"We are now starting construction of the first ship which will embody the new process of preheating

body the new process of preheating the air, and are combining the process with the use of high pressure turbines," said Sir Charles Denny. "The combination I am sure will produce as economical results as the internal combustion engines.

"A ship which uses steam for its propulsive power can utilize either coal or oil. This is a great advantage over a boat powered with internal combustion engines which, of course, can use only oil. I believe therefore that coal which was the secret of our success originally, will once again become the fuel of the seas."
