City Judge Flewellen is working on a curfew ordinance today. He was instructed yesterday by the commission to draw one up following a statement by Police Commissioner Terrell that children were roaming the streets late at nights in increasing num-

The commissioner suggested that it should include minors up to the age of 15 years but Police Chief Davenport, who was present, asked that it be made to include minors of the age of 16.

Commissioner Terrell said there were more complaints of petty thieving in Ranger than at any time and the small boys out at nights are taking a part in it. He said also it will have the effect of putting more children into school regularly than at present. "It will protect 12 and 14-yearold girls," he further said.




