LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 9.-Four persons were killed and several injured here today when a mob intent upon lynching William Lockett, negro, who confessed to murdering ten-year-old Geneva Hardman, charged the court house during the Lockett trial and was fired upon by the police and state troops.

Two women are among those reported shot by the troops. In a clash with the soldiers, the mob was held off while the authorities managed to slip the negro away

to a place of safety. Great excitement was caused by the shooting and there were mutterings of further trouble. While the mob with a rope was attempting to get into the court house, the jury found Lockett guilty of first degree murder and the court sentenced him to die in the electric chair March 11.

In addition to the four said to be killed, nineteen. were. injured when troops fired into the mob.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—At least one victim dead with some persons still unaccounted for, and thirty injured, was the toll of the fire which swept through the five-story Berkshire apartment hotel here early today.

Most of those taken to hospitals were women. Some suffered severe burns while others leaped from windows and balconies.

An explosion, apparently on the fourth floor, blew out a part of the upper wall. Shortly afterward the roof collapsed.

Those whom the firemen could not reach and who took the slender chance of leaping from upper story windows were crushed by the fall.

The Berkshire was a fire-story building, containing eighty-five apartments. The police estimated the occupants of the building at 150.

So rapid was the spread of the flames that fire fighting measures were almost useless. An investigation into possible violation of fire ordinances in building, maintenance and protection may be ordered by the city authorities.

The work of recovery of the bodies has only begun. It cannot be completed until the hot ruins have cooled and much of the debris has been cleared away.





1919 COAST FIGURES SHOW PRODUCTION INCREASE WITH LESS DRILLING THAN 1918

Completions during 1919 numbered 1,236, against 1,677 in 1918, with 281,366 barrels new production, compared with 326,737 barrels in 1918. The dry holes in 1919 numbered 562, against 682 in 1918. This is a decline of 709,790 barrels. against 682 in 1918. This is a decrease of 439 in the number of completions; a loss of 45,371 barrels in initial production and a decrease of 120 in the number of dry holes and salt water wells.

July was the banner month, with 128 completed wells and 39,930 barrels new production, with 63 failures December made the poorest showing in the number of completions, with 77, while February was the month registering the smallest initial production, 13,920 barrels.

The West Columbia pool shows the largest new production for the year 152,300 barrels, from 130 completions, of which 67 were dry or salt water wells that were deepened. Only 80 barrels new production was developened in the Batson pool, with seventeen wells finished, nine being fail-




