Hagaman and his sons, chief owners of the water works, to sell the system to the city of Ranger at the value determined by a competent appraiser, plus a sum which is understood to have been fixed at \$10,000.

Abuse of Privilege In Automobiles Is Lowering Morals

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 2. -Automobiles are lowering the morals of school children, Chief of Police John B. Hammond charges in a letter to the board of educatiton here.

"Boys and girls crowded together in automobiles induce familiarities that should not be tolerated and are a menace to future welfare and happiness of the American home," Hammond said.

"Immorality, dating back to high school days and induced by automobiles is the cause of most of divorces among young couples," he stated. "These cases are not confined to the ignorant—the educated, in fact, predominate."

High school "scandals" here and in other cities were cited by Hammond to support his charges.

"Make the children walk to school," is his plea.



"Because of the expanding and contracting of the steel of large buildings it is important that the mass of the building be kept as near a uniform temperature are possible, to prevent the steel from contracting and expanding within minimum limits, said Mr. Coley. "The limias are probably 85 degrees on the hottest sum mer day and 68 degrees on a cold winter's day, where the building is adequately heated.

"Should the buildings be allowed to cool off on Sundays and holidays to a temperature of 40 or 50 degrees it can be seen that the contraction would be much more marked and the bulging of much more marked and the bulging off of plaster would be excessive Generally it can be assumed that the temperature variation in the buildings is about 25 degrees.
