EASTLAND COUNTY LIQUOR CASE REVERSED

CISCO PLANS ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION

American Legion, Gridiron Warriors and Chicken Fanatics Arranging Program.

CISCO, Nov. 4.—Armistice Day will be celebrated in fitting fashion in Cisco Nov. 11th. In addition to the usual features connected with Armistice Day celebrations, the day will be the concluding day of the big Bankhead Poultry Show and the final football game between Oil Belt teams will be played between Ranger Bulldogs and Cisco Lobos. A magnificent parade will be staged in the early afternoon.

Armistice Day has for the past several years been a big day in Cisco and in so far as known the Cisco celebration will be the only celebration of Armistice Day in the Oil Belt territory. The American Legion in co-operation with the Chamber of Commerce, public schools, and all civic organizations of the city have united in staging this celebration. Practically every business house and civic organization of the city will enter a decorated car or float in the parade and the city will be decorated and especially lighted for the occasion.

The poultry show will be the final poultry show of the season and the largest exhibit of blooded poultry ever brought together in Eastland County is expected to be on hand. Handsome cash prizes and ribbons together with a silver loving cup are provided for the winners. One special feature will be the Cisco Cup offered for annual competition for the best display of birds of all varieties. Any exhibitor who wins three times earns permanent possession of the cup. All varieties of chickens and turkeys are provided for in the show and in addition to the regular breeds special and grand championships are provided.

The football game in the afternoon is expected to draw a great crowd despite the fact that Ranger has been defeated. Comparative scores mean nothing where Cisco and Ranger teams are involved and the game is always a struggle when Cisco and Ranger meet. Cisco has won over Ranger for the last two years, but by a one touchdown margin each time. Ranger will have their men in the best of condition for the game and the Lobos will have a mighty struggle on their hands.

Nov. 11th will be a day long remembered in Cisco and the celebration is expected to be one of the greatest ever staged in the Oil Belt.

Candidate Dies Immediately After Winning Election

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 4.—As election returns piled up a majority that made his election certain, Judge John M. Patterson, republican candidate for district attorney, died in a hospital here. A relapse of Judge Patterson, who was recovering from an operation, caused the rushing of stickers containing the name of Fred Shower to polling places with orders from the republican organization leaders to switch the vote to the latter for fear of Patterson's death. Patterson, however, piled up a majority of more than 50,000, polling 177,527 votes to Shower's 123,616.

ADVERTISE FOR PAVING BIDS ON ONE PIKE TAIL

Extension of Main Street, Ranger To Complete New Pike To Breckenridge.

"What's the good of a perfectly good, smooth pike with a wiggle in its tail?" was the question asked the Ranger city commission Tuesday whereupon the commissioners proceeded to vote to advertise for bids to pave the rough stretch of road beyond the Leveille-Maher establishment on West Main street so there will be no break in the paved pike to Breckenridge. The stretch of street will be paved with brick and some asphalt preparation, it is said. It was voted to advertise in the Ranger Times for bids and it is contemplated that the work will be done as soon as the legal 10-day limit for advertising has expired, provided a satisfactory bid is made.

RAILROAD ASKS RANGER FOR FRANCHISE

Hamon-Kell Railroad Suggests Omission Should Be Corrected Now.

It reads like a joke—it is a joke on somebody that all these years the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth Railway has been operating in Ranger without a city franchise. The joke no doubt is on the railroad and the city officials who, from time to time, have let the matter rest along the road functioning under its state franchise only. Nobody seems the worse for it, but after paying out hundreds of thousands of dollars to procure the road for Ranger, the little item of granting it a franchise seems to have been let go as negligible.

That is now to be corrected, according to the City Commissioners, who, at the instance of M. W. Tobin, right of way and claim agent and J. R. Toland, chief clerk of the "Hamon-Kell" road, went before the Ranger City Commission with the draft of a franchise which will, it is said, either in its present form or some modified form, be early enacted into an ordinance, it is said. The document was thought too long for immediate action, it is stated, but will be gone over and acted on in the very near future.

Rotarians Planning To Make Inter-City Meet Big Occasion

After wading through a maze of impossible nicknames and trying to ascertain whether it was the Chamber of Commerce secretary or President Thurman's "hoon days" that were on trial—the one for getting framed at Abilene, the other for catching a wolf by the wrong foot, it was developed at the Ranger Rotary club meeting today that Raymond Teal should be a singing evangelist and that he modestly admits the inter-city program he and "Gold Dust" and "Baldy" have arranged will be the nation's records in that forthcoming inter-city meet to be held in and around the Gholson, Nov. 18.

Luncheon, dancing, bridge, two real orators, reminiscences, and half a dozen other things are to be features of the occasion it is stated. Every Rotarian up to 100 per cent or more—and every Rotary Ann of Cisco, Eastland and Ranger is expected to attend. Heavy penalties for absence are to be assessed, it is announced.

These tri-yearly meets, the last of which was held on the banks of the big dam in Cisco, are said to be growing in importance. But Ranger Rotarians do not hesitate to say they will reach their acme—their ultimate proportions—their last word in real good old times at this Gholson meet on the eighteenth.

TAMMANY HAS BIG MAJORITY IN NEW YORK

Boston To Have a Republican Mayor. Election Returns Over the Country.

By United Press. NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Tammany Hall captured New York by an overwhelming majority in yesterday's election, and State Senator James K. Walker is New York's mayor elect. With only a few of the city's 3,073 election districts unreported, Walker's majority over Frank D. Waterman, Republican candidate, is 399,085 and is expected to pass the 400,000 mark. All five of the present borough presidents were re-elected.

SPECIAL EXAMINATION FOR TEACHERS TO BE HELD

Miss Beulah Speer, county superintendent of Eastland county, is in receipt of a letter from the state department of education at Austin advising her that the state superintendent has directed that an examination for certificates of the second class be given on Nov. 13 and 14, but authority to hold such examinations is to be given only to such county superintendents who indicate by letter or telegram on or before Nov. 9 that they have applicants who desire to take such examination.

Miss Speer is anxious for those who wish to take such examination to advise her at once in order that she may notify the state department in time to be given the authority to hold the examination. This is a special examination given to accommodate such persons as need to complete some building on an elementary certificate of the second class or to obtain an elementary certificate of the second class in order to teach some school already arranged for.

Two Cities Will Get New Pike As Christmas Gift

Ranger and Breckenridge are to have a brand new Christmas gift, according to G. D. Macey, superintendent of construction on the Pleasant Grove highway which is being rebuilt between Ranger and Morton Valley school house, where it will connect with the Eastland-Breckenridge pike and give Ranger and Breckenridge direct connection via paved pike, reducing the distance between the two cities to 36.3 miles, by state highway measurements.

Long before Christmas, in fact by the end of the present week, if weather conditions are favorable, Mr. Macey expects to complete the foundation on this road, after that, he states, there will be at no time more than a mile's detour and automobiles will have a good hard road to travel over except where workmen will be spreading the amecite. In all probability, travel between Breckenridge and Ranger will open up by the end of this week with that handicap. Should weather conditions continue favorable, it is Mr. Macey's opinion it will be less than a month until the topping will be on the pike completed. However, this season of the year is not counted on for uniform good weather so the conservative estimate of the new pike as a Christmas gift is made with entire safety.

The actual distance from Ranger to Breckenridge via the new route will be as follows: Ranger to Morton Valley school (where the road intersects the Eastland-Breckenridge pike) 7.8 miles; Morton Valley to Cisco-Breckenridge pike intersection, 5.6 miles; Cisco-Breckenridge intersection to Breckenridge, 23.1 miles. Total distance, 36.5 miles. The distance from Ranger to Eastland over the present route is 10.2 miles and the distance from Eastland to Morton Valley school, 5 miles, making a total of 15.2 miles. The total distance to Breckenridge over the present route is therefore, 7.4 miles greater than over the new road, or 43.9 miles. These are the official figures of the State Highway Department and are considerably in excess of many of known speedometer records.

REPUBLICAN MAYOR IS ELECTED IN BOSTON

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—Complete returns from yesterday's mayoralty election show Malcolm E. Nichols, Republican, victor in a field of ten candidates by a plurality of more than 22,000. This gives Boston its first Republican mayor in eighteen years.

REPUBLICAN MAYOR IS RE-ELECTED IN KANSAS CITY

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 4.—Mayor Albert I. Beach, Republican, was returned to office for four years in Kansas City's first municipal election under the new charter, yesterday, by several hundred votes.

DRIVING WHILE INTOXICATED IS PUNISHED

May Also Be Basis for Having Previous Suspended Sentence Revoked.

O. E. Smith of Ranger was found guilty on a charge of driving an automobile on the public highways while in a state of intoxication and sentenced to a term of 60 days in the county jail by a jury in the Eighty-eighth district court, Tuesday. The verdict was returned about 8 o'clock Tuesday night. Smith, who is a young man, is under suspended sentence on a forgery charge, and the county attorney will now seek to have Smith's suspended sentence in the former case revoked. Smith has already been in the Eastland county jail 42 days, but will not get credit for this time on his 60-day term imposed by the jury, officers say.

GOVERNMENT FILES BRIEF IN CHEMICAL FOUNDATION SUIT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The federal government today filed in the United States supreme court its brief in the Chemical Foundation suit, in which the United States is trying to recover title to about \$7,000,000 worth of German owned patents seized during the war and sold by Alien Property Custodian Garvis to the Chemical Foundation, of which he was an officer. "These sales violated every known rule of law as to sales by an officer of the United States of property in his possession," Solicitor General William Mitchell said in his brief.

FOUR KENTUCKIANS KILLED IN ELECTION QUARRELS

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 4.—Four Kentuckians were killed in election quarrels last night, according to reports received here today. William Gilbert and a man named Maples were said to have engaged in a duel at High Spring, and fatally wounded each other. They quarreled over the municipal election, reports said. One man was slain and four wounded in an election fight near Whitesburg. Robert Cole, of Poor Fork, was shot and killed by Robert Daviestan in an election row.

ANTI-KLAN CANDIDATE VICTOR IN DETROIT

DETROIT, Nov. 4.—Mayor John W. Smith of Detroit, seeking return to office on an anti-klan platform, decisively defeated his klan opponent, Charles Bowles, in yesterday's municipal election.

CARBON YOUTH HELD CHARGED WITH BURGLARY

Arrested in Eastland While Peddling Goods Identified As Stolen.

Odus Caffey, 21, of near Carbon, was arrested in Eastland, Monday evening, and is being held in the county jail on a charge of burglary. Caffey, when arrested by Deputy Sheriff Virge Foster, was peddling knives, razors, barbers' clippers, jewelry, etc., and also had with him some money, \$1.85 of which was in pennies. He told the officers that he had purchased the things he was selling from a man who claimed to be a cousin of his, but whom he did not know and had never seen before. The officers doubted his story and placed him in jail.

Tuesday morning he told the officers, after they had made an investigation and learned that the Carbon Mercantile company's store at Carbon had been burglarized about two weeks ago, that what he had told them about the goods and the other property was not true; that he had a Buick car parked on the south side of the courthouse just in front of the sheriff's office and that they would find more goods in it. This proved true and a suitcase containing shoes, a suit of clothing, shirts, etc., was found in the car. W. W. Speer of the Carbon Mercantile company came to Eastland and identified the goods found in Caffey's possession as belonging to his firm and as being a part of those taken from his store when it had been burglarized some days ago. Caffey then admitted that he entered the store and took the goods, about \$100 worth in all. He told the officers that he left Eastland late in the afternoon, Sunday a week ago, and reached Carbon shortly after dark and went directly to the Carbon Mercantile company's store and gained an entrance to it by breaking a small hole in the glass of a rear door and reaching his arm in and working the lock.

The proprietors of the store had not informed the sheriff's department of the fact that their store had been burglarized. They explained this by saying that they had believed that they knew who the guilty parties were and thought that they would catch them with the goods themselves. The parties they had in mind as the ones who entered the store were altogether different parties, however, they stated. Caffey told the officers he had known of a number of other boys who had burglarized stores and dwellings over the country, but all of them had been arrested by the officers and that most of them were in the reformatory or out under suspended sentences.

MRS. DREW NOTED SCREEN COMEDienne, IS DEAD

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 4.—Mrs. Lucille McVey Drew, noted screen and stage comedienne, was dead here today following a lingering illness. Mrs. Drew, who was 35 years old, appeared with her husband, the late Sidney Drew, in film comedies, depicting domestic troubles. She was an aunt by marriage of Lionel Barrymore. Her husband died in 1919.

Giant Liner Tossed About By Waves and Passengers Buffeted

SOUTHAMPTON, England, Nov. 4.—The Cunard liner Berengaria arrived here today with 26 passengers slightly injured during the Saturday and Sunday storm, when the giant liner fought waves 40 and 50 feet high. They were cut and bruised by being hurled against the bulkheads. Damage estimated at \$10,000 was done to furniture and crockery. Passengers said they were hurried about as though they were feathers as the waves buffeted the ship.

TRIBESMEN IN DAMASCUS ARE BETWEEN FIRES

Grief, Poverty and Hunger on One Side, Demands of French on Other.

DAMASCUS, Nov. 4.—Damascus is quiet now after its recent troubles and the French bombardment of the city, yet there is a tenseness to the atmosphere that may presage more trouble for the pearl city of the desert. Through the ruins of the bombardment, sorrowing tribesmen are searching for their dead and the hungry are looking for food. Thousands are homeless and many leaving the city. The homeless are huddled in the Silicia quarter. Women whose religion demands they hide their faces from the gaze of man are fleeing unveiled and some of them garbed in men's clothing.

The authorities are pressing the city for payment of indemnity, rifles and money. The money toll mounts higher as the city fails to deliver the rifles the French have demanded. Many prominent Moslems have been arrested. In a letter being made by County Agent R. H. Bush to the members of the Eastland county boys' agricultural clubs, announcement is made that substantial premiums are to be given to those members who excel in the keeping of both individual and club record books. These books must be completed and in the hands of the authorities at College Station not later than the fifteenth of this month. Prizes are also being offered for competition among Eastland county clubs alone, the Texas State bank of Eastland having offered a silver loving cup to the boy or girl submitting the best record on poultry work. The Connellee theatre of Eastland is issuing passes to club members who turn in completed record books.

PRIZES OFFERED MEMBERS BOYS' AGRICULTURAL CLUBS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The United States destroyers Lamson and Coughlan, at Alexandria, have been requested by Paul Knabesshue, American consul at Beirut, Syria, to proceed to that port as a precautionary measure, the state department was notified today. The consul said that while there was no immediate danger he thought it would be wise to have the warships on hand.

MRS. AL MORTON DIES IN HOME NEAR EASTLAND

Mrs. Al Morton, Eastland county pioneer citizen, died at the family home about midway between Eastland and Ranger and near the Bankhead highway, this morning. Death followed a second stroke of paralysis, it is stated. Funeral arrangements had not been completed this morning. Mrs. Morton is survived by her husband and several children, and a sister and two brothers, Mrs. Briggs Owen of Eastland, E. D. Dulin of Eastland and W. A. Dulin of Mitchell county.

DISSENTER IN BROWN APPEAL IS OVERRULED

Each Judge Court of Criminal Appeals Writes Opinion In The Case.

AUSTIN, Nov. 4.—All three judges of the court of criminal appeals wrote opinions today in reversing and remanding a liquor case, that of J. O. Brown, who had been given a prison sentence of one year in Eastland county for selling intoxicants. The court, however, was divided. Judge Hawkins wrote the opinion for reversal and Presiding Judge Morrow concurred, giving his views in a written opinion. Judge Lattimore disagreed and wrote a dissenting opinion.

It was the second time this term that the court has been divided in deciding a liquor case. In reversing the Brown verdict, the majority of the court of criminal appeals held that as the indictment charged a sale had been made to three parties it was incumbent upon the state to show proof, which had not been done.

ATTORNEYS FOR ROAD COMPANY DISCUSS SUITS

Confer With Attorney General and Delay Filing of Petitions. AUSTIN, Nov. 4.—Joe Worsheim of Dallas, general attorney for the American Road Company and Judge Ireland Graves of Austin, also of counsel for that company, were in conference this morning with Attorney General Dan Moody. It was said this conference had delayed the filing of suits by the attorney general for cancellation of certain road maintenance contracts. The filing was expected this morning, the petitions having been completed yesterday. It was stated today the investigation by the Travis County grand jury into State highway matters is to be continued notwithstanding suits are to be filed.

ARGENTINE FLIER ON FLIGHT TO NEW YORK

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Nov. 4.—Guillermo Chillcoat, Argentinian flier, accompanied by Francisco Romay, Mexican, began here today an airplane flight to New York. Starting at 5 a. m. they set a course for Salta, which they hoped to reach this afternoon. They planned to cross the Andes to Calama, Chile, tomorrow at a point not hitherto attempted. A landing on this part of the trip would be equivalent to disaster because of the rough nature of the country.

TWO-MASTED SCHOONER, UNMANNED, FOUND DRIFTING

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Nov. 4.—Crippled and unmanned, a two-masted schooner was found drifting today off Star Island. The craft, minus all sails except her jib, carried a cargo of lumber. The fate of her crew has not been determined. Six coast-guardsmen boarded the schooner and planned to work her into Gloucester, if possible.

NEW AIRMAIL ROUTES TO BE STARTED IN SPRING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Operation of five new airmail routes to act as feeders for the trans-continental system has been delayed until spring. Contractors awarded the lines have convinced the government it is not feasible to start operations in the winter. March has been set as the tentative date. Chicago, Dallas and Fort Worth are among the cities affected.

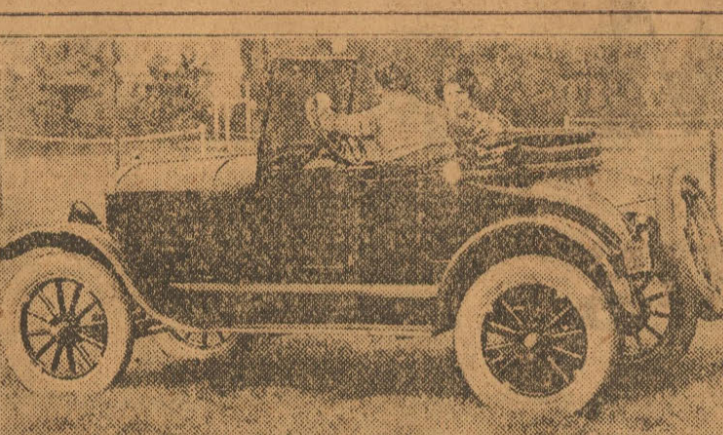

**Grand Jury To Investigate Student Paper Attacking College Morals**

GRAND FORKS, N. D., Nov. 4.—The "Harpoon," the deadly pink sheet, 3,000 of which were distributed one night at the University of North Dakota last Spring, will be investigated by a district court grand jury meeting today.

At the opening of college this year, President Kane announced that the authors were known and that none were in school this year.

The "Harpoon" struck terror to the hearts of students and faculty when it was found one morning at the doors of fraternity houses and dormitories. It dealt in no insinuations, but, calling a spade a spade, made open charges, ranging from immorality, drunkenness and doping down to parsimony, egotism, and imbecility.

Exposés in The Harpoon ranged from alleged "insides" on University politics, to purported glimpses of Sunday evening darkened parlors and drinking bouts. One "real party" was described in detail to protect "susceptible, unsophisticated maidens off the farm" from the "glib-tongued fast set."

Students and professors both men and women were vigorously attacked. No serious charges, however, were made against any of the women members of the faculty.

One professor was likened to a "he-duck" with a "dried-up-potato-like face that takes on the official opiate grin," having a "weezened, drug-soaked neck," being "deceitful, hypocritical, low and mean," and "given to attempts to seduce young co-eds."

Last Spring faculty investigators were said to have traced the printing to a shop in a small North Dakota town, but the owner of the shop was unable to identify any of the students in the University year book as those who brought him copy.

No charge was so revolting that the "Harpoon" softened the attack by leaving the names to imagination. Nothing in the history of the university ever caused so much comment or such bitter denunciation.
