FORT WORTH, June 6 .- Punishment for four oil stock brokers. who were alleged to have sold stock on claims of quick riches, was announced today in federal court.

Walter Marks, Chicago broker, whose company handled stock of the General Lee interests was fined \$15,-000 today by Judge Benjamin Bled-soe. Nathan Sang, Phillip Goldstein and Max Hurst, who peddles stock for Marks, were each fined \$10,000. The four men pleaded guilty at the outset of the trial of those involved in the affairs of the General Lee company, District Attorney Zweifel said today.

Judge Bledsoe would have given them the jail sentence but the district attorney recommended that they be fined only. The men came to Fort Worth voluntarily and told all

#### FEDERAL AGENTS SEIZE COUNTERFEITING GANG IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, June 6 .- Thirteen men were arrested and \$2,000,000 of bogus government stamps, used in labelling whisky, were seized by operatives of the United States secret service in two raids last night at the places where the stamps were made. Chief Operative Palmer, who conducted the raids, declared the men were flooding the country with fake labels. Dies and printing equipment were also seized.

WASHINGTON, June 6 .- The arrest of 13 men in New York and the seizure of counterfeit revenue stamps, medical prescriptions and withdrawal permits was declared by Chief Moran of the secret service to have been one of the most successful raids in months by the service.

Moran charged that the men had been working for several groups, one of which was the manufacturer of concoctions of liquor, and another to obtain medical liquor from druggists and the third to make withdrawal permits to obtain liquor from bonded warehouses.

It is primarily an amusement seeking city, with assorted ideas on what is amusement. The same rules that hold in other big cities do not apply to New York. Professional football, which goes big in the Middle West, was a bust in New York, where it was figured that anything would get a crowd. New York supports two six-day bike races a year, and they wouldn't draw any more than a laugh in any other big

Promoters who have been successful in New York generally work on the theory of "giving 'em a winner" in anything they like, but this does not always work, as is being shown now in the case of the New York

Manhattan fans have turned away from the Giants and are favorable to the Yankees with their patronage. Considering that the Giants are world champions and that in two world series engagements they have made the Yanks decidedly inferior, it is difficult to figure the change

If the main idea is to look at a winner, the Giants certainly ought to get more patronage at home than their American league rivals, because the Giants are not only the greatest team in the major leagues now, but many former players, managers and old fans regard McGraw's present team as one of the best bal-

championship teams, like the Philadelphia crowds did back in 1914, when poor business forced Connie Mack to break up one of the greatest teams of all times.

At one time the American league club in New York was scoffed at and ridiculed and fans boasted that they were Giant rooters. The rabid partisanship began to slip away as soon as the Yanks got Babe Ruth, and now the same fans are just as rabidly boosting the Yanks.


