

Alaskan Explorers tell of Eskimos. This is the story brought to Denver by C. C. Gaisford, Alaskan explorer, who spent two years in Alaska.

Mr. Gaisford first went to Alaska when the steamship "Portland" limped into port with its cargo of gold dust, and its hardy miners who told stirring tales of a great strike in the Klondike.

"I was one of the crowd that stampeded to Alaska in 1897," said Mr. Gaisford. "Such a company of soldiers of fortune has never invaded a country. In that notable group was Robert W. Service, the "Kipling of the Yukon."

After some years spent in prospecting and mining, Mr. Gaisford turned to the task of filming the great Alaskan unknown.

Mr. Gaisford was on board a trading vessel captained by a man named Bodfish, who first introduced the phonograph to the Eskimos. The captain had on board two or three dozen small, old-style phonographs with tin horns.

Chief is impressed with the "Jazz Box."

When first he played a record for the Eskimos they looked about in bewilderment and searched every nook and cranny of the horn, looking, as they said in their broken English, "for the white man."

The chief of the tribe was greatly impressed by the wonderful "jazz box" and sent messengers back to his fur storehouse, at the same time indicating to Bodfish that he was prepared to make a trade.

The chief asked Bodfish how much the music box was worth. Bodfish shook his head to indicate that no sale would be possible. The chief then began to heap fox furs upon the surprised trader until \$12,000 worth of pelts lay at his feet.

"It was a temptation for any man," said Mr. Gaisford, "but Bodfish was square as a die and made the trade for one pelts worth about \$600."

Eskimo Intelligent and is Loyal Friend With phonographs selling for \$600 apiece for the fifteen-by-fifteen-inch with a tin-horn variety, it would seem that the cost of living was high in Alaska. In comparison with the wages received, this is not the case, says Mr. Gaisford. A good meal costs \$5 in any of the towns in the interior, but wages are compensatory.

The Eskimo is an intelligent and loyal friend and servant, says Mr. Gaisford.

One character known to nearly all

white men in the fur trading stations is Happy Jack, a young Eskimo who earned his sobriquet when after spending four days floating around without food on a cake of ice he "came up smiling" when found by white traders.

Happy Jack lost his toes as a result of that little cruise, and thus the land of the midnight sun lost its most trustworthy guide.

A favorite pastime of the natives, Mr. Gaisford relates, is the matching of bear cubs in prize fights. First the cubs are given a few steins of beer to get them properly "lit up." In this mood they take on very belligerent attitudes and fight one another with great gusto.

Mr. Gaisford spent many months in Alaska making pictures. While there he encountered three other picture making expeditions in various stages of bad repair, and also assisted the Stephanton expedition.

CHORUS GIRLS CAN TAKE CARE OF THEMSELVES, SAYS PASTOR

International News Service. LONDON.—The Rev. Stewart Headlam thinks that chorus girls can look after themselves and does not take much stock in tales that touring companies are really disguised traveling harems.

"As a rule these dear girls can look after themselves," said the minister, who is well known in the theatrical district. "I have known them for years and years and years. Generations of them I have known. There are some wrong ones among them, the same as in other professions, and there are some silly ones, but the majority can manage their moral affairs thoroughly well."

But despite his views expressed before the London county council, the council recommended that proprietors and managers of touring companies should be licensed the same as theatrical employment agents.

# HAVE REPUBLIC IN BRITISH SCHOOL

International News Service.

TIPTREE.—I have just spent a sunny day with a band of happy school children amid the fruit trees and beautiful meadows near Kelvelon.

They live at Tiptree hall, and are absolutely free to rule themselves, conduct their own education, learn respect for community interests— which has produced in them a delightful natural courtesy—and mete out their own punishments.

The self-controlled and self-educated little community is drawn from the poorest class. They are mostly war orphans, and many have come from evil surroundings. I was told a story which illustrates their growth.

Their language savored of "Billingsgate" when they came to Tiptree hall, but not long afterward they inaugurated "burial services" for words they had noticed were not used by Mr. Norman MacMunn, the chief adviser, or Miss Scanlan, the "house mother."

The last words to be buried—to a professional chant written in secret by the children—were "our" and "your". It is a sad fact that "our" rose from his flower-decked grave a

few days later, but he was successfully buried again.

The children teach themselves history by means of a sort of wooden ladder, on the rungs of which hang cards bearing such inscriptions as "Wars of the Roses," with the date on the back. On the rung the number of the century is printed. The game is for one little boy to turn his back on the ladder while another picks a card at random and reads the inscription. In a second or two comes the answer, giving the date.

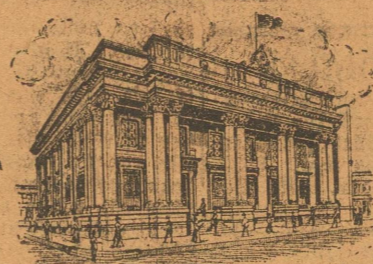
I was invited to lunch and the children saw that I was comfortable. A tiny child stood up and said "grace." I learned that they conduct their own morning and evening prayers.

With garlands of leaves in their hair they afterwards danced the "Spring Song" and Chopin's Furra March, and their sense of rhythm, meaning and sensibility was astonishing. The only lesson in dancin' they have ever received was "do what the music tells you." They danced "God Save the King," and the stiffness and dullness of our National Anthem was almost ludicrously illustrated.

Lord Glenconner is the chairman of the committee of educationists in charge of Tiptree hall. Mr. Norman MacMunn is the head of the school. Funds, I believe, are urgently needed if this experiment in education is not to be abandoned.

HERE'S MALADY MORE DEADLY THAN THE 'FLU

OTTAWA, Kan. - "I am not afraid of war, not afraid of typhus, not afraid of Asiatic cholera, but I am afraid of the new monster - pneumonia plague. I must stay and fight it out, however," writes Dr. George W. Davis, an Ottawa physician, the only Anglo-Saxon physician in Manchuria or Mongolia, just after he had, with the aid of a few native doctors, finished the fight with the great Harbin cholera plague of August and September, in which nearly 5,000 persons lost their lives.

Typhus on 6th Sides. "Dangers are not all behind us," he says. "Typhus they have on both sides of me in Siberia. The louse is ever present in Asia. No one knows when his bite may plant the deadly germs of typhus exanthematodes. One louse bite is sufficient and the disease is terrible. Already we have buried three of the party that came with me. Out yonder on a mountain side, 4,000 miles from home, they lie. "I am inclosing a picture of the death of my fellow-worker - two pictures, one made at 3 a. m., while he was out with me, and the other at noon, where he sits before me, dead from Asiatic cholera. The Asiatic cholera epidemic in Manchuria was terrible. It gives no warning and is no respecter of persons. A man's wife was eating raw shrimp for breakfast and at sundown we laid her to rest with the Mandarin dead. The coolie carried distilled water from my locomotive still to the hospital all night and died before he could eat his breakfast. One of our Chinese physicians gave more than 500 treatments without sleeping, then laid down in his last long sleep in the same hour that his last patient was treated. Enters Through Mouth. "The bacteria of Asiatic cholera is a terrible killer. He is easily killed, but a gentleman withal - he enters only through the front door, the mouth. Keep him out of the food and drink and you may walk unscathed through the lazarettes of the dying and among the festering dead with impunity. I did it. The native doctors - most of them - did it and followed us through. What Angered Him. "Yes, I was fined \$200 for putting coloring matter in artificial butter. "Well, did you deserve it?" "Perhaps. THEY CALL THE SULTAN "NICE OLD MAN" NOW

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 3 - People of Constantinople call the sultan, Mehmed VI., "a nice, harmless old man." Mehmed VI is the last enemy emperor left, the man whose temporal possessions are at stake in the making of peace.

The Padishah, or "Father of All the Sovereigns of the Earth," is short, grey-haired, rather stoop-shouldered, dark-eyed, with short, white moustache set under the characteristic beaked nose of the Turk. Bereft of good counselors, worried by the actions of Moustapha Kemal Pasha, leader of the nationalists, Mehmed is in a quandary as to how to save his people and his throne. At that he doesn't worry too much, thanks to the pervading oriental spirit of fatalism.

Every Friday, the Turkish Sunday a crowd of Mussulman pilgrims and foreigners gathers to see him go to prayer. The ceremony takes place outside the palace gates of Yildiz on the hills of Pera just above the Bosphorus. There are the sultan's official offices and also his harem in a flower garden part of an immense park.

The sultan, wearing a fez, comes into view riding slowly in an open phaeton, preceded by a single horseman and followed on foot by a dozen or more of his red-fezzed suite dressed in black frock coats and trousers in the European style.

The sultan bows right and left, in response to the acclamations, looks towards the terrace where are ranged the foreigners, and bows pleasantly to them. The distance to the mosque is passed, then at the door of the mosque he steps out; from the interior is heard a chant of a male chorus, and he disappears. Directly the general Mussulman public is permitted to enter at another door of the mosque to take place in the prayers which continue for a half hour. Meanwhile the foreign visitors disperse; their curiosity in the successor of the prophet satisfied.

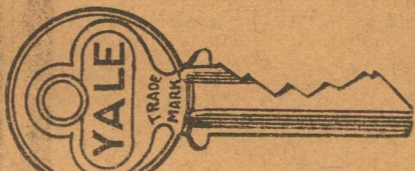

# NEW ROUTE FOR THE WORLD AIR DERBY IN 1920

By Associated Press  
SAN FRANCISCO.—Flyers in the proposed 1920 world-girdling air derby will not travel by Mercator's projection, but by a new "butterfly" map devised by B. J. S. Cahill, of Oakland, Cal., which has just been adopted by Maj. Charles J. Glidden, executive secretary of the aerial derby commission, now on his way to the Far East and who gave the map his approval before leaving here.

Mr. Cahill, who is the originator of San Francisco's \$12,000,000 "civic center" plan, said that an aviator using the Mercator projection as a guide, would go 1,000 miles out of his way in a trip from Panama to Yokohama. "If the north pole were on an island a mile wide," he said, "it would appear on Mercator's projection to be 25,000 miles wide, or nearly the total circumference of the earth at the equator."

The inventor of the new map, who worked on his drawings fifteen years, said that "an impartial and rational world geography is essential to world peace." He said that Mercator's projection, which was originally devised by the Belgian cartographer as a guide for navigators, "distorted and exaggerated the earth as it receded from the equator." This, for instance, made it appear as if South America were much smaller than North America when, as a matter of fact, he said, they were about the same area.

The Cahill map is as though an actual sphere had been cut and flattened, its appearance somewhat resembling the outspread wings of a butterfly.

A nation looking unduly expanded on the map may easily, Mr. Cahill says, develop a sort of geographical "big headedness," inducing an overbearing diplomacy. A nation whose territory is so unduly exaggerated on the maps in common use may well come to exaggerate its resources, its economic strength and even its virtues and so create an atmosphere anything but conducive to mutual good will and consequent world peace.

All problems of intercommunication by sea, land or air are baffling and misleading on Mercator's chart, says Mr. Cahill, but simple and obvious on the "butterfly" map, a further aid to mutual knowledge and understanding.

"Internationalism, now a sporadic and occasional thing, but destined in the future to be the keynote of all human endeavor, plays an important part in the science of statistics and meteorology," said Mr. Cahill. "Graphical statistics are self-contradictory and ludicrous on Mercator's chart and as for indicating the prog-

ress of high and low pressure rings in weather charts, the ever-changing scale on Mercator's was simply bewildering to the forecaster who had to use them. The new map, by showing all lands in their true proportion and form, he declares, would be a material aid in solving peacefully problems dealing with the world as a whole.

# BOXING GAINS IN FAVOR AS A COLLEGE SPORT

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Boxing as an intercollegiate sport is rapidly gaining supporters at a number of colleges and universities in all parts of the country and championship tournaments under revised ring rules are not at all unlikely within the next few years.

Inter-varsity bouts between picked boxing teams representing Oxford and Cambridge have been part of the annual English sport schedule for many years and similar contests are not entirely unknown in the United States.

It is expected that such meetings will become more frequent as the boom in boxing gathers strength. Then tendency in this direction is shown by a number of recent reports of boxing activity among the collegians. Word comes from Peoria, Ill., that the "little conference" has included boxing in its list of major sports and that a championship tournament would be held next spring.

In the East the University of Pennsylvania has long been an ardent advocate of boxing for the college athlete and has several times suggested the formation of an intercollegiate boxing league. At the present time both Pennsylvania and Penn State college have the largest squads of boxers trying for the teams in the history of the sport. Both squads are under the instruction of competent coaches and there will be a dual tournament early in the spring between the two institutions, as was the case in 1919. Dartmouth and other colleges in the East have engaged boxing coaches and plan intramural tournaments with the possibility of broader activities within a year or two.

# HUDSON BAY CO. HAS STORES IN WEST CANADA

WINNIPEG, Man.—The Hudson's Bay company has altered its policies with the rapid advance of civilization that has curtailed the production of furs in its territory and has become one of the great merchandizing corporations of Canada. With two centuries and a half of history behind it, the company just now is closing out to settlers the land that represents the last vestige of its former empire.

A chain of department stores extending across western Canada has been established. The company now has stores in Winnipeg, Calgary, Vancouver, Edmonton, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Kamloops, Nelson, Vernon, Victoria, Qu'Appelle and Yorkton. Those in Calgary and Vancouver are comparable to the great department stores of the United States. The company is now planning to build in Winnipeg the largest department store in the domain.

The company is still one of the world's greatest fur traders. It has 142 fur posts and still sends to England annually millions of dollars' worth of raw furs. But with the wonderful growth of its business as a

general merchant, it no longer has need of land.

Under its charter granted by King Charles II in 1670, the Hudson's Bay company became virtually sole owner and ruler of three-fourths of North America. Its territories extended from the Great Lakes to the Pacific and from the Arctic ocean far south across the present American boundary line to the Spanish settlements in California.

When it surrendered its authority over this vast region to Canada it received as an indemnity \$1,500,000 and retained one-twentieth of all the land in the fertile belt between Lake Winnipeg, Lake of the Woods, the waters connecting them and the Rocky mountains and between the North Saskatchewan river and the international boundary.

The land amounted to 3,200,000 acres at the end of October and has been untouched by the plow in the midst of the richest sections of western Canada. Farmers of districts that hem it in have long cast covetous eyes upon it. In a few years it is expected it will be dotted with the farms of settlers, and grain fields will wave over the last remnants of the Hudson's Bay company's ancient empire.

# GREAT GOLD STRIKE REPORTED IN AUSTRALIA

LONDON.—News was received here of the discovery of a sixty-mile ridge of gold near Kalgoorlie in western Australia. It is the longest gold-bearing formation ever found in history.

The new Klondike already is attracting prospectors from all parts of the world.

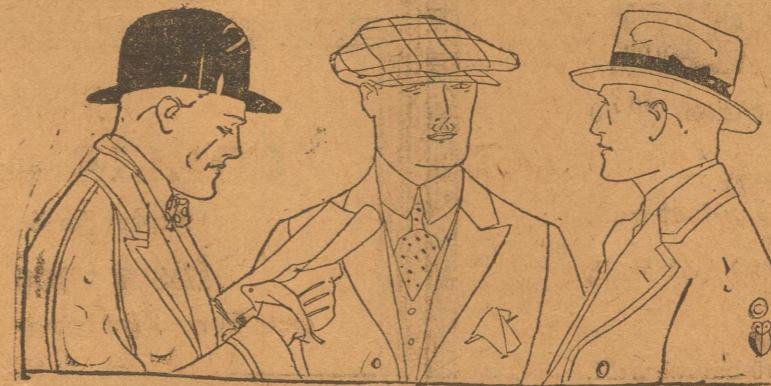

### THE NEW C. OF C.

A chamber of commerce, or an commercial club, either is a decided asset, a vital force in civic development, or a nonentity. Either it has the aggressive support of every man who is working for the betterment of his city or it has little or none and becomes hardly more than an information bureau, with an incomplete stock of information.

Ranger has need of the chamber of the aggressive sort. More than any city whose growth is normal, whose problems are ordinary, it must have an organization full of life. Questions that are beyond the reach of city administration, or any civic worker, or small group of civic workers, must be solved.

In its reorganization, the Ranger Chamber of Commerce is seeking just the vitality it needs. It is going after the men whose characteristics are action, progress, and the ability to create successful co-operation.

Every man considered for the new board meets the requirements. He will be asked to consider a place on the board not as an honor, though such it will be, but as a task—and a hard one.

Given these men, who believe in their city and are willing to work for it, and no question of civic betterment and growth will be too difficult.

### MAN'S INHUMANITY TO MAN

The action of the sheriff of Cook county, Illinois, in forcing prisoners under his care to witness the hanging of one of their number the other day, undoubtedly will meet with disfavor in the eyes of right-thinking people of the nation. The Times sees no benefit, no advantage that could possibly accrue to the other prisoners through seeing one of their fellow beings put to death.

And the "moral effect," the lame excuse advanced by the sheriff for taking the other prisoners into the

death chamber, is feeble enough in itself. The Times does not believe that that is the way to put the fear of law and justice into the hearts of men, whether they be imprisoned or free to enjoy the benefits of life. There is a more uplifting manner in which men can be made to realize that the law is law and must be obeyed. Whatever else may be said to the contrary, it is the fear of the Eternal Creator after all that inspires men to uphold the laws of the land. Rather would it have been more in keeping with the principles upon which the nation is founded to have restored to some means other than the one used.

Undoubtedly a wave of resentment will sweep the country over the action. We are forced to express admiration for the spirit in which the prisoners took the whole affair; they were unconcerned and took the matter as one coming just in the ordinary run of their prison life. True to American form, what they want most of all was their breakfast, and they took as an insult the postponing of their morning meal much more than the fact that they were forced to see one, whom they knew, enter the prison from whence no traveler returneth.

## URGE "CARRY ON" CLUBS OF WAR VETERANS

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Disabled war veterans in Boston, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Baltimore, Milwaukee, Detroit, Columbus, Ohio; San Francisco, Denver, New Orleans and Minneapolis, handicapped for life and unable to more than barely live on the government allowance of \$80 a month during their vocational training, have written to the headquarters of the Carry-on association here requesting the establishment of "Carry-on clubs" in the cities named.

According to the projectors of the association which provides the wounded soldier with a good home, nourishing food, laundry, dental and medical care, transportation and an allowance for clothes, all for \$10 a week, a dependent ex-fighter is thus left with money enough to keep up his war-risk insurance and have some amusement beside. Since last April, when the first experimental club was opened in New York at 1447 Eighth street and Madison avenue, accumulating forty men and ten extra for meals, its work is said to have shown great possibilities. The organization opened another New York club on Christmas day and the week previously one with a capacity for 150 men was opened in Washington.

The enterprise is said to have the approval of the American Legion, which is reported raising \$50,000 in New Orleans for a "Carry-on club" here. Denver, with 3,000 arrested tuberculosis cases, is also reported to be preparing for a club drive. Altogether there are between 230,000 and 260,000 disabled ex-service men in the United States.

The "boys" in the Carry-on clubs do much of the housework and enforce their own regulations. A big sunny living room filled with ex-soldiers playing, reading and chatting or singing to the accompaniment of a phonograph or piano is the chief feature of the institution. One young ex-fighter said he gained thirty-one pounds in thirty days as a result of

the good food and care he had received. The first club was formed, it was said, because it was shown by carefully compiled statistics that while an invalid young man might be able to live on \$80 a month in many parts of the country it was impossible to do so in a large city.

## Lady Astor Has Good Time as Commons Member

By Associated Press. LONDON, Jan. 3.—"Lady Astor is hugely enjoying the attentions she is receiving in the house of commons," says the Star. "Her vivacity is infectious. Veteran members of parliament are always smiling at her. They enter and leave the house with a new elasticity. There is a scramble to sit near her. The labor leaders seem to look up at her, and are fed with a smile that illumines the whole chamber."

"She wants to chat with everybody and when, the other night, the deputy speaker had called 'order, order' because she was talking to a member on the floor of the house, Lady Astor at once skipped across the bar, and airily waved her hand at the chair as if to say, 'all right, old man; never mind, I daresay I'll do it again before long.'"

## START HUNT IN SOUTH DAKOTA FOR LOST GOLD

SIoux FALLS, S. D.—Hunting for supposed buried treasure in a city park is the novelty presented at Pierre, in the Missouri river section of South Dakota.

Last summer a man appeared before U. S. city commission and said he had located buried treasure in the city park, and made an offer of 25 per cent of the amount recovered for permission to dig for the treasure, which he said was \$1,000,000 or more.

His story was to the effect that the treasure was that obtained by a party of men who worked the placer mines of Montana before that territory was opened to white men; that they got so far down the Missouri river as the site of Pierre, and that on Christmas day the party were attacked and killed by Sioux Indians and their boat burned.

He asserted he knew that the hull of the boat containing the gold was sunk and that the accretion of years had covered it.

Later other men appeared in Pierre and made the same proposition to the city. Permission was granted and they began drilling into the earth at the point where they said the hull of the boat, after being burned to the waters' edge, was sunk.

While these men are boring holes in the city park, other men are searching on a large sandbar near the middle of the Missouri river opposite Pierre, some distance from the present shore line, their theory being that the shore extended much farther out when the boat was sunk and that the location of the treasure is near where they are digging and boring.

Old settlers along the river doubt whether the report is based on a good foundation, as the time mentioned was long before settlement had advanced much above St. Louis, Mo., and there is not historical record of such an expedition.

It is said that the man in charge of the crew found the location of a sunken barge in the Missouri river at Omaha which contained a cargo of quicksilver and brought it to the surface. He is said to be satisfied with the progress in the search at Pierre. He is provided with a unique instrument, by means of which he asserts he can find buried gold and other valuable minerals, as well as oil and coal.

**WOMEN PROMOTERS MAKE APPEARANCE IN OIL FIELDS**

McKEESPORT, Pa.—Among other things the gas boom here has produced is the woman promoter and the woman producer.

Two promoters are the Misses Isabelle Milome and Irene Atwater. A city councilman offered the girls a lease he owned if they would promote it and not sell it and give him a one-eighth royalty. They took him up, and six hours later had contracted for a derrick and the drilling. Then they hustled and soon had sold the \$25,000 worth of stock to carry on the work.

Miss Anna B. Smith is the producer. The well sunk on her land is flowing at the rate of about 12,000,000 cubic feet daily, and Miss Smith's income from the royalty is estimated at more than \$5,000 a month. Miss Smith is still employed as a stenographer.

## MAN AND WIFE PLAN CRUISE ROUND WORLD

MEMPHIS, Tenn.—A strange voyage around the world is soon to begin.

Captain Edw. L. Miles, owner and builder of the schooner *Mystery*, which he is now completing, plans to take his youthful bride on a honeymoon cruise that will last seven years. The start is to be made within thirty days and practically every important seaport in the world is to be visited.

Although the *Mystery* was launched only a few days, she has experienced more ill fortune than most vessels that have plowed the deep for years. The veteran skipper, who has gained quite a reputation locally for his eccentricity, has suffered one blow of hard luck after another.

He constructed the vessel unaided on a vacant lot more than a mile from the river. It is 40 feet long, has a 15-foot beam, a draught of 7 1/2 feet and weighs, he says, 45,000 pounds.

Captain Miles loaded the schooner on a hoiler wagon and started for the river. The horses stalled midway across a busy street and blocked traffic for an hour.

Constable Attaches Vessel.  
A few blocks further on, a constable attached the ship on a suit for \$25,000 alimony, filed by his former wife, Mrs. Helen Byrne. There it remained for two weeks while the matter was settled in court.

As the wagon started down a steep hill leading to the river, a cable broke and the schooner fell off. It skidded thirty feet over the cobbles stones and buried its stern in an embankment.

The vessel was placed on skids and again started toward the river. Twenty yards further on, while crossing the Illinois Central tracks, the skids broke and the *Mystery* settled gracefully across the rails, blocking trains for a half day.

Only the wharf now lay between Captain Miles and the river. He got the boat to the water's edge and was just preparing to launch it when it stuck fast on a mud bar. There it remained for three days until the river rose.

**OPPOSE FEEDING OF STALE BREAD TO HOGS**

SAN FRANCISCO.—Combating the B. C. I. on the nation's most essential food, bread, the board of supervisors here are preparing today to pass a law forbidding bakeries from shipping stale bread to stockmen, chiefly for feeding to hogs.

**DIVORCE RATE IN WISCONSIN IS INCREASING**

MADISON, Wis.—What is behind the steadily increasing number of marriages that end in the Wisconsin divorce courts?

Figures just compiled by the state bureau of vital statistics reveal the divorce rate has more than doubled since 1910, and according to appearance is continuing its ascent.

The state bureau proposes to start an investigation to try to determine why so many marriages fail.

When the bureau of vital statistics got out its biennial report in 1915 it said:

"It would appear that divorces are steadily increasing, although the records for Wisconsin have not been compiled for a sufficient period to warrant us in making any general deductions."

Since then the bureau has added

some what to its data and records for 1916, 1917, 1918 have turned the calculations of the bureau topsy turvy.

**Records Broken in 1918.**  
Last year broke all records for divorces, with an unprecedented average of 133 divorces for every 1,000 marriages. This follows after 1916 and 1917 had shown an enormous increase in the divorce rate.

A comparison of statistics for the last ten years shows a rate of 82.5 for 1909, 64.1 for 1910, 68.5 for 1911, 80.2 for 1912, 66 for 1913, 92.5 for 1914, 95.5 for 1915, 95.8 for 1916, 87.4 for 1917, and 133 for 1918.

The sudden increase last year is due, no doubt, to the fact that the number of marriages was very much less. Many young men were in France, while the older people remained at home and continued to get divorces. The low rate for the year before may also be explained by the fact that an unprecedented number of marriages were recorded in 1917, many of them of men about to enter the army.
