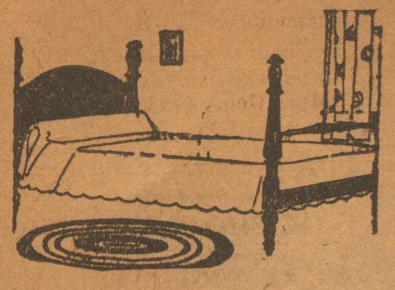

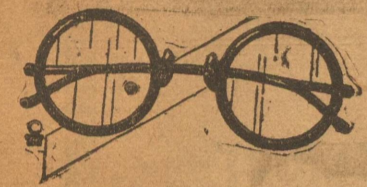

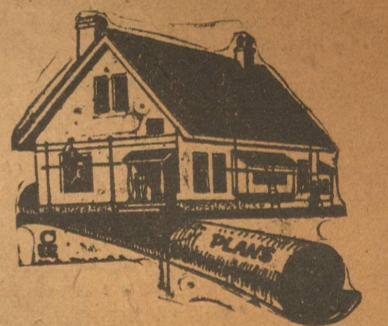

RACING CARS ARE MODELED ON SMALLER LINES

Speedway Event at Indianapolis May 30 Will See Them In Action.

By CAPT. E. V. RICKENBACKER, American Ace in World War. (Written for the United Press.) INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 21.—The automobiles which will be driven in the 500-mile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway Wednesday, May 30, are sleek and neat. In comparison with the 600 cubic inches piston displacement juggernauts of yesterday, they remind one of the race between the 250-pound fat, flabby, undertrained athlete and the 125-pound, properly primed sprinter.

The new cars have a total piston displacement of only 122 cubic inches whether they be four, six or eight-cylinder motors. This is the first time cars of this small size ever have been raced in America. The smaller they have made the motors, the more rapid they run. It is just like the sprinter on the track. When he first starts training he is slow and laggard. Constant practice makes him quick on the getaway, develops his efficiency and power and within a short time he is able to run great distances and still have surplus energy at the finish.

The motors in these new racing cars develop from 4,500 to 6,000 revolutions per minute, compared with 2,500 in former days. The reciprocating parts are lighter and easier of action. Fewer of them are broken under the stress and strain of high speed. Lubrication has been perfected to a higher degree and metals have gained strength through experiments which were made necessary by the constant reduction in the size of motors and cars decreed by the speedway management.

A Bit of History.
It is interesting to note that in the first 500-mile race at Indianapolis in 1911 the winner, Ray Harroun, piloted a six-cylinder motor of 447.1 cubic inches at an average speed of 74.59 miles per hour. A foreign car which was second had a piston displacement of 544.4 inches and the largest piston displacement motor in the race, another of foreign make, totalled 589 inches. Yet the foreigners were the pioneers in developing smaller motors and have had much more experience with the smaller power plants than the American engineers.

In 1912, the winning car in the hands of Joe Dawson, had four cylinders and a piston displacement of 40.8 inches and averaged 78.7 miles per hour. The following year Jules Goux won the race in a foreign 10-cylinder car of only 488 inches, but his slower average was 76.92 miles an hour.

Then Rene Thomas came along in 1914 and with another four-cylinder foreign job of only 280 inches averaged 82.47 miles an hour. The car of smaller piston displacement made the fastest time ever made thus far at Indianapolis. In the same year he established a track record for one lap of 103 miles an hour which still stands.

Ralph De Palma's foreign four-cylinder car in 1915, was of the 274 cubic inches vintage and he set up a record of 89.94 miles an hour that remained intact until Jimmy Murphy, my former mechanic, smashed it to smithereens last May by negotiating the distance in a 183-inch car at the rate of 94.48 miles an hour.

AM'RILLO.—Obtaining lands for municipal parks would be the purpose of a municipal board which local officials have been requested to establish by citizens. Several tracts of land have been offered for park purposes.

MISSION.—Mission has the distinction of having grown and shipped the first carload of cantaloupes of the season for the entire United States. The first car was rolled from here last week to New York. Last year this town won similar distinction when it shipped a carload of cantaloupes on May 22. Prospects are for a record production on increased acreage, according to farmers.

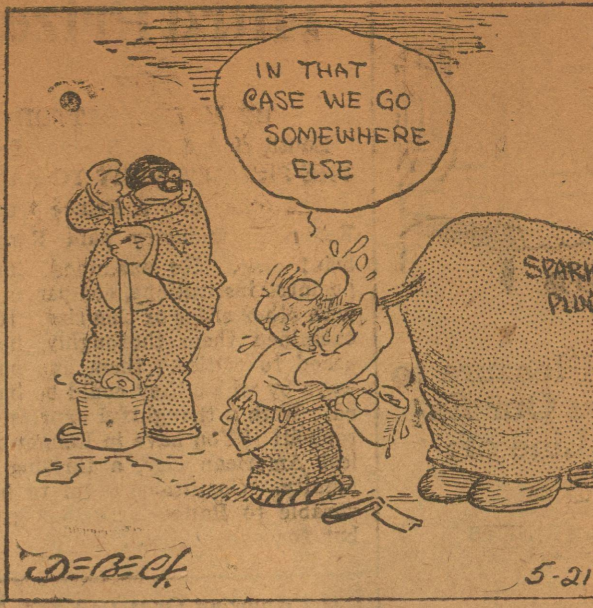
