

Northeasterly and southwesterly trade winds skirting the edges of the doldrum section near the Cape Verdes set up circular motions, which, with other meteorological conditions. are supposed to start the vortexes which result in hurricanes. These move westward with the regular wind drifts. The fact that the doldrums do not reach into the Atlantic south of the equator is given as the reason why hurricanes are never reported from that area.
