DRY CLEANING PLANT BUILDS a to **UP BIG TRADE**

S. P. Boon Develops Business in Ranger Among Best in West Texas.

Perhaps the only complete power driven dry cleaning plant, where all of the machinery is driven by electricity, between Fort Worth and Abilene is located in Ranger. It is the plant of the Ranger Dry Cleaning company on the Tiffin road. It was established in September, 1919, by S. P. Boon and a cousin of his, who later withdrew from the firm.

To this equipment has been added only recently a pleating machine at a cost of approximately \$300, includ-ing the pleating forms. This also is said to be the only machine of its kind between Fort Worth and Abilene. Heretofore, the company sent pleating work to be done to Fort Worth, which meant delay and the additional cost of mailing and the risk of possible damage in transit.

The exclusive use of power driven machinery means greater efficiency in the cleaning of clothes. The electric motor, boxed up outside of the plant proper to avoid the danger of sparks setting anything on fire, runs every machine used in cleaning and is amazing. 
