Noted Paris Diamond Bartering Cafe Feels Sudden Police Raid

PARIS (By mail to the United Press.)—The intensive campaign to collect taxes as one means of bolsterand will probably strip it of its remantic atmosphere. The "Cafe des Diamantaires" has been raided and the only thrill left in it must be found in its very commonplace

This tawdry cafe in the rue Lafayette, so like hundreds of other Paris cafes in appearance but so unlike any other in business, was the foremost unofficial "diamond market" of Europe. For many years, farther than the oldest inhabitant can remember, diamond merchants have been carrying on transactions have been carrying on transactions

Ragged individuals, over a glass of beer and a sandwich, would sudden-ly draw from their pockets jewels worth huge sums and barter. Sales worth many thousands of dollars were concluded daily in this little barroom where men of many nation-alities always seemed to be loitering

The police, of course, knew of its existence, as everybody who knew Paris did. Guides used to point the place out to tourists, and often visitors dropped in to watch the side

But most of these curb merchants took good care not to have a perma nent business address in Paris, and so the French treasury was unable to collect taxes on these luxury ar-

The police raid came shortly after The police raid came shortly after noon when the "diamond exchange", was doing a thriving business. Neighboring streets were blockaded and the dealers had no chance to escape. Identity cards were demanded of all customers, and when the dealers were unable to produce them they were taken to headquarters.
