New Process Gives Accurate Picture

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5 .--- The precise contour of the Pacific continental shelf from San Fransico Bay to Point Descanso, Mexico, revealed here recently in the publication by the Hydrographic office of the navy department of a bathymetric chart, shows the floor of the ocean in a detailed way which will enable mariners hereafter to determine the position of their craft when landmarks are obstructed from view by climatic conditions.
