WASHINGTON, May 2.-While government officials are continuing to puzzle over the amplification of the supreme court's decision upholding the law that prohibits both the American and foreign ships from bringing liquor stocks into American ports under bond, orders were being issued for a concentration of all coast guard hips in the North Atlantic waters to keep alleged rum-runners under surveillance day and night.

Since announcement of the su-preme court's decision, the government has entered into a more determined resolve to uphold the majesty of the law by enforcing the prohibition statutes in the strictest possible manner.

CRUDE OIL MAKES SECOND DECLINE OF TEN CENTS A BARREL

Crude oil declined 10 cents today, according to announcement by the Prairie Oil & Gas company, this being the second reduction since the retrograde movement began. The first cut of 10 cents was announced April 23, about one week after tha decline in the price of the lower grades in South Texas. The lower price affects all grades of crude, which, which being bought on gravity basis, are now quoted as follows:

Further we learn that half of these deaths could be prevented by proper care. There is no question as to whether it is worth while. No sane person would consider for a moment opposing the program of such an organization. The problem is not whether the work is worthy of support but how much support it shall receive.

If there were no undernourishment in America, if all men and women were sound of body and mind, there would be a new degree of physical perfection that would give this country an even higher place among the nations of the world. We must start with the children and equip them for the future. Then we shall have a race of superior men and women.

And that will be a national asset worth while.







REPLANTING OF CORN MADE NECESSARY BY BACKWARD WEATHER

Too Much Rain and Wind and the Blackbirds Make for Poor Stands.

By Associated Press.

HOUSTON, May 2 .- Considerable replanting of corn is noted in county reports to the U.S. division of crop and livestock estimates, announced here today and covering the condition of the crop up to April 15. Replanting was made necessary by the lateness of the spring and excessive mois-ture in the east half of the state, the reports declare.

Most of the corn crop was planted at the close of the period covered and the acreage is apparently as large as last year, the summary states. Blackbirds, freezing weather in March and too much rain or wind have made poor stands in many instances.
