Rules For Farms.

In selecting birds for the demonstration farms the rules laid down by the Texas Baby Chick association at their recent meeting held in Arlington will be used with the following additional rules:

All birds passed by the inspector must be banded with state sealed and numbered leg bands at the time of inspection. Only one variety shall be kept on the farm unless ample provisions have been made to keep these varieties and their eggs separate. Birds rejected by the inspector shall have their tails clipped. Nobirds except those with state sealed and numbered leg bands shall be allowed in the breeding flock, and no male birds shall be allowed in the breeding flocks and no male birds shall be allowed in the selection of male birds, special other flocks aside from the breeding flocks that may be kept on the fam. In the selection of male birds, special attention shall be given to the constitutional vigor.
