

Thirteen Thousand Laws Are

Enacted in Year Although there is said to be no exact record of the number of laws on the statute books of the nation, experts have calculated that in one year, 13,000 of 40,000 bills presented in the legislatures of 35 states, were passed at a cost of about \$900 each. Congress handles from 10,000 to 20,000 bills each session, and, it is estimated, passed 930 before its last adournment. Estimators figure that there are between 50,000 and 100,000 state and ederal laws.




