#### PREVENT A RAIL TIEUP. Chicago Tribune:

Railroad labor is going to be a issue. Financial regeneration of th roads is going to be another issue One or both may cause a suspension of traffic. Suspension of traffic means a suspension of food.

We have had a good deal of experience in settling after the strike. Tha experience should teach us to settl. before the strike. Most strikes come upon us in uniform fashion. Firs: come threatenings. No one seems to bother. Then come indifferent negotiations. They fall through. The public stands helpless. The employers close up. The strikers walk out When suffering becomes acute there is a great zeal for compromise and adjustment.

Sack methods are wasteful. In the nd the public pays. Employers fina it convenient, now and then, to be patient and wait for public sentiment. Public sentiment ought to begin practicing forehandedness. Public sentiment ought not to wait until the coal bins are empty and the pantry shelves peration, wastefulness and enormous bare. It ought to be constantly active, osses through strikes. Inasmuch as demanding that coal bins be kept full t must pay, the public insists upon a

wait for famine? Financial regeneration and the labor question are interdependent in a l'abilitated lines. large degree. If the roads are competently operated and if they give evidences of healthy progress they may borrow all they need. But to be efficiently operated they must have diligent workers. Diligence can best be promoted by good wages, health in surance, old age 'pensions, and othe incentives to competitive energy.

If the workers lack incentive strikes will occur. A tieup of the railroads affects the whole prosperity of the nation. But it affects most the integrity of the roads themselves. Credit is not likely to be forthcoming for roads that are run down and inefficiently manned.

Strikes must be abolished. This cannot be done by governmental mandate. It must be done by making railroad service highly desirable. The right to strike may be abolished only by removing the desire to strike.

The time to consider these things is before we find the country strangled by its clogged arteries. When the trains have stopped we must do something. The thing then becomes unescapable. Why isn't it just as un-

escapable now? Congress has the power to make financing of the roads a simple matter. The roads should not be thrust back upon the owners without some means of financial regeneration. Those who have money to invest want to make sure of their investments. They have a right to expect stability


