Luther Davenport Funeral Services Largely Attended

Friends and acquaintances from all walks of life filled the large Methodist church auditorium Sunday afternoon at the funeral services for Luther Davenport, who died suddenly while swimming at Olden lake, Saturday evening.

The funeral procession reached Ranger from Eastland shortly before 5 o'clock and went immediately to the Methodist church. A short service was held at the residence of the deceased in Eastland, before the procession left for Ranger, conducted by Rev. Mr. Munger of the Methodist church of Eastland.

Rev. L. A. Webb of Ranger was assisted by Rev. Mr. Munger at the services. The church choir was led by Mrs. Bessie Luke. The pallbearers were: G. A. Davidson, William Dorsey, Ray Starnes of Eastland; G. D. Chastain, W. T. Garrett and F. J. Dreinhof of Ranger.

Mr. Davenport was buried in the Davenport family burial lot at Evergreen cemetery. While living at Eastland at the time of his death, Mr. Davenport always considered Ranger as his home.

Friends and relatives from distant points were here for the services. Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Keeling and Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Dingman of Paris were among those present from a distance.

Guardian of Young Girls Killed; Man Blamed for Deed

CHICAGO, June 25.—Resentment of interference that may have saved a young girl from the clutches of some designing man is believed behind the killing of Mrs. Carrie Lawrence, 37, known as the "guardian of Lovelace Lane," who was found dead today in her home on Harlem avenue, a wooded thoroughfare just outside the city limits. Her daughter, Ethel, and a boy friend found her seated in her chair with a bullet wound in her head.

TRAIN LEAPS FROM ELEVATED IN BROOKLYN

Four Known Dead and Thirty Are Injured in Crash.

NEW YORK, June 25.—Hurting into space through a fence, 30 feet from the ground, a two-car elevated train filled with passengers plunged into the street in the heart of Brooklyn this afternoon. At 3 o'clock at the scene of the accident, four persons, two men and two women, were known to have been killed. Others are thought to be dead in the wreckage. Thirty persons were taken out injured.

Every available piece of fire fighting apparatus and every ambulance in the neighborhood and police reserves hastened to the scene. In the stifling heat, which gripped New York today, they delved into the splintered frames of the cars, from which screams of the injured and the hysterical cries of women could be heard.

As the cars plunged through the railing they seemed to halt on the brink of the elevated and the screams of the passengers mingled with the grating of iron and wood. The first car turned over on its downward plunge. The second then crashed down on the first. Throngs rushed towards the scene from every direction. The spot of the crash is at the intersection of Atlantic and Fourth, one of the busiest sections in Brooklyn.

TOUSSAINT SATISFIED WITH LIFE SENTENCE

WICHITA FALLS, June 25.—Counsel for H. J. Toussaint, convicted at Anson, Saturday, of murdering his father here in February, 1921, and sentenced to 99 years in the penitentiary, announced today his client would accept the verdict and begin serving his sentence at once. He was first tried in Wichita county and sentenced to die, but the case was reversed and he obtained a new trial.

DEATHS IN AUTO ACCIDENTS OVER WEEK-END IN CITIES

Copyrighted 1923 by the United Press. Thirty-eight persons were killed and 184 injured over the week-end as a result of automobile accidents in 33 large cities of this country, according to reports gathered by the United Press today. Twenty-two were injured and four killed in Detroit, Johnstown, Pa., Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, and Denver, Colo., each reported three killed.

CAR GOES DOWN 100-FOOT CLIFF, NEGRO KILLED

Three Others in Auto Badly Hurt; Accident Happens on Bankhead Highway.

A Ford car in which five negroes were riding hit a pile of gravel on the Bankhead highway, 10 miles east of Ranger about 11 p. m. Saturday and dropped down an embankment estimated to be about 100 feet deep and killed one of the women and injured three others. The fifth jumped when he saw the car heading for the embankment and escaped without injuries.

The car was one of an old make, with kerosene lamps, and because of the poor light thrown by the lamps the driver probably didn't see the gravel pile. The car is said to have made a complete somersault, landing on its top.

Rena Robertson, who had her head crushed by the impact, was sitting in the rear seat. Those who suffered injuries were: Charles Holmes, back wrenched and broken thumb; Ed Gaines, driver of the car, head bruised, one eye lost and sprained wrist; William Lewis, back wrenched and both ankles sprained. The name of the one uninjured was not learned by the Milford Funeral home, whose ambulance answered the call. He is nicknamed "Celloid," it is said.

The negroes left Ranger about 10 o'clock and were bound for Mineral Wells.

When the Milford ambulance reached the scene of the accident about midnight, the body of the dead woman was found unguarded. All of the accident victims had been previously brought to Ranger in passing cars.

A brother of the victim lives in Fort Worth and a sister in Graham. Both were notified and they will be here tonight. The body will be sent to Fort Worth tomorrow.

Reckless Drivers Pinched; Second Arrest for Youth

Three drivers charged with driving their cars recklessly were arrested and fined over the week-end by the police department. One of the drivers is a Ranger youth, who has been in before on the same charge. He was fined \$11.70 and said he would pay the fine on his next pay day.

Night Sergeant Hamilton left his office and went out and got a man late Saturday night, who was said to be careless in his driving. Officer Jim Ingram picked up a man for carelessness after his car is said to have run into the rear of another driver. The driver was also charged with drunkenness.

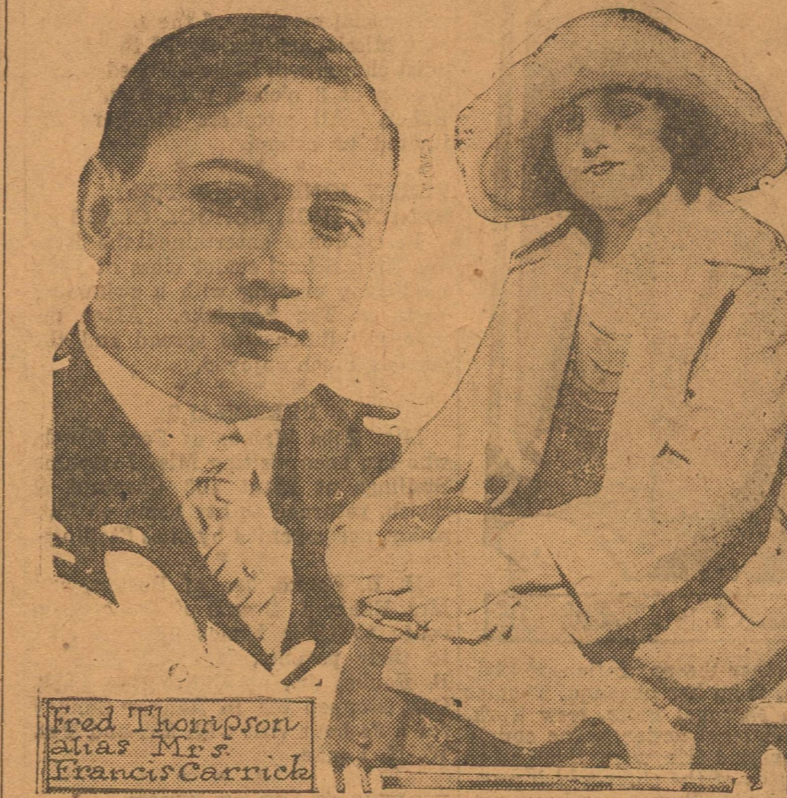
Only one drunk was found last night and he was hustled to the jail to reflect things over.

About 5 o'clock this morning, Officer Ingram arrested two men, one from Ranger and the other from Graham, and a young woman of Ranger at a local hotel. Charges of vagrancy were placed against the trio to which they pled guilty. Fines of \$15.70 were paid promptly.

STATE HAS CHARACTER WITNESSES TO TESTIFY IN TOM ROSS TRIAL

LUBBOCK, June 23.—More than 20 witnesses were introduced at the morning session of the Tom Ross trial. State attorneys attempted to discredit the testimony introduced by defense characterizing H. L. Robertson and W. D. Allison as "dangerous and violent men." The defense rested after three witnesses. The state used character witnesses for the first time. Among them were W. E. Connell of the First National bank of Fort Worth, W. H. Warwick, Judge G. A. Dickinson of Seymour and others. It is predicted the case will go to the jury about Wednesday or Thursday.

MYSTERY "WOMAN" IDENTIFIED AS SLAYER



Fred Thompson alias Mrs. Francis Carrick. The "woman" arrested as "Mrs. Francis Carrick," in Chicago, charged with the murder of Richard O. Tesmer, insurance man, who was shot dead by a "woman bandit" when he sought to save his wife's wedding ring from highwaymen, has turned out to be "Fred Thompson," a man, a drug addict, who for years posed as the wife of Francis Carrick, but who often appeared in his real male garb. He was positively identified by Mrs. Tesmer. The photographs of Thompson, posing as both a man and a woman, were found in his apartment.

HARDING LOSES FOUR OF PARTY IN AUTO CRASH

Three Dead, One Seriously Hurt, Result of Car Diving Off High Bluff.

DENVER, June 25.—Thomas Dawson, Colorado state historian, died in a hospital here early today as a result of an automobile accident yesterday, in which two of his companions were instantly killed and another besides himself hurt. He passed away suddenly after it was thought he had passed the critical stage. Donald Craig, manager of the New York Herald's Washington bureau, is now the only survivor of the accident and his condition is regarded serious.

DENVER, June 25.—Sumner Curtis of Washington, representative of the Republican national committee, accompanying President Harding's party on its western trip, was killed outright, Thomas French was fatally hurt and two other men were injured seriously when the automobile in which they were making a mountain trip plunged off the road into Bear creek canyon, 25 miles from Denver, late Sunday.

The injured are Donald Craig, manager of the Washington bureau of the New York Herald, and Thomas Dawson, Colorado state historian and veteran Washington newspaper man.

Thomas French of Denver, driver of the car, died on the way to a hospital. The extent of the injuries sustained by Mr. Craig and Mr. Dawson has not yet been learned definitely.

The accident victims were members of a large party of newspaper correspondents who, because President Harding was resting Sunday afternoon, dropped their work and took an excursion to the mountains as guests of the Denver Press club. President Harding was not with the party.

The route taken, leading over Lookout mountain, follows a tortuous trail through the canyon. It was at an extremely sharp curve near Evergreen, at a point where a mirror is posted for the protection of motorists, that the steering gear of one of the machines broke, according to the reports reaching here, sending the car over the cliff into the creek bed below.

FEDERAL WATER ENGINEERS COMING TO WORK IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, June 25.—A board of federal topographical engineers will arrive in Texas next week to begin work on the \$600,000 reclamation flood control program provided for at the regular session, it was announced today by the state board of water engineers.

BRITISH SHOW MORE JUDGMENT THAN FRENCH

Liquor Interests Find Latter Easier to Lead by Suggestion Than English.

LONDON, June 25.—Premier Baldwin announced in the house of commons today that he could see no ground for a British protest against enforcement of its liquor laws, rules and regulations by officials of the United States in its home ports, and that foreign ships must abide by the laws of the countries they visited, even to the breaking of foreign seals. This announcement followed a query relative to the rights of the United States regarding search and seizure of liquor on foreign ships visiting United States ports.

PARIS, June 25.—A French protest against the American seizure of liquor on French ships visiting United States ports was dispatched to Washington at once, it was said here today, although Premier Poincare favors delay of action until congress meets again in the belief the law will then be changed. Others here favor reprisals and point out how French regulations may be imposed on American ships visiting foreign ports that would detain them in port for a month. They would impose such regulations on some foreign ships and not on others, so extreme are the views of the liquor interests.

Boone Sets Fast Pace for Ranger Golf Enthusiasts

Using only a mashie and putter, Floyd Boone played nine holes for a score of 36 Sunday afternoon, a rare feat not only for most golfers but also for himself. It was his first full line holes since recovering from a recent knee infection. His score by holes was: 4-3-4-4-5-2-6-4-3-6. Boone also made a 36 and 37 in playing around, using what sticks he wanted. Dr. Clyde C. Craig made a score of 40 yesterday, the best he has made on the course. Boone expected to begin today giving golf lessons.

CHESTNUT & SMITH SHIP TRAINLOAD OF GASOLINE

A train of 34 cars of gasoline were shipped out of Ranger today for Port Arthur via the Texas & Pacific railroad. Chestnut & Smith were the shippers.

HARDING SAYS COUNTRY'S LAWS "CAN AND WILL BE ENFORCED," NEW YORK ATTITUDE ABSURD

DENVER, June 25.—President Harding served notice in an address here today that the federal government was determined to enforce the prohibition law even should the burden of enforcement continue to be increasingly thrown upon it by the states.

Moreover, the executive voiced the conviction not only that the prohibition amendment will not be repealed, but that whatever changes may be made in the Volstead act "will represent the sincere purpose of effective enforcement, rather than moderation of the general policy."

Striking straight out at those who violate the law, the President said the issue is fast coming to be recognized not as one between the "wets" and "drys," but as one of whether the laws of "this country can be and will be enforced."

Better Enforcement. "So far as the federal government is concerned," he said, "and I am very sure also, so far as concerns the very great majority of the state governments and the local governments, it will be enforced. A gratifying, indeed, it may fairly be said, an amazing progress has been made in the last few years toward better enforcement."

While Mr. Harding made no direct reference to the situation in New York state, he did say that "the spectacle" of a state nullifying its own authority, and asking the national sovereignty to take over an important part of its powers, is new. He added that "when the implications of this strange proposal are fully understood by people and parties devoted to preserving the rights of the states, the new nullificationists, I venture to say, will discover that they have perpetrated what is likely to prove one of the historic blunders in political management."

The President disclosed that a good deal of testimony is reaching Washington that some states having prohibition enforcement codes and even some which successfully enforced "dry" laws before national prohibition are "disposed to abdicate their own police authority in this matter and to turn the burden of prohibition enforcement to the federal authorities."

Ridiculous Attitude. "Doubtless," he said, "this is largely due to a disconcerting notion, too widely entertained, that the federal government has actually taken over the real responsibility. The fact is quite the contrary. The federal government is not equipped with the instrumentalities to make enforcement locally effective. It does not maintain either a police or a judicial establishment adequate to or designed for such a task. If the burden of enforcement shall continue to be increasingly thrown upon the federal government, it will be necessary, at large expense, to create a federal police authority which in time will inevitably come to be regarded as an intrusion upon the interference with the right of local authority to manage local concerns. The possibilities of disaster in such a situation hardly need to be suggested. Yet it is something that we must recognize as among the menaces in this situation."

"The federal government ought to be in the hands of the state and local authorities, and it should be executed in all sincerity and good faith, as other laws are presumed to be executed. Duty of People. "What I am saying must not be construed as indicating any relaxation of the national governments' purpose to do its full duty in this matter. I

"The issue is fast coming to be recognized, not as an issue between wets and drys, not a question between those who believe in prohibition and those who do not, not a contention between those who want to drink and those who do not; it is fast being raised above all that, to recognition as an issue of whether the laws of this country can be and will be enforced. "It was very generally believed that the adoption of the constitutional amendment would take the question out of our politics. Thus far it has not done so, though I venture to predict that neither of the great parties will see the time, within the lives of any who are now voting citizens, when it will declare openly for the repeal of the eighteenth amendment. But despite all that, the question is kept in politics because of the almost fanatical urgency of the minority of extremists on both sides."

Harvesters flock to Kansas wheat fields. KANSAS CITY, June 25.—Twenty thousand harvest laborers today swarmed to work in the Kansas wheat fields. More are said to be needed. Because of the heavy rains, the grain in Kansas has ripened simultaneously and work is needed to save the wheat from becoming over-ripe.

Ranger Is Banner Produce Shipping Point Along T. & P.

The freight department of the Texas & Pacific railroad of Ranger is handling more produce at this point than any point along the railroad between Fort Worth and El Paso, it was said today at the local freight office. Seven cars of produce arrived here today, all consigned for Dillingham Produce company.

**POULTRY RAISERS PLAN**  
**BARBECUE FOR MEMBERS**

The Eastland County Poultry Raisers and Breeders association, which has headquarters in Cisco, has made definite arrangements to hold a chicken barbecue Saturday, Aug. 25. It is estimated that there will be from 2,500 to 3,000 people partake of the refreshments, and that much good will be derived from the meeting as a well rounded program is being arranged and prominent poultrymen from over the Southwest will be invited to speak. While definite plans for the program have not as yet been formulated, the following men will be asked to appear on the speaker's platform: E. O. Edson, poultry specialist, A. & M. college; Walter Burton, Arlington, Texas; M. W. Kazmier, Bryan, Texas; R. E. Sparkman, state representative, Ellis county; M. E. Hayes, Texas Farm bureau, Dallas, Texas; Ed Pritchard, Eastland county judge; R. H. Bush, Eastland county agricultural agent.

In order to secure a large membership for the rapidly growing poultry association, the directors have decided that only members of the association and their families will be allowed to participate in the barbecue, and as the membership dues are only \$1 a year, it is assumed that a large number of Eastland county citizens and those of other counties will join the association in order to take advantage of the barbecue. In this way it is hoped to secure about a thousand members.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Another 24 hours, at least, of the present broiling hot weather is promised for eastern and middle states and the southern part of the country, the weather bureau here announces.

DETROIT, June 25.—The hot weather which drove many to the lake shores and river banks is declared partly responsible for 12 drownings that occurred Sunday in Michigan. At Grand Rapids three were drowned, and at Detroit two met death in the water. The official temperature was stated at 94 degrees.

**HARDING SAYS COUNTRY'S**  
**LAWS CAN AND WILL**  
**BE ENFORCED**

(Continued from page one.)

There is no doubt that if the burden is cast, in undue proportion, upon the national authority the federal government will, not only under this administration but under whatever others may come in the future, assume and discharge the full obligation. But I am pointing out that this ought not to be made necessary. The national policy ought to be supported by the public opinion and the administrative machinery of the whole country. For myself, I am confident that we are passing now through the most difficult stage of this matter, and that as time passes there will be a more and more willing acceptance by authorities everywhere of the unalterable obligation of law enforcement. The country and the nation will not permit the law of the land to be made a byword.

"It is a curious illustration of loose thinking, that some people have proposed, as a means to protecting the fullest rights of the states, that the state should abandon their part in enforcing the prohibitory policy. That means simply an invitation to the federal government to exercise powers which should be exercised by the states. Instead of being an assertion of state rights, it is an abandonment of them; it amounts to a confession by the state that it doesn't choose to govern itself but prefers to turn the task, or a considerable part of it, over to the federal authority. There could be no more complete negation of state rights."

**GOVERNOR WILL APPROVE**  
**MEASURE TO AID INSANE**

AUSTIN, June 25.—Governor Neff told a large delegation of Austin citizens and representatives of various organizations in his offices today that he will approve an item of \$240,000 carried in the eleemosynary bill to repair and equip the old blind institution here for the senile insane, so they might be removed from the jails.
