Lord Curzon Regarded as Most Probable Man, But Others Being Considered.

LONDON, May 21.—Marquis Curzon, secretary of state for foreign affairs since 1919 is the most likely successor to the premiership from which Andrew Bonar Law retired last night.

Ill health from throat affliction forced the resignation of the man who has been at the helm of the British government since last October. He was too ill even to pay the usual customary visit to the king.

It is expected King George will summon Lord Curzon to Aldershot ministry. Curzon has many enemies, however. Many think the premier should be qualified to sit in the house of lords. Consequently Stanley Baldwin, chancellor of the Exchecquer, has been mentioned for the office. Earl Balfour and James





## RACING CARS ARE MODELED ON SMALLER LINES

Speedway Event at Indianapo lis May 30 Will See Them In Action.

By CAPT. E. V. RICKENBACKER, American Ace in World War.

(Written for the United Press.) INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 21.-The automobiles which will be driven in the 500-mile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway Wednesday, May 30, are sleek and neat. In comparison with the 600 cubic inches pis ton displacement juggernauts of yesteryear, they remind one of the race between the 250-pound fat, flabby, undertrained athlete and the 125pound, properly primed sprinter.

The new cars have a total piston displacement of only 122 cubic inches whether they be four, six or eight-cylinder motors. This is the first time cars of this small size ever have sprinter on the track. When he first starts training he is slow and loggy. Constant practice makes him quick on the getaway, develops his efficiency and power and within a short time he is able to run great distances and still have surplus energy at the

The motors in these new racing cars develop from 4,500 to 6,000 revolutions per minute, compared with 2,500 in former days. The reciprocating parts are lighter and easier of action. Fewer of them are broken under the stress and strain of high speed. Lubrication has been perfected to a higher degree and metals have gained strength through experiments which were made necessary by the constant reduction in the size of motors and cars decreed by the speed- TOTAL way management.


