



Liquor Now Barred From Ships In Port Flying All Flags

WASHINGTON, June 9 .- Amerca tonight launched its campaign against booze. No ship which puts into port after midnight tonight may egally bring liquor across the imagnary 3-mile line which marks the zone of the territorial waters.

At the hour of midnight the new regulations which will carry into effect the ruling of the United States supreme court will become operative Despite protests from 8 maritime na tions which see an unheard of attempt on the part of the U.S. government to apply its jurisdiction to foreign ships, little difficulty was expected. All foreign nations have been formally notified of the new regulations Protests from eight of them have gone unheeded and, so far as state officials disclosed, unanswered.






