Refuses to Help Solve Reparations Problem Along Lines Charted by Poincaire.

By United Press WASHINGTON, Nov. 2. - The United States has made clear to France that she will withdraw from the proposed investigation of Germany's ability to pay reparations by a commission of experts if the scope of the inquiry be restricted in advance by Premier Poincare.

This development came simultaneously with the attack on the Hughes plan by Senator Johnson at Oakland, Calif., which, though not unexpected, nevertheless served to impress the administration with the kind of criticism which it must expect if it enters the allied councils

The United States will refuse to become involved in an abortive investigation. Secretary Hughes offered to join in an inquiry of Germany's capacity to pay and methods by which payment may be made. He does not regard the restrictions laid down by Premier Poincare at Nevers on Thursday as in line with his proposal made in the recent note to Lord Curzon. In that communication Hughes said the United States would be willing to join in an eco-nomic conference "for the purpose of considering the questions of the capacity of Germany to make reparations payments and an appropriate financial plan for securing such pay

TEXAS U. ATHLETES MAY CHANGE DOMINANT COLOR OF THEIR SWEATERS

AUSTIN, Nov. 2.-Because white is considered an effeminate color, it is proposed that the prevailing color of Texas university athletic sweater awards be changed to orange. L Theo Bellmont, athletic director of the university, is taking the lead in the movement. The question will be definitely settled at an early joint meeting of the Longhorn "T" association, the organization of university athletes, and the university athletic council.

In the past, white coat sweaters with an orange "T", six inches in height, have been awarded to letter men in the various major sports. Under the proposed change, the sweaters would be orange with a

"Tis true that white symbolizes purity and virtue; but the orange denotes manliness and courage and should put iron into the blood of the athletes," declared Mr. Bellmont. "Last spring nine-tenths of the athletes in school signified that they were in favor of the change, and I anticipate little opposition to the proposal at this time."
