CHANGES OCCUR AT RANGER CITY HALL

GRAIN FUTURES ACT IS HELD AS CONSTITUTIONAL

Supreme Court Approves Second Effort of Congress to Regulate Exchanges.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The supreme court of the United States today placed its seal of approval on the second attempt of congress to regulate the grain exchanges of the country. It declared constitutional the grain futures act passed by congress last fall, which brings the principal grain exchanges of the country under governmental control and provides that farmers co-operative associations shall be admitted to membership on the exchanges.

About a year ago the court declared unconstitutional the first grain futures act passed by congress.

Speeding Auto Kills Two and Injures Others

PITTSFIELD, Mass., April 16.—Hurling out of a hail storm into a helpless group of persons waiting for a trolley car, an automobile driven by Fred Miller crushed two lives, injured two others and carried off a 3-year-old baby, tossed into the tonneau by the crash.

Miller was arrested today on a charge of murder. The death car, blood-stained and with shattered windshield, was found in his yard after police had hunted throughout the night, following the accident late Sunday.

LANDAU, GERMAN AUTHOR, PLACED CURSE ABOUT FICTITIOUS TOMB

BERLIN, April 16.—The Earl of Carnarvon's death, following so closely on his successful excavations in the Valley of the Kings at Luxor, has led the German to dust off a literary parallel to his case written in 1888 by a German author, Paul Landau. Landau created one professor Andreas Moeller, who succeeded in unearthing the tomb of a fictitious Syrian king named Zydou, which dated back a thousand years. Zydou's sarcophagus bore the inscription:

"Human: Open not my death chamber. If you do open my death shrine and disturb my rest, then you will find no rest on earth. Your blood shall boil in your arteries and your limbs shall be rendered numb."

Frightened by this curse Professor Moeller abandoned his plans for breaking into the king's actual resting place. In Carnarvon's death the Germans say Landau's problem of "revenge of the mummies" seemed to have found a basis in reality.

WEST TEXAS COTTON ACREAGE TO BE LARGE

FORT WORTH, April 16.—West Texas farmers, foreseeing, as they believe, high prices even for a record acreage of cotton, are making ready a vast area of land that has never been under the plow, according to reports received here.

In sections where excessive rainfall and cold weather caused the corn to fail of germination, the land is being plowed and planted in cotton.

The Rio Grande valley reports a heavy acreage and the Panhandle is seeing an average in the high altitude and the consequent freedom from boll weevil.

"BRONZE AGE" GRAVE

EDINBURGH.—A grave, believed to be 2,000 years old, has been discovered in Kincardineshire, Scotland. Digging on his farm, a Catterline farmer came upon a peculiarly marked slab about four feet below the surface, and under this were four other slabs of larger size. Beneath all was a full-sized human skeleton, with an ancient urn beside the skull. Antiquarians pronounce the grave to be typical of the Bronze Age, and experts are further investigating the discovery.

People Coming

Rush of New Residents to Ranger Indicated by Large Quantity of Household Goods Being Shipped In.

Ranger's population is increasing. Proof of this assertion lies in the records of the American Express company and the Texas & Pacific railroad freight department books.

Monday morning, household goods and baggage arrived from different parts of the country via express that indicated at least ten families were destined for Ranger. C. E. Shields, Ranger representative of the American Express company, said. This is unusual, he said.

At the office of the railroad freight department, it was said that shipments of household goods have arrived here in larger numbers than freight employes expect for April. There were some shipments from Arkansas and East Texas, it was said.

The greatest long distance shipment was from Norwich, Vt., and the shortest from Mineral Wells, the American Express office official said. It is not uncommon to get four or five shipments of household goods here in one day via express, but the figure ten sets a record for this season of the year, Mr. Shields said.

Mile of West Main Street Graded, Gravelled and Put In Fine Order By Ranger Lions and Rotarians

The grading of West Main street, inaugurated by the Ranger Lions and accomplished by the combined work of the Ranger Lions and Rotarians, has been completed. The total expenditure of cash, which was raised by donations from the business men of the city, amounted to \$1,242.04. A few of the business men who had promised teams to aid in the work failed to keep their promises for the full period necessary, causing the expenditure of \$471 for team hire that otherwise would have been saved.

The Chestnut & Smith Corporation, the Prairie Oil & Gas Co., the Prairie Pipe Line Company and the Texas Pipe Line Company were the four leaders in furnishing teams.

Central Baptist Church Announces Revival Services

Definite decision was made at an afternoon session in the Central Baptist church yesterday to begin revival services Sunday, April 29. The Rev. A. L. Leake, pastor of the church, will conduct the services, and the Rev. G. O. Key of McKinney has been asked to assist in the series of meetings.

"This is to be strictly a soul-winning campaign, in which the cooperation of all Christian people is desired," said the Rev. Mr. Leake. "Personal announcements and invitations are to be sent to all pastors and congregations of Ranger. This meeting will continue two weeks."

It was decided to build a Sunday school annex to the tabernacle, and such other structures as may be needed to facilitate the work of the Bible school and other church organizations. A committee was appointed to devise ways and means and instructed to report at a meeting called for next Wednesday evening.

Notice was given that next Wednesday afternoon will be observed as Clean-up Day around the tabernacle. A driveway west of the church is to be constructed and a drainage system installed to carry water from the premises. Teams, trucks, plows and workmen have been promised to accomplish these tasks.

The Sunday morning attendance at Sunday school numbered 270 and the main auditorium was well filled at both morning and night services.

FAMILY IN PARADISE ILL FROM DRINKING POISONED WELL WATER

FORT WORTH, April 16.—Five persons, all members of the family of T. R. Burnett, a merchant of Paradise, are suffering today with an illness said to have been caused by drinking poisoned well water.

An analysis of the water in the well shows it to contain poison in large quantity. The poisoning of the water is said to have followed the burning of the Burnett store at Paradise and officers are making a close investigation.

All members of the family will recover, it was said.

ALLEGED SLAYER OF PANHANDLE RANCHMAN ARRAIGNED FOR TRIAL

CANADIAN, Texas, April 16.—A special venire of 110 men was being summoned today for the trial of William Mohler, who is charged by indictment with the murder of Noah Samples, an aged stock raiser of the Panhandle country. The trial was set to begin today.

Mohler was formerly an employe of Samples. He is in jail here and is said to have confessed to killing the aged cattleman, whose body was found in an abandoned cellar near here. Robbery is said to have been the incentive for the murder.

Counsel for the defense filed an application for a change of venue after the case was called.

The court adjourned until this afternoon to give the defense an opportunity to bring witnesses to support its contention that the defendant could not get a fair trial in Hemphill county.

MISS ROBERTSON GIVEN FEDERAL BUREAU JOB

WASHINGTON, April 16.—An executive order appointing Miss Alice Robertson, former member of congress from Oklahoma, as welfare worker in the Veterans' bureau was signed today by President Harding.

TAKE GERMAN BRIDES
LONDON, April 16.—From the date of the armistice until the beginning of 1923, 400 British soldiers on the Rhine married German women, according to official information.

When Building Begins Ranger Will Grow Fast

"When people get the building fever here, the city of Ranger will fill up," says C. E. Shields, American Express representative here.

Mr. Shields, traveling auditor for the American Express Co., previous to being assigned to the local office in the spring of 1921, says he believes Ranger deserves to be ranked as one of the three best towns on the Texas and Pacific route between Fort Worth and El Paso. He picked Abilene and Sweetwater as the two other progressive and growing cities.

"I have traveled through parts of Oklahoma and Texas in my work and it gave me opportunities to see towns before, during and after oil booms," he said today. "When homes were built in oil boom towns, the population would increase, and the town go ahead after the oil production fell off. We would see the same thing here if several men would put their money in real estate."

LEGISLATURE GOES ON JUNKET TRIP SATURDAY

Senate and House Will Throw Off Tax Cares and Play in Houston.

AUSTIN, April 16.—Senator Chas. Murphy of Houston was today unanimously chosen president pro tem of the senate for the second called session.

The senate, after organizing, adopted a resolution accepting an invitation to go to Houston Saturday, April 21, to attend the San Jacinto celebration. The house adopted a similar resolution.

The senate suspended the rules and passed the contingent expense bills, totaling \$110,000. These were the first measures introduced. The third bill was an educational budget bill, carrying an appropriation of \$5,654,000 for the first year and \$5,729,000 for the second year.

Senator Clark introduced a bill providing an appropriation of six million dollars for available school funds for the next two years.

Senator Dudley, who will resign as a member of the senate before May 1 to become mayor of El Paso, today resigned as chairman of the senate finance committee and asked that Vice Chairman Wood replace him.

Appropriation measures prepared by the senate finance committee before the convening of the present session were reported favorably today.

Eight bills were introduced in the house after the governor's message proposing eight tax measures was read. These included the so-called "quo warranto" bill sponsored by Governor Neff and seeking the removal of officials who fail to perform their duties as prescribed by oath. The bill failed to pass at the last session.

Other measures were: Bill by senator Melson seeking to repeal an act of the first session of the thirty-eighth legislature appropriating \$600,000 for a topographical and hydrographic survey of flood control and reclamation; by Simpson, a bill providing for occupational tax on interstate motor bus lines; by Green, an appropriation of \$5,000,000 and by Moore, an appropriation of \$6,000 for school aid; by Quaid, \$3,216,498 for support of the judicial department, including the salaries of judges; by Satterwhite, an appropriation of \$523,377.98 for the adjutant general's department, made necessary by the demand for martial law last Summer during the railroad shopmen's strike; by Patman, creating the state tax equalization board.

PASTOR ON SUNDAYS, SHERIFF ON WEEKDAYS, HE IS SOME SIN STOP

SOUR LAKE, Texas, April 16.—Pastor-Sheriff, is the position held by Charles Hughes here. He is known both as the Reverend Charles Hughes and as Sheriff Charlie Hughes.

On Sundays the Reverend Hughes preaches powerful sermons to his congregations. On week days Sheriff Hughes deals misery to bootleggers in this section.

"I've heard of the 'law and gospel' all my life, but this is the first time I ever saw them both together," was the remark of a bootlegger arrested by Hughes recently.

A pocket Bible and a pair of six guns make up the personal equipment of the sheriff-preacher when he goes bootlegger hunting.

Recently Hughes captured seven bootleggers before breakfast and at eleven o'clock of the same morning he preached a sermon at a revival meeting; at 2:00 p. m., he conducted a funeral service and at 8 p. m. he preached another sermon.

A raid on a still shortly after the sermon finished the pastor's daily duties.

MICHIGAN PRIEST GIVEN LIFE IMPRISONMENT TERM

KALAMAZOO, Mich., April 16.—Rev. Father Charles Dillon, confessed slayer of Rev. Father Henry O'Neil of St. Augustine Catholic church, was sentenced to life imprisonment by Judge Werner in circuit court this afternoon.

MILLIONS MUST BE OBTAINED BY STATE TAXATION

Governor Calls on Legislature to Devise Revenue Raising Measures.

AUSTIN, Texas, April 16.—Both houses of the legislature had quorums to answer roll calls when they assembled at 9 o'clock this morning for the second special session of the 38th legislature. In the senate 23 responded and in the house there were 103 members on hand.

Following the preliminary work of organization, the Governor's proclamation and first message were read. The governor has called on the legislature to enact revenue-raising measures first of all and suggests that these increase taxation on oil production, for franchises and delinquency in tax payments, inheritance tax and income tax.

STATE FACES DEFICIENCY SAYS TEXAS GOVERNOR

AUSTIN, April 16.—The state today is facing a deficiency in its general revenue of \$780,460, Governor Neff declared in his message, read before both branches of the legislature today. Considerable appropriations have already been made for the fiscal year, the statement read. There will be a deficiency of \$3,400,000 at the end of the fiscal year, the message said.

Russian Soviet Sentences Eleven For Dishonesty

MOSCOW, April 16.—Eleven persons were sentenced to death here today for bribery in connection with the distribution of dwellings. All were employes in the Moscow Central Housing department and were members of a band of sixty placed on trial for a monster bribe plot.

The charge was that these employes furnished dwellings to the applicant who could supply them with the most funds.

Dancer Appears Rather "Touchy" About Her Age

HOUSTON, April 16.—Miss Magdalene Williams, world champion long distance endurance dancer, and recently chosen by Rodolf Valentino as the most graceful dancer, this morning announced that she is celebrating her 20th birthday today.

"Report carried in the newspapers that I am 24 years old is wrong," Miss Williams declared when interviewed in her room at a local hotel where she was taken yesterday after she set up a world's record of 65 hours and 53 minutes.

"I did not tell anyone my age and I don't think anyone besides my parents know how old I am," Miss Williams said.

The statement that today was Miss Williams' 20th birthday was substantiated by the girl's parents.

NINE CHILDREN BURN TO DEATH IN CALIFORNIA

Sixty-Five Escape When Japanese Mission School is Destroyed by Fire.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 16.—Nine Japanese children were burned to death here today in a fire which destroyed a mission school. The victims ranged from 5 to 7 years. All but one of the bodies have been recovered.

There were 74 children in the building, which was used both as a school house and dormitory.

K. Kanada, a teacher, heroically assisted most of the youngsters to escape, but the nine who met death were trapped in their rooms on the third floor of the structure.

The building of frame construction was blazing fiercely when the firemen arrived. They were able only to keep the blaze from spreading to adjoining residences.

Hammer Murderess Trained, Is Claim, To San Salvador

LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 16.—Mrs. Clara Phillips, who escaped from the Los Angeles jail December 5th last, after being sentenced to ten years imprisonment for beating Mrs. Alberta Nabors to death with a hammer, has been traced to San Salvador, according to a copyrighted dispatch in the Los Angeles Examiner today. Her arrest may be expected at any time, according to the message.

Mrs. Phillips escaped from jail by sawing the bars of her cell.

FIVE DIE IN WRECK OFF THE DELAWARE CAPES

LEWIS, Del., April 16.—Winter came back Saturday off the Delaware capes and in the short-time fury of a wind storm wrecked a barge and took five lives. The dead were four members of the crew of the coal barge Stroughburg, and Mrs. Annie West, wife of the captain of the barge, whose home in in Sandford, Maine.

Prater Beach of Green Falls, N. C., was the only man rescued.

PRODUCTION OF OPTICAL GOODS SHOWS INCREASE

WASHINGTON, April 16.—Although the boom effect of the World War on many American industries has decreased since the peak year of 1919, there are many that still show unprecedented increases over their pre-war condition, according to statistics. Among these, according to figures compiled by the census bureau, the manufacture of optical goods is shown to be at least 144 per cent greater in 1921 than during 1914; surgical appliances show an increase of 117 per cent, and dental goods of 59 per cent.

MAYOR HODGES NOW IS CHIEF IN RANGER CITY

New Chief Executive and Three Members of Commission Take Oath of Office.

Mayor R. H. Hodges and three of the four commissioners elected to office at the city election April 3, were formally sworn into office at 10:50 o'clock this morning in the mayor's office in the Marston building. The oath was administered to the new officials collectively by the retiring city secretary, George Hemmingson.

All of the new officials were at the office at 10 o'clock, the time for which the ceremony was set except F. A. Brown, who was elected finance commissioner. He and his family are at Long Beach, Cal., for a month's stay, having left last Thursday. Raymond Teal, Dr. C. O. Terrell and Colonel Brashier were the three commissioners who presented themselves to take the oath of office.

No speeches were made by any of the incoming officials. The retiring mayor, John M. Gholson, declined to make a talk when a suggestion to this effect was made by one of the spectators present, Dr. J. B. Stackable.

There were not more than a half dozen persons present, outside of the commissioners, to witness the ceremony.

City Judge Flewelling, at the close of the reading of the oath, extended the commissioners an invitation to be present at the banquet of the Ranger club at the Gholson hotel, which he said was planned in honor of the new officials. The Ranger club gave its support to the winning ticket at the last election.

Following the reading of the oath the new commissioners affixed their signatures to individual copies of the oath of office.

The commission will meet tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock. A long session is expected. The city's financial affairs will be discussed, it was indicated today. Mayor Hodges will give out a financial statement tomorrow afternoon, he said. All the commissioners said they would be present at the meeting tomorrow. Mr. Brown, it was indicated, will take his oath of office on his return from California.

The retiring mayor in a chat with the new mayor and several of the commissioners said he considered it unfair to citizens who have paid their taxes to have "as much delinquent taxes on the list as there is." There are some tax payers who have taxes due for three and four years, he said.

The subject of delinquent taxes will be given special study by the new commission, several members said.

NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING OCCUPIED BY MANY STUDENTS

Work was taken up in the new high school building Monday morning by the High school grades and higher grades of the Central ward school.

An assembly was held the third period, and the students, after singing "America," were addressed by Superintendent McNew, Mr. Woods, principal of the High school, and Miss Healer, principal of the ward school.

Work will go steadily forward, it was said, new courses will be introduced, the library will be enlarged from time to time, and with proper support there is no reason why Ranger will not have one of the best High schools in the state in a short time.

The medals which were won at the track meet were given out.

Medals were awarded Dooley Cohen for first in the 100-yard and the 220-yard dashes. Charles White won first in shot put.

Ribbons for second and third places were awarded: Troy Grubbs, Ted Runage, Harry Martens, and Kenneth Campbell.

The track team will go to the district meet at Comanche next Friday.

THURBER NINE WINS FROM JOHN TARLETON COLLEGE

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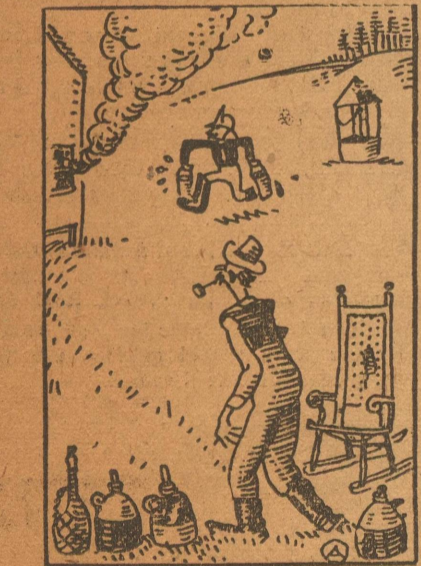
FIREMEN LOSE THEIR FLOWER GARDEN, BUT WILL PLANT AGAIN

NEGRO ARRESTED WHEN BANK TURNS DOWN HIS CHECKS

A penchant for writing out checks when he had insufficient funds in the bank resulted in a warrant being sworn out against Buster Haley, negro, today in Justice Fenlaw's court. He was arrested shortly after 12 o'clock and placed in the city jail.
There were five complaints against Haley, according to the justice. He is alleged to have written the checks for five, ten and fifteen-dollar amounts, totaling in all between \$60 and \$70.

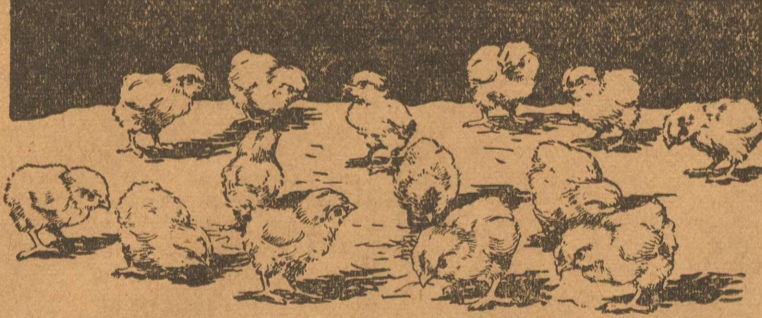

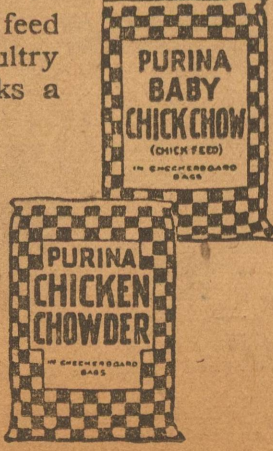

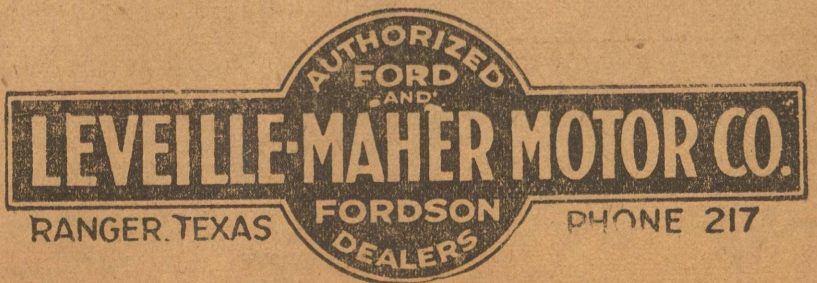

BISHOP DICKEY BRINGS MESSAGE TO METHODISTS

Preaches Opening Sermon in Auditorium of New Church Building.

For the first time the auditorium of the Ranger Methodist church was opened yesterday for services. It was marked with union services with other congregations in the city and an audience that filled the church to overflowing.

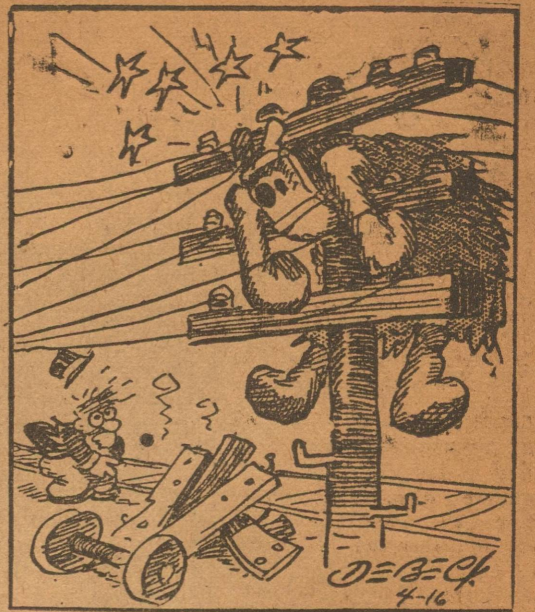
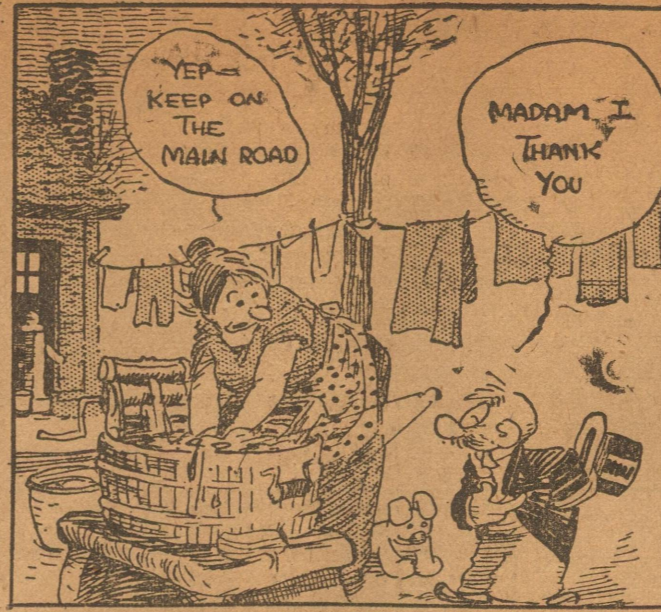
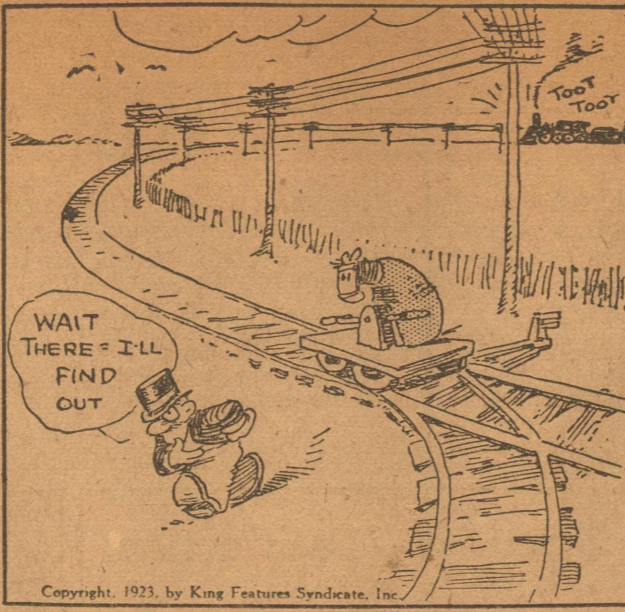
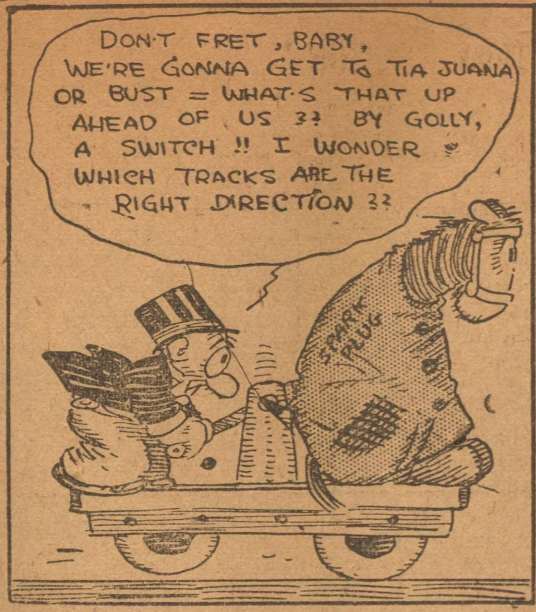
"Thou art Peter, upon this rock will I build thy church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it," was Bishop Dickey's text. "Though nations crash, generations pass and kingdoms fall, Christian temples dedicated to glorify and dignify Him continue through the ages," he said.

The bishop spoke of the purposes of houses of worship as distinguished from places of entertainment or exclusively philanthropic institutions.

men whom, he said, deny the divinity of Jesus Christ, the co-equality of His Son to the Father, and the eternity of Christ.

He praised the human being with a clean soul. "A man or woman may be dressed in robes of scarlet, yet the soul be not clothed in robes of righteousness," he said. "A man can go into the waters and wash himself clean, but if his soul is not purged of uncleanness he is not clean before his Maker," he said.

"The Son of God," the bishop said, "came to seek and save. He came not only to dignify and glorify mankind but to transform man. That is the purpose of His church on this earth. He seeks the low and high, the rich and the poor."

Man's eternal discontent with the material things of life, once he has them in his hands, took up a portion of the bishop's sermon. He told of rich men whom he had known who seemed unable to become satisfied with their riches. "That man, of all living beings, is the one who, when the end is approaching, needs to be prepared for another world," he said.

"If everyone of you living here in Ranger had an oil well in the rear of your yard and the wells gave forth golden fluid, this would not satisfy you," he said. "We, who read the Blessed Book know that there is a more beautiful world beyond."
