## FLOODS ARE SWEEPING OVER OKLAHOMA

### PAGEANT WILL BE FEATURE AT NIGHT SESSION

West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention Plans Program of Interest.

SAN ANGELO, May 22.—The birth of West Texas and its development into a mighty empire will be portrayed in the big historical pageant "In the Shadow of Fort Concho," to be presented in an open air theater on the San Angelo athletic field tonight, the second night of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention. This will be the King Show of all ever held in Texas.

The entire scenario and plans for the pageant were worked out by Harley Sadler, well known showman of West Texas. He has spent a large part of last winter in perfecting the intricate details of the story and scenery to be used. Fanny Ellis, a member of the Sadler company, is assisting in this work and has been in San Angelo for the last three weeks getting all the details in connection with the presentation out of the way.

**Picturing West Texas**  
"In presenting this pageant the pantomime idea has been adopted, the story is allegorical, that is to say, its towns, and the sterling qualities which are responsible for its success and achievements.

"The authors feel we have had enough of wars and will make no mention of the mighty struggle which gave Texas her independence and of the glorious part that Texas played in the Civil, Spanish-American and World wars. These are too well known for us to attempt to eulogize, so we will simply say that those who have gone West in the defense of their country are too well loved in memory, for we who have never made the supreme sacrifice to attempt to praise.

**Program of Music.**  
The first event of the evening of the pageant will be the band concert to be given by the various bands in attendance at the convention. Each band contesting for the prizes in the contest will play a short concert in front of the grandstand at 7:15, at which time the doors will be open. At 8:15 all bands will be massed

### BOOTLEGGERS NEED NOT EXPECT CLEMENCY SAYS THE GOVERNOR

STANTON, Texas, May 22.—Governor Pat M. Neff spoke here on Monday morning to a large audience. He said violators of the prohibition law need expect no clemency from him.  
"I am for the law in this country being administered in the courthouse," declared the governor. "I am for the judgment of the court and the verdict of the jury. We fought out the prohibition question from the platform, the pulpit and through the press, having settled it permanently at the ballot box.  
"Any man who is not in favor of the enforcement of the prohibition law is a traitor to his country. The state and not the country, should say what the law is and the state should see that it is enforced.  
"If it were otherwise the lawless element could congregate in some section of Texas and say that no law should be enforced there. As long as I am governor and as long as a Texas Ranger can pull a trigger, no such condition shall exist in any county in Texas.  
"If you people will send the bootleggers to the penitentiary, by the eternal I will see that they serve their terms."

### MAN AND WIFE SET NEW DANCE RECORD

NILE, Ohio, May 22.—James Yarnell of Youngstown, Ohio, hung up a new marathon dance record of 161 hours and 35 minutes at Avon Park here Monday. Yarnell and wife started dancing at 10 o'clock last Monday morning. Mrs. Yarnell left the floor at 10:27 Saturday night, after having danced 132 hours and 27 minutes—a world's record for women. Yarnell quit at 4:20 today.

### CURE OF CANCER BY COLLIDAL LEAD, NEW DISCOVERY CLAIMED

### UNITED STATES WILL NEGOTIATE WITH BANDITS

President and Cabinet Discuss Measures to Obtain Release of Americans.

Conditions in China and the activity of the bandits in that country, together with measures to obtain the release of American held prisoners by the brigands, was almost the only subject discussed at the meeting of the president's cabinet today.

### Gray County In Panhandle Suffers From Small Storm

### HOLY ROLLER MEETING ENDS WITH AFFRAY

A. O. Womble Severely Cut and Preacher, M. E. Drake, Arrested.

A. O. Womble, aged about 63, is in the General hospital suffering with several severe cuts in the back, another cut that almost circles his neck to his chin and other injuries sustained Sunday night about 11:30 o'clock.

M. E. Drake, a preacher of the Holy Rollers, who has been conducting a meeting in Ranger for several weeks, was arrested late Monday and was to have an examining trial in the court of Justice of the Peace Roger Fenlaw at 2 o'clock this afternoon on a charge of assault with murder.

R. N. Fitzpatrick, one of the elders of the Holy Rollers in Ranger, was arrested on a charge of aggravated assault, and released by Justice Fenlaw on a bond of \$300.

According to statements to the police, the wife of Womble wished to be baptized as a member of the Holy Roller church and her husband objected. Meeting Drake at the close of the service Sunday night, Womble told him of his objections, and Drake is said to have replied: "I shall baptize Mrs. Womble whenever she comes to the waters." The affray followed.

While there were many witnesses to the contest, which is said to have been brief but spirited, none appears to have any certain information. Drake and Womble appear to have got mixed up and Womble was cut by a knife in somebody's hands. Fitzpatrick appears to have gotten mixed up in the mele, but it is uncertain just what part he took in it.

J. W. Womble, a son of A. O. Womble, accompanied his father to the Holy Rollers' tent and, meeting his mother, accompanied her home, after which he returned in time to see his father in the midst of a struggle and to rescue him with a force that appears to have driven all other combatants from the field. At least none were to be seen after the younger Womble had helped his father to his feet and had turned to resist the next attack. There was no further attack because there were no attackers. His wife had previously seized a knife from the hand of an assailant.

While Womble's wounds are said to be serious, it is thought he will recover. None of the other combatants appear to have been hurt.

LONDON, May 22.—The Touregs of the Sahara, writes Lady Dorothy Mills to the Daily Chronicle, are handsome men and devoted to their women. "Aristocrats of the Sand," Lady Dorothy calls them. "The men live by bloodshed and pillage and are the handsomest creatures alive, slim, amber-skinned and muscular. They hide their aquiline features behind a black or dark blue veil that leaves nothing visible but their bright black eyes.

"Their women are very good looking, though among the richer classes beauty is measured by weight, and young girls are subject to a fattening process something like that of the Christmas turkey. Often by the time they reach maturity they can only move by the aid of two or more slaves."

### DIPLOMAS GIVEN 1923 GRADUATES OF RANGER HIGH

Auditorium Crowded for Commencement Exercises of Happy Twenty-Nine.

Twelve young men and seventeen young women who graduated this year from the Ranger High school received their diplomas last night. Their families and friends were out in force to witness the commencement exercises and the large auditorium in the new high school building was filled to overflowing.

The baccalaureate address was made by John E. Aubrey of Denison, a fluent speaker of national reputation but especially well known in Texas. He recalled that he had visited the Ranger high school last fall and said that of all the schools he had since visited none had students or graduates presenting greater promise than those of Ranger. He urged high ideals, constant vigilance, determination, application and industry.

Mr. Aubrey was introduced by Superintendent E. A. McNew.

S. D. Woods, principal of the high school, made the introductions. The Rev. A. L. Leake, pastor of the Central Baptist church, gave the invocation, and the Rev. H. B. Johnson, pastor of the Christian church, gave the benediction.

### BALDWIN NOW IS PREMIER OF GREAT BRITAIN

Accepts Invitation of King George to Form New Cabinet.

LONDON, May 22.—Stanley Baldwin, chancellor of the exchequer in the old Bonar Law ministry, has been made premier of Great Britain. He was summoned to Buckingham Palace by King George this afternoon, and after a conference it was announced that he had accepted the invitation to form a new cabinet.

### Baldwin Choice of Leaders in British Conservative Party

LONDON, May 22.—Stanley Baldwin is Great Britain's new prime minister, having accepted this afternoon the premiership offered him by King George. A Central News story says he was the choice of leaders of the Conservative party.

Sir Robert Horne, formerly chancellor of the exchequer, will again take over that office, succeeding Baldwin.

### TWO POLICEMEN KILLED, TWO WOUNDED IN GUN BATTLE IN NEW JERSEY

JERSEY CITY, N. J., May 22.—Two policemen were shot to death and two others seriously wounded in a gun battle today when they sought to arrest J. G. Sayes, a hold-up suspect, at his residence. Sayes and a woman companion were captured by police reserves after they had been driven from the house by a gas bomb.

Detective John Black and Patrolman James Walton were wounded. Six officers went to the house to arrest Sayes as a suspect in connection with the recent hold-up in which \$9,000 was taken from a messenger of a financial institution.

### NEW YORK, May 22.—Robert Ingalls and Gordon Ingalls, indicted at Fort Worth for using the mails to defraud, were arraigned here and held in \$10,000 bail by United States commissioners. The date of their hearing has been set for June 3.

### Marathon Dancers Attracting Many Visitors Who Are Watching Exhibition Very Expectantly

The marathon dancers seem to have taken Ranger by storm. All day Monday, from the time they hopped off until late in the night, hundreds of people streamed into the Summer Garden. It appears that most everybody in Ranger is interested in the dancers and already many people have picked out their favorite dancer to win the world's record which now stands at 161 hours. People began to pour into the Summer Garden at 7 o'clock this morning and the crowds have not let up. The management is wondering how they will handle the crowds tonight.

### ATTACK ON THE TEXAS TECH IS BEING PUSHED

Legislators in House Want None But Revenue Raising Measures Now.

AUSTIN, Tex., May 22.—Repeal of all appropriations for the Texas Technological college is sought by a bill introduced in the house today by Representatives Fields and Shires. The bill is also signed by a number of other members.

Proponents of the measure said the repeal of the Texas Technological college bill would reduce the total of appropriations by about \$1,000,000. They claim it is not their intent to destroy the college, but rather to delay its construction and the beginning of its work until the state is in a little better financial condition.

The house went on record today as opposing any measure that was not a revenue-raising measure, the vote on the resolution being 58 to 46. It could hardly be accepted as a rule of the house, however, it was said, for it was not passed as an amendment to the rules, so could not operate to prevent consideration of other than revenue-raising measures if some other manner of bill should come up for consideration.

### Ranger Extends Its Banking Facilities To Frankell People

The Ranger State Bank has taken over the deposits of the First State bank of Frankell, a private bank which closed last Saturday after the business of the institution had been settled. The bank closed without any liabilities, after which all accounts were transferred to the Ranger State bank.

### TURKS REPORTED TO HAVE BLOWN UP BRIDGE

### NORTH CANADIAN RIVER IS HIGH AND RISING HIGHER

Lowlands in Oklahoma City Threatened With Disaster If Levee Breaks.

CLINTON, Okla., May 22.—Damage to crops amounting to millions of dollars is believed to have resulted from a series of cloudbursts that descended on Western Oklahoma last night. Rivers are out of their banks and flooding the lowlands and thousands of acres are under water.

It was reported that 17 persons were dead at Levee and three at Butler. There was little prospect that wire communication with these places and other points that have been cut off until midnight or tomorrow morning.

Observers saw what they described as a slow moving tornado traveling northward last night. The storm cloud traveled slowly and many were enabled to seek shelter in storm cellars.

More than 300 persons have been taken from lowlands at Oklahoma City, which are threatened with the flooding waters of the North Canadian river, already far out of its banks and yet rising fast.

### STORM DAMAGE AT McLEAN HAS BEEN VERY HEAVY

WICHITA FALLS, May 22.—Reports from McLean this morning said that the damage from wind and hail of yesterday was likely to prove greater than at first estimated. Twenty families were made homeless, crops were destroyed and many head of livestock killed. McLean citizens have sent an appeal to the Red Cross for aid.

### LOSS OF LIVES AT LEVEE IS DENIED

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 22.—Reports from Clinton that several persons had lost their lives in a storm and flood at Levee was denied in a brief message received here today by phone from the office of the Southwestern Telephone Co. at Levee. Communication was established for 5 minutes and was broken before any report of the storm disaster could be obtained.

### Western Oklahoma Suffers Much From Tornado and Rain

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 22.—With six dead at Levee, Okla., rivers at flood stage and communication of all kinds paralyzed, the western section of this state is recovering from a night of storm and tornado. Railroad traffic throughout the western counties is reported at a standstill and railroad officials declare the storm the worst in recent years.

Deaths at Levee are believed to have resulted from a small tornado which struck there and demolished a number of houses, but wire communication has been cut off and no definite information has been obtained. Telephone and telegraph companies are working feverishly to re-establish the communications.

### TWO AGED MEN KILLED WHEN HIT BY TRAIN

ARLINGTON, Texas, May 22.—W. G. Heath, 75, of Pittsburg, Texas, was killed, and C. F. White, 75, of Amsden, so seriously injured that he died within two hours, when they were struck by a Texas & Pacific train near here today.

THE SUGAR BOYCOTT

The housewives have set themselves the task of boycotting the sugar bloc. In view of the fact that they are buyers of approximately 70 per cent of the sugar consumed in the United States, an effective boycott ought to make an impression on the market.

The recent decline of the raw and refined wholesale markets is due in part to the action of the Government in pressing its suit against the New York Exchange speculators and to the activity of the bear faction there in taking advantage of that proceeding. Not a little credit, too, should be given to the statement of the President of the American Sugar Refining Company that there is plenty of sugar for all this year's requirements and that consumers should not be scared into a panic.

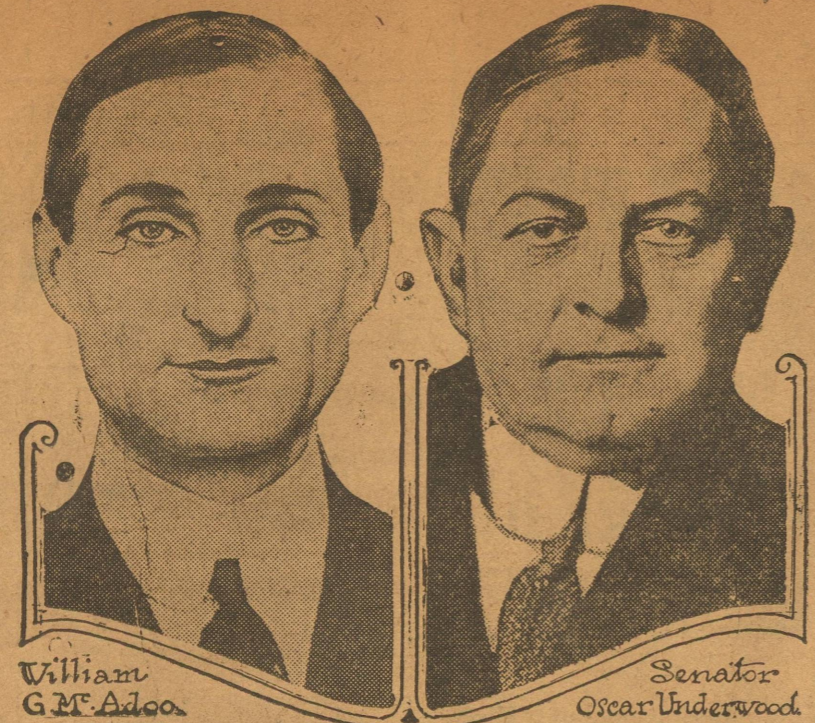
It would have been foresight had the housewives' organizations bestirred themselves earlier and gone after Congress to keep it from levying a tariff of 2 cents a pound on Cuban grown sugar. That amount has been added to the price of sugar and accounts for a very large part of the increased market price. But for that, sugar would be selling now at 8 cents a pound, even allowing for the speculative movement. It should be selling at retail for about 7 cents a pound, or a little less, and a well directed protest by the housewives, assisted by confectioners' and canners' organizations, ought to accomplish that. These last named have not so large an interest as have the housewives, because confectioners use but about 10 per cent and canners about 20 per cent of what is consumed in the United States. Yet their unselfish co-operation would be of general public interest.

Boycott is a word that has not a pleasant sound. It is not a generally desirable measure to which to resort. It may have a reactionary effect. In this case a too rigid application might result in driving the growers of cane to a crop curtailment that would react on the boycotters next year. Yet, since the Boston Tea Party, Americans have had to resort to it at times and no doubt will continue to find it to be necessary in emergencies. The women should proceed with wisdom as well as zeal in this case.—Cincinnati Enquirer.

UNDERWOOD AND M'ADOO MAY SEEK NOMINATION



According to reports from Washington, United States Senator Oscar Underwood, of Alabama, will toss his hat into the ring for the Democratic nomination for the presidency when he returns from his European tour, some time next month. It is declared he has already sounded out the political leaders in New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts and Illinois. His chief opponent for the nomination, it is reported, will be William Gibbs McAdoo, now of California, son-in-law of Woodrow Wilson.

FORMER SHERIFF IN OKLAHOMA SHOT TO DEATH BY BARBER

DUNCAN, Okla., May 22.—E. H. Rhyne, former sheriff of Stephens county, who was shot three times by Bob Calmes, a barber, here Monday, died a few hours later at a hospital. It was the second time Calmes had attacked Rhyne. When shot today the former was walking with crutches as a result of the first shooting, which occurred on the street here Dec. 5 last.

Rhyne had just entered the court house and started to ascend the stairs leading up from the first floor corridor when Calmes, who was apparently standing on the landing above, fired six shots, three of which took effect.

District court was in session in the building and the pistol reports brought an immense crowd. Rhyne was found in the court house yard apparently dying. His discarded crutches lay at the foot of the stairs. Calmes went to the sheriff's office and surrendered. The gun which he turned over to the officer held six empty shells. Rhyne's gun was found untouched in its holster. Calmes was on bond as a result of the first shooting. He was placed in jail after the shooting today. He has not indicated the motive for either attack. Rhyne went out of office Jan. 1 last.

REPORT OF BODIES FOUND DECLARED TO BE FALSE

SAN ANTONIO, May 22.—Reports from Mexico City that 32 bodies had been found in the Rio Grande near Laredo were today branded as false by authorities at Laredo and Nuevo Laredo. Six bodies were found recently at intervals, officials said, and rumors of additional bodies being found are branded by Laredo authorities as false. A number of Italians hired a band of Mexicans to smuggle them across the Rio Grande and were murdered by their guides, according to stories told by the survivors. Afterwards 6 bodies were recovered and several arrests were made in Mexico in connection with the tragedy.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—Seven western states, during recent sessions of their legislatures, passed measures affecting the enforcement of prohibition. They are Nevada, Wyoming, New Mexico, Colorado, Washington, Oregon and Montana. Four others, California, Idaho, Utah and Arizona, did not adopt legislation to this end.

YOAKUM, Texas, May 22.—The body of J. H. Warden, agent for the American Express company, who was shot and killed yesterday afternoon, was to be forwarded to McKinney today for burial. Fred C. Allen, a traveling salesman and a close friend of Warden, surrendered to officers after the shooting. He was given a preliminary hearing and released on \$6,000 bond. Both men have families here.

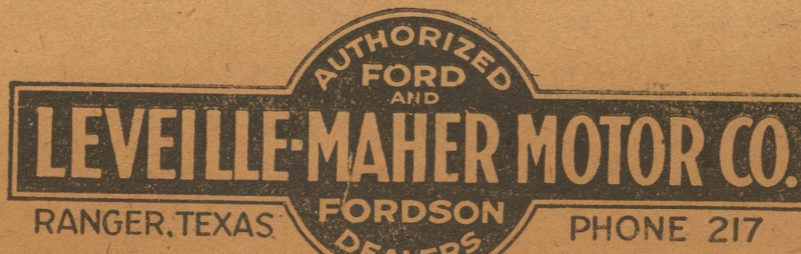

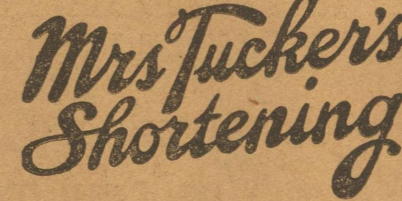

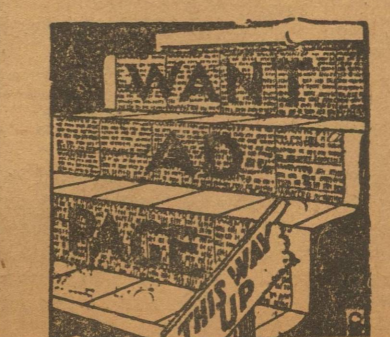

HOW 14 DIED IN TEXAS OIL FIRE



Texas Oil Fire, 1923.

A spark caused by the clashing of two bits of metal as crews of men were trying to cap the Hughes oil well gusher, near Kearns, Texas, set the gas and oil afire, 14 men being burned to death. The well burned for days, the heat making it impossible to approach it, until men, wearing asbestos suits, managed to drag out the charred bodies. Sixteen boilers were rigged to pour live steam and smother the fire. Although spectators were kept back 500 yards by the heat, P. J. Howe, a newspaper photographer of Fort Worth, ran to within 30 feet of the fire and took this picture at the risk of his life. His clothes were burned off. Note the density of the high spouting flames.

**SCIENTISTS LEARN WHERE STORMS BREED AND WHERE THEY GO**

WASHINGTON, May 22.—The lair of the wild West Indian hurricane at last has been tracked down. C. L. Mitchell, meteorologist of the United States weather bureau, after a year's work, has announced that the Atlantic Ocean just south of the Cape Verde Islands is the breeding place of cyclones in August and September, while the west section of Carribean Sea has that honor during the rest of the storm season.

In a study of 235 storms of hurricane intensity during the last 36 years, it was found that all occurred between May and December.

Reports of the origin of hurricanes in the eastern two-thirds of the Carribean were disproved, and the effects of the doldrums upon cyclonic disturbances disclosed.

Northeasterly and southwesterly trade winds skirting the edges of the doldrum section near the Cape Verde set up circular motions, which, with other meteorological conditions, are supposed to start the vortexes which result in hurricanes. These move westward with the regular wind drifts. The fact that the doldrums do not reach into the Atlantic south of the equator is given as the reason why hurricanes are never reported from that area.

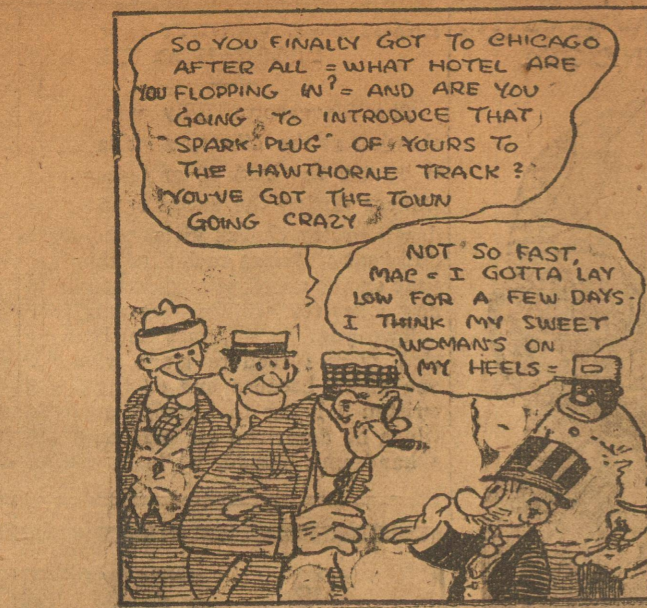

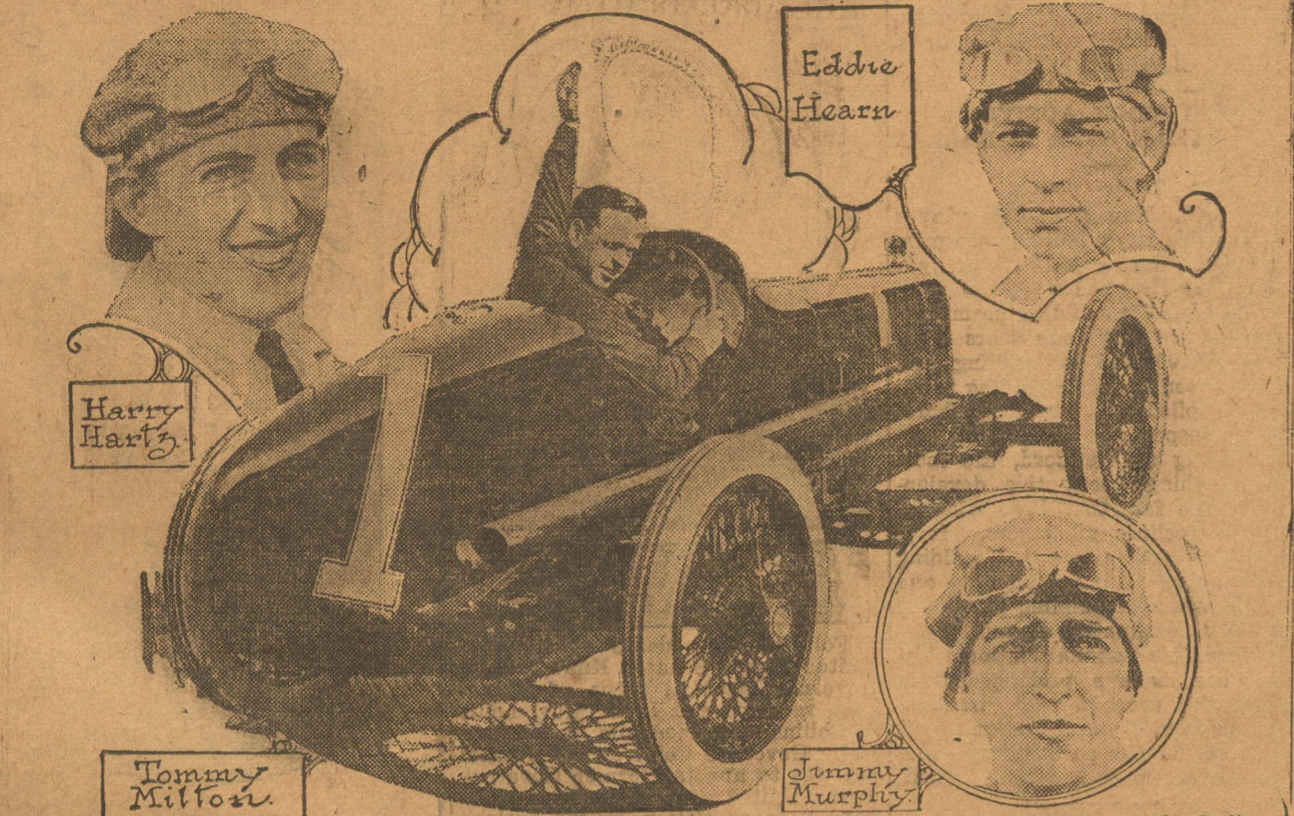

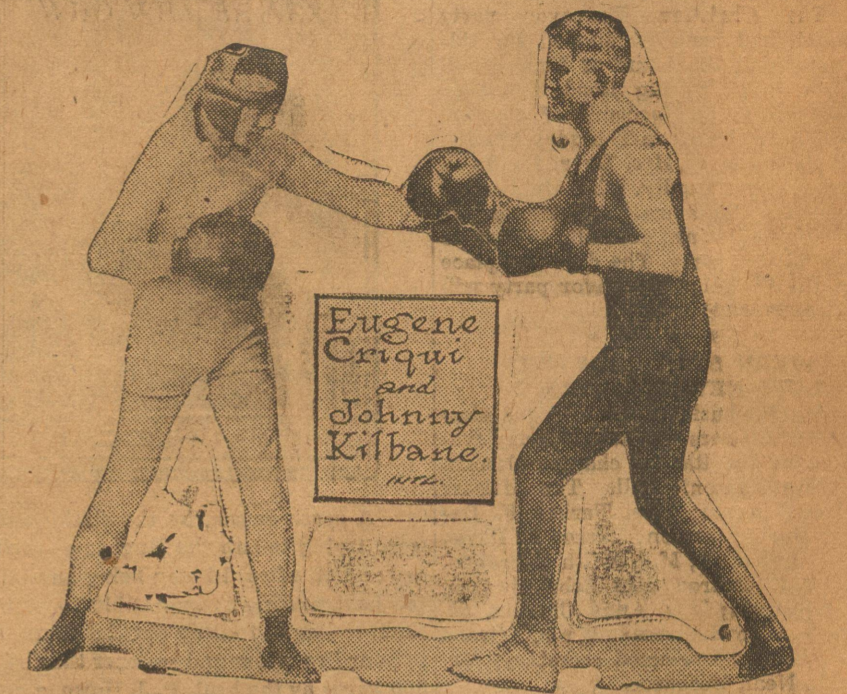
