40 TO 50 CASES OF FLU IN CITY; ONLY ONE DEATH

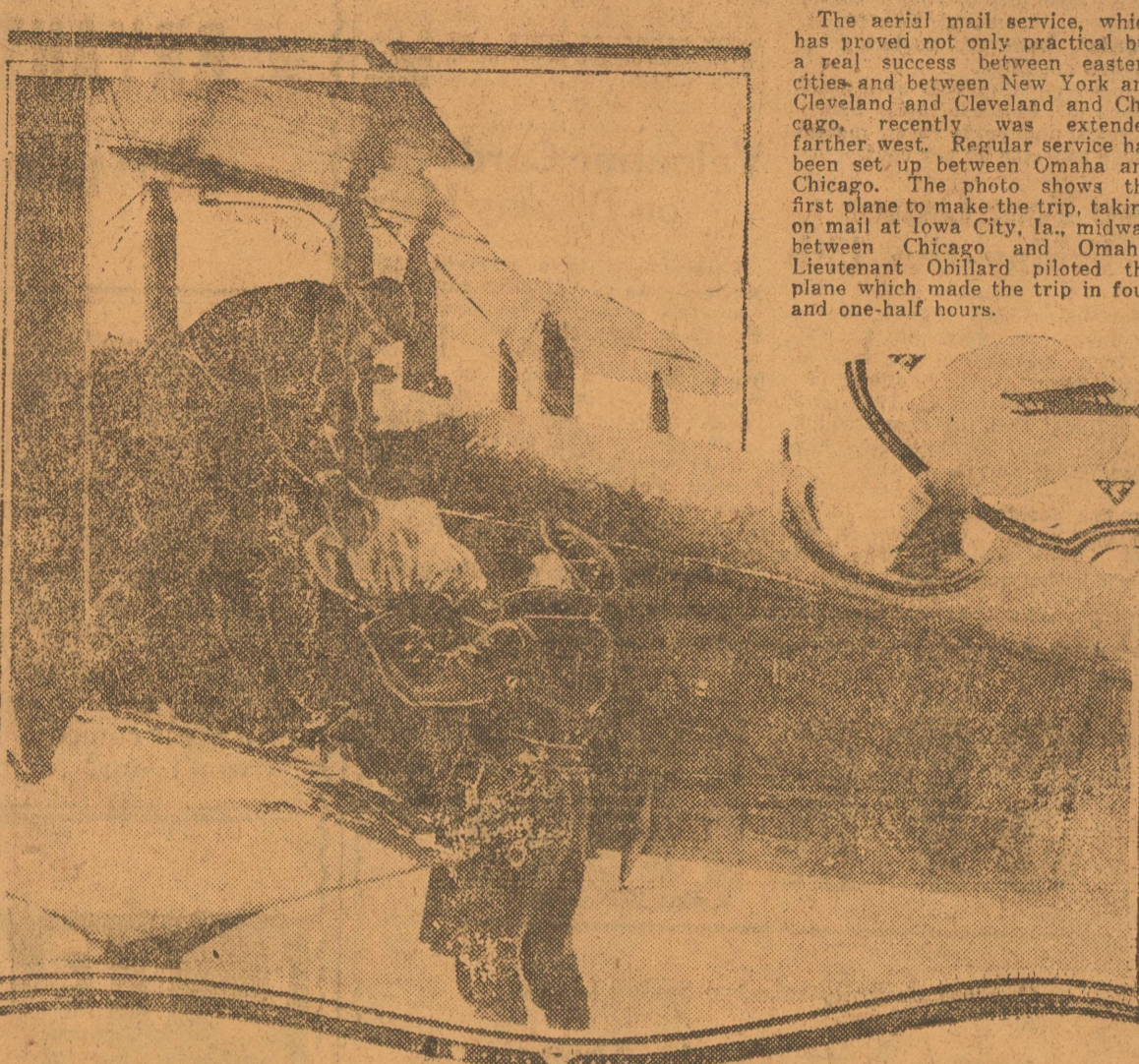
Many Flu Cases Reported at Cisco

CISCO, Texas, Jan. 30.—Local physicians are reporting increased numbers of influenza cases to City Health Officer Joseph W. Gregory each day. Several serious cases have been seen, but the attack does not approach in severity the symptoms of the disease in 1918. Some cases of pneumonia are developing.

AERIAL MAIL SERVICE WEST OF CHICAGO IS INAUGURATED

The aerial mail service, which has proved not only practical but a real success between eastern cities and between New York and Cleveland and Cleveland and Chicago, recently was extended farther west. Regular service has been set up between Omaha and Chicago.

WHY? Unanswered.

Chief of Police Byron B. Parrish has been offered the columns of the Times to tell the people of Ranger what he has done and is doing to stop open gambling in Ranger, but has declined to avail himself of the privilege, and the questions asked by the Times Thursday remain unanswered.

It is to be assumed, however, that he has acted as directed by the city commission since its Tuesday meeting, for search of the city in every quarter Thursday night failed to reveal any game in progress.

The chief of police has done some effective work in preventing crime in Ranger and in arresting law breakers and at times has kept open gambling down in this city. He has shown that open gambling can be stopped, at least temporarily.

Mayor Hagaman and the city commissioners and City Manager Turner are earnest advocates of strict enforcement of the law against gambling. "We realize that it is a difficult task, but it can be done," said the mayor.

The open gambling element in Ranger is small but persistent. The law provides ways and means to discourage this persistence and it has been suggested that the police make use of them. Continued raids of open games with arrests and subsequent fining of the gamblers would exercise a deterrent influence and add something to the city's exchequer.

The law provides that the "banker" or person who maintains the game shall, upon conviction, be deemed a felon and go to the state penitentiary. It provides also that all the gambling furniture and paraphernalia shall be destroyed by the police and, yet further, that the owner of the building where open gambling is indulged in, unless he can prove he had no knowledge of the law violation, shall be punished as a law violator.

It is reported that while the police have repeatedly stopped open gambling they have arrested few gamblers, have destroyed no gambling paraphernalia, have made no complaints against owners of property in which such violations of the law have taken place.

Chief of Police Parrish could be as persistent as the small gambling element and it is evident from occasional closing of the games the gamblers are quick to make a get-away when they know the "stop" order is out. The suggestion by some good citizens that he make use of ways and means provided by the law as yet untried in Ranger, if adopted by him, undoubtedly would cause an exodus from Ranger of gamblers who contribute nothing to the city, to citizens who are weak enough to get into their net and besmirch the good name of the city.

U. S. WILL LEND NO MORE MONEY TO EUROPE NOW

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Europe in so far as the United States government is concerned must rely upon her own resources in retrieving her financial equilibrium.

This is the interpretation given to a letter Secretary Glass has sent the committee of the United States Chamber of Commerce, which sought an expression on the proposed conference of financiers and commercial leaders to discuss reconstruction problems.

In a blunt statement of facts as he sees them, Secretary Glass says that the American government has done all it considers advisable and practicable for Europe.

ADMIRAL SIMS MUST ANSWER NAVY CHARGES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Rear Admiral Sims' charges concerning the navy's unpreparedness when the United States entered the world war, will be made a part of the general inquiry into the operations of the nation's sea forces during the war by the senate naval committee.

Chairman Page of the committee has asked Secretary Daniels to furnish full information as to the condition of the navy just preceding the declaration of war and other details.

Lack of Supplies Held Up Advance of Bolsheviki

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Difficulties of supply probably stopped the advance of the Bolsheviki along the trans-Siberian railroad west of Irkutsk, according to reports received by the British war office today.

All resistance seems to have disappeared. Detachments are reported on the Chinese frontier, southeast of Bisk. The latest reports show the relation between the Semioff government and the Czecho-Slovaks' condition has become worse and Bolshevism appears to be gaining ground as a result of "red" agents working in front of the Bolsheviki army.

British Want Big Petroleum Tract in Peru

LIMA, Jan. 30.—Application for a concession of a 12,000,000-acre petroleum tract in Peru by a powerful group of British capitalists has been approved by President Leguia.

Aviators Forced to Land in Mexico to Fly Back to U. S.

BROWNSVILLE, Jan. 30.—Through permission of the Mexican government, arrangements have been perfected for the return to the United States of Lieutenants Davis and Grimes, American army aviators, who were forced by the exhaustion of their gasoline supply to land in Mexican territory Wednesday.

Kolchak Hiding in Manchuria

HONOJULU, Jan. 30.—Admiral Kolchak is reported to have escaped from the Bolsheviki and is hiding in Manchuria, according to a Tokio dispatch to Japanese newspapers here.

FOOD PRICES COMING DOWN, HE DECLARES

DALLAS, Jan. 30.—Food prices are coming down, in the opinion of E. M. Schenker, president of the North Texas Wholesale Grocers association, addressing the association in convention here. He expressed the opinion that prices of groceries have reached the apex and from now on both grocery-men and consumers may expect a gradual decline in costs.

REBELS CAUSED \$50,000 LOSS TO RYS. IN MEXICO

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Sixty-four instances of attacks, derailments and dynamiting of trains in Mexico during the past year are classified as serious in the official report which reached Washington today.

Instances reported were chiefly in northern Mexico and on the Mexican line between Mexico City and Vera Cruz and the Isthmus line. Railroads suffered losses of \$50,000. Eight locomotives and 170 freight and passenger cars were lost from rebel raids, the report said.

NOTED BANDIT ELECTROCUTED AT SING SING

OSSENSING, N. Y., Jan. 30.—Gordon Fawcett Hamby, notorious murderer and bandit, was electrocuted in Sing Sing last night for the murder of two bank officials in Brooklyn. He was buried in a local cemetery today.

"Doughboy Daddie" Found in U. S. by Little French Boy

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Georges Phierrot, the 13-year-old French boy who came to America as a stowaway aboard the steamer, Mest, Cornia, searching for his "doughboy daddie," was claimed today by the wife of Lieutenant Howell French of Columbus, Ohio, as her adopted child.

W. J. Bryan Takes Issue With New Jersey Governor

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Jan. 30.—"I hope he will continue talking, no champion of the liquor traffic can talk long enough, insulting the conscience and sense of decency of the country," said William J. Bryan today referring to Governor Edwards of New Jersey.

Diamonds Stolen From Murdered Woman Found

HOUSTON, Jan. 30.—Nearly all the diamonds, believed to have been taken from Mrs. Floyd Parker at the time of her murder in San Antonio, have been recovered by the police.

 Battleship and submarine scenes, both exterior and interior, will be technically correct in the Thomas H. Ince special production, "Behind the Door," starring Hobart Bosworth, which comes to the Lone Star theater for three days, commencing today, as a Paramount-Arteract picture.  
 This was assured when Director Irvin Willatt enlisted the services of Lieut. John Cook from the H-8 at the submarine base at San Pedro, Cal., to guide him through the nautical sets.  
 Mr. Cook approved all the interior boat sets before they were photographed and he was with Mr. Willatt on the battleships and on the submarine while making the exteriors, so that every movement was in strict accordance with naval discipline.

## ENGLAND FACES DAILY DEFICIT OF \$892,000

International News Service.  
 LONDON.—Great Britain, which within a year or so hopes to get off the red ink side of the national ledger, faces an outlook until April of a daily deficit of \$892,000.  
 From England's standpoint, that is quite an improvement over 1919, when the national expenditure was \$6,252,000 daily more than income. These figures presume the pound to be worth \$4.  
 So the position from the debit side is today seven times better than in 1919, although outgo is still nearly a million dollars a day ahead of income.

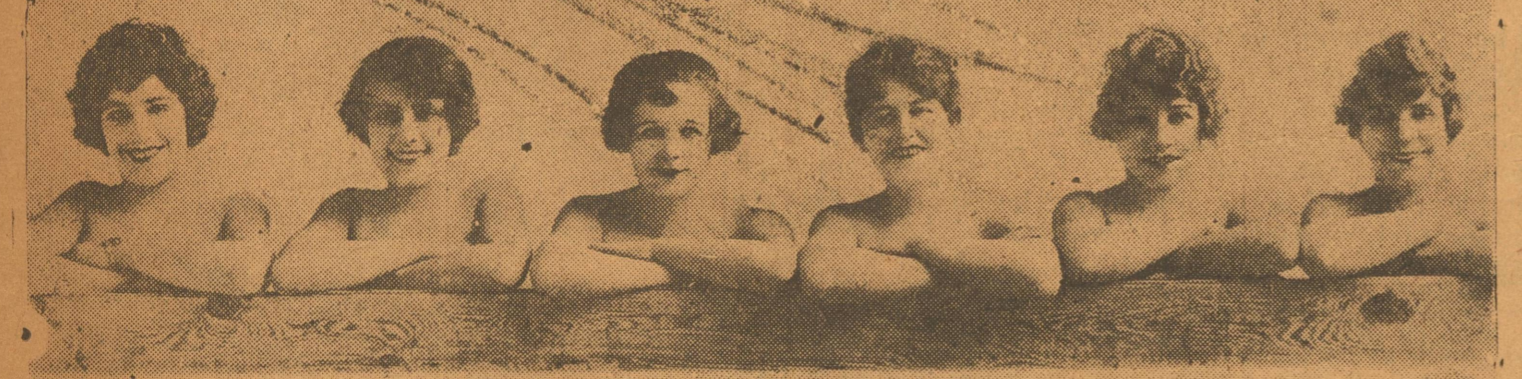

Ranger is a proud and progressive city; proud of her accomplishment and proud of her future, keen for growth and development along clean lines.

The progress of Ranger has been phenomenal. From a little one-street village, hardly more than a cross roads community, she has grown within eighteen months to a place among the first ten cities of Texas. It is quite possible the census will show her seventh in population among Texas cities and ahead of the state's capital city. They have said so through their city ordinances and state laws and it is the duty of their peace officers to stop gambling just as they stop other infractions of the law. The people do not want excuses. They might go right on living in a mire whenever it rains just because they cannot prevent the rain from

falling in the streets and making mud, but they will not. They did not seek refuge in an excuse, but borrowed the money and are paving the streets. They do not want gambling to continue among the few who would have the city continue to exist in mire, but insist that its officers stop the gambling.

Ranger aspires to be the cleanest city in Texas, physically and morally. It is a right the citizens owe to themselves, and they will insist upon this right.

## EXPORT TRADE IS PROBLEM NOW BEFORE HUNS

International News Service.  
LONDON, Jan. 30.—German and neutral newspapers and trade journals received here show that dumping of German goods is agitating both neutral and German economists. They agree such dumping is due solely to the low value of the German mark. German papers point out that the continued fall of the mark serves only to line the pockets of the German exporters and that government control of manufacturers' prices should be discontinued. Then, they say, prices will climb up to equal those abroad and the value of the mark will increase.

The depreciated mark enables German goods to be sold in adjacent countries at from a fifth to a third of the cost of producing them in those countries. The German economists are pointing out that if government control of production is removed and manufacturers who export are allowed to charge what they would like, Germany's price level would rise rapidly to the international standard. They say that dumping on foreigners and the exhaustion of Germany by selling at undervalue would cease, and German wages and profits would rise correspondingly.

The china, glass and hardware manufacturers want to continue dumping and declare that by export alone car sufficient foreign exchange be obtained to buy needed raw materials. "In Germany, and among these is numbered Herr Hugo Stinnes, the 'Schwerindustrie' magnate, say the exporters are actuated chiefly by the desire to get their goods into foreign markets, which rise in value while the mark drops, and to take advantage of the twenty-five per cent extra charge allowed on all exports.

The Berlin Tageblatt points out that present German manufacturing costs are less than those of English, French or American manufacturers, and that the rise in the cost of living in Germany has been less than abroad. The Berlin ministry of economy is reviewing the whole export situation with a view to making recommendations to the government.

# RANGER CHIEF OF DETECTIVES SCOUTS CARLSON'S ASSERTION FINGER PRINTS CAN BE FORGED

The officials of the International Association of Personal Identification in New York, an organization which has for its object the fingerprinting of every man, woman and child in the United States and Canada, recently began an inquiry into the charge made by Milton Carlson, a Los Angeles hand-writing expert, that finger prints can be forged.

This man is quoted as stating that he forged the finger prints of a convicted murderer in New Jersey in connection with a butchering knife, getting the perfect impression of a man 1,000 miles away. He claims that experts have pronounced his forged finger prints perfect. So far as it is known, he is the first man to succeed in duplicating finger prints a system used for years as an infallible means of identification.

Chief of Detectives Thompson of Chicago reported from the idea of finger prints ever being successfully faked. "This Carlson," he said, is surely going to discredit finger prints because their use depends from his business. Any hand-writing can be imitated but I have yet to see an imitation of a finger print that cannot be detected under the microscope.

I have seen duplications of these would-be imitations but I have always been able to readily detect the fraud. "It would be a fine thing if the

finger prints of every person in the country could be taken and filed away. This would make it easier to identify mutilated bodies of people in the condition of the lately renowned Professor X. I believe the time will come when a man will endorse every check and sign every document both with his finger print and his signature. This would make forgeries of signatures impossible. There are two systems of taking prints; the three-finger system and the ten-finger system. A man has to practically cut off the ends of his fingers to destroy evidence of the tell-tale finger prints, and then his toes and the palms of his hands are left. So, you see, a criminal is sewed up tight once we get his finger prints. You leave these "human seals" on everything you touch, and by sprinkling over them with a little light or dark powder they can be photographed and put on file.

"Moonshine" Stills in West Virginia Raided

By Associated Press CHARLESTOWN, W. Va., Jan. 30.--The manufacture and sale of moonshine whisky in the mountains of southern West Virginia is claiming the close attention of W. S. Hallanan, prohibition commissioner, who with a large force of deputies continues to raid and arrest almost weekly.

There have been times in the last few weeks when the officers have met determined resistance, and already two men, Preston Mullens, an alleged moonshiner, and John D. Kennedy, a deputy sheriff, have lost their lives in the campaign. This fight, the most serious in recent years, occurred in the Panther creek section of McDowell county, on the Virginia border. Panther creek, the prohibition authorities say, is one of the most active moonshining districts in the state. There, according to Mr. Hallanan, have been gathered some of the most famous manufacturers of moonshine from Buchanan county, Va. They know all that is to be known about the industry, and some of them are famed for the qualities of their "corn liquor." Usually their stills are extremely difficult to locate, but gradually the prohibition

There is another kind of moonshiner in that section who is giving the officers much trouble. He makes his moonshine as quickly as possible, markets it with the least delay, and then moves his still to some other place. The country is mountainous and rough with many fertile valleys. These valleys, the commissioner has discovered, were this year used to a large extent for the growing of sugar cane, the high price of sugar having driven some of the old time moonshiners to producing what they needed for domestic and moonshine purposes.
