AUTOMOBILES AND PROHIBITION.

Is the rapid increase in the number and popularity of the automobile due in any part to prohibition? Automobiles were in use for a number of years before the country went dry but the ratio of increase during those years was nowhere near what it has been since prohibition went into effect. A writer in Ohio argues there would be far fewer automobiles in this country if the country had continued wet. He writes:

There are in Ohio enough automobiles to carry the entire population with an average of five persons in each machine. Father Ohio therefore can get out the family fliver and take the entire family a ride without over-crowding.

The growth in the number of automobiles in Ohio has been far out of proportion to the growth of the population. It has been steady ever since 1917 with the exception that in 1919 just at the close of the war, it dropped slightly because at that time there was a great tendency on the part of the people to make their old cars do and to invest their money in war savings stamps and liberty

Nobody will contend that prohibition alone is responsible for the large increase of the number of machines in Ohio, but it is a fact that the percentage of increase has been very heavy since prohibition went into effect. Ohio, which has been gradually drying up for several years, went dry by state-wide prohibition, May 27, 1919-about five weeks before complete war-time prohibition went into effect.

In 1917 the last com year in the United States, Ohio had 342,500 passenger cars and trucks. In 1918 the war-time food control bill was passed which stopped the manufacture of distilled liquors. Other legislation closed up a great many saloons around army camps and prohibited the sale of liquor to soldiers so that there was some stride in 1918. Notice that the number of cars and trucks rose to 514,-

It is known that every bit of rock, piece of steel, or even a penny is a colossal reservoir of energy in the form of electrons, that are constantly moving at a speed of from 10,000 to 160,000 miles a second. In his search for a force that would release this energy and at the same time control it, this inventor developed a 5,000,000 volt flash of lightning, a yard in diameter, which jumped a gap of 37 feet and was maintained for 31 seconds.



Easily Made Waterwheel for Running Small Dynamo


By using a light waterwheel of the type illustrated, where sufficient water current is available for turning it, the energy of the flowing water can be transformed and used for practical purposes.

The waterwheel can be made by attaching a number of tin cans, of suitable size, on the felloe of a discarded buggy wheel, and fastening the wheel, together with a pulley, on a shaft, that is supported by a wooden frame. The pulleys on the waterwheel and dynamo must be so proportioned in size that it will be possible to revolve the armature at its rated p. m., in order to obtain the voltage



Special and highly complicated apparatus force will be exerted on the waterwheel. increased from 11.7 to 11.9.

On circular saws it is often necessary to speed up the engine in order to cut heavy wood, but it is, of course, not necessary




