The contract for a postoffice building has been awarded to George J. McManus and George A. Parton, both of Dallas. The building will be located at the corner of Elm and Rusk streets, where the proposed Natatorium was to be built.

They offered to put up a permanent building with at least 7,000 feet of floor space, for use of the postoffice, and to lease the building to the department for a consideration of \$12 a year. Business at the postoffice has increased on an average of 15 per cent a month since last July. An increase of 15 per cent a year is counted substantial growth in most cities. The postoffice received a second class rating last July, and it has done enough business since July to entitle it to a first class rating, exclusive of the business transacted the first six months of the

Since the department makes its rating only once a year,

# TUNGSTEN FOR THE ASKING

International News Service.
WASHINGTON—Ambitious Americans desiring to become owners of tungsten mines without paying anything for them may do so by going to China, according to advices received by the department of commerce from Vice Consul Charles E. Kline, at Shanghai. According to his report, at the present time, with few exceptions, the mines are not owned by private companies or by the government, and anyone may employ men to work one.

The discovery of tungsten mines in China has been recent. The principal districts in which the mineral is four are the provinces of Hunan, in the southern part of China, in Hangchow and its vicinity, Nankanghsien, Taiyu. Kaiyung, Heifung, Lekfung and Chukiang districts. The districts mentioned above are only those in which convertions are now being carried on operations are now being carried on, there being other large areas in which tungsten deposits are found which have not as yet been opened.

Chinese tungsten in the form of

wolframite occurs either as sands or pebbles in the streams or in small veins in the granitic rocks. The former deposits are sometimes accompanied by cassiterite or magnetite, or both, usually mixed with quartz sands the latter in the form of veins rang-ing in thickness from a fraction of an inch to two or three inches. A though both kinds of deposits are found in many widely scattered re-gions, they are never found in large quantities in any particular area. For this reason and also because this industry is of very recent origin in China, no modern systematic method have been inaugurated to explore this

The principal method of mining i The principal method of mining is the use of rakes, toms and pans, which are used for washing the stream ores, and sometime black powder is used for extracting the val-uable content of the ore. With the exception of a few places in Hunan and Kwangtung, nearly all of the mining is carried on by farmers who work during their spare time after their farming work is completed. But during the early part of 1918 the in-dustry had grown to such an extent that many of the farmers suspended their farm work and devoted them-selves entirely to tungsten mining.







CHICAGO, Jan. 9.—If all the diamonds mined in history and existing today as cut and polished gems were gathered from the ends of the earth. they would form a pile about as large as a wagon load of coal dumped on the sidewalk, says a Chicago statistical expert. The pile would contain 46,355,474 carats and the gems would weigh 10½ tons. If the pile were in the form of a cone, it would have a base diameter of eight foot and a the form of a cone, it would have a base diameter of eight feet and a height of five feet. Reckoning the diamonds at \$300 a carat, it would have a value of \$13,506,642,200. It would contain 710 1-3 gallons, worth \$5.539,023 a gallon; or 76 1-3 bushels, valued at \$51,570,729 a bushel. All the world's diamonds could be packed in an ordinary clothes closet or a kitchen pantry. kitchen pantry.




