

Several years ago the voters turned down a proposal to shrink the common in order to swell the streets. But in the recent city election the voters in all but two wards declared in favor of widening the streets from common lands. The two wards which opposed the plan are in Charlestown, seat of another historic shrine, Bunk-er Hill monument. Under the plan, which is a compro-

Under the plan, which is a compro-mise arranged between the street commissioners and the Boston Com-mon society; Tremont and Boylston streets, which bound the common on two of its sides, will be widened to a maximum of forty three meet instead of fifty to 'sixty feet, as first' pro-posed This will be accomplished withposed. 

Reports from the Cotton Plant district today give the Mock Texas Oil company's G. E. Williams No. 1 production which runs between 3,000 and 3,500 barrels after a iolt Sunday.

The well is located north of Cotton Plant and on a tract adjoining the Gulf Production company's McCaulley. It was due for a hypo last Thursday, of 260 quarts from 3,315 to 3,428 feet, but it was held off and in view of several flows that the well made it was decided to let it rest on natural production. It was estimated to be good for between 300 and 500 barrels.
