United States Mail Destroyed In Flames

FIRE TAKES POSTOFFICE OLDEN, TEX.

OLDEN, Feb. 10.—Early this morning the Olden postoffice and its entire contents were destroyed by fire, supposed to have originated from a gas light left burning all night in the lobby of the building.

Loss of building and fixtures is estimated at \$2,000, with no insurance. In addition, several registered letters, the postoffice's supply of stamps and a quantity of parcel post packages were burned.

The extent of the loss has not been checked.

Fortunately for the patrons of the office, a supply of mail boxes is now in transit, which will be installed in temporary quarters as soon as they arrive and will alleviate the congestion resulting from the destruction of the office.

ALASKA GIVES SOLUTION OF PRINT FAMINE

SEATTLE, Feb. 10.—Alaska wants to throw open her millions of acres of national forests can help relieve the pulp and newsprint famine, Governor Thomas Riggs Jr., of Alaska, declared here today.

Governor Riggs is on his way from Juneau, capital of Alaska, to Washington, where he expected to help press pending legislation intended to remove restrictions and allow pulp manufacturers to go into the Tongass and Chugach reservations, the northern territory's two great reserves.

Pulp and paper men are anxious to go to Alaska an establish mills as great as those operated in British Columbia not far south of the Alaska boundary line, the governor asserted. Under the present laws the pulp makers cannot enter the reservations with any certainty that they will be allowed to stay.

Alaska's great forests stretch over approximately 34,000 square miles, an area nearly equal in size to the state of Indiana, according to estimates made by government officials.

Several hundred million feet of good pulp wood, including western yellow pine, hemlock, Sitka spruce, white fir and lodge-pole pine are on the forest reserves alone.

The Tongass reserve, in southeastern Alaska, is especially adapted to the manufacture of pulp and paper, forestry officials have reported. There is plenty of water power, ocean harbors open the year round, timber skidding the water and weather similar to that of the Puget sound.

The governor intends to ask Washington to restore the reserves to the national domain or to open them to the pulp industry.

STATE REVEALS PLOT MADE TO KILL GUNMAN

FIFTY MILLIONS OLD ACCOUNTS OWED TO TEXAS

AUSTIN, Feb. 10.—Approximately \$50,000,000 is owed to the state of Texas upon thousands of public land accounts which are pending. State lands are sold upon forty years' time and for this reason the accounts have accumulated.

With the development of the state the number of land accounts is being reduced. Purchasers are not waiting for the date of final payment to discharge their obligation and become full owners of the land. In January 320 patents were issued and that number of accounts closed. During the last calendar year 2,439 patents were issued. As all the land was sold under the act of 1880, final payment upon none of it was due. The oldest patent issued during the year was for land bought in 1883.

New accounts are being opened with each quarterly sale of state land, but the sales are not keeping pace with the number of patents that are issued. Public lands have been picked over and desirable tracts have been selected until now practically all the good land is gone. Less than 300,000 acres remain, and much of this is so rocky and barren that it is, in its present state, suitable only for "trading land," to be held for speculative purposes.

CISCO FARMER ENDS HIS LIFE WITH ONE SHOT

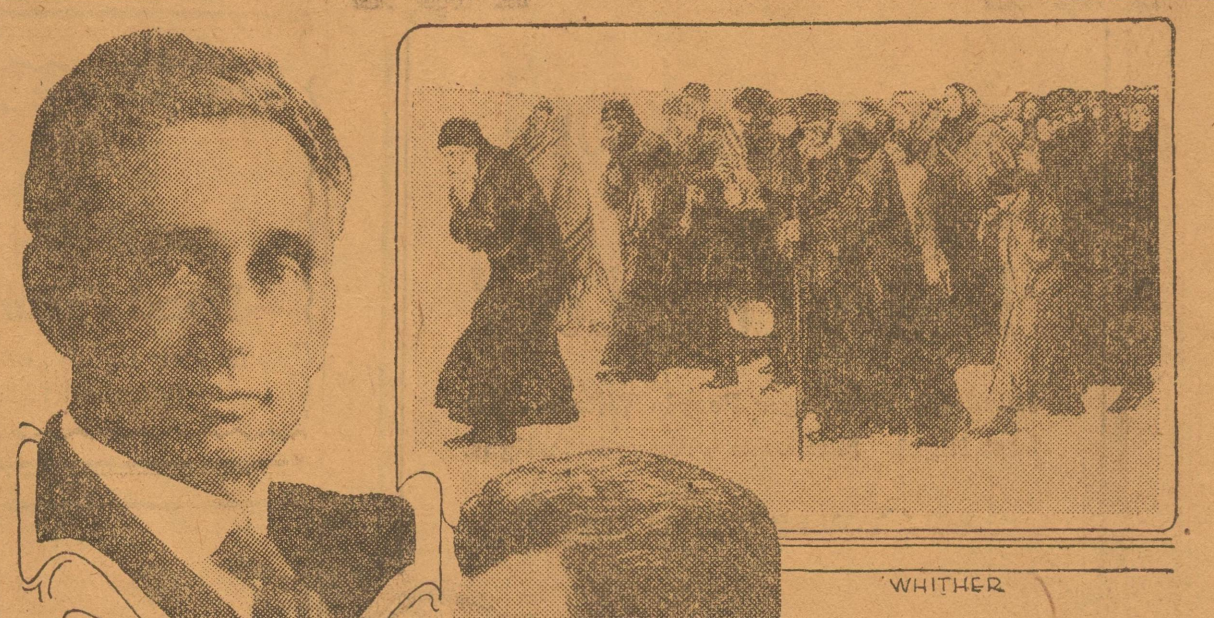

Thousands of Jews Risk Lives In Brave Effort to Reach Palestine

Millions of Jews throughout the world are awaiting the word that will permit them to start again another Exodus to the Promised Land.

In every quarter of the globe, impatient thousands are waiting with tense eagerness for the great word which will enable them to go to the one land where they believe they will find peace and the spiritual satisfaction of national existence—the Land of Israel.

This signal will come with the signing of the treaty of peace with Turkey, establishing a British mandate over Palestine and paving the way for the formation of a Jewish National Homeland, where the intense mass-desire of these millions of modern Pilgrims will be realized.

There is no country in the world without its large group of Jews waiting with agonized impatience for the time when mass-migration will be opened to the Holy Land. The Zionist Organization of America, which is endeavoring to raise \$10,000,000 for carrying on restoration work in Palestine to prepare it to receive this world wide Exodus, reports that its most serious problem is to restrain

this mass-migration, which threatens at any time to break through and start for the Holy Land. Reports have been received today of Jewish men and women arriving at Constantinople, Odessa and Trieste, many of whom have trekked across Siberia, Russia, Poland and Austria on foot, in an effort to reach Palestine. Hundreds have risked their lives in small fishing smacks sailing from Odessa or Constantinople, hop-

ing to smuggle their way into Palestine via the Black Sea and the Mediterranean. No one knows how many have been drowned in this mad enterprise.

Plans have been made to handle this world-wide migration through Copenhagen, London and Haifa. Official reports issued by the International Zionist Organization show that organized in this great mass-desire to reach the Holy Land are 1,000,000 Jews in Russia, 500,000 in Poland, 30,000 in Argentina, 40,000 Russian prisoners of war held in Germany, as well as thousands of leading German Jews, 20,000 in Hungary and over double that number in Austria, 5,000 engineers of the Czech-Slovakian army and over 90 per cent of the entire Jewish population in the East, as well as 9,000 German and Austrian prisoners of war held in Siberia.

In addition, there are large groups in Persia, Morocco, Algeria, Tunis, Turkey, Bulgaria, Jugo-Slavia, Greece, organized to leave, as well as masses, including leading professional men in every European country and Canada. In the United States many professional men and women have volunteered their administrative services in establishing the new country, the first 5,000 applicants from this country representing 134 different vocations ranging from laborer to specialist.

HUGE SUMS IN MONEY ORDERS CROSS BORDER

JUAREZ, Mexico, Feb. 10.—During the first twenty months since the resumption of international money order relations between the United States and Mexico, 105,446 money orders, totaling \$3,442,627.39, were issued in the United States for collection in Mexico, according to a report received by Edward A. Dow, American consul here, from Andres G. Garcia, formerly Mexican consul general at El Paso, now director general of the Mexican postal service.

Senor Garcia's report shows that 23,315 money orders have been issued in Mexico for collection in the United States since May 1, 1918. The money value of these orders was \$578,811.33.

The fact that the value of money orders issued in the United States payable in Mexico is about six times that of orders made out in Mexico to American payees is explained by American officials here as due to the number of remittances made to relatives in Mexico by Mexican laborers in the United States.

SHOT STARTS BORDER CLASH NEAR NOGALES

NOGALES, Ariz., Feb. 10.—A clash between Mexican customs guards and Americans was narrowly averted last night when a Mexican bystander was shot and seriously wounded by the United States military police firing at an escaped prisoner.

Instantly the wildest excitement ensued and the business men across the line commenced closing their stores in expectation of serious trouble.

Civil and military authorities, both American and Mexican, cooperated in bringing about an understanding and trouble was averted.

R. R. STRIKE SITUATION IS SERIOUS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—White House and railroad administration officials regard "as most serious" the railroad situation precipitated by orders for a strike Feb. 17, issued by officers of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way employees.

Secretary Tumulty will lay matter before President Wilson today, emphasizing the possibility that this strike may be the opening wedge for a general strike of all railroad employees should the wage demands be refused by Director General Hines.

It is understood that Hines conferred with Secretary Tumulty for three hours last night outlining the situation for presentation to the president.

MAY REFUSE DEMANDS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—It is generally believed here that Director General Hines would go before the representatives of 2,000,000 railroad workers and inform them that their wage increase demands could not be granted. He is willing to do no further, it is understood, than to adjust the alleged inequalities in wages.

1,200 AFFECTED FT. WORTH. FORT WORTH, Feb. 10.—Two hundred maintenance men and 1,000 shop men will be affected by the strike order issued yesterday by the heads of those unions, to start Feb. 17.

CISCO, Feb. 10.—The influenza situation is still quite serious here, several cases of pneumonia having developed. Children from the age of one year and older seem to be easy victims to the pneumonia complication. Five deaths from pneumonia and influenza have occurred here since last Monday. Nurses are hard to get.

BASEBALL CO. INCORPORATES FOR \$35,000

The Ranger baseball team is no longer a myth. Monday evening several of the local business men interested in Ranger's place in the West Texas baseball league held a meeting for the purpose of organizing the Ranger team.

M. R. Smith, H. R. Ghoulson and F. D. Bostaph were elected directors for the first year. Also, \$35,000 was subscribed to start operations, and it was voted to incorporate under the laws of Texas; the company to be known as the Ranger Baseball & Amusement company.

Another meeting of the directors and organizers will be held some time this week to arrange the purchase of land and to start building operations on the Ranger park.

The company will lease the park to H. R. Williams, R. Hosey Wick and W. H. McCulloch for a period of five years.

The Ranger team of the West Texas league will be under the management of Messrs. Wick and McCulloch.

Notice was received this morning that Mineral Wells had agreed to come into the West Texas league and that the city had already subscribed \$5,000 toward the purchase of a park.

War Department Sends Texas Stock to the Philippines

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—The war department is going to take up cattle breeding through its bureau of insular affairs. The department has purchased in Texas 100 Hereford bulls and twenty Hereford heifers for breeding into the stock of Philippine Zebu cows. MEXICO AFTER LAND FOREIGN GRANTEES HOLD

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 10.—President Carranza's administration intends to recover to the nation great tracts of lands conceded by previous administrations to foreign interests, according to statements of Mexican officials. It intends also to enforce the constitutional prohibition barring foreigners from holding land within sixty-two miles of the Mexican frontier and thirty-one miles from the coast line.

The general trend of their statements is to the effect that it is the purpose of the administration to avoid colonization projects that might eventually endanger the nation and to recover dominion over oil lands without violating the legal rights of the present producers.

These statements were made in explanation of the government's request that the 1919 congress float a loan of \$50,000,000 pesos to enable the nation to recover land held under concessions by foreign interests.

The officials stated that the greater part of several states, such as Lower California and Chiapas, is held by foreigners under concessions given by previous administrations.

Where the terms of these concessions have not been complied with, they have been nullified, according to the department of agriculture. Part of the proposed loan was intended to indemnify holders of these concessions for improvements they had made.

Interests who have been deprived of their concessions by these nullifications have declared that interior conditions for the last ten years have made it impossible for them to fulfill their agreements. Various British representatives are said to be pushing for indemnification for work done on concessions, especially in Lower California and Chiapas.

Denial is made by Pastor Rouaix, secretary of agriculture and development, that the government plans to nullify all concessions granted under the Diaz and Madero regimes. Only those whose prescribed obligations have not been met will be annulled, he asserts.

PRESS BUREAU OF GERMANY IN CONFERENCE

BERLIN, Feb. 10.—All the press organizations of Germany, the representatives of all publishers' organizations, the official Wolff bureau, the Dutch news agency, "Trans-ocean," and the German wireless propaganda service, gathered in Berlin recently for a discussion of the wireless possibilities in Germany for transmitting news.

Dr. Bredow, who conducted the conference, stated that there have been distributed daily a report of the assembly at Weimar, and news summaries by the Wolff bureau and Dutch agency. The news messages have been received by the government wireless stations at various points in the country and turned over to the papers. The conference concluded that the wireless is not yet able to supply the full needs of the press nor anywhere near it, for the wireless stations are overloaded with personal messages. However, they decided that the wireless is capable of handling brief flashes on important stories which are paralleled by telephone or telegraph by the news agencies, so that the news is available for a larger circle of people.

The conference was convinced, however, that the spreading of such messages can be done in large numbers only when the wireless telephone has been installed, as only in this way the special wireless operators can be avoided. They decided that for the present the sending of news will have to continue by telegraph for it was too expensive to fit up each telegraph office with wireless equipment.

In a few weeks the group will meet again to discuss any further technical experiments with wireless telephony.

NUT GROWERS MEET TO FORM TEXAS PECAN ASSN.

SAN SABA, Feb. 10.—A meeting here of pecan growers and horticulturists of the state has been called by the San Saba chamber of commerce for the purpose of organizing the proposed Texas Pecan Growers' association. The dates proposed for the meeting are Feb. 27 and 28. A two-day program is now being arranged and many prominent horticulturists will address the convention.

MEXICAN GOVERNMENT WILL MAKE EXTENSIVE STUDY U. S. FISH TRADE

JUAREZ, Mexico, Feb. 10.—The Mexican government has plans for an extensive study of the fishing industry of the country, according to a report received by Edward A. Dow, American consul here.

As a result of the decision to further the fishing industry, new laws will be promulgated, it is said. There are many kinds of fish in the west coast waters of Mexico, and it is believed that if capital is induced to invest in the industry considerable returns will result.

The question of pearl fisheries is being given preference in the government's study of the question.

RED MENACE THREATENING TOKIO SAYS

HONOLULU, Feb. 10.—Siberian Bolsheviks have captured Alexandrovsk, capital of Sakhalin island, and fear is felt that the radical forces may enter Japan proper, according to special cable dispatches from Tokio to a local Japanese language newspaper.

The Japanese government is negotiating with Alexandrovsk authorities for the evacuation of the Japanese population from the city, the cablegram said.

N. M. SOLONS NOW DEBATING ON SUFFRAGE

SANTA FE, N. M., Feb. 10.—The New Mexico state legislature met in special session at noon today, in response to a call issued by Governor O. A. Larrazolo. The principal matter to come before the assembly is the ratification of the suffrage amendment to the federal constitution.

Two attempts were made at the regular session of the legislature in the spring of 1917 to give women the ballot in New Mexico, but both of them were defeated by narrow margins. According to the constitution of New Mexico, however, the proposal required a two-thirds vote of the members in both houses, while only a majority vote will be needed to ratify the federal constitutional amendment.

Unless there has been a radical change in sentiment during the last year, which is hardly likely, leading supporters of woman suffrage are of the opinion that the amendment will be ratified without difficulty.

U. S. ENGINEERS START WORK SAN SABA DAM

SAN SABA, Feb. 10.—A mapping party, in charge of R. R. Monbeck, engineer of the United States geological survey, arrived here Sunday and will start work today mapping the San Saba reservoir site and valley. The investigation of the proposed irrigation district to be formed here will be made jointly by the federal government and the state board of water engineers. The project proposes the building of a ninety-foot dam across the San Saba river near Doran, about eighteen miles southwest of here, at an estimated cost of \$3,000,000. This dam will irrigate between forty and fifty thousand acres of land, it is said.

CITY DWELLERS IMPRISONED BY PARIS FLOODS

PARIS, Feb. 10.—The floods of 1920 were a disaster almost equal to those of 1910 for the riverside suburbs of Paris. Houses on the banks of the Seine and Marne in the vicinity of Paris are built in the middle of walled gardens. The sudden rise of fifteen feet had the effect of imprisoning the occupants for a week. Ordinary row-boats could not pass through the garden gates, so some beleaguered householders were provisioned by canoes, but in many instances the current was too strong for these frail craft. The householders were half starved and were only relieved by the subsidence of the waters.

The worst sufferers were the inhabitants of Maisons-Alfort and Alfortville, suburbs situated at the confluence of the Seine and Marne just above Paris. The ground there lies low and gets the benefit of the floods from both rivers. Most of the houses were flooded up to the second story and more than 5,000 inhabitants were taken in boats from the upper windows. They were provided with rough accommodations in the schoolhouses and other public buildings of suburbs less affected by the flood. Soldiers and bluejackets brought up from Brest, Rochefort and Lorient with collapsible boats rescued them and their belongings.

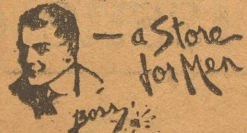

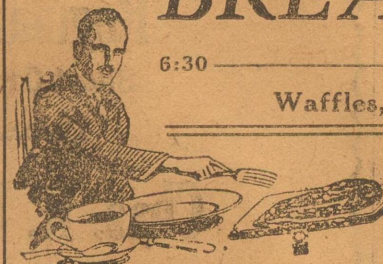

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THE FEDERAL BUILDING.

Ranger's move for a federal building, to cost between \$125,000 and \$150,000, will be made along regularly planned lines, considered and accepted by the committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

First to consider it site. When Ranger goes to its congressional well wishers with the request for help in getting the necessary appropriation through, the city will be able to say, "Our site is ready."

Several sites are under consideration. Those best suited to the building would be between one and two blocks from Main street and not more than four or five blocks from the Texas & Pacific station. Its location will be determined by two factors, convenience and the possibilities of the surrounding property to take care of the growth that will follow the location of a first class government building.

First class it will be, as to building and class of office. For Ranger long since has passed the stage of a second class post office. Receipts of the local office for the last six months were more than enough to warrant the change to first class.

Admitting that the present quarters are inadequate and if enlarged would only be temporarily satisfactory, it is certain that in making a change, the city should aim to have a permanent building, a structure that not only will care for the postal wants, but will stand as a concrete example of the citizens' and the government's confidence in the metropolis of the West Texas oil fields.

With the site determined, the federal building workers also will be able to tell congressmen and post office authorities, "Every cent put in Ranger will go into a building," for it is certain that the plot of ground, probably 100x140, will be donated, if not by the owner alone, then with the help of property owners immediately surround, who will be the first to feel the benefit derived from the location of the building.

All of Ranger will benefit. Everyone who receives as much as a postal card a month will gain through better service. Those whose business demands greater mail service will gain in time saved, in certain delivery. Beyond the enhanced value of the service, the city will gain in the value of the new structure and the standing that comes with the erection of a creditable federal building.

Once the committee, a capable one, which has the work in hand gives the word, then all interests must unite behind the project.

Not only should requests go out by letter and telegram to the local congressional representatives, but to all departmental officials and men in congress whose aid would help in the move to get the measure through.

Ranger men wield a wide influence, through their connections in other states; it could be brought into play in no better cause.

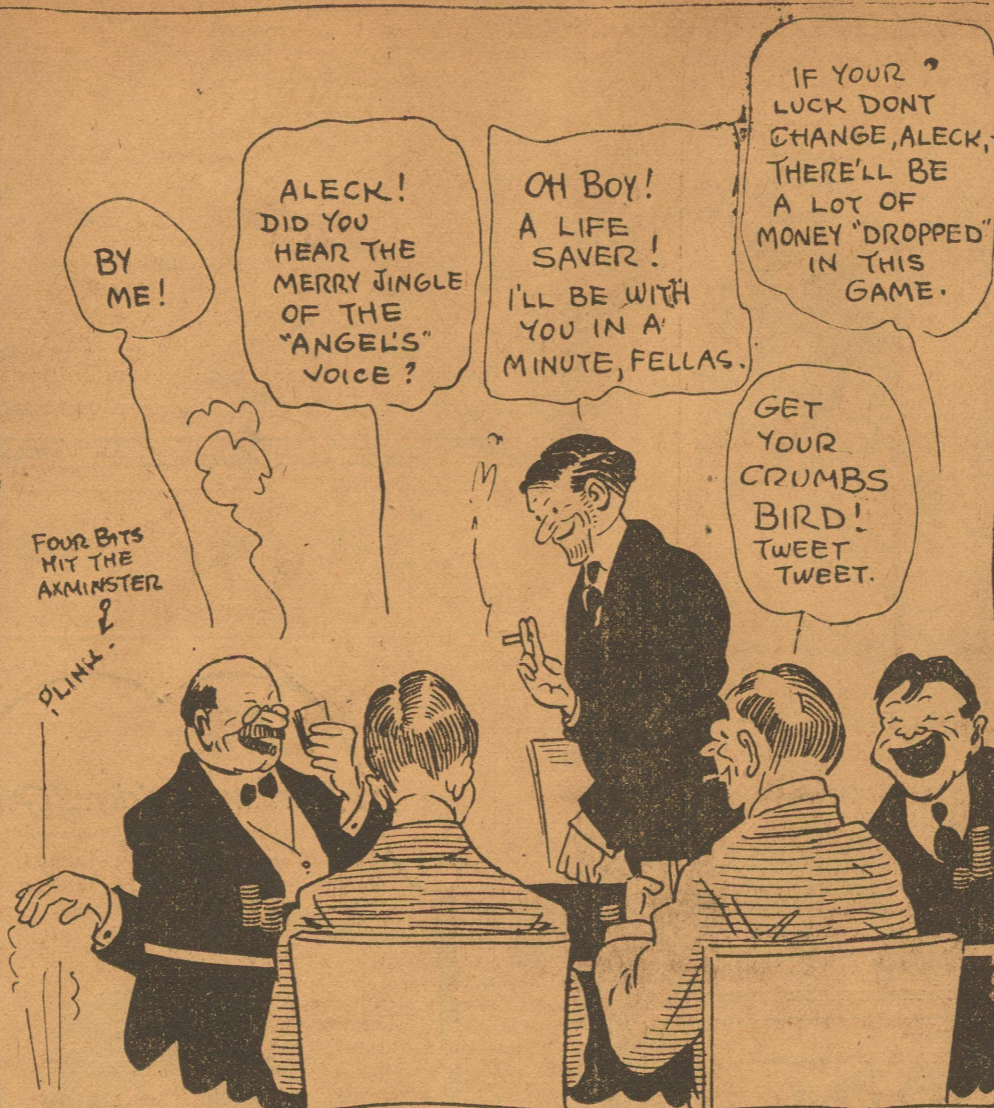

RIO GRANDE IS MIGHTY RIVER ONLY IN SONG

By Associated Press
EL PASO, Feb. 10.—Despite its name, the Rio Grande is not a big river. The stream that divides Anglo-Saxon America from Latin-America is a "mighty, turbulent flood" only in song and story.

This has been true since the construction of the Elephant Butte Dam, in New Mexico, about 100 miles north of El Paso. This dam, which is the largest in the United States, with a capacity of 2,600,000 acre feet, has deflected as much as 1,138,000 acre feet of the river's waters at one time. This water has been kept in storage in the dam by the United States reclamation service, to be used in the irrigation of the lands constituting the Rio Grande project, which extends from San Marcial, New Mexico, to a point fifty miles southeast of here.

North of San Marcial the maximum depth of the river is about six feet. South of this point for several hundred miles down the river its average depth is not more than three feet.

El Paso, where the bed of the river is narrow and where as a consequence the channel ought to be deeper, the depth of the river is scarcely ever over three feet. The following figures are taken from the records of the reclamation service records:

In January, 1919, the average depth was 1 foot; in February 1 and 2 feet; March, 2 feet; April, 2 to 3 feet; May 2 to 3 feet; June, 2 1/2 feet; July, 2 to 3 feet; August, 2 to 3 feet; September, 2 to 3 feet; October, 1 to 2

feet; November, 1 to 2 feet; December, 1 foot. Had it not been for the water deflected by the Elephant Butte dam, the average depth of the water at El Paso would have been between 8 and 9 feet, reclamation officials estimated. The width of the river at El Paso is about 150 feet.

The Rio Grande, however, has been on a few rampages in the past. About six miles north of El Paso, there are still standing houses, the brick walls of which show distinctly a "water line" about six feet above the floor level. Such a water line in the open spaces where the houses are situated would mean a depth probably of 12 feet in the narrows at El Paso. During the Texas floods in September, 1919, a depth of from 50 to 60 feet is said to have been reached by the Rio Grande in certain narrow portions of its bed.

LONDON: "RAILWAYS DAILY TRANSPORTS" 4,000,000

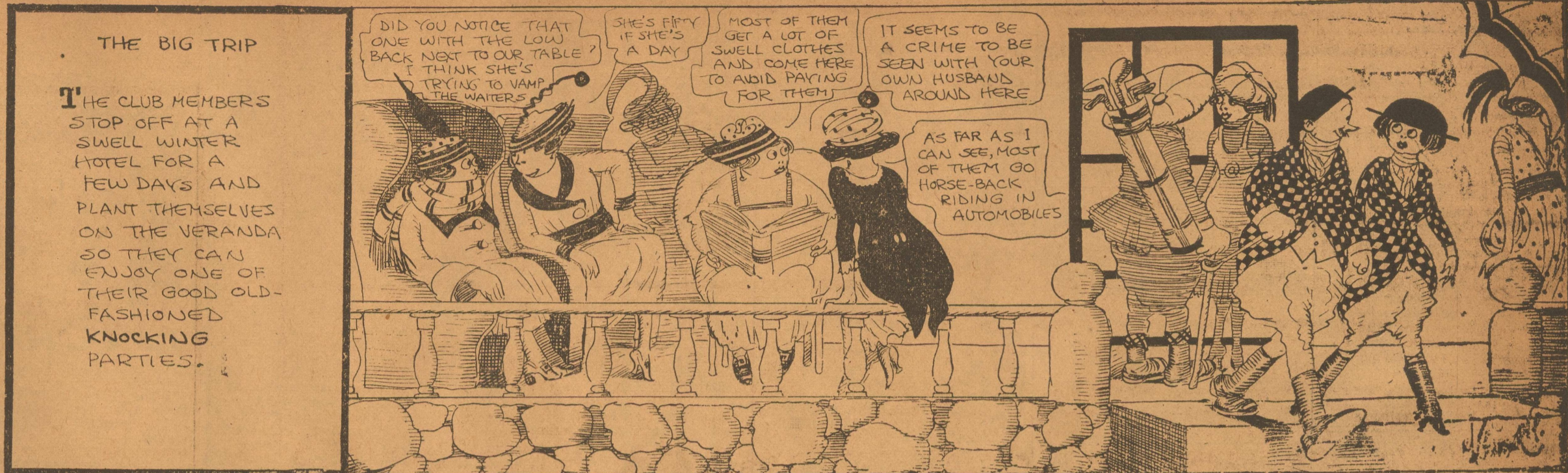

STEAM DEVICE KILLS WEEDS ON RAILROADS

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal. Feb. 10. Apparatus to kill weeds with superheated steam, the invention of two Texas railroad men, is nearing completion in San Bernardino shops. It is designed to keep railroad tracks free from vegetable growth.

STEPHENS CO. POOL LEADER FOR THE WEEK

BRECKENRIDGE, Feb. 10.-When the civil war ended there were more Tonkawa Indians in and around Breckenridge than pale faces. When the Spanish-American war ended, there were possibly 700 white people and no Tonkawas. Today there are about 5,000 people in Breckenridge, including the transient population.

Stephens county has about a mile and a half of railroad which traverses an extreme southeast portion of the county. There are four railroads, one from the north, from New Castle, and one from the south, one from Caddo, Eastland and Ranger, each-all four racing against time to reach Breckenridge, the county seat and geographical center of the county.

The thing that has militated against the progress and development of the county has been lack of transportation facilities.

When this important fact became fully realized, the citizens who were getting rich in oil and had been richer had they not been so handicapped, got themselves together in a determination to remedy the matter. On Nov. 15, by a popular vote, the county with a unanimity of sentiment passed \$3,500,000 good roads bonds for permanent highways. They also got busy with the four railroad projects and today within a mile of the corporation line may be seen a great force of teams at work throwing up the grade for the Ranger roads to the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad.

The Cisco railroad also has its engineering forces laying out the road and surveying the route and they are practically within sight of the corporation limits. The grade of this road is completed into the county to a point about eight miles south of Breckenridge and the force of men are extending the grade as fast as the weather will permit.

The Eastland road, now known as the "Ringling road," has its railroad jump well within the limits of Stephens county.

The Wichita Falls road, which now has its terminal at Newcastle, is under contract with the citizens' committee, which has met every condition imposed and will have their line into Breckenridge soon enough to connect with the Ranger road, thus having trunk line connections north and south.

The Cisco road will continue through Breckenridge to Caddo, as announced by its promoters, and it is contemplated that this road will extend to Mineral Wells.

The definite points of contact with trunk lines will have their line into Breckenridge soon enough to connect with the Ranger road, thus having trunk line connections north and south.

Aside from the highway and steam transportation facilities, which are practically guaranteed, the citizens of Breckenridge are very much encouraged over the proposed Fort Worth, Mineral Wells & Breckenridge interurban.

It seems that sufficient progress has been made on this project to assure that the interurban will be built from Fort Worth to Mineral Wells. From Mineral Wells west to Breckenridge, the project is more or less in an incomplete state. There is quite a large engineering force divided into two crews making a thorough and exhaustive survey between these two points. Mineral Wells and Park Pinto have so far met with the requirements asked by the promoter. Breckenridge has not yet finished her quota asked by the promoter, because the situation has not been sufficiently canvassed. People here really believe there is a good prospect for the interurban to be built into Breckenridge.

Breckenridge was incorporated in March, 1919, and is not yet a year old as an incorporated town. Already surveys and blueprints have been made for a complete water system for the town, to supplant the inadequate water system it has now. Contract has been let for the building of a sixty-five-acre reservoir, two miles from town by private individuals, but no contract has been made to supply the town from this source; but the big problem of a water supply for the town.

city will be solved by the big men of the town, who are now wrestling with it.

Precautionary measures against disease epidemics are being taken by the citizens and officials of the town. The state health officer, Dr. Goddard, at the invitation of the citizens' committee, has sent Mr. Eggart, their sanitary engineer, to make a survey of conditions here. Ordinances have been prepared under his suggestion, and remedial measures have been provided to take care of the situation.

The Red Cross chapter has planned a clean-up campaign and the Chamber of Commerce, the city and county commissions and the public schools and civic clubs have all agreed to take part in the campaign.

The town of Breckenridge owns none of the public utilities, but private interests have established a water works plant, a natural gas plant for domestic purposes, and fuel in unlimited quantities. The telephone company has been reorganized, and a wide extension of its service throughout the oil fields is promised. Although an inland town, the Western Union telegraph office is now furnishing telegraph service. The city, of course, contemplates the installation of a complete sewer system, and it is also contemplated that bonds will be issued in due time for street paving. However, the city planners intend to have all the water, gas and sewer pipes laid on the streets before the paving is done, so that the streets will not be constantly torn up, as is noticeable in other places.

The roads to Breckenridge during the rainy spells, like most every other place this winter, have been impassable at times, but the last few days a clear weather and sunshine have dried them up and there is a noticeable flux of transients. The city street commissioner is now grading the principal streets in the city, and contract has been let by the Chamber of Commerce to a local contracting firm to drag, drain, ditch and grade daily the road south from Breckenridge to the Eastland county line, until the middle of April. A sufficient force of teams and men will patrol this road and keep it open and passable for all kinds of traffic until the railroad gets to Breckenridge.

The Chamber of Commerce has just been organized at the beginning of the year, and in a two days' whirlwind campaign for membership, raised a \$15,000 budget for the year 1920, with a \$5,000 supplementary fund for the roads and streets. A very attractive motto has been adopted for the club as follows:

"If you want to kick, kick in it" and every progressive of the town has "kicked in" and become a live member of the club. The secretary is being overwhelmed with inquiries for information concerning the oil field and especially business opportunities. The best advice he has been able to give was to "come and see for yourself" in every direction from the court house there is visible on the horizon oil derricks, and from one vantage point in the city. 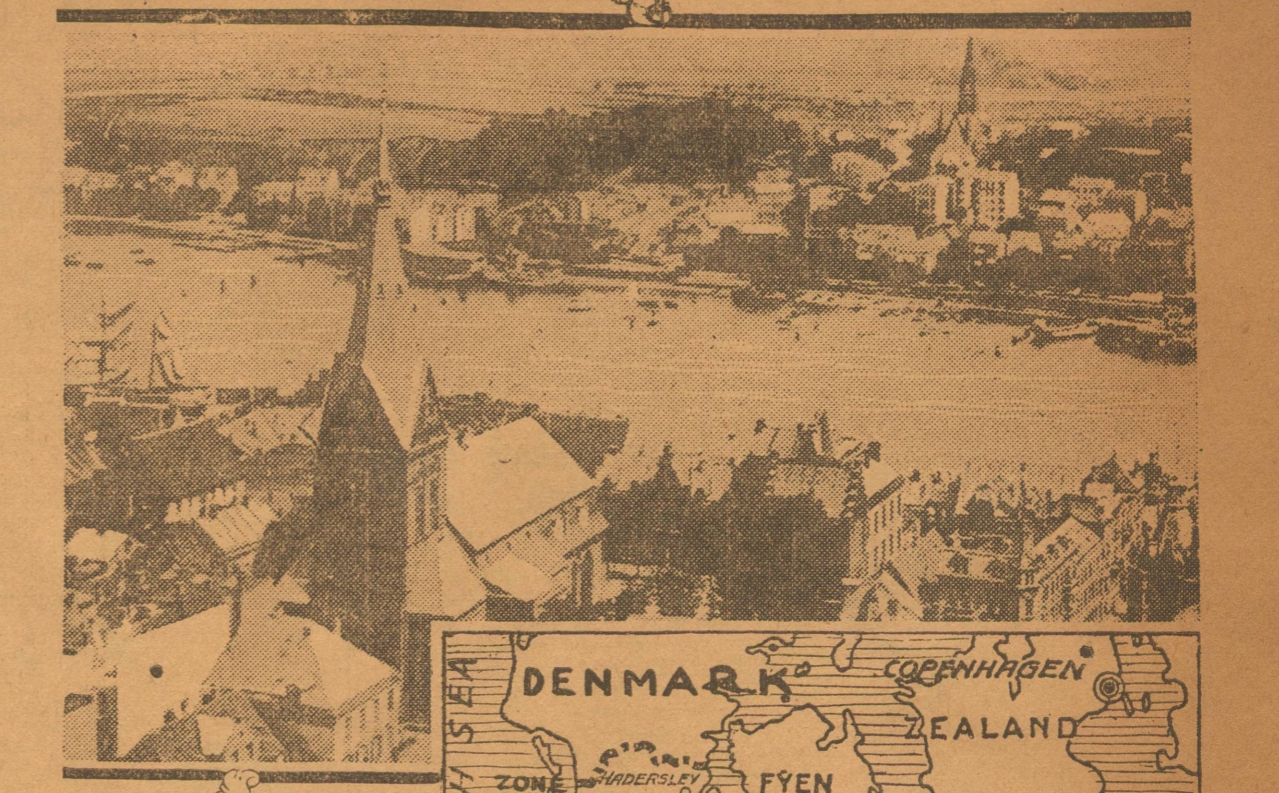

VETERAN WILL GIVE LECTURE AT NEAR DATE

Sergeant-Major A. J. David, late of the Fifteenth Battalion, Australian Imperial Forces, will give a lecture under the auspices of the John Barnes Post of the American Legion in the near future. This will undoubtedly be of great interest to the people of Ranger, especially to those who were in any way connected with our forces during the war.

Mr. David is an able speaker and will give a complete resume of the part played by the Australian forces during the conflict, as well as relating many of the trying experiences which he himself as a member of that historic battalion underwent.

He served at the Gallipoli Peninsula for four months. He was badly wounded there and after some time spent in hospital saw service in Egypt at the Suez canal. From there he was transferred back to France, where, on account of his linguistic ability he was used as an interpreter. On November 1, 1916, while engaged in the great Arras offensive he was taken prisoner by the Prussian Guards and while in captivity was confined at the prison camps of Munster, Cottbus, Minden and Delmar. Cottbus, the last place he was confined, was but one hundred and twenty kilometers from Berlin.

David was in Berlin two days after the revolution which saw the downfall of the imperial forces and was an eye witness to the fighting in front of the Reichstag. He was released and exchanged on December 2, 1918.

This lecture, together with a good program of military interest, will be announced later through the columns of the Times. The time and place will be decided upon at the next meeting of the local post of the American Legion.
