Paul J. McCarthy, World War Veteran, Killed While Driving His Car.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 10 .-Scores of police and detectives here were searching today for the un-known slayer of Paul J. McCarthy, 31, attorney, found dead in his car here shortly after midnight.

McCarthy left his home in answer to a telephone call, arranging a meeting with a party near his home. Soon afterwards the body was discovered by a passer-by, who immediately notified the police. The slayer apparently was sitting in or standing close to the car at the time of the shoot ing, for powder burns were found on McCarthy's coat. The bullet entered the left chest and went through the heart, death being instantaneous, physicians said.

McCarthy served four years as assistant municipal counselor while J. C. Denounces as Cowardly Refusal to Bear Responsible Part In Reconstruction.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 .- In a bitter and scathing denunciation of America's attitude on world affairs since the war ended, Woodrow Wilson spoke by radio tonight to an audience of probably more than one million listeners and delivered what may be said to be one of the most

sensational addresses of his career. Within seven or eight minutes, the war president of the United States compressed one of the bitterest structures ever hurled at any nation for what he declared to be America's withdrawal into sullen isolation. He denounced as ignoble, cowardly and dishonorable America's refusal to bear any resposible part in the restoration of peaceful world prosperity, placing on America much of the responsibility for the world's present turmoil and confusion.

Mr. Wilson spoke in the study of his Washington home on "The Meaning of Armistice Day." His voice was obviously choked with emotion almost too great for him. He declared that America's post-war attitude had been despicable and ignoble and that France and Italy seemed to have provided a sinister climax to the European situation by making a scratch of paper of the Versailles

"The proper way for the American people to observe Armistice Day," said the former president, "would be to put away all self-interest and act on the highest ideals of domestic and

international policy."
At times while speaking, Mr. Wilson's voice quavered, and it was dif-ficult to understand some of his phases, although he tried to speak slowly and distinctly.
