AUTO THIEVES MAY BE ROUGHLY HANDLED

AMERICAN BOOK CO. BEGINS SUIT AGAINST STATE

Asks Supreme Court for Mandamus to Compel Use of Books Contracted For

AUSTIN, June 4.—Application for leave to file a mandamus petition to compel S. M. N. Marrs, state superintendent of public instruction, to recognize and carry out the contract alleged to have been made by the state textbook commission last December was today filed in the Texas supreme court by the American Book company.

This is a test case of the book contract in controversy before the legislature since January. The American Book company is holder of a contract to furnish geographies and readers. The petition states that the state superintendent has informed its representatives that he does not intend to use the books provided in the contract made last December and that requisitions for the old books already have been sent out to the school superintendents. The book company says it has made the proper bond to carry out its contract and copies of the contract and bond are included with the petition.

Superintendent Marrs, as instructed in resolutions adopted in both senate and house, has declined to recognize the book contracts. The controversy arose over a contention that the textbook board could have saved the state about two million dollars by continuing the old textbooks instead of selecting new textbooks.

An investigation was conducted by a legislative committee, which recommended annulment of the contract. General Keeling informed the legislature he would not defend the legislature's position in court and the legislative committee was empowered to employ attorneys to do so. A bill seeking new contracts is now on the governor's desk, awaiting his approval or veto. A similar measure passed during the regular session was vetoed.

CHINESE ARE TAKING BANDITS INTO THE ARMY

Release of All Foreign Captives of Brigands Expected Soon.

PEKIN, June 4.—Enrollment of the Shantung bandits into the Chinese national army is proceeding, according to advices received by the American legation. Those of the bandits who do not wish to become soldiers are slipping quietly away.

Members of the foreign legations feel it will be only a few days until the released prisoners of the bandits are released.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TO HELP AT METHODIST REVIVAL SERVICES

Wednesday night will be High school night at the Methodist revival services. The first part of the service will be turned over to the High school yell leader, and all members of the student body are invited to be present.

ILLINOIS WETS MAY SEEK TO LOOSEN LAW

CHICAGO, June 2.—Repeal of the state prohibition enforcement law will be a major issue in the 1924 primaries and election, Scott McBride, official of the anti-saloon league, said tonight. McBride said the league was being mobilized to fight the campaign that will be waged for the wet forces who will seek to obtain repeal of the Illinois enforcement law as was done in New York.

NEGRO PLEADS GUILTY TO DISTURBING PEACE.

Two negroes arrested for disturbing the peace on Marston street last night were brought to the police station. One of the negroes pleaded guilty and paid a fine. The other one after an investigation was released by Assistant Chief Leonard Davenport.

Ranger Dancer In Marathon Contest On at St. Louis

ST. LOUIS, June 4.—Seven persons today remained in the national marathon dance which began Friday night. Each of the contestants is seeking to break the world record of 195 hours and 5 minutes established last week by W. E. McMillin of Los Angeles, dancing in Ranger, Texas.

The seven dancers include one girl. They had been on the floor this morning almost 50 hours. Among these dancers are J. E. Rawson of Ranger, and Leon McNatt, Lawrence Klucky and the "masked marvel," all of Dallas.

BETTER ROADS BETTER HOMES SAYS PRESIDENT

He Speaks on Two Modern and Progressive Movements.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Two modern and progressive movements, one designed to bring about better highways and the other better homes were approved by President Harding in addresses incident to the Shrine convention here. Speaking at a dedication of Zero milestone, a granite monument erected for measuring highway distances, he declared that the national highway associations, having developed a system of main roads, must recognize the obligation of organizing the more remote roads to the fullest extent justified by economic conditions.

In his second address at the opening in Potomac park of the boyhood home of John Howard Payne, composer of "Home, Sweet Home," the president asserted that "we are going to have such advances in mechanical appliances for the home that it will mean the real emancipation of women." He said women would be seen taking a new, enlarged and more advance part in the activities of life.

TORONTO, Ontario, June 2.—Six persons were burned to death today when fire destroyed the home of Silas Stanley in Sodom, near this city.

TOURIST TRAVEL THROUGH HERE IS BEING URGED

Bankhead Highway Through Eastland County Almost Entirely Completed.

Tourist bureaus at San Antonio, Fort Worth, Dallas and other strategic highway points were advised today of the road conditions of Highway No. 1, better known as the Bankhead highway through Metcalf Gap and Abilene, between Eastland county, by B. F. Bennett, secretary of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. He offered to keep all of the tourist bureaus informed weekly of the road conditions in this section.

The Ranger secretary pointed out that there is a fairly good road between Metcalf Gap and Palo Pinto and a passable dirt road between Palo Pinto and Straw, and a gravel road from the latter town to the Eastland county line.

The macadam road from the eastern county line to Ranger and Eastland is almost completed. The last detour of the brick road between Ranger and Eastland was obliterated last Sunday with the completion of the Texas & Pacific railroad crossing outside of the city limits. The macadam road from Cisco to the Callahan county line will be entirely open shortly.

SOCIALISTS LEADING WETS IN WISCONSIN

MADISON, Wis., June 2.—Wisconsin is set for the next ground between the wets and dries. The anti-dry forces are led by Milwaukee socialists. The Tucker bill, which has been made a special order for next Tuesday, is said to be virtually a duplicate of the law just enacted in New York.

FORT WORTH, June 4.—Marshall Spoonst, former Tarrant county attorney and a candidate for attorney general of Texas, and recently an oil operator, died here last night after two months illness. He was 44 years old.

Citizens and Police on Trail of Gang

T. O. Bray Offers Reward for Arrest and Conviction of Guilty Auto Owners. Vow Vengeance if Cars Are Molested.

T. O. Bray, uncle of Bill Williams, whose car was stolen from in front of the Adams & Co. grocery store, 219 South Rusk street, between 11:30 and 12 o'clock, Saturday night and stripped of everything having a market value, offered today a reward of \$100 for the arrest and conviction of the thief or thieves responsible for the car being stripped. Mr. Bray is a member of the Rusk street grocery firm.

The Williams auto, a Ford, is the second Ranger car within four days to be driven to a lonely place in the country and stripped of everything removable. F. R. Parker's auto, also a Ford, was driven to a pasture, more than a mile off the Tiffin highway last Tuesday night and stripped of tires and the battery. Mr. Parker found the car on Thursday afternoon.

Auto Owners Aroused Several owners of automobiles today expressed themselves to a Times representative in vigorous terms concerning the manner in which auto thieves should be dealt with. One man even went so far as to say that they should be handled as horse thieves were in the old days in Texas. Hanging for horse stealing was once the law in Ranger territory.

Chief O. V. Davenport said he and his men were doing all they could to apprehend the auto thieves. Anyone found loitering around a car not known to be his own will be brought to the station without a question being asked, he indicated.

"This car thieving and stripping must be broken up and we will do all in our power to do it," the Ranger police head said.

Ranger auto owners have been annoyed for months with petty thieving. Motormeters, spotlights and tires have been taken from cars on the main streets, with almost seeming immunity from apprehension.

Looking for Gang The opinion was expressed by the police that a gang is operating the stripping game here. Encouraged by their success in taking removable articles from cars parked on the streets, the gang is determined to make a more thorough job of it by getting the car to some isolated spot in the country, where the thieves can work unmolested.

Five tires, the carburetor, steering gear and battery of the Williams car were removed. The car was found by a pumper, eight miles west of Ranger in the woods, according to reports reaching here today.

McMILLIN TO BE HERE FOR BENEFIT DANCE

W. E. McMillin, holder of the world's marathon dance record of 195 hours and 5 minutes, established at the Summer Garden on May 29, left for Dallas Monday morning. Before leaving he said he wished to publicly thank his friends for the support they gave him while going through his endurance performance and also the well wishes tendered him after he was forced to leave the dancing floor.

He said he would return to Ranger for the dance to be given in his honor at the Summer Garden on June 12.

BRECKENRIDGE DEFEATS THURBER BALL TEAM.

Breckenridge Dynamos defeated the Thurber baseball club at Breckenridge yesterday afternoon, 4 to 2, before a large crowd, including some Ranger fans. This was the second successive defeat for the hitherto undefeated Thurberites, the Dynamos taking a tight game on Saturday.

NEW YORK OPENS WIDE PATH FOR THE SMUGGLERS

Quantity of Liquor Being Collected in Canada to Transport Across Border.

OTTAWA, Canada, June 4.—Large cargoes of liquor are moving towards the international boundary on their way to New York state, as a result of the repeal of the prohibition enforcement law of that state. Plans to flood New York with the "hard stuff" are said to be very extensive. The liquor smuggling trade is beginning to bloom anew, following the winter shut down. The attitude shown in New York by its latest enactment is said to have brought new blood into the liquor trade and new consignments of liquor are being got ready for the smugglers to send along.

POLICE INVESTIGATING DEATH OF WEALTHY KANSAS CITY MAN

KANSAS CITY, June 4.—Police were investigating today the mysterious death of Guy A. Moore, a wealthy broker and a former president of the Kansas City Board of Trade, whose body was found late yesterday on a railroad track here. The pockets in his clothing were turned inside out. Wounds on the right side of his head were made, the police believe, before the body was cut and mangled by a railroad train.

Moore is believed to have been dead several hours when a train crew discovered the mangled form on the track. It was thought at first he might have killed himself, but he was prosperous financially. Friends who saw him Saturday said he was in splendid spirits and there was no reason why he should take his life. E. W. Lawless, his business partner, said he believed Moore had been attacked and robbed and his body thrown on the track. He said he believed Moore had a large sum of money with him when he left the office Saturday night.

A. B. KIRKPATRICK DIES IN AUSTIN, HIS FRIENDS HERE ADVISED

A. B. Kirkpatrick, formerly for a number of years in the lumber business in Ranger and recently head of the Kirkpatrick Lumber company in Austin, died at his home in that city last night, according to a telegram received today by R. H. Bundick, a former business associate. Funeral services were announced to be held this afternoon.

Mr. Kirkpatrick was about 56 years of age. He was very active in this territory during the several years of oil activity, his business extending also to Breckenridge and other places. He was much liked by all who knew him and esteemed for his reliability in business.

"The death of Mr. Kirkpatrick was a great shock to me," said Mr. Bundick. "He had always appeared in such good health to me," said Mr. Bunnam and his death will be regretted by many friends here."

LIQUOR ON VESSELS IN U. S. TO BE SEIZED

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Foreign and American ships which enter the United States waters with deliberate intent to violate the regulations barring liquor from vessels coming within the three-mile limit will be stopped by federal customs officers and the liquor seized. Treasury officials today notified customs officials regarding their duty.

Under the terms of the order, rum runners and vessels deliberately violating the law, or whose owners conspire to defeat the law will be required to pay the penalty prescribed by the law.

DENTON DWELLING HOUSE DESTROYED BY FIRE.

DENTON, June 4.—Two residential blocks were threatened with fire which destroyed the home of D. L. Wilkins here early today with a loss of approximately \$20,000. Two other houses caught fire, but were saved. Origin of the blaze was not determined.

Supreme Court Holds Invalid Law Barring Language

WASHINGTON, June 4.—State laws prohibiting the teaching of foreign languages in public, private and parochial schools in Ohio, Iowa and 18 other states was held invalid today in the supreme court.

Justice Holmes, in presenting the dissenting views of himself and Sutherland said the state law should be tried out first.

GERMAN POLICE ROUNDING UP REDS IN RUHR

BERLIN, June 4.—While hundreds of communists were being rounded up by the police in the Ruhr today the strike continued to spread. It was apparent that a complete strike program had been carefully planned in advance and was being carried out regardless of interference.

The police have been arresting communists in Bochum and Dortmund, but strike activities in the southern part of the valley have caused a number of industries to close down. The German police was partly reorganized in the Ruhr to stamp out the communist flame and are working in military style. Armed men surround whole blocks of dwellings in which communists are believed to be hiding and are holding door to door search.

In Dortmund 500 "reds" were arrested. Every one of them was armed and many of the houses raided turned out to be veritable arsenals with the cellars packed with ammunition.

DALLAS OIL FRAUD CASE STARTS IN COURT

DALLAS, June 4.—Trial of the first oil fraud case in Dallas, B. H. Peeler and Wade Chandler, under indictment for using the mails to defraud, was announced ready for trial in court today.

C. B. Johnson, postoffice inspector, was called as the first witness. He said he was with the officers when they were arrested last October and that they admitted sending out literature to possible investors.

BUREAU OF RELATED INDUSTRIES HELD UNLAWFUL

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The Armstrong Bureau of Related Industries, which the government claimed was organized for the control of the manufacture and sale of linseed oil, was held by the supreme court today to be an unlawful organization.

POLITICAL PROBLEMS NOT FOR COURT TO DETERMINE

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The case brought to determine the legality of the Sheppard-Towner maternity act was dismissed today for want of jurisdiction by the supreme court, which refused to pass on the validity of the act.

Justice Sutherland, who announced the court opinion, said that the case could not be considered on its merits pointing out that previous cases differed from the matter before them which presented only political and not judicial matters.

CITIZENS' MILITARY TRAINING CAMP AGE LIMITS ARE REDUCED

BRENNHAM.—The boll weevil has made its appearance in sections of Washington county, according to W. A. Yates, county demonstrator. Yates estimates and increased acreage of 10 per cent in the county with the crop two to three weeks late.

RETURN TO RANGER AND MAY MAKE HOME HERE

C. Stenberg, who left Ranger last November with his wife, is now registered at the Paramount hotel. He is considering a business plan that would make Ranger his home, he said today. He is in the sign painting business.

HOUSE LOWERS TOTAL OF BILLS ASKING FUNDS

Educational and Departmental Appropriations Are Cut \$2,000,000.

AUSTIN, June 4.—The general educational and departmental appropriation bills as reduced were reintroduced in the house today and reported favorably by the committee. The first draft showed a reduction of \$2,500,000 under the appropriation made in the last session. The educational bill was reduced approximately \$1,500,000. The appropriations included for the larger institutions of learning: University of Texas, \$2,600,000; A. & M., \$2,501,703; College of Industrial Arts, \$648,000; normal schools, \$497,172.

A new income tax bill was introduced by Representative Price, the bill proposing a two per cent tax. The exceptions are put at \$1,500 for single persons and \$3,000 for married persons. It is estimated the bill would mean a revenue of \$6,000,000.

Representative Smith offered a bill calling for the payment of a \$2 fee for all those receiving an insurance agents certificate in the state.

FORMER RAILROAD MAN FOUND DEAD BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN MURDERED

BAIRD, Texas, June 4.—Efforts to solve the killing of T. J. Anderson, a former railroad employee at Baird, have failed thus far. Anderson's body was found yesterday on the T. & P. right of way near Putnam. His skull was crushed, both legs were broken and his loots had been taken off.

OKLAHOMA SHERIFF FORESTALLS THE MOB

OKEMAH, Okla., June 4.—A mob which assembled here last night for the purpose of storming the jail where it was believed two negro boys were being held, after two white boys had been stabbed, arrived too late, according to the sheriff's office. Sheriff McKinnon, fearing trouble, rushed the prisoners to Okmulgee before the mob formed. The negroes Bell Lee and H. Johnson were alleged to have stabbed Marshall Husler and Clarence Brown, white boys, when the four met on a sidewalk and neither pair would give the right of way.

CAUSE OF EDUCATION IN TEXAS MUST HAVE SUPPORT SAYS BIZZELL

COLLEGE STATION, June 4.—The cause of education is at a crossroads and the friends of education must get back of an educational program and political leadership must be developed which will secure the adoption of such a program, Dr. W. B. Bizzell, president of Texas A. & M. college, told old graduates of the college here for commencement exercises.

"If the legislature reduces the estimates contained in the legislative bill, which the governor just vetoed, it will mean the arresting of educational progress in Texas," he said. He urged the revision of Texas tax laws and the equalization of the burden.

COL. R. D. GORDON PLANNING TO BUILD GASOLINE PLANT

EASTLAND, June 4.—Continental Gasoline company will build a gasoline plant in the Lake Eastland district, according to word received here from Col. Robert D. Gordon, who is in New York. The company is incorporated for \$250,000.

Erection of the plant will start as soon as Colonel Gordon returns from New York, the message said. Gordon will be president and Dr. H. B. Tanner, secretary and treasurer. The plant will probably be built on the Caudle lease, on which the Gordon Petroleum company has seven producing wells at present.

EIGHTEENTH AMENDMENT.

1. The Constitution of the United States provides specifically the way in which amendments may be made:

(a) Proposed by the national senate by two-thirds vote.
 (b) Proposed by the national house of representatives by two-thirds vote.
 (c) Ratified by both senate and the house of three-fourths of the States.

The eighteenth—the prohibition amendment—was adopted in exactly the way preceding amendments were adopted.

2. The United States senate, August 1, 1917, proposed the prohibition amendment, 65-20.

3. The United States house of representatives, on December 17, 1917, proposed the prohibition amendment, 262-128.

4. The congress which proposed this was elected, with the amendment as the dominant issue, November, 1916, five months before the United States entered the war.

5. From January 8, 1918, to January 16, 1919, thirty-six (36) states (the necessary three-fourths—prohibition effective one year thereafter) ratified the amendment with a combined vote of 1,016 to 416.

6. The only states that have not ratified are Rhode Island and Connecticut.

7. The movement that resulted in the eighteenth amendment began in 1851, when the first state adopted prohibition—72 years ago.

8. When the United States entered the war, twenty-six (26) states had voted "dry," and over 85 per cent of our area, inhabited by more than 60,000,000 people, was "dry" territory.

9. No other amendment of the federal constitution was ever discussed so widely and continuously through so long a stretch of years, and no other amendment was ever adopted so overwhelmingly.—Federal Council Bulletin.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS VOLUNTARILY ABOLISH ANNUAL CLASS RUSH

 EL PASO, June 4.—No more class rushes at El Paso high schools. And the faculty and school board did not abolish them, but the students.

Class rushes, practiced year after year, have always had more or less ill effects, and there will be no more of them, freshmen, sophomore, juniors and seniors have agreed.

Two years ago, for example, class work was interfered with for a week, and students, half a dozen at least, were bruised so badly that it was days before they got back to school. Members of some classes kept others off the school grounds, also.

A year ago, one boy's leg was broken, another was injured internally and an operation on him was necessary, two or three were made sick by exposure in the mountains where they were carried off and tied, and there were other ill effects.

This year, a student after he climbed to the top of the 100-foot flagpole, fainted and fell off. He was not injured, but his escape was miraculous. It scared everybody, sobered students up to the point of listening. Classes met and voted unanimously to "cut out the horse play."

Class supremacy, hereafter, will be settled in baseball, basketball games and through other regular sports.

The same vote was taken by members of the El Paso Junior college, a school giving two full years of accredited college work, which is taught in the high school building.

Dr. Frank H. H. Roberts is president of El Paso Junior college and also is principal of El Paso high school.

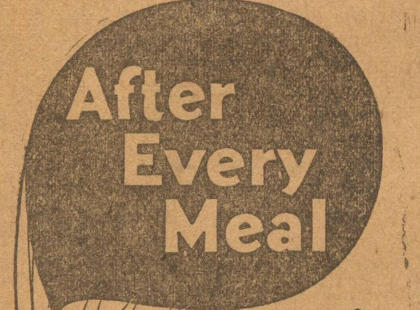

Witness Admits Advertising Not Entirely Correct

FORT WORTH, June 4.—Charles Sherwin, defendant in the General Lee oil interests promotion trial, admitted on the stand today that some of the statements contained in literature sent out by the company were not true and said that there had been "errors" and "oversight" in the pamphlets "The Honor of the Lees." He said he had been negligent in looking over the copy prepared by his advertising men.

Sherwin made the statement in answer to a question of Judge Bledsoe. He said he had termed "General" Lee a "miracle geologist" from his own conclusions, believing him to have a general and scientific knowledge of oil drilling.

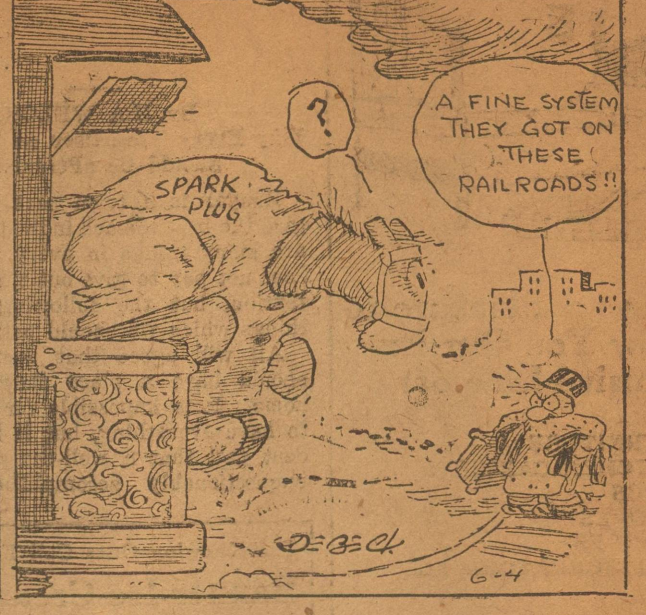
