# SOVIET SAYS TO

Former Patriarch of All-Russia to Be Arraigned for Trial.

By United Press.

LONDON, April 6.-A mob of more than 10,000 Poles attempted to storm the Russian legation at Warsaw today in a protest against the execution of the Catholic prelate, Monsignor Butchkavitch, shot by a firing squad last Saturday, according to the London Evening News. Mounted police broke up the attack.

Fifty persons were reported injured in anti-Semitic demonstrations in Warsaw last night before the military interferred to stop the

Indignation over the execution of Monsignor Butchkavitch now is mingled with apprehension over the probable fate of the Most Rev. Dr. Tickhon, former patriarch of all Russia, who is to be tried April 11 for resistance to the soviet system.

Russia has informed Great Britain that it is impossible to alter the original soviet reply to this country's protest against the execution of the Catholic prelates and hope is expressed that England will refrain from interference with Russia's internal af-

Alabama Senator Denounces Speech By Chairman So-Called Workers' Party.

By Associated Press WASHINGTON, April 6 .- A finish ight by preachers of the United States against the doctrine of comnunism was urged in a statement issued Thursday by Senator Heflin, Democrat, Alabama. He attacked in particular a speech delivered here Wednesday night by J. P. Cannon, described as chairman of the workers' party of America.

Remarks attributed to Cannon urgng communist ideas as against Christian tenets were characterized by Mr. Heflin as a bold attack on constitutional government delivered in the capital of the nation.

"At the Milwaukee plant a difficulty was encountered soon after its' construction which called for the work of the chemical engineer. From the sewage treated daily 1,275,000 gallons of sludge, containing 98 per cent water is obtained," said Dr. Wilson. "In the winter time the dewatering of this sludge, or muddy sediment, is extremely difficult."

By the introduction of sulfuric acid in certain quantities, and also heating the sludge, it was found that the finely divided particles united to form larger clots and thus increased the filtering efficiency of sludge in February nearly 25 times as fast as its natural rate.

It was also found that by introducng slightly more sulfuric acid and adding one pound of alum to each 50 gallons of sludge the relative filefficiency is increased to 40 times its natural rate. Alum, however, is so expensive that its use is warranted only when the sludge is in its poorest condition.
