## Golden Rule Sunday

American Families Asked to Eat Frugally and Give Liberally Next Sabbath for Orphan Charges in Near East.

Refugee rations are the prescribed diet for every resident of the United States on Dec. 2. Before that date, it is expected that a million Americans will have signed pledge cards to observe Golden Rule Sunday with a diet similar to that which is served regularly, day after day, in the American orphanages of the Near East.

'The intelligent study of foods, from the point of view of economy and efficiency, will be stimulated by the annual observance of Golden Rule Sunday, recently proposed by a convention of international relief bodies in Switzerland. Right between the feastings of Thanksgiving and Christmas comes Dec. 2, when we shall lighten the strain on our digestions and brighten up our imagination as to what it means to live on a "bare sufficiency," by living for one meal or one day on just enough bare necessities to keep alive.

The plan is to serve the family on Dec. 2, the sort of foods they might get if they were living in Syria, Greece or Armenia, and subsisting largely on American bounty.

The food given to these refugee orphans consists of American staples, bread, macaroni or rice, not as a side issue but as the main ration, with just enough mutton in stew, perhaps twice a week, cocoa, corn syrup and condensed milk, to make it go down

## QUEER MIX-UP OF BABIES

CORDOVA, Spain, Nov. 29. -Two helpless babies who do not know their own mothers, much less their fathers, have been denied haptism by a priest here and present a world record puzzle in mixed-up babies. "Pat Neff," Beloved by All the Children and a Favorite With Everybody, Is Crushed Beneath the Wheels of an Automobile.

EASTLAND, Nov. 29. -Thanksgiving, though bright and sunshiny, was a day of sadness and lamentation for many folk in Eastland, especially the school children, for Pat Neff

No, not the governor of Texas. While Eastland has a wholesome respect for governors in general and their own governor in particular, the demise of a mere governor would not cast a pall of personal gloom like the passing of Eastland's own Pat

This yarn is about a dog. Pat Neff was a little woolly dog, of Scotch ancestry, the actual property of Mrs. Louisa Jones, 203 South Connellee street, but claimed by all Eastland.

Pat ran afoul of an automobile about sundown Wednesday and his soul passed on to the happy hunting ground of good dogs an hour and a half later.

The irony of the tragedy was that the offending car was driven by a boy and Pat was the idol of all the children of the town. It was growing dusk and the youthful driver did not have a chance to see the diminutive dog, who dodged out from under another car, blind to all danger when he saw his beloved mistress coming toward home after an afternoon downtown. Pat Neff was not just an

ordinary dog, which is why this account of him. He was an extraordinary dog, wise beyond his years, a familiar figure on all the streets of Eastland. He was a daily caller at the courthouse, where he was known to all of the county officials. In the last month of his life he never let a day go by without paying a visit to the Daily Telegram, to pay his respects to the

Not to have known Pat Neff was to argue oneself unknown in Eastland. His progress down the street was an ovation each day, as nearly every man, woman and child he passed reached down to stroke the little dog and say something kind to him. It is reliably related that one of Eastland's best known citi-

zens, lying on his death bed, called for Fat Neff and would not be comforted until his wife fetched the little dog to lick his hand and whine his distress. The man died with the dog beside his bed. A sick boy could not go to

sleep Wednesday night until his mother went to see how Pat Neff was getting along. She dared not tell the boy the dog was dead.

Pat Neff is dead and the Thanksgiving sun was a little dim in Eastland.

## CHRISTMAS DAY PARDONS

President Coolidge Looking Into Records of Political Prisoners With View to Freeing Them if Possible.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 .-President Coolidge intends to issue Christmas Day pardons to 32 political prisoners remaining in federal penitentiaries, if it be legally possible to do so. He has ordered a complete investigation of all their cases by the department of justice and has created a special non-partisan committee to advise him relative to restoring liberty to the men. This committee consists of Newton D. Beker former secretary of war in Fresident Wilson's cabi-

net; Bishop Charles Brent of Buffalo and Major General James G. Harboard, retired A. E. F. veteran.

This committee held its first meeting in Buffalo yesterday.
