FRENCH LAW **IS SEVERE ON** WAR WIDOWS

By NEWTON C. PARKE, International News Service. PARIS, Feb. 14.—About 40,000 widows of French soldiers reported "missing" during the war now find themselves in the tragically peculiar of being neither widows nor wives in the eyes of the law.

Until the death of their husbands i entered legally upon the record books a process requiring from two to thiryears, they can neither remarry, in herit the property of their dead hus-bands, nor sell any of his effects Members of the Chamber of Deputies are now studying methods of amelior ating their situation.

More than 100,000 French soldier. were listed as "missing" at the end o the war. In thousands of cases, the deaths were practically proven by the testimony of fellow so'diers who say men blown to bits by shells or wit nessed their death behind the enem; lines. In these cases, the widows mus obtain the testimony of their with es and accompany it with a certifi-cate of birth of her dead husband, in itself open to a process lasting sev-eral months. But so many applications for thes documents have been received at the Ministry of War that 1,200 employes, occupied almost exclusively with this question, find themselves swamped The ministry hopes to dispose of this class of cases within eighteen months but it is by no means certain that it will be able to do so.

The cases of women whose hus bands have simply vanished without traces are much more difficult to un tangle. The last parliament voted measure to provide that all missing soldiers should be declared dead after a period of two years had elapsed since formal notice had been served of their disappearance. But it wa further provided that no notice could be served until six months after the cessation of hostilities.





Other sections of the measure would declare all Indians of onecighth or more blood, who shall have reached the age of 21 years, or who shall have taken the prescribed oath ' a regular soldier of the United 'totes, to be full citizens of the Unit-

ed States. Subject to a reading and writing test. after 1929 all Indian graduates of the reservation would be declared full citizens on reaching 21 years of age.

Testifying before the house com-mittee. Dr. Dixon charged that the commissioner of Indian affairs does not believe in Indian citizenship, and that he had prohibited the delivery to Indians in some sections of copies of testimony before the house military committee in 1917, when Dr. Dixon argued for the recruiting of ten or more regiments of Indian cavalry for use in the war. Under a ruling by the attorney general, the commission er of Indian affairs was held to have mail of Indians as the warden of renitentiary in preventing the deliv of mail to convicts. 
