Jane's father started a bank account for them at the PEOPLES STATE BANK. That's where I have


my rainy day drop.





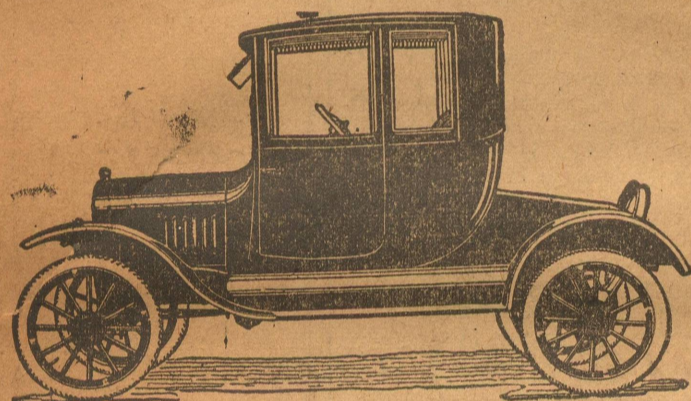

Thou art Patterson's and Joe Burkett's home.

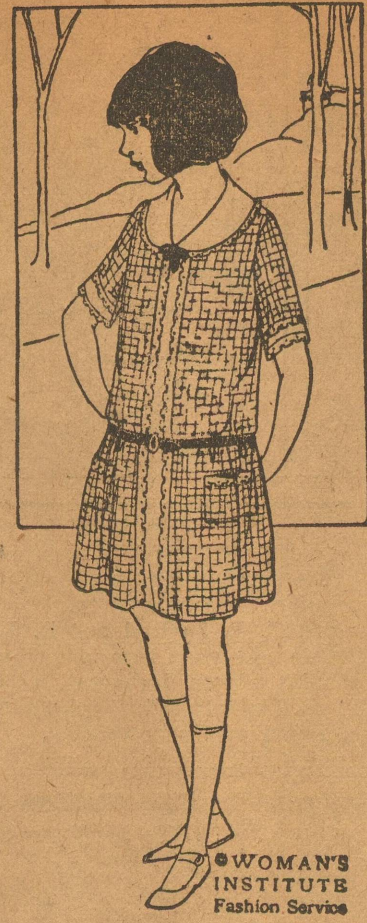
We've stood beneath Italian skies,

## HUGE CROWDS ATTENDING 1923 BASEBALL GAMES

By HENRY L. FARRELL, United Press Sports Editor.

NEW YORK, May 7.—Attendance at the early games of the baseball season made it apparent that the crowds in the future will be regulated only by the size of the parks in the big towns. It no longer is a question of the number of fans who want to see the players in action, but a problem of the rather limited number of them who can be allowed to see the games.

There is little doubt that 100,000 would have been present at the dedication of the new Yankee stadium if the park was big enough to hold them. As it was, there were approximately 75,000 in the stands and about 25,000 were turned away.

The first five games of the season played by the Yankees drew more than 200,000 through the gates of the huge stadium and established a mark that is almost unbelievable.

Interest in the game is not confined to New York, as a heavy increase in attendance has been observed in all of the big league towns and in a corresponding degree in the important minor points.

Ban Johnson predicted last season that the game has reached its peak and that there would be a slump in interest this year, but that just helps to prove that whenever Johnson expresses any kind of an opinion he is nearly always wrong.

Washington is sending a crew on again this year to row the best eight in the east on the Hudson at Poughkeepsie. The invasion of the westerners hasn't aroused the eastern schools to any hilarity, as it is a rather general belief that another championship is about to leave the east.

It took one of the greatest crews ever developed to beat Washington last year, and that great Navy team has been broken up by the graduation of seven oarsmen.

There are no outstanding crews in the east and the Washington eight proved its class by defeating the California crew for the championship of the Pacific coast.

With so many examples to prove that it is almost impossible to overestimate the tremendous interest in sports in this country, it would seem that the West Side Tennis club, of Forest Hills, is making a mistake in building its new stadium to accommodate only 10,000 spectators. Without figuring on the natural increase of interest in tennis that can be expected in 10 years, the stadium will hardly be big enough now to accommodate the crowds that will want to see the Davis cup challenge round.

## New Process Gives Accurate Picture Of Ocean Bottom

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—The precise contour of the Pacific continental shelf from San Francisco Bay to Point Descanso, Mexico, revealed here recently in the publication by the Hydrographic office of the navy department of a bathymetric chart, shows the floor of the ocean in a detailed way which will enable mariners hereafter to determine the position of their craft when landmarks are obstructed from view by climatic conditions.

The information is based on a recent cruise made by the destroyers Hull and Corry, employing the recently invented Sonic finder.

**Timing Depth.** The Sonic finder, a device which determines the depth of the ocean by recording the time required for the sound to reach the bottom and re-echo to the ship, takes a 2,000-foot sounding in less than a minute, supplanting a method which required six hours.

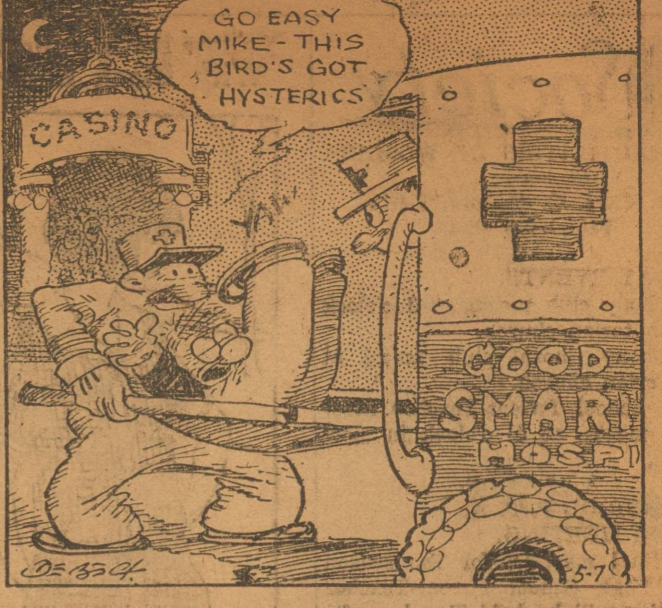
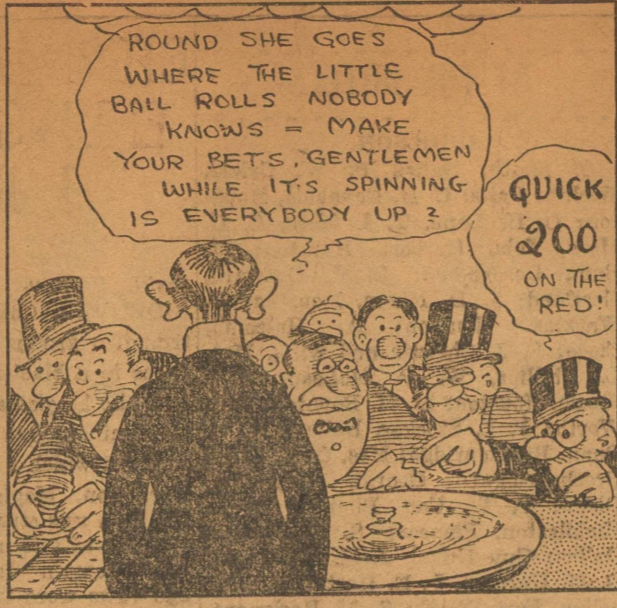
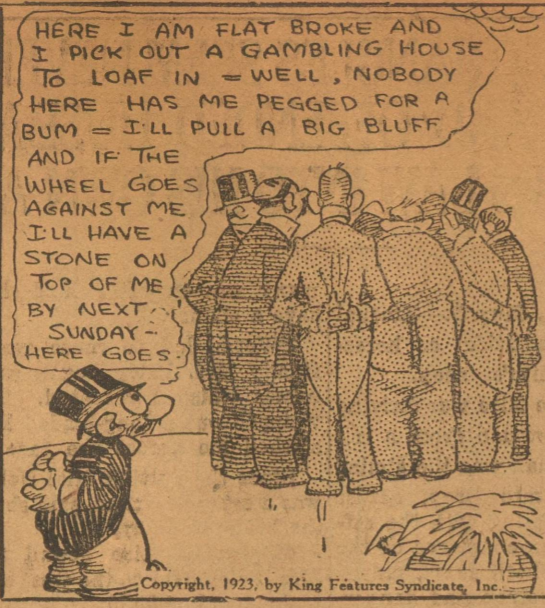
Originally undertaken at the request of the Carnegie Institute to aid in finding earthquake faults in the Pacific Ocean, the results obtained by the charting cruise far exceeded the original purpose, according to Lieut. Lyman K. Swenson, of the navy department.

Geologists may employ the chart to trace the extension of oil fields, situated on the southern California coast, to submerged prominences in the same vicinity offshore, it is said.

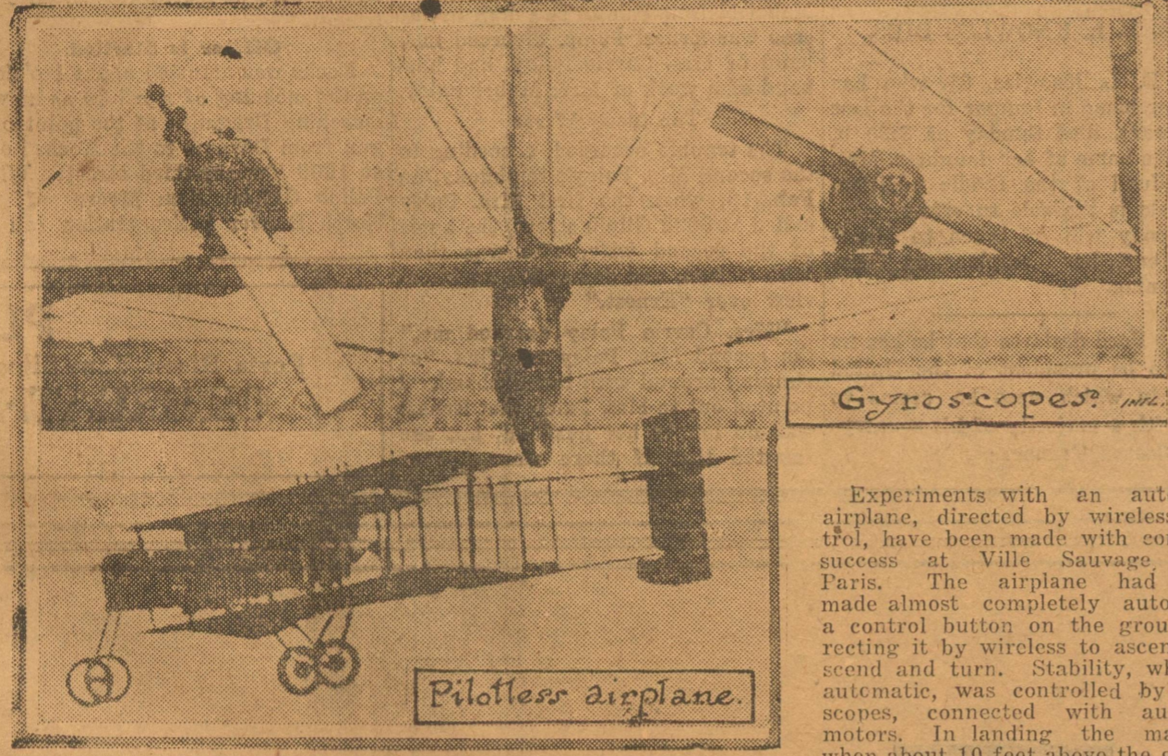
Elaborating the possibilities of such a chart, Lieutenant Swenson said it would enable anthropologists to trace links between continents in order to reach a determination of the manner in which animals migrated to countries which are now separated by oceans.

**Aid to Navigation.** With the chart as a basis, mariners approaching the California coast could direct their craft, if equipped with the Sonic finder, to any harbor by means of deductions from the finder interpreted by the chart, navy officers said.

The expedition furnished revelations regarding the floor of the ocean off the Pacific coast, which

Experiments with an automatic airplane, directed by wireless control, have been made with complete success at Ville Saucage near Paris. The airplane had been made almost completely automatic, a control button on the ground directing it by wireless to ascend, descend and turn. Stability, which is automatic, was controlled by gyroscopes, connected with auxiliary motors. In landing the machine, when about 10 feet above the ground automatically started, and the plane
