CLOSING ORDER LIFTED; THEATRES WILL OPEN SATUR

R. R. CROSSING HEAR

The special commission named to hear the testimony in the condemnation suit started by the Wichita Falls, Ranger & Fort Worth railroad against the Texas & Pacific railroad to affect a grade crossing a mile north of the station at Ranger, met Friday morning in the office of Mayor M. H. Hagaman, and adjourned pending the settlement of the restraining order which T. & P. counsel has secured. The commission, comprising Dr. J. A. Shakelford, Ralph G. Stockman and G. A. Clements, elected Mr. Stockman chairman and decided to reconvene at 10 a. m. Monday.

The restraining order, issued through the county court, claime that the amount of the damages, if any. suffered by the Texas & Pacific, cannot be determined until the railroad commission, meeting in Austin, settles the question as to the way the crossing should be made, a matter that is scheduled for hearing Feb. 17.

Attorneys of both railroad companies are in conference in Fort Worth today. It is the hope of the Wichita Falls, Ranger & Fort Worth counsel to have the crossing hearing in Austin expedited.



The order closing all theaters, churches, schools and public gatherings generally will be lifted Saturday, and all theaters will be permitted to open Saturday night, on the recommendation of Dr. C. O. Terrell, city health officer. Improved conditions in the influenza fight are responsible for lifting the ban on public gatherings.

The theaters, cabarets and dance halls have been closed since Wednesday morning, at which time the closing order went into effect.

Unless conditions change, the city schools will be opened Monday morning.

At the time the order was placed in effect, Dr. Terrell stated that the extent of the influenza in Ranger did not justify calling it an epidemic, but he said that a closing order was the best step to stop a possible spread of the disease to proportions that would make the fight much more difficult.



CISCO, Tex., Feb. 6.—The influenza situation in this city is still serious. City Health Officer Joseph W. Gregory reports approximately 300 cases on hand now. About 30 per cent. of these are of a severe type. About thirty of pneumonia have developed in the city since last Friday. Two deaths have occured with pneumonia deaths have occured with pneumonia complications within the past two days. No drastic steps have been taken by the local health board. Two years ago when the influenza epidemic appeared in this city all business houses were closed for several weeks, and no good seemed to come from such a bar. The city is cleaning up as fast as possible.




